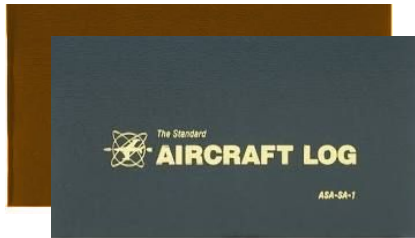

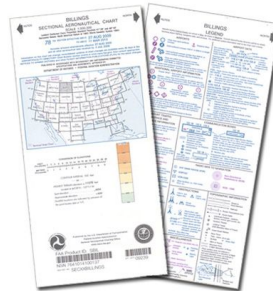

1. **View Limiting Device** - You may or may not need it but have it just in case.
2. **ICAO Flight Plan** - Does not need to be paper, it can be digital.
3. **E6B & Plotter** - Can be old school/digital, but it's fair game for the DPE to pull out a wiz wheel and ask you to teach it.
4. **Aircraft Logbooks** - Make sure all inspections are tabbed out. Do not forget AD Compliance Logs as well.
5. **Current Aeronautical Charts** - Paper is always easier; digital is unlimited data and info.
6. **Nav Log** - Can be print or digital, but if digital, make sure that you know every aspect of the product you are using.
7. **FAA Reference Material** - Carry everything in the ride with you. Then you will not say you wish you had it.
8. **Lesson Plans** - Have these front and center, and do not start teaching unless you are on the appropriate lesson plan.
9. **AROW** - Although the DPE is required to check aircraft airworthiness prior to the practical test beginning, most don't, but be prepared for them to ask for it, or even walk out to the aircraft prior to the exam to check these items.

FAA Form 8710-1, Airman Certificate and/or Rating Application. This is a detailed form for applying for an Airman Certificate and/or Rating. It includes sections for personal information, medical information, flight history, and examiner information.

FAA Medical Certificate First Class and Student Pilot Certificate. This form certifies that the holder meets the medical standards prescribed in part 67 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. It includes sections for personal information, medical history, and examiner information.

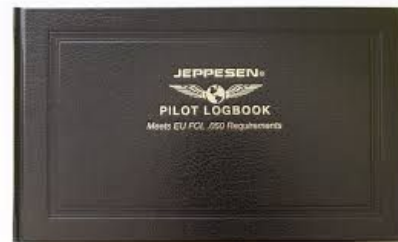

FAA Pilot Certificate. This form certifies that the holder is a pilot of the aircraft specified in the certificate. It includes sections for personal information, flight history, and examiner information.

Airman Knowledge Test Report. This form reports the results of an Airman Knowledge Test. It includes sections for personal information, test results, and examiner information.

1. **Form 8710** - Completed FAA Form 8710-1, Airman Certificate and/or Rating Application with Instructor's Signature or a completed IACRA form with E-Signature.
2. **Government Issued Photo ID** - Must be issued by a Federal or State organization.
3. **FAA Medical** - Must be current, minimum 3rd class
4. **Pilot Certificate** - Current and most recent. If it is a paper temporary, make sure it is not expired.
5. **Airman Knowledge Test Report** - Can be original or a copy.
6. **Pilot Logbook** - Be sure to audit your logbook for completeness. Tab out all endorsements needed for the exam.
7. **\$\$\$\$** - No checks or credit cards unless prior approval from the Examiner. FAA does not charge for exams.
