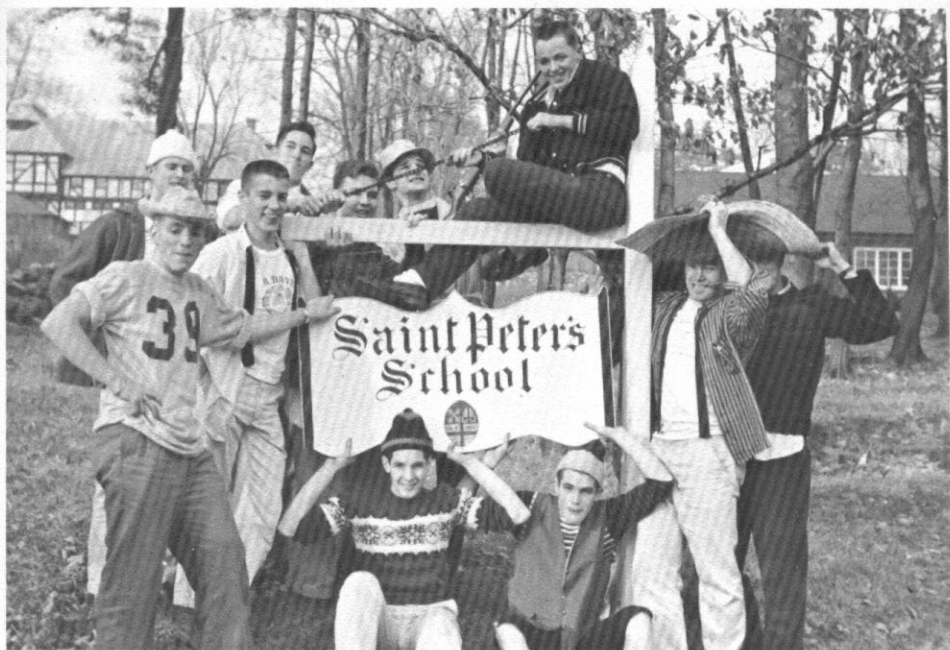

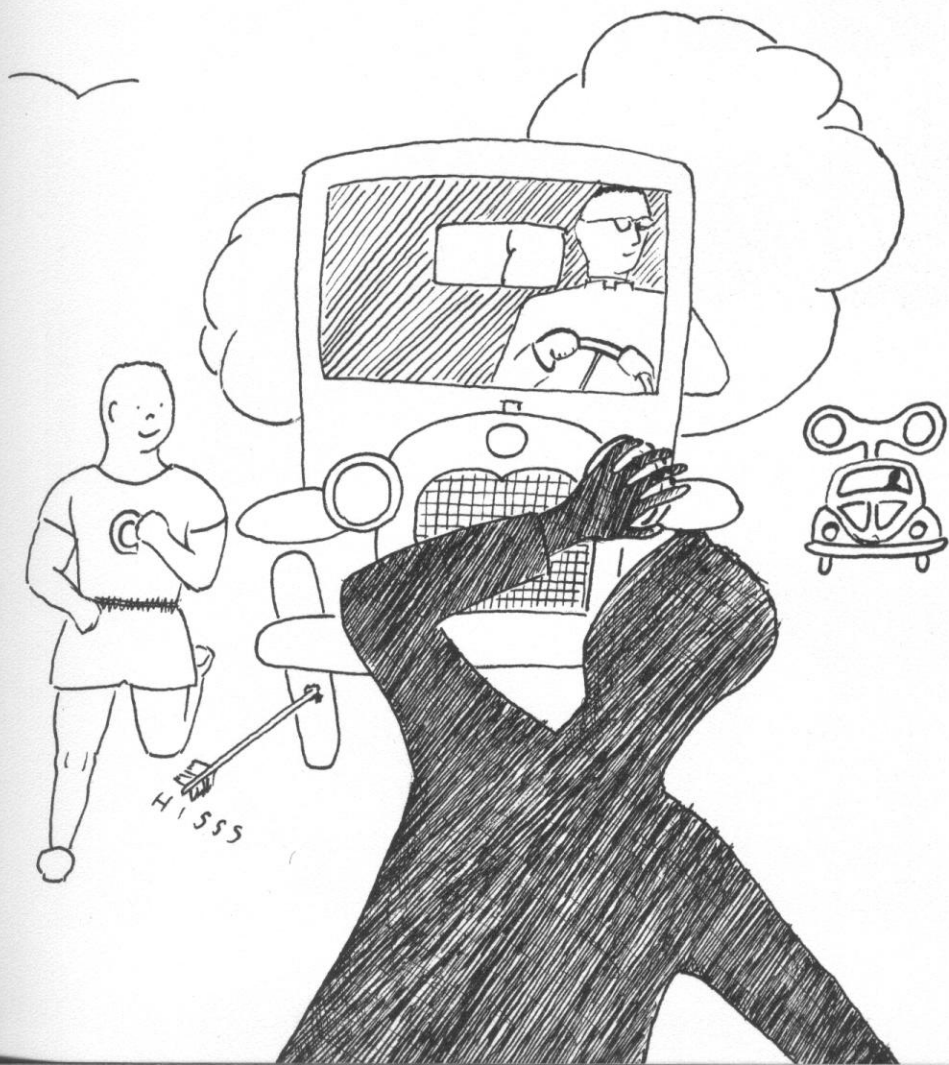
Message from the Headmaster

Classe Historie



ne brisk, invigorating, fall day in mid-September, 1954, four small, unsure, worried boys found themselves deposited on the campus of Saint Peter's School, running unsteadily about amid the confusion which always accompanies the beginning of a new school year. While some of

these youngsters were destined to fall by the wayside in future years, others faced a bright and enlightening future above the verdant Hudson Valley.

As soon as our youthful heroes got their bearings they began to create such a general disturbance as the school had never seen before. Poor Annex, the dorm in which the boys were quartered, practically split its weathered sides from so much wild rollicking and devilish antics.

In 1955 the class of '60 gained strength as it was increased to thirteen little panthers. Avoided, even feared by the more sophisticated upper formers, the class added to its high scholastic record such a list of unheard of pranks as to turn senior hairs gray and curdle the faculty's blood. Mr. Barnett's scared eyes and Mrs. Campbell's eternal weariness were living testimony to the hell raising of that fantastic second form.

Although ranked as "immature" by older schoolmates, the little ones were highly respected for their scholastic achievements.

When the class returned next year, they found themselves to be greatly increased in numbers. They were at last recognized as acceptable members of the student body.

The boys were crammed inside the antiquated walls of what is now the infirmary while Stabb Hall was having the finishing touches put on it. The newspapers have recently been full of the new college fad, phone-booth cramming, but nothing has been said of our unsung thirty-two who found themselves oozing from the windows and doors of that tiny building.

