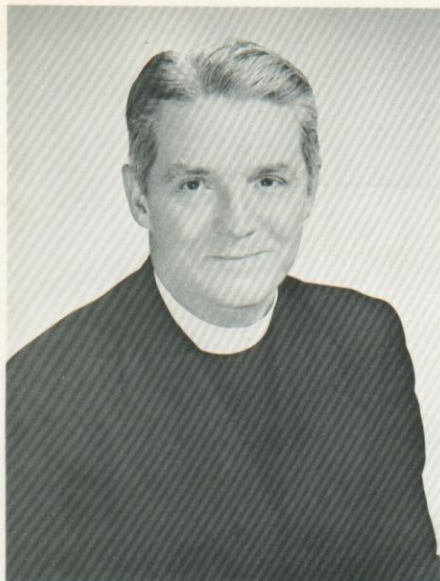
The many boys in her french class remember not only her *petits fours* at Christmas and the *croissants* at her Spring outing but also the able

While the School is sorry to lose this year's Praefects, it knows that the new Praefects will carry out efficiently the tenets of the Saint Peter's Constitution.

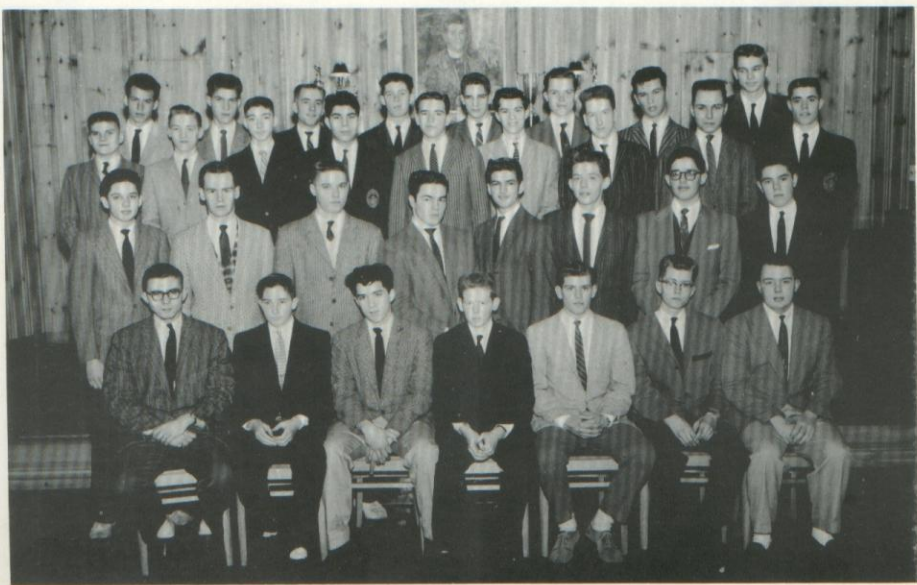

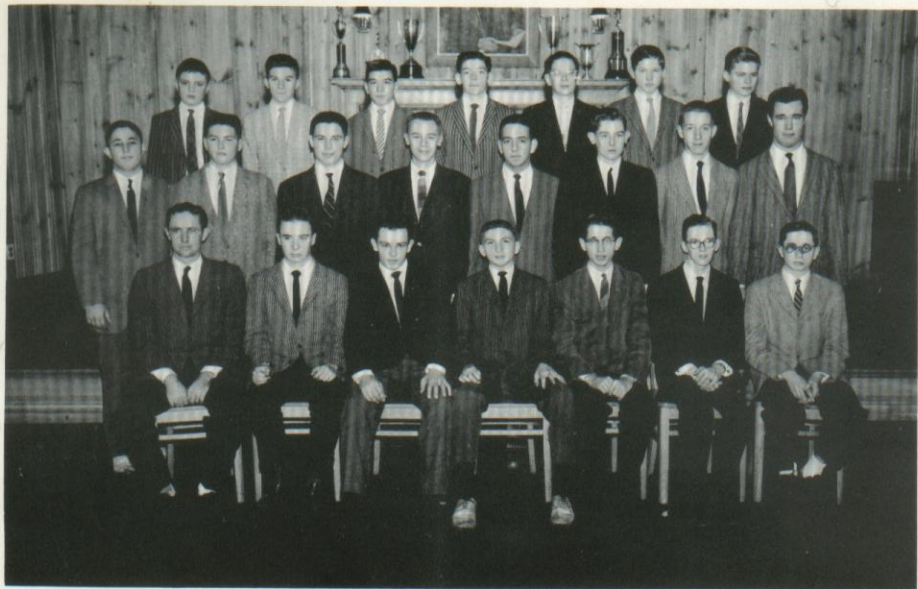

basketball.

