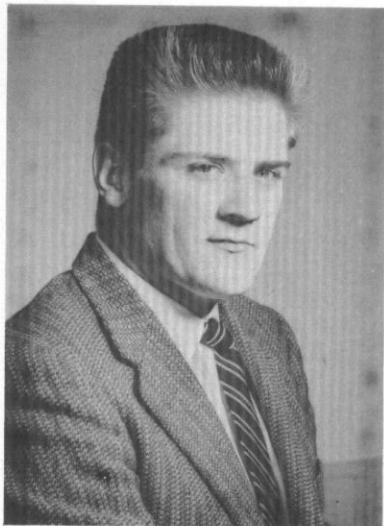
## The Class of 1957

## Dramatics

The Dramatics Club, during the course of this year, has undertaken three noteworthy productions. The first was a skit put on entirely by the Senior Class. This skit depicted, in a very humorous manner, the differences between the new and the old boy and their interpretations of the various rituals of the typical St. Peter's daily schedule. The production was under the able direction of Mr. Ennis and put on during the annual Hollowe'en Party.

The second play was entitled *Dora The Beautiful Dishwasher* or *The Heroine Who Cleaned Up*. This play was a hilarious old-fashioned melodrama with an unscrupulous villain, Lorin Chillingsworth, played by Claude Shostal, who pursued the socially prominent and wealthy but uninformed Mrs. Malvina Hyacinth, portrayed by Brent Fisher. Her adopted son Hector, the hero, Andrew Clark was pursued by a villainess, Andra Morgan, played by Jack Butler, who was determined to marry Hector for his fortune. The plot is unravelled as Arnold Wise, Malvina's attorney, portrayed by Roy Enz, uncovers Lorin Chillingsworth and proves Dora, *The Beautiful Dishwasher*, William Murr, as Malvina's real daughter enabling Hector to marry his true love. This production of Mr. Ennis' was well accepted by students and parents.

The third production was an English version of *The Farces of The Worthy Monsieur Pierre Patelin* which was put on in its entirety by the first and second forms under the direction of Mr. Knauff. It involved a draper who was outwitted by a shepherd in similar circumstances.

## The Singing Peers

This year's Glee Club, maintaining approximately the same number of boys as were in the organization in the past, has a most commendable record. Many new and expert voices immediately filled those vacancies left by last year's graduating class. In addition, much new music, both sacred and secular, has provided the Glee Club with a well-balanced and finished repertoire. The sacred part of this assemblage was taken from the Mass, from well-known Christmas hymns and from noted anthems of the Church. Some of the Glee Club's many favorites in this group include *Create In Me*, *While By My Sheep*, *Ave Maria*, *Lauda Anima*, and *Lo! How a Rose E'er Blooming*. The secular division was made up of songs from the Broadway stage, from traditional college music, and from modern arrangements of old Negro spirituals, and included *The Cockeyed Optimist*, *You'll Never Walk Alone*, and *My Soul's Gonna Rise Again*.

Throughout the year short trips were made to neighboring parishes and communities where the Glee Club either sang the Mass or gave a concert. The Glee Club's season was climaxed by a three-day tour during the Spring Holidays to Washington, D. C., Hatboro, Pennsylvania, and Fort Lee, New Jersey. In all three places they gave concerts, and in Hatboro they sang Evensong as well. The tour, although it was full of work for all involved, was a most enjoyable and rewarding experience.

Looking back over the past year one must realize that it was one of the most successful ever seen at Saint Peter's. Certainly work was not lacking but it was well interspersed with lighter things making it, on the whole, an excellent year. To Father Leeming, Geoffrey Butcher, and the Glee Club go the school's sincerest thanks for a job well done.

## The Bishop's Men

The Bishop's Men is a group chosen from the best vocalists of the Glee Club by Father Leeming and is also under his direction. The organization rehearses one night a week. This year it is composed of eleven students, seven members having returned from last year's group and the remaining four being new boys. The group has established an interesting, well-rounded and virtually entirely new repertoire this year over which it has worked diligently. Father Leeming has utilized this group not only to add versatility and balance to concert programs but also as a booster to the Glee Club in learning new songs. This has been extremely successful and has, in a great way, contributed to the wonderful accomplishments of the Glee Club this year. It has also supplied entertainment at the intermission of school dances and has had various other outside engagements.