Finally in November Stabb Hall was finished and the third form flocked down *en masse* under the burden of their belongings to a figurative heaven of new paint, thick mattresses, and cardboard-thin walls. Later in the year one of our classmates, now departed, found himself catapulted through the wall, thus making his own door. Having seniors in the adjoining section of the building,

discipline was strict and the possession of food was purely honorary. Seniors travelled in groups of no less than three, for a lone wolf often found himself beset upon by a flock of vengeful demons who could wield a broom handle with startling dexterity.

In spite of all this savagery, the scholastic standing of the form did not suffer. A large percent of the honor roll was occupied by third formers.

September, 1957, found the class of '60 a more "mature" group of boys. There was already serious thought of the future years when the governing of the school would be turned over to the form. Marks improved and the class felt the first weight of responsibility on its shoulders. The ice cream concession, inherited from the previous fourth form, was a tremendous success, proving the mercenary qualities of the shrewd-dealing form.

The boys, spurred on by their incentive to maintain a good average, often broke the rule by burning the midnight oil, constantly on the lookout for that ominous station wagon which sped noiselessly through the night without lights.

Once an "indestructable" chair was broken by the first person who sat in it. Boy, the lid sure blew on that one! We were sitting on the floor for weeks, but during the night the privileged few who studied in their rooms smuggled a few chairs back in a most devious way.

