


The Dedication

Administration

The Student Administration is the basic concept of the Self-help Plan at baint Peter's School, at 15 composed of two scoarage appointed staffs, the Praefects and Inspectors, and one elected staff, the Student Council.

The Praylocis are each essipped to a domitory and are one steel with much of the responsibility of keeping order in the house. They are second only to the Housemaster in this responsibility. In general, the Praefects are appointed to lead the rest of the student body in the function of the school. It is one of their general, duties to proctor the exemina study hall. The appointments of the Praefects are made known to the rest of the student body on Ascension Day, and for the last week of the sortion year, they assume their responsibilities from the preceding senior class.

In addition to the four Praefects there is a subpraefect who is appointed to administer disciplinary measures for minor intractions of the rules which do not warrant action by the Student Council. The subpraefect issues work upits of one half hour each for each offense to the offender. The sub-praefect is also responsible for arranging the seating plan in the study half, the job assignment list, and the table arrangepient for students in the dining room.

The Inspectors are appointed by the Praefects and the Headmaster co-operatively. They are assigned to keep the brighings and grounds in order. They assume their respective responsibilities from the preceding senior class with the new Praefects for the last week of school.

The Student Council, the third of the three staffs, assumes responsibility for making changes in the function of the school with the approval of the Headmaster and faculty, and to discipline students who seriously infringe upon the rules. The Student Council is composed of the Praefects, the Presidents and Vice-presidents of the upper three Forms, and the President of the Third Form. It is run entirely by democratic principles and its members are elected by the student body strictly according to democratic procedures.

The Student Administration remains by a long-established tradition one of the most outstanding aspects in Saint Peter's School.

Defensive Lineup

The Varsity Football team was not successful in their 1961 football season. In the opening game against Oakwood on their home grounds Bill Holmes took the ball from Ed Franzese on an inside reverse and galloped sixty-three yards for the winning touchdown in a 13-0 victory. Following the Oakwood victory came five straight defeats at the hands of Wooster, South Kent, Concordia, Millbrook and the Gunnery. In the last game of the season a late fourth period drive enabled the Varsity Saints to tie King School 6-6 and finish with a 1-5-1 record.





difficult to recover from during the course of a