The repertoire included, for a humorous touch, such College Gleees as *Not Yet But Soon* and *My Comrades, When I'm No More Drinking*. It also included several religious numbers, and a few popular songs. Also evident is a strong leaning towards Negro Spirituals which is well on its way to becoming a tradition here at Saint Peter's. To add a finishing touch in creating a well-rounded program, a western number entitled *The Bold Vaquero* was also included.

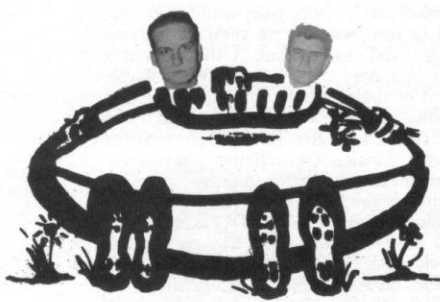
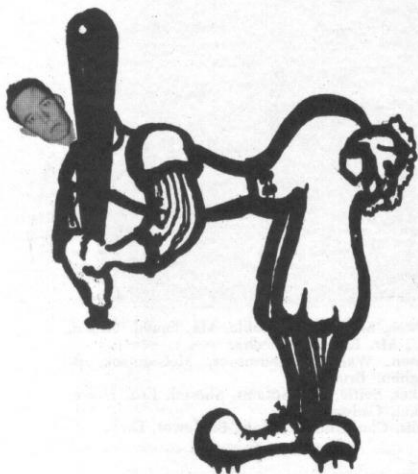

## Varsity Football

This year's football team brought the school its first undefeated season in history. Under the expert tutelage of Coaches Ennis, Hughes, and Knauff the team displayed that spirit, determination, and quality which contribute to a winning season.

When the coaches announced the first practice session some thirty enthusiastic boys arrived at the gym. From this very first practice the boys set a standard which was kept throughout the season. From the time that classes ended in the afternoon the boys had approximately forty-five minutes to get dressed and on the field. They were asked to run two laps on their honor and throughout the entire season never shirked this dull assignment. A short twenty-minute calisthenics period followed the laps and here the team really displayed their spirit by doing every exercise to the best of their ability. The entire practice session rarely lasted over two hours and when the time came to leave the field there were always a few boys who would spend an extra five or ten minutes



perfecting a block or practicing punts. The results of these extra few minutes' practice were quite evident on game days. Practice usually ended with the team's taking three laps as a unit. The boys did this chore conscientiously with the knowledge that their efforts would be rewarded at game time.

Frequently the coaches held live blocking and tackling drills instead of an actual scrimmage. These drills were accomplished by giving one of the backs a ball and a blocker. Two linemen started from about 20-yards away running straight towards the two backs. The blocker was to dispose of one of the

The Hilltoppers were quite fortunate this year in being able to scrimmage two local high schools. These scrimmages gave the boys a chance to show the coaches how both the defense and the offense operated under game conditions.

Another key factor in the Saint's outstanding success was the weather. There were only about six or seven days when rain prevented the team from taking the field. When these rare occasions did arrive the team had calisthenics in the gym or a "chalk talk". These little talks were always beneficial as the problems which were bothering the team could be brought out and thoroughly discussed by the coaches and the team.

The opening game with Oakwood was a test for the Crimson and Gold and they took the field with the determination to win the first one. Norm Pritchard took the opening kickoff 72-yards for his first touchdown of the year. Minutes later the Hilltopper's alert forward wall caused the Quakers to fumble on their own 25-yard line. Three plays later Pritchard scored again.



The following week the Saint's took the South Kent Seconds and won by a decisive margin of 33-13. Charlie Gotsch scored first on a 41-yard end around play. In the opening minutes of the second period Gotsch intercepted a South Kent pass on their 30-yard line. Four plays later Shostal went 20-yards for the score. The Saint's scored again in the fourth on a 49-yard run by Pritchard.



On October 26, Captains Enz and Shostal led the spirited Saints against Trinity Pawling. Trinity took the opening kickoff on their 10-yard line and advanced it to the 25. A third-down fumble proved costly to the boys from T. P. Behind superb blocking of the Saint's forward wall Pritchard, Ratzler, and Gotsch were able to gain considerable yardage with apparently little effort. Midway through the first period Pritchard sped 45-yards for his first tally of the day.

The Saints scored again in the opening minutes of the second period when Hank Buermeyer intercepted a T. P. pass thus en-

abling Ratzter to scamper 42-yards through the enemy defense.