In September, 1958, the form was quartered almost entirely in Stabb Hall, except for a hardy few who suffered the noisy radiators of Main House. Conversation invariably ran to topics such as who were going to be Praefects or which college would suit us best.

Many boys in the fifth form were very active in the sports programs and contributed to winning seasons throughout the year.

The fifth form year was a fast moving whirl of hard work, social activities, sports, and other extra curricula. In May the Dragnet was placed upon our shoulders, and we arose to the new responsibility, eager to improve upon it. The administration placed a wary eye on the boys who still found life an endless joy ride, and posed the question, "Who would be mature enough to carry the responsibility authorized to seniors and who would have to fall by the wayside?" As it turned

out only four did not return, and two due to family disturbances.

As the end of that year approached, the five Praefects were elected through secret ballot by the student body, and the inspectors were appointed. The old senior class then stepped out, leaving us to carry on. The graduation ceremony held new meaning for the form, for it was then that the class of 1960 reached its long awaited goal.

Fall brought the new senior class back to campus with a feeling of awe for the task that lay before. As older brothers, they welcomed the new boys, showed them about, and got them settled. This was indeed a new feeling, to be at last looked up to and respected by the student body. Privileges inherent to every senior class became ours to use properly, and thus set a good example to the rest of the student body.

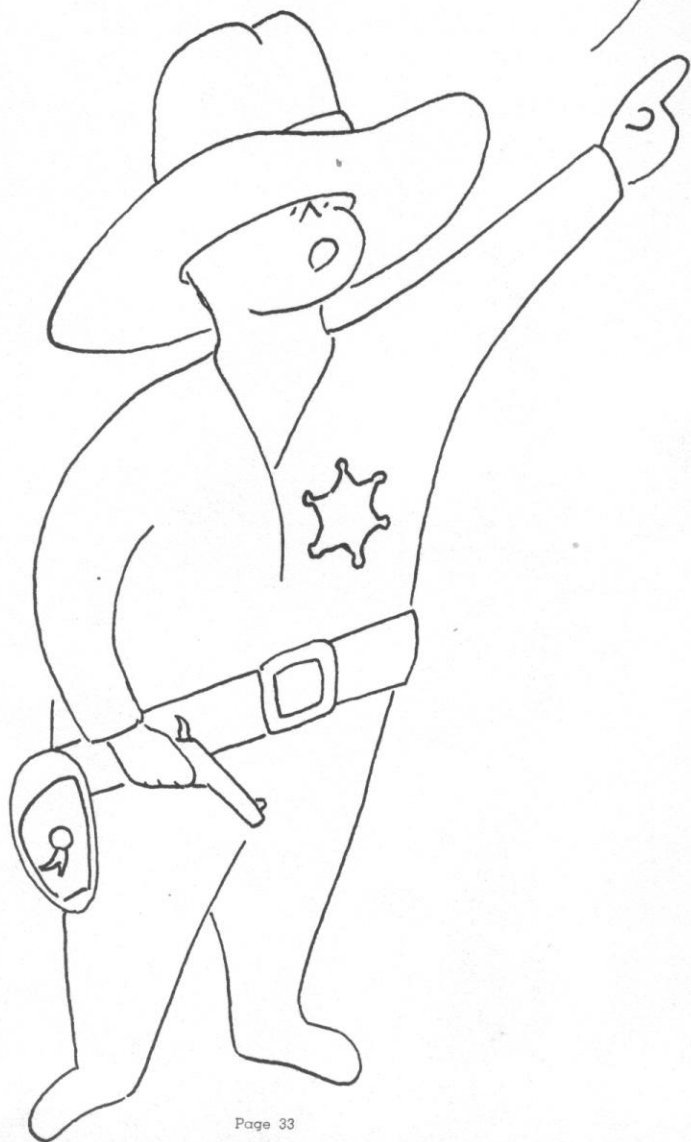

The class suddenly realized how important were all the past years of work. Applications were sent in, and the results were awaited with bated breath.