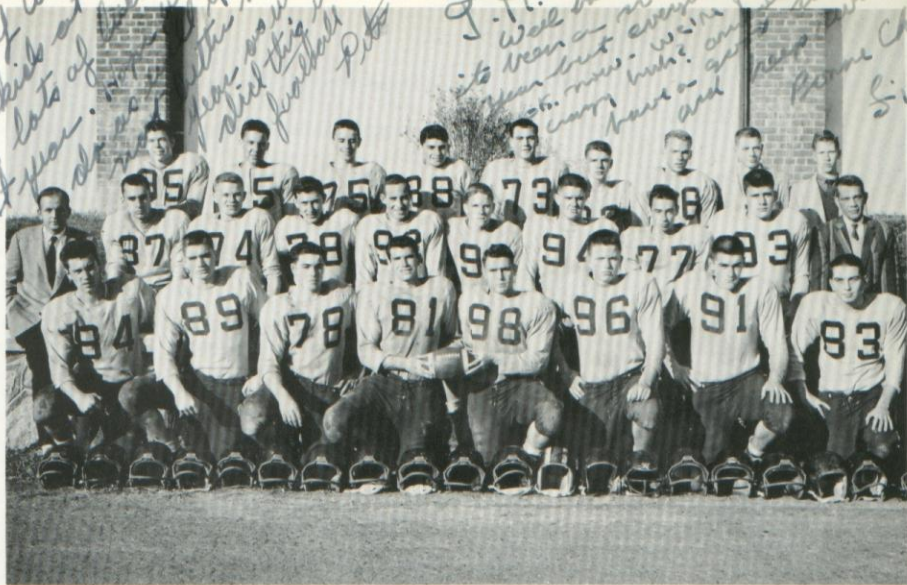

Under the reins of Mr. Ennis, Mr. Gillette, and Mr. Adkins, this year's squad reported to practice full of vim and vigor the day after school was under way. The first practice saw forty-five young hopefuls in full equipment eagerly trying to impress the coaches with their skills. With the depth of our coaching staff the team could be split up between the line and the back-field while Mr. Gillette handled the line. Having separate coaches gave the team the opportunity of

having more concentrated coaching by men who knew their job.

Our schedule this year had the Crimson and Gold slated for five gridiron contests. But then there was the flu epidemic that knocked out virtually everybody but us. Each week there would be a phone call to Mr. Ennis saying, "Sorry, no game because of the flu". Here originated a term which later became a cliché, "Flued Out." Then Mr. Ennis, in dire need of a game, would call anybody. As it turned out we never caught the flu and we managed to have a total of six games. We played South Kent twice, Concordia Prep, whom we will be playing in the future, and Lakeland High School, a local public school, in addition to those on our regular schedule.

A new coach, Mr. Gillette, had the line doing many new and different maneuvers. These maneuvers went from wind sprints, running, and falling on the stomach to the practicing of the four point stance which proved deadly to many of our foe. We also had many variations of live tackling. Mr. Gillette's fine aid was brought to light by our constant-



ly overpowering defense. The defensive forward wall of Ed Baker, George Rothermel, Andy McLaughlin, Mal McDowell and Hank Buermeier was hardly ever stopped.

Probably the most evident factor in our inability to win more than we did was our lack of depth. Offensively, lack of depth can cause many problems. It means the coach has to leave all his starting eleven throughout the game thus giving no rest to some boys who might need it, which happened quite frequently. When a player was hurt, the coach would send a substitute in hoping for the best. Also, it gives the other team, if they have depth, a chance to put fresh athletes against rather tired ones.