The highlight of the second half came in the fourth period when Stu Jorge intercepted a T. P. pass and went 40-yards for the score. When the final whistle blew the Saints were on the large end of the 38-12 score.

On November 3, the Saints again laid their unblemish record on the line, this time against the Mountaineers of Storm King. The Saint's forward wall, consisting of Bill Murr, Charlie Howe, George Rothermel, Hank Buermeyer, Roy Enz, Andy Clark, and Jack Butler displayed the best blocking of the entire season. The Saints scored first on a 31-yard sprint by Pritchard in the first few minutes of the opening period. With Shostal directing the team the Saints were able to leave the field at half time with a 20-0 lead.

In the second half Shostal connected on two beautiful spot passes to Jack Butler and Norm Pritchard for two more scores. The Mountaineers were able to push over two tallies but they were constantly outplayed and when the game ended the Saints again emerged victorious, this time by a 45-13 score.

Several alumni attended the game and they remarked later that they had never seen a Saint Peter's team with such precision and ability.

On November 10, the Saints brought their perfect season to a close with a 46-25 win over their arch rivals, Saint Luke's. Early in the first period Pritchard went through a tremendous hole opened by Charlie Howe and George Rothermel. Minutes later Hank Wallace intercepted a Saint Luke's pass and two plays later Pritchard again scored. In the closing minutes of the period Shostal connected with Butler on a beautiful pass giving the Saint's an early 19-0 lead.

In the second half each team scored three times. The highlight of this scoring was a 60-yard kickoff return by Charlie Gotsch behind the beautiful blocking of Bill Murr.

When the final whistle blew there was an air of jubilation among the members of the team. As they walked slowly from the field each individual had his own thoughts. Many seniors left the field that day with lumps in their throats knowing that this 1956 season had been the last football season for them. For others the season had been used as a stepping stone to four years of college ball and for the underclassmen the undefeated season presented a challenge—a challenge to come back next year and show everybody that the experience granted them this year would not be soon forgotten.

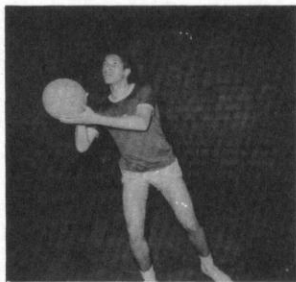
## Varsity Basketball

The 1956-57 basketball campaign was indeed a rewarding one. The brilliant 11-3 record that was compiled by the squad represents the best effort put forth thus far by any Saint Peter's basketball team.

Under the superb direction and leadership of the Saint's new coach "Red" McCarthy the team rose to become one of the leading quintets in Westchester County.

The Saints opened their season before the Christmas holidays against Saint Luke's School from New Cannan Conn. Being their first game it went quite slowly for the first half. After half-time the Saints found themselves and began to work together. By the final buzzer the boys were on top 49-47.

After the holidays the team met the ever powerful Alumni whom they conquered 49-24.



The next few games on the Saints' schedule were by no means easy ones. The team outplayed the Quakers from Oakwood School to overcome a twenty-point deficit and win 55-53. The following game with Scarborough School turned out to be a thriller with the Saints coming out on top 42-41. This was followed by a close contest with Storm King with the Saint's once again emerging victorious by a 44-39 score. Next the Hilltoppers met their crosstown rivals, Peekskill Military Academy, and when the final buzzer sounded they walked off the court with a 62-52 vic-

tory. The team then finished their first half of their season's play with an easy win over Wooster, 47-35, thus giving them a 7-0 record.

On February 14th, the Saint's traveled to New Canaan for a return matched with Saint Luke's. Once again the Crimson and Gold placed their unblemished record on the line. The result of this game proved unfavorable to the Saint's, as they lost 82-43. Two days later the Saints took on Scarborough and lost their second game in a row 76-73 in a hard fought battle. The following game the Saint's bounced back and toppled Oakwood 60-28.

February 23 was again a big day for the Saints. The crosstown rivals, P.M. A. were out to get even for the loss inflicted upon them earlier in the season by the Hilltoppers. By employing a man-to-man zone defense and a triangular offense the Saints emerged victorus 47-40.

The regular season play ended on the following Tuesday when the Saints met and conquered the Mountaineer's from Storm King 69-54 on the latter's court.

On Thursday evening, February 28, the Saints traveled to Children's Village Gymnasium in Dobb's Ferry for the second round of the Westchester County Private and Parochial Championships Having drawn a bye in the first round of play the squad met Children's Village, the winner of the first round.