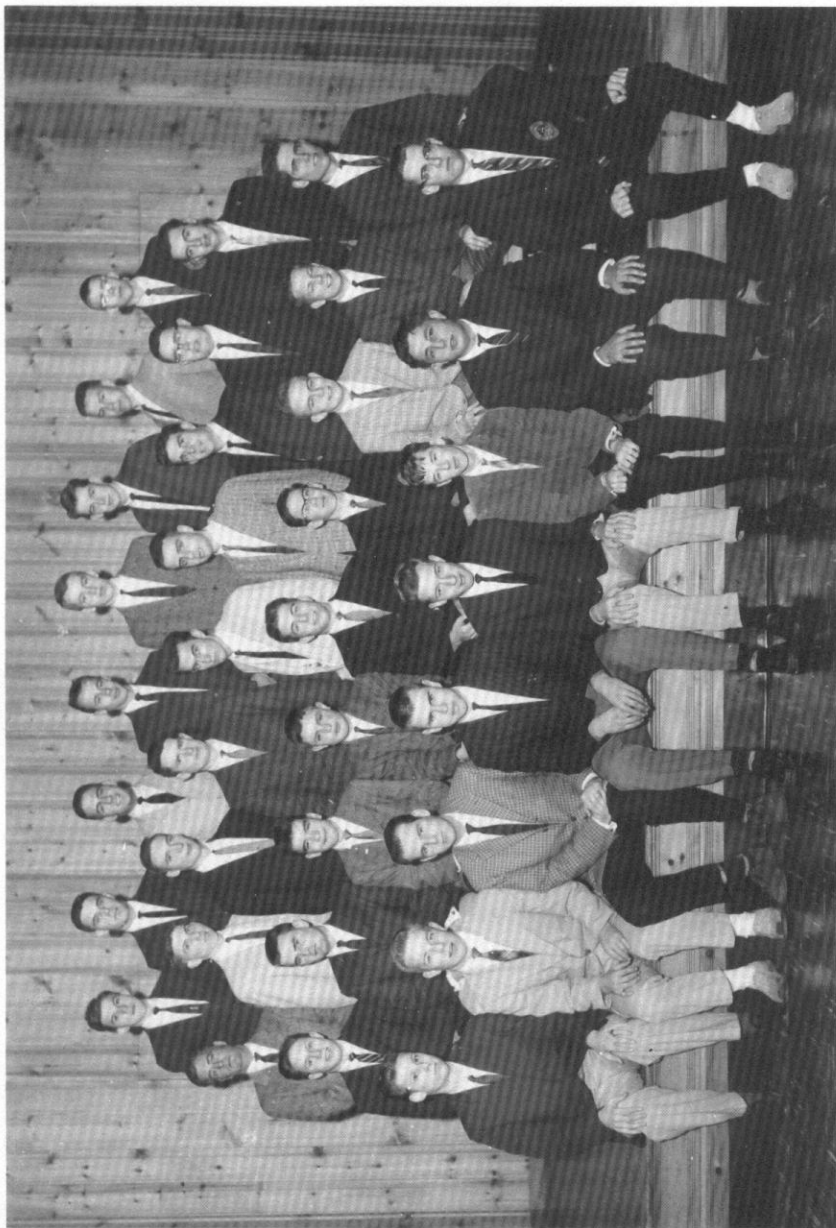

Saint Peter's is unique in many aspects. One of the most important of these is in the governing of the student body. These administrative duties are usually handled by the seniors under supervision of the headmaster and the faculty.

The Praefects, elected by a secret ballot, administer at all assemblies, meetings, etc., and play a large part in running the diverse houses. Many decisions are carried out by the Praefects, and this relieves the faculty of extra duties.

The Student Council is another important branch of school administration. This council is composed of the Praefects, the presidents and vice presidents of the fifth and fourth forms, and the third form president. It is presided over by the Senior Praefect and a faculty advisor who acts as a liaison between the student body and the faculty. The purpose of this council is to administer punishments to students for infractions of the rules.