Again this year the weather was in our favor. Only a few days of practice were given to rain. When rain did prevent practice, the team had a "skull practice" where problems of the field could be ironed out on the blackboard.

The Saints, this year, were able to schedule two scrimmages, but one of those was "Flued Out". The scrimmage we did manage to play was with Millbrook School, a school we had never come in contact with athletics before. We were able, via the scrimmage, to show the coaches what we had and what to expect during the season.

The Hilltoppers opened the season on Oct. 5th by beating one of their rivals from the Nutmeg State, Wooster School, by a score of twelve to seven. Charlie Gotsch tallied for one T.D. after a recovered fumble by McDowell. The other touchdown was scored by Dick Warrington.

On Oct. 12th many disheartened spectators saw Saint Peter's longest skein of football victories broken at six games which had endured last season and one of this year. Our loss came at the hands of South Kent by the score of 19-0. In this game, our lack of depth was evident because South Kent was always putting in fresh athletes, proving too much for the overplayed Crimson and Gold.

The Saints made it two and one for the season when they trampled Oakwood 24-0 on Oct. 19. This was an extremely impressive game compared to past engagements. Despite a muddy turf under foot, we gained 291 yards rushing to Oakwood's 130 yards, and had thirteen first downs to their four. Led by the fine blocking of George Rothermel, the offense could not be stopped that day. A new offensive backfield was initiated in this game. It consisted of Tony Roberts as quarterback, Pete Liff at fullback, and Stu Jorge and Charlie Gotsch at the halfback

slots. This contingent stayed as our backfield for the rest of the season.

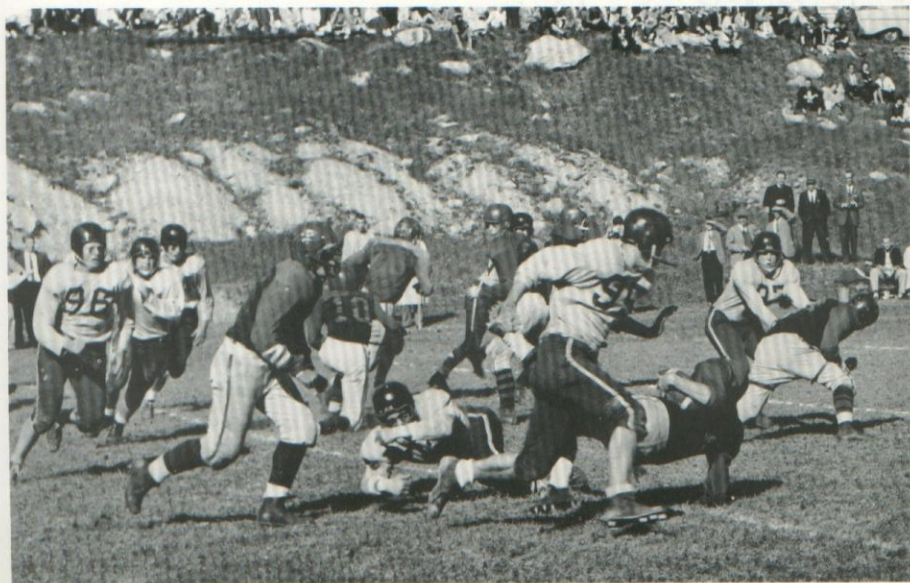
"Flued out" of their regularly scheduled game with Trinity Pawling, the Hilltoppers were fortunate in getting a game with Concordia Prep. Despite the brilliant defensive work which the Saints displayed, they found themselves on the short end of a 13-6 decision due mainly to twelve unprecedented fumbles in the backfield. Both touchdowns came directly from the Saint's miscues. The Saints had scoring opportunities but they failed to monopolize on them. Twice the pigskin was inside the twenty yard line and three times Charlie Gotsch intercepted Concordia passes. One benefit that the Saints received from the game was that they will have Concordia Prep. on future schedules. Again being flued out of a scheduled game, the Saints took the gridiron against Lakeland High School on Nov. 2nd. For the second consecutive game the Saints found themselves on the short end of a 13-7 decision. Our lone touchdown was scored by left end, Tom McCormack on a spot pass by Tony Roberts. This was the climax of a long sustained drive by the Hilltoppers, sparked by the brilliant running of Pete Liff and Stu Jorge.

