

of St. Peter's. Good luck and, as always, God bless.




TRACK TEAM

The 1964 Track Team was one of the finest teams the school has ever built. The inspiration of Mr. McDowell, in his final year at Saint Peter's, led the Saints on to win nine out of ten dual meets. Loosing to Trinity Pauling and taking a close second in the Millbrook Invitational. The teams primary drawback at these two last meets of the seasons was the loss through injury of Co-Captain Lew Barnes. If Barnes had not been injured the team could have easily picked up these victories and had an undefeated season.

Co-Captains Andy Schuyler, and Lew Barnes led the rest of the powerful team on to the breaking of numerous records. All records were broken except the half mile. Schuylers 162'6" javelin throw, and 51'1" shotput, Barnes 22.9 sec. 220, and Hartmans 140'7" discus throw were only a few exceptional feats obtained by the Hilltoppers.

Coach McDowell had been building this team for three years. Painstaking time was spent on style and perfection in many fields. No member of the team was a specialist. Inspite of the large squad, every man could compete in three or four events.

The season's outcome, we feel, is the best present the team could give to Mr. McDowell in his closing year at St. Peter's.




JUNIOR VARSITY BASEBALL

VARSITY SOCCER

Saint Peter's soccer team, with an unexceptional record of five wins and five losses, was nevertheless a fairly exceptional team, made up mostly of promising underformers and new boys. The few returning lettermen were invaluable to the young team during the season, which was certainly much better than the record shows.

The Saints got off to a very slow and depressing start, losing to Yorktown and New York Military Academy. In the next game the school's archrival, Peekskill Military Academy, soundly defeated the team in a well-fought battle, only doing this because they out-hustled the Saints, just as the teams did in the two previous games. The team finally began to show its true worth in the game against a rather mediocre team from Oakland. Against an excellent team from Rockland the soccer players suffered yet another humiliating defeat. With a record of four losses and one win, the Saints at last settled down to do a good job and promptly ran over an excellent Trinity Pawling unit, in one of the hardest games of the season. P.M.A. was next in line for a lesson, and the soccer players beat them in a very strenuous game, that went into overtime. In the last Varsity game of the season, the team beat a much improved team Scarborough, in a well fought encounter.

Under the excellent supervision of Sterling Louthan, the new coach, the team did a good job.