We should take pride in the fact that the student council has so much freedom and backing in making decisions and in suggesting reforms for school functions.

The inspectors are involved with supervising the different jobs which are a part of our self-help policy. To them is entrusted the upkeep of the interior of the buildings and the desired atmosphere of living in the dorms.

This concept of student administration has worked well at the school and is a credit to all.

When the boys returned this fall a few days early, one of the most noticeable traits of Mr. Ennis' hopefuls, was a predominance of considerably smaller candidates than in years past. Most of these, with the exception of four or five boys, had not played varsity ball before, and lacked much needed game experience.

After several weeks of very hard work by all concerned, the first game with Guntery came up. Although very much out weighed by their opponents, the lack of experience in game conditions was the biggest deterring factor from our success.

On Parents' Day Wooster met with a very determined team of Hilltoppers: but their ground game having been stalled, they found two flaws in our pass defense, and the Saints suffered their second loss, 12-0.

At South Kent, the Saints discovered their flaws, and after being socked for three quarters, managed to control the ball for the last quarter, scoring twice. Although they lost 26-12, the team became aware of their own strengths and weak points, and learned from this game how to use them to best advantage.

When Millbrook arrived, after having the game postponed because of transportation problems due to the rainy weather, the Saints were ready for a tough battle. Although they controlled the ball throughout the game, they could not muster the needed scoring punch, and the game ended in a 0-0 tie.

On the rain soaked field of Oakwood the Saints met a fiery team who soon after the game started found themselves outclassed. The Hilltoppers clicked time and time again, and the offensive unit had many chances to try plays not used before. The experience that they received proved quite worthwhile later in the season, and even the alternate team managed to score, bringing about a 32-0 victory in favor of the Saints by the end of the game.

On November 7 the Saints journeyed to New Rochelle to meet the undefeated Concordia Prep. team. As had become natural, the rain accompanied them for the entire duration of the game. A raging battle surged up and down the field with both teams taking turns. In the third quarter Concordia capitalized on a blocked punt to make the score 7-0, and in the fourth quarter the Saints did the same, the point-after touchdown, however, fell inches short, and the Saints returned home after a very hard 7-6 defeat.

On November 14 the newest member to our schedule, King School, met with the rain-played Hilltoppers and for the fourth straight game it poured all afternoon. The Saints matched score for score in the first half, but missed an extra point, and at the half, the score was 14-13. When they retook the field the second half, the depth of the King School bench proved to be too much for our battered, rain-soaked heroes, and at the end of the game the score was 32-13.

Along with the lack of experience of the team, they were hampered also by many injuries, which held them back considerably.

The important thing, although a tremendous record was not compiled, was that many boys were given the chance to play, and everyone had fun while learning at the same time the principles of sportsmanship and competition.