Our final game of the season was a rematch with South Kent on Nov. 9th. This being our last game, the Saints really showed the desire to win

but it was not enough because the boys from Pig-tail found themselves with nineteen as opposed to the Saint's six. In this game our backfield worked better and appeared to be more co-ordinated. Sparked by long runs by Charlie Gotsch and Stu Jorge, our offense was rolling only to be stopped by South Kent at crucial moments.

When the game was over it marked the closing of another successful football season at Saint Peter's. For many disheartened seniors this was perhaps their last season of football. For the underclassmen it was a season that can be bettered if they meet the challenge and strive for the best.

The season was brought to a climax when the annual fall sports banquet was held. Those qualifying for Varsity letters at the banquet were: co-captain, Charles Gotsch, Peter Iliff, Dick Warrington, Stu Jorge, Tony Roberts, co-captain George Rothermel, Tom McCormack, Malcolm McDowell, Andy McLaughlin, Hank Buermeyer, Ed Baker, Don Church and manager, John McCue. The captain-elect were Andy McLaughlin and Tom McCormack. They will be next year's leaders of the Squad and all the luck goes to them for a successful season.

Fencing

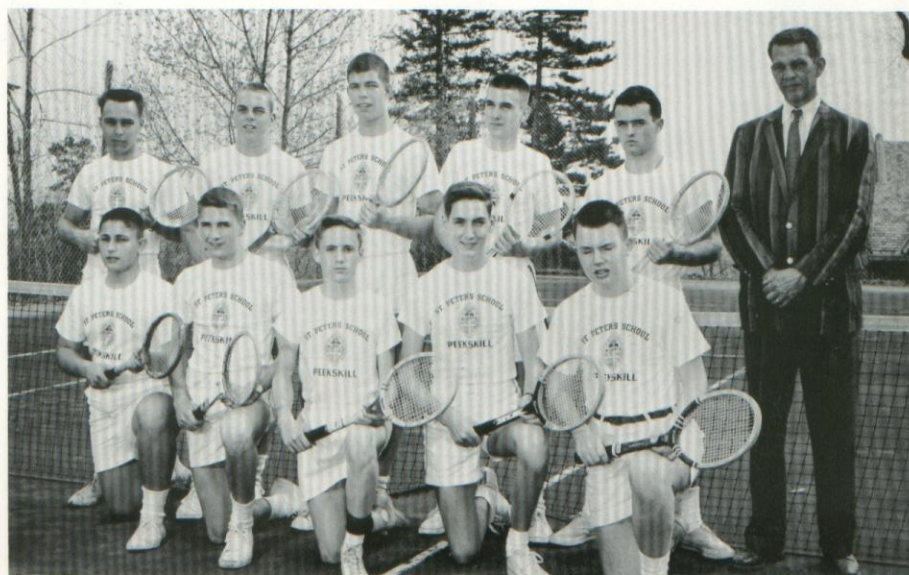

The J.J. Hoopsters had a more commendable season than the J.J. Footballers. The Junior Saints