The Saints found it quite hard to get started because of the speed, consistency, and accuracy of their opponents. At half-time they were down ten points and quite

amazed at their opposition. In the second half the Saints overcame the ten-point difference and went on to win 62-46.

On Saturday March 2, the Hilltoppers met the New York School for the Deaf in the finals of the Class C Championship. The regular starting five comprised of Captain Norm Pritchard, Charlie Howe, Claude Shostal, Jack Butler and John Settle went on the floor with hopes of bringing home the school's first County Championship. Although the Saints defense held up remarkably well throughout the game against such a high-scoring opponent as N. Y.S.D., their offense could not score. Near the end of the game the Saints were forced into a man-to-man defense at which time the opposing quintet surged ahead on fast breaks. At the end of the game the Hilltoppers were on the smaller end of the 66-41 score.

## J. V. Basketball

The J. V. basketball team this year, under the guidance of Mr. Hughes, brought to Saint Peter's a respectable 4-5 record. The team, captained by Charlie Gotsch, jelled together quickly during its short pre-season workouts and by December 12 it was ready to open its season against Saint Luke's.

On December 12 the Junior Saints took the floor for the first time of the campaign and, employing a fast break, easily defeated Saint Luke's 50-29. This general principle of development of the younger boys was to a large extent followed through on the basketball court.

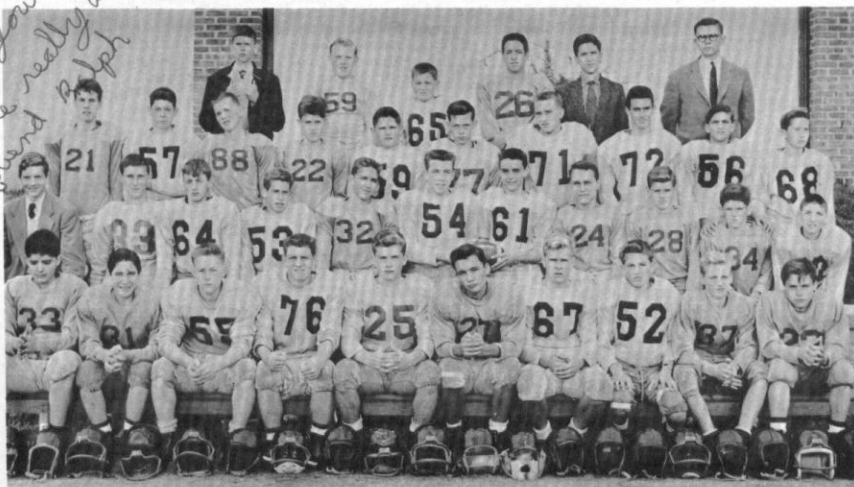

On October 20, the Fifth Form sponsored the first dance of the year. The Senior Class gave their annual Hallowe'en Party on October 31. The highlight of the evening was a skit put on by the Seniors comparing the lives and actions of the new and old students here at school.

As the new buildings were not finished until November 17 we had to live in rather crowded quarters but with their completion as an incentive, we gladly endured the cramped conditions. At last the much anticipated day arrived and the move was completed with little difficulty. The Thanksgiving recess began on November 23 and we left for the first vacation of the year.

On November 26 we returned to school for the final three weeks before Christmas Vacation. The Glee Club and the Bishop's Men earnestly added the

Returning to school on January 4 we were immediately faced with mid-term exams and the Seniors had to cope with College Boards.

The Varsity basketball team followed in the footsteps of the football team by winning its first seven games in a row, winding up the season with an 11-3 record.

The Glee Club trip to the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine in New York City commenced our concert season. In addition to the many scheduled concerts we began to practice for the Spring tour.

On March 16 the Seniors once again took College Boards and the next day the Glee Club departed for Washington, D. C. and the rest of the school left for home.

On April 3 we returned to school for the final two months of the year. Baseball practice started. The Glee Club held its annual Roosevelt concert and dance on May 3 for the benefit of the Scholarship Fund. This affair grows in size every year and for their excellent job the Peers were awarded a banquet in the last week of May.

The Senior Prom was held on May 18. For the first time it took place in McFadden Hall. The twenty-five couples all agreed that this was a highly successful affair.

On May 21 the new Praefects were installed, the Class of '58 took over the administration and the Seniors at last began to relax after a very arduous year.