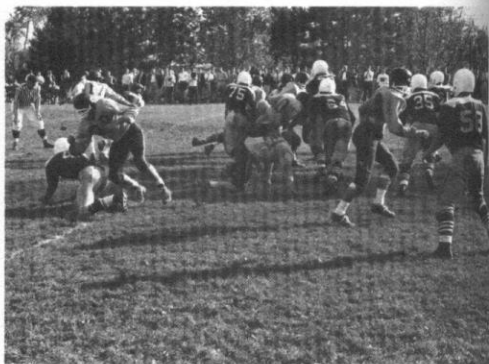

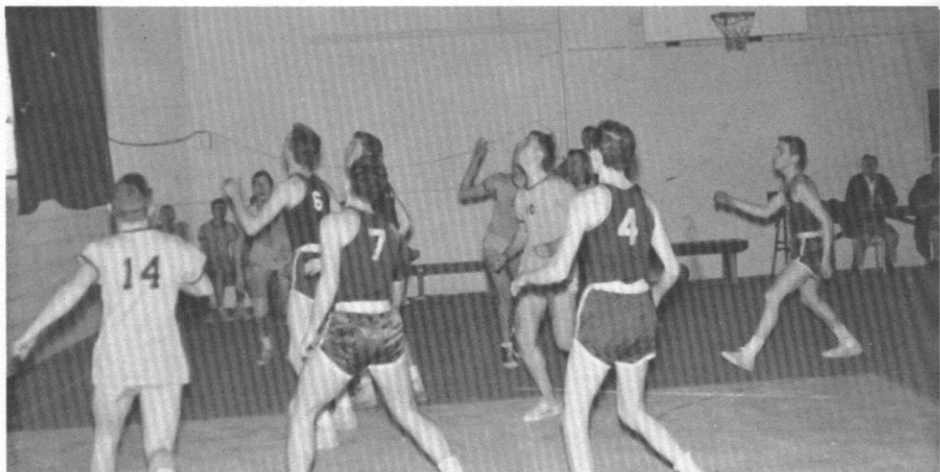

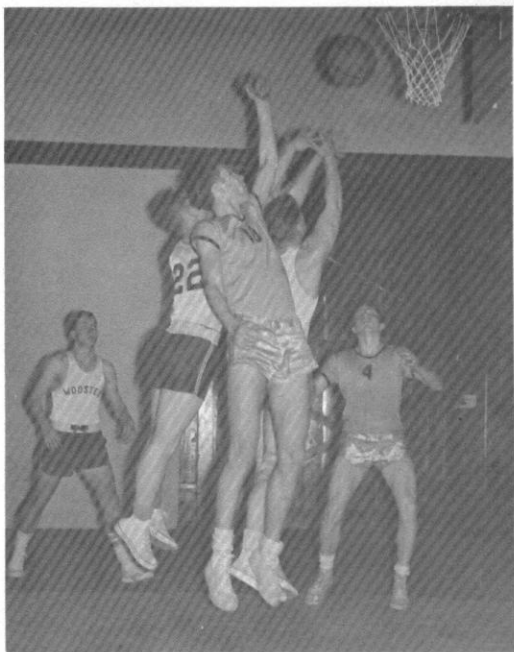

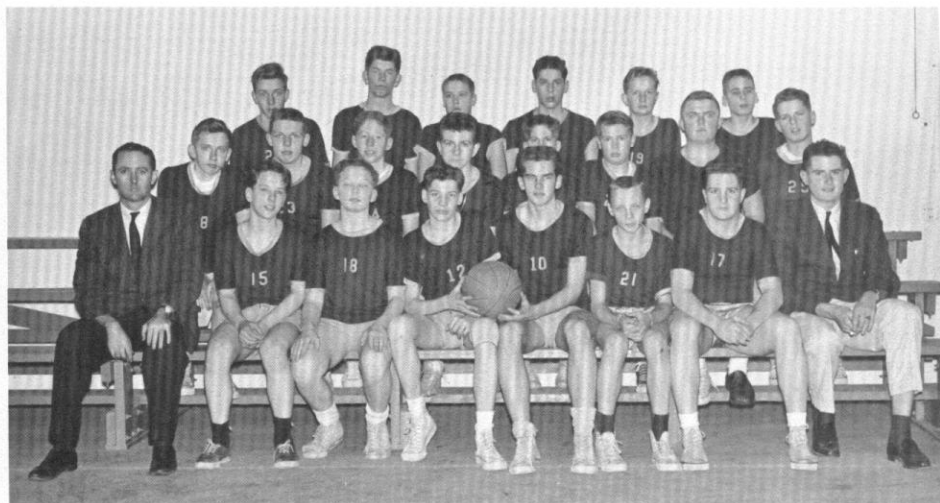
After the two quick defeats the varsity came back to win their last three games to complete the season with an outstanding record of thirteen victories against only two defeats.