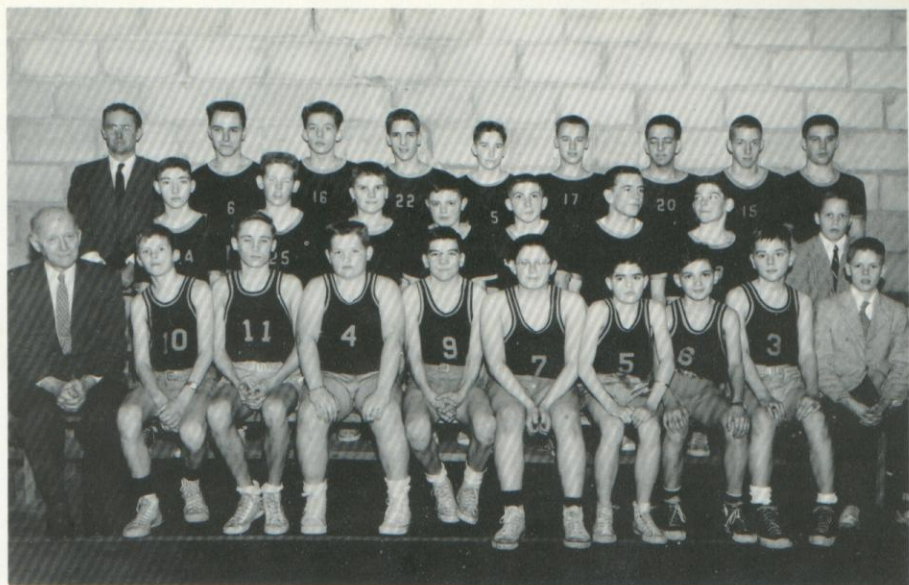

The Year In Retrospect



The School started its Twentieth year on Monday, Sept. 16th 1957 when the Senior Class arrived on campus for the ensuing year. The Seniors spent the following day fixing up the campus in general, for it was then that the new boys arrived. It was the job of the Senior Class to see that every new arrival placed all his clothes and "wot-not" in his designated room.

Besides the great influx of new students this year, we have acquired three new masters, Mr. Adkins, master of English, Mathematics and Sciences; Mr. Gillette, master of Higher Mathematics; and Father Pickett, master of first and second form classes.

On Thursday, Sept. 19th, the remainder of the School arrived and was surprised to note that a great many changes had been made during the past summer. Much of the work had been done by two of the students who remained over the summer under the able direction of Mr. Fleischman and Mr. Terbush.

A new filter system had been added to the pool which became ours upon the acquisition of the McFadden Estate two years ago. The old Main-house dish pantry was renovated and made into an office for the dean of the school, Mr. McDowell.

After serving Saint Peter's for a total of eleven years as Director of Athletics, Mr. McDowell has stepped down from his post and turned the reins over to Mr. Ennis. With the School enrollment at a height of one hundred and nineteen boys, the job of dean has become a full time occupation.

On October 11th, Saint Peter's had its annual fall Parent's Day and Fair. A great deal of preparation went into the auction and Fair which was held in the gym. The day began at about ten thirty A. M. when the





parents started to arrive. As there was no school that day, all the boys were able to go to the Fair with their parents.

While the auctioning was going on inside the gym, the Senior Class had a concession of its own outside at which hamburgers, hot-dogs, coffee and soda were sold. This concession was an overwhelming success being busy the whole day long.

At the close of the day a grand total of one thousand-seventy dollars was reached for the benefit of the Scholarship Fund.

On the same day the building, which was formerly known as New Dorm, was named in honor of Harriet Husted and Nicholas Harvey Stabb, who were with Father Leeming from the very beginning of the school back in 1938. It was felt by the trustees, alumni, and friends of the school that this edifice would be a fitting tribute to Aunt Harriet and Uncle Harvey, as they were affectionately known.

Uncle Harvey served as the director of the financial affairs of the School, while Aunt Harriet served as house mother, and as many alumni remember, keeper of the Chapel. They both performed many valuable services which were a great help in building the School to its present state before their deaths in March, 1955.

On the night of November second, the Seniors held their annual Hallo-wen Party in the Study Hall. The party started sharply at eight o'clock. As soon as the entire student body arrived, the judging of their costumes commenced. The costumes this year were original to say the least.

The Senior Class presented a take-off on the S.P.S. faculty. The only scenery required was one chair, which was supposed to be in the faculty coffee room. The objective of each faculty member that entered the coffee room was to see if he could persuade the member of the faculty that was





already seated to get up and give him the seat. "Father Leeming" was the ultimate winner. Following this skit came a series of skits, all of which were supposed to represent the faculty in class. A general education was had by all.

On October twentieth the fifth form sponsored the first dance of the year. The *jeunes filles* came mainly from Saint Mary's.

On Tuesday evening, the twenty-sixth of November, the annual football banquet was held, bringing the football season to a close. Unfortunately, this year's team had a two and four record. In spite of that the team was commended for its performance throughout the season. Because of the flu the team was over-matched in two instances and in a third replayed South Kent who had previously beaten them.
