



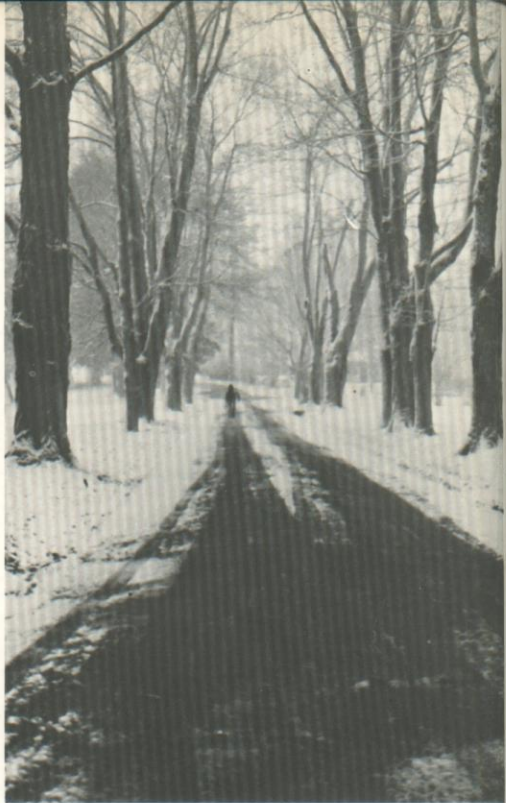

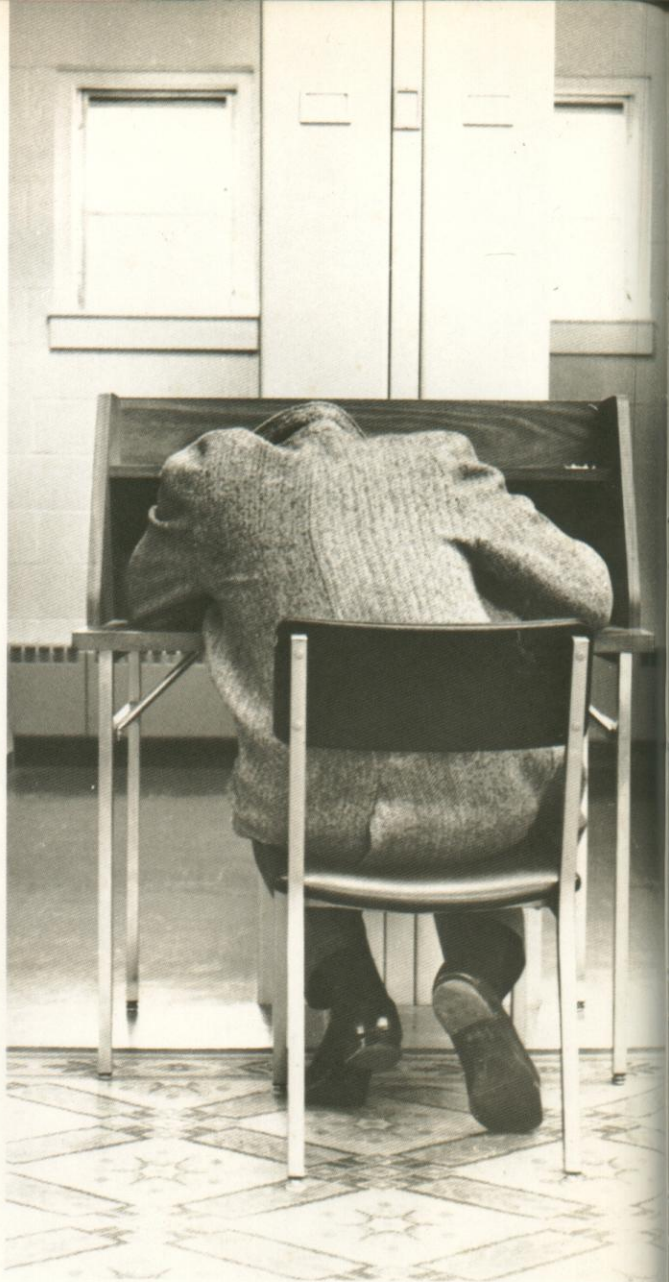

This fall St. Peter's students returned to find many campus improvements. The Gymnasium, Schoolhouse, and the Administration Building have all been renovated. The gym has been insulated and a new heating system has been installed. Presently the gym is being painted, and, once completed, new fiberglass backboards will be installed.