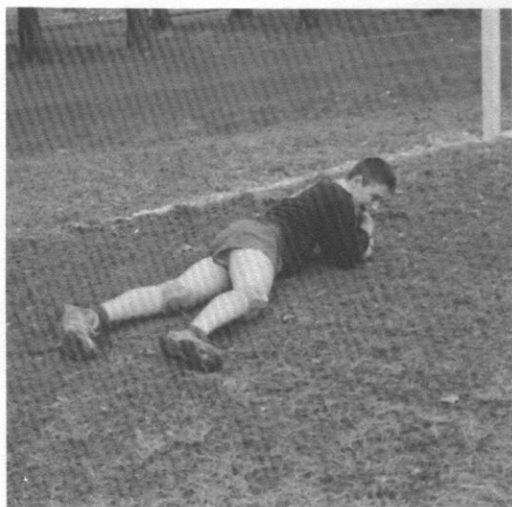
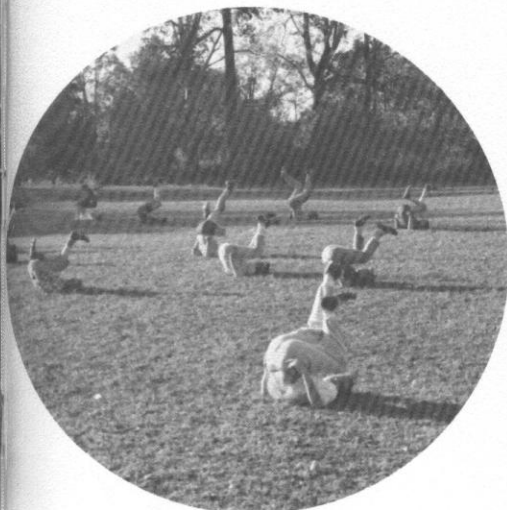

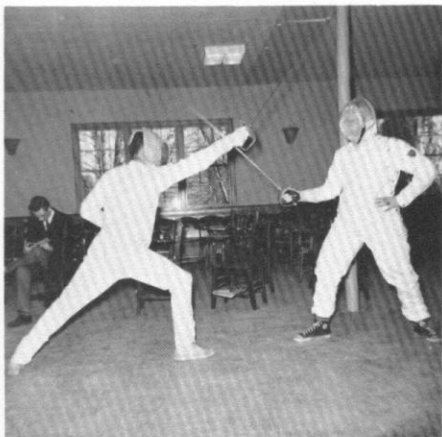
FENCING

Riflery

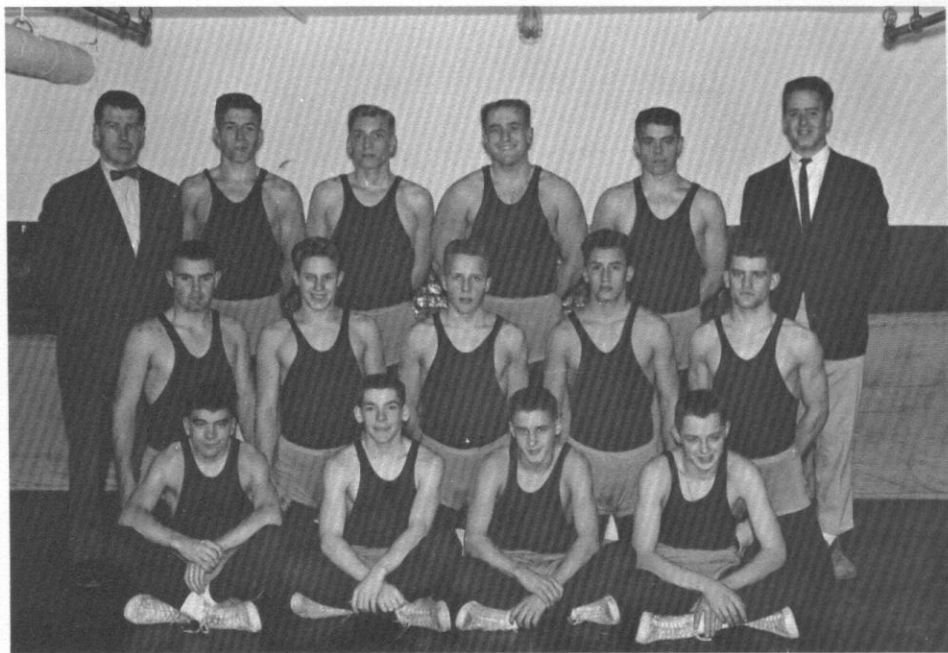