The Athletic Department is also undergoing some needed changes. Both Varsity Football and Soccer have received new uniforms. The football squad now has a white uniform with maroon and gold trim down the sides of the pants and over the shoulders. The varsity soccer team wears yellow shorts with a maroon stripe down the side, and white, long-sleeved jerseys with maroon edging.

A new rug has been installed in the entrance to the Schoolhouse, and the two rooms just inside the door have been converted into a typing room and a Theology room. The Astronomy class has received several new telescopes, along with the latest star charts and maps.

Able Masters Join Faculty

The faculty constitutes an important part of any educational system because its members provide the incentive to work and to learn. The course that an institution takes is directed to a great extent by these men. St. Peter's welcomes eight new masters and is glad to have these competent and enthusiastic gentlemen with us.

This academic year sees the baptism of several neophytes into the teaching profession. Mr. Timothy Ross is one such gentleman. As a first-year teacher, he comes to us from Franklin-Marshall College where he received his A.B. in Economics last June. Mr. Ross teaches Fusion Algebra, Introductory Physical Science, and Earth Science. He will coach baseball and assist in coaching wrestling. Mr. Ross, a native of Peekskill, enjoys horse racing. He lives in an apartment in Stabb Hall.

Another apartment in Stabb is occupied by Mr. David Tower, who comes from Boston. He graduated from Williams College and studied in his Junior year at the University of Munich. Mr. Tower, who has had experience in working with disadvantaged children on the Winter Study Project in Paterson, N.J., teaches Geometry and First and Second Form Mathematics. Among his interests are classical music, cross country, skiing, and sailing.

Another novice on our teaching staff is Mr. James Doyle, who prepared for college at Scarborough School. Also in his first year of teaching, he graduated with an A.B. from Wabash College. He teaches Lower School History and coaches Lower School soccer and tennis. His particular interests lie in the fields of East Asian Studies, Urban Studies, and college sports. Mr. Doyle, who comes from New York City, resides in McFadden Hall.

Also living in McFadden with his lovely wife is Mr. B. Roberts Howarth, a native of Baltimore, Maryland. An alumnus of Randolph-Macon College, he has taught in summer school and has substituted in the Richmond public schools. Mr. Howarth teaches Lower School English and coaches football, baseball, and track. He derives a great deal of satisfaction from coaching and from collecting antiques.

Occupying the newly refurbished Manning House is Mr. James Colao. Born in Peekskill, he has both an A.B. and an M.A. from Temple University. Mr. Colao teaches Modern European History and American History. Additionally, he is the yearbook advisor, assists with the Library, and plays the organ in Chapel. He enjoys music and golf.

Living with us in the dormitory are the Howes. Mr. William C. Howe, who prepared at the Landon School, received his B.F.A. in French from Yale University. Mrs. Howe is an alumna of Albertus Magnus College in New Haven. Mr. Howe also has several certificates of study from French universities and during the past year he has been a Fulbright Teaching Assistant at the Ecole Normale d'Instituteurs in Paris, where he taught conversational English to young French students. Mr. Howe has traveled in West Africa, both as an interpreter and as a worker on a road construction crew. Mr. Howe teaches French and coaches Jr. Varsity Soccer. His interests lie in photography, bicycling, hiking, and traveling.

Across from the Chapel live the Taylors in Kettle House. Father Taylor, our Chaplain and Theology instructor, graduated from West Virginia State College and from Boxley Hall Divinity School of Kenyon College. He is currently doing graduate work at the General Theological Seminary in New York. Fr. Taylor has worked as a full-time campus minister in counseling and developing new religious groups, and as an advisor to the New Left and the Black Student Union. He has

served on the Bishop's Urban Crisis Committee and as Youth Resources Editor on the Episcopal Executive Council. In the latter capacity, he worked at assembling materials for a youth work packet called "Sharing Service," and he edited the Youth Ministry Notebook. Fr. Taylor enjoys both watching and playing sports and is kept in good shape by chasing after Joy and Paul, his two young children. Mrs. Taylor, a graduate of Ohio State University, is the Upper School Hostess. Both Taylors are interested in jazz, poetry, politics, and philosophy.

We also have a veteran of the teaching profession with us. Before coming to St. Peter's, Mr. Terrence Matern taught English and drama at Trinity-Fawling School for six years. Originally from Victoria, British Columbia, Mr. Matern graduated from the University of California and he has done graduate work at Yale University. Mr. Matern is Chairman of the English Department, advisor to *The Dragnet*, and Director of Drama. He lives in Pusey House and is interested in fishing and sports cars.

One can easily see that this year St. Peter's has a fine staff, with their varied backgrounds, the instructors provide a wide range of interests and abilities. The newly appointed masters bring enthusiasm and valuable skills to the School. As is usual at St. Peter's, the student-master ratio is proportionately low, which allows each student to receive more individual attention.

First Form

Football Breaks Losing Streak

On Saturday, November 15, the Varsity Football Team won its first game in two and a half years against Nyack Prep. In its final game, played here, St. Peter's defense held Nyack scoreless. Eric Olsen connected with David Taylor for the first touchdown of the game; Ben Daley scored the conversion and the second touchdown. Joe Farewell brought the winning score (16-0) by running the second conversion and intercepting two passes. The Saints totally outstruck Nyack for a total of 384 yards; most of this yardage was scored by Eric takes with 126 yards, and won by Daley with 135.

Scores since the last issue:

St. Luke's game 14-0, first Rye game 28-6, second Rye game 25-8, Brunswick 32-7, King School 43-28. The reasons for this season's losses are diverse. Basically, three take precedence over all the others: lack of spirit, defeatism, and failure to coordinate sufficiently early in the games. This was not due to coaching error, but to the players alone. It seems that in the Nyack game the team clicked; everyone was "up" for it and performed his assignments perfectly. Soccer Ends Tough Season

Varsity Soccer ended its season with a 3-1 loss to King School on November 11. King scored in the second period and added two goals in the third, giving them insurance for the rest of the game. The sole St. Peter's goal was scored in the fourth period by Left Wing Steve Lyons on a rain-soaked field, thus bringing the Saints' total season scores to thirteen. An earlier game with King ended in a loss of 5-2.

The Brunswick game, which they won, 5-2, was a disappointment because we had had a 2-0 lead in the first quarter and then slacked off to let them come back to win. The Parents' Day game against Scarborough had a happier ending with a 3-1 win in double overtime; the home crowd along the sidelines was a tremendous help in this victory. After their return from a long weekend, the Varsity met Rye Country Day School on October 27, only to suffer a defeat of 5-1.

Meeting a strong Storm King team on October 25, the Saints struggled hard but were shot out 4-0. St. Peter's traveled to their second confrontation with St. Luke's on October 29 and this close fought game had several scoring threats from both sides. In winning this game 1-0 on a goal by Steve Lyons, we had been helped by the St. Luke's goalie who had dropped the ball on a shot by one of the halfbacks. All that was needed was a foot to push the ball in and Lyons was there; St. Luke's could not muster enough drive to rally and possibly tie or win the game. This gave each school a game piece in the two-game series.

After three days of continuous rain, Brunswick came to

play us on a muddy field on November 2. Because of the inclement weather, the referees decided to have the teams play eight minute quarters, instead of the regulation fifteen. The first quarter was scoreless; during the second, Brunswick continued its pressure on the Saints' goal and came out with a 1-0 lead at the half. Continuing with their momentum, they scored twice more, once in the third quarter, and again in the fourth. With a well-drilled line, Brunswick was able to penetrate the Saints' defense and test the abilities of replacement goalie Rutkowski. The Brunswick defense was such that we were allowed only a limited number of shots at their goal, and we did not score with any of them.

As the soccer season opened, St. Peter's had been hopeful in anticipating a successful season and a chance for the new League title. The team's spirit was broken by a rash of injuries. Goalie Chuck Smith was hurt in the first League game; then a promising Fourth Former, John Van Sickle, broke his leg in the King game. Right halfback Mark Stephens was knocked unconscious while going for a head ball in the Scarborough game, sidelining him for the rest of the season. The team was further handicapped when three key players were suspended from school by the Headmaster; great goals were left in the defensive slots, and the team did not have the depth to provide experienced substitutes. Alva Decker showed the most improvement as a player this fall; he exhibited initiative and desire, both at practice and in games. Strong performances was shown by Jim Van Sickle in his ability to play both offense and
