Changes Coming 2024

I am excited to announce that this spring we will be adding 4 or 5 new outdoor exercise yards on the south side of the property. These yards will be between our front office and the existing play yards. All the new yards will be fenced with gates and "no climb" fencing on top. We will be asking for donations to put toward this project in early spring. We currently have some matching funds from two generous donors to help make sure we are able to cover the cost of the entire project. Potential donors can look forward to information and a campaign for this project soon.

Another project that we will be working on is venting our large play yard on the north side of the property. This yard is surrounded by wood panel fencing and tends to get very hot in the summer time. I will cut ventilation holes in the fence in various strategic locations, which will be able to be opened and closed as needed. Look forward to seeing these changes this summer.

We are in the process of applying for a grant to improve the outside areas at the shelter. We will be painting part of the shelter building as well as the Paws Clinic building. Along with this will be a sidewalk in front of the Paws Clinic as well as a sidewalk from the southern door of the front office building to the back of the intake building area. We will have some new signs and an awning put up in front of the Paws Clinic as well. Look for this in late spring early summer as well.

Our amazing staff have been working on having more of our dogs meet and play together which we call "pen pals". Focusing on this helps them with dog to dog socialization, and is very important for the dogs to keep them happy and enriched. Our front office staff has also been doing a terrific job with updating social media and keeping posts fun and accurate. Look forward to more to come from our dedicated staff as ideas continue to be implemented to help with adoptions and our animals' enrichment.

We are starting to gear up for our 19th annual Happy Tails Auction and BBQ. Information and volunteer communication will be coming out soon. The Happy Tails Auction and BBQ will be held on August 24th in the Orchard behind Charlie Clarks. As always, we will have BBQ, a live auction, a silent auction, raffle buckets, a summer raffle, and our DOGhouse staff will be present selling special items as well. Of course, there will be wonderful dogs present who are available for adoption. We look forward to seeing everybody there!

Spring and Summer Safety

With the warmer weather upon us, we would like to talk about some pet health and safety tips to keep you and your pets cool as cucumbers during those dog days of summer.

First and foremost, vaccinating your animals is very important not just during the summer but throughout the year. During the summer months with more animals traveling here, there and everywhere, it's a very wise idea to make sure that your animals are up to date on their vaccinations. They could pick something up anywhere that will have detrimental effects on their overall health. So, before planning to go on that fun family vacay with Fido and Fifi, get their annual boosters.

You may want to talk to your veterinarian about a flea and tick preventative for your pets to keep those pesky parasites off and away from your pets and your home.

Anytime you are traveling with your animals make sure they are never left in a hot vehicle. This could result in extreme thirst, heat stroke or worse. Be conscience of the decisions you are making for your animals prior to taking them with you.

Our feline friends do not acclimate to the heat well at all. Some folks work on the Trap, Neuter and Release on feral cats during the warmer months. If you do, make sure that traps are not set during the

hottest part of the day and are checked every morning to ensure that the cats are able to be taken in to your vet or released from the trap in a decent amount of time. Never set a live trap for an animal before going away for more than a day.

Working with Communities

We have had several recent changes in leadership here at HSWM. You last heard from me as the Volunteer Coordinator and now I am the Shelter Manager. I began working in the field of animal care in 2015 as a Veterinary Assistant at an animal hospital in Texas. In 2017, I moved here with my family and my career with HSWM began. Throughout the years I have held many positions here at the shelter. Starting out as a Kennel Tech, and then moving on to Lead Kennel Tech, Volunteer Coordinator, Assistant Manager and now I have accepted the role of Shelter Manager. I have had the pleasure of working with the most amazing people and pets in my years here! I am very thankful to be a part of such a great organization.

In the world of Animal Rescue, overcrowding in local and regional shelters is at an all-time high. It can be overwhelming for humans and animals at times. Therefore, we are extremely grateful to all other local rescue organizations whose staff and volunteers work as tirelessly as we do to make sure we are helping as many animals as possible. I would also like to extend our deepest gratitude to our rescue partners. When they are able, they take in our pets who will have a better chance of being adopted in their area. I assure you, we only transfer animals to known, reliable rescues.

You can help combat overcrowding and here are a few tips. Please spay and neuter your pets. Also remember to always have identification on your pets, such as a microchip and collars with tags with current contact information. Even a collar with a contact phone number written on it can help to get your pets home safe. If you or someone you know is missing a pet, please reach out to us. Come to the shelter and see if your pet is here. We have had several instances that an animal stayed several weeks, or even months, with us simply because their owner didn't know to come to the shelter or didn't even know that we exist. Please help everyone by spreading the word about HSWM.

It is the owner's responsibility to make sure their pets are healthy and safe. If you need to microchip your pet, we offer that service at the shelter for only \$20.00 and you do not need an appointment. Just come by the shelter (open Tuesday thru Saturday 12:00p to 5:00p) and we will be happy to help you. We also have a low cost spay and neuter program. Call us or stop by and we will get you scheduled as quickly as possible.

I would like to remind everyone that we have limited kennel space. We do our best to help all pets in need but in recent months we have been well over capacity. Please have patience as we are doing our best in these tough times and will take in your animals as soon as we have space.

There are many misconceptions about how our shelter operates. I cannot speak for all shelters but I can for ours and I believe it is very important that you know we DO NOT euthanize pets for space or due to extended length of stay here at HSWM. Our ability to take in animals depends on our adoptions. One going out makes space for one coming in. We consider our residents to be family and they will stay with us until we find them homes or, if they qualify, they will be transferred to one of our rescue partners for a better chance at

finding a permanent home. As a nonprofit organization, we are able to care for homeless pets solely from donations received through community support, our Doghouse Thrift Store and fundraisers we hold throughout the year. Our largest fundraiser of the year is our Happy Tails event in August. Please consider volunteering, donating, or becoming a foster for a shelter animal in need. Thank you all for your continued support!

I am the veterinarian at the Humane Society of The White Mountains and am there every Thursday for spay/neuter surgeries and to examine any of the residents that may need medical care. On one visit in January of 2023 an orange kitten, Amie, was brought in for me to look over. She had been in isolation for some time being treated for ringworm and she was clean by the time I saw her. I was to evaluate her because she had severe micro-ophthalmia of her right eye. In other words, she was born without her right eye ball. While I was trying to examine her, she kept nosing my face and playing with me, making the examination hilarious. I instantly knew she had a ton of personality. I determined that she did not need any special treatment due to her missing eye. Some animals with her condition will have pain or irritation, so it is best to surgically

remove whatever is in the socket. But with this kitten, I felt she would be fine without any extensive surgery.

When I arrived home at the end of the day, I could not stop thinking about the one-eyed kitten. I sent Debbie (then Shelter Manager) a text saying that I wanted to adopt her. Once I brought her home, I changed her name to Blossom. She has been a ton of fun from the get-go. Watching her the first time she tried to jump on the counter was interesting. She kept staring at it and rocking back and forth until she finally decided to go for it. She made it all the way up to the top of the counter on her first try! When she wants to jump on something she always must "think" about it, more than a cat with two eyes, but she always makes it.

In the morning at my house, my dogs receive cheese snacks when they return from going outside, Blossom likes to participate in tasty treats also. She will sit up on her hind legs to grab the cheese. She has also become one of my sleep partners at night, usually next to my head or my feet. To anyone who has fallen in love with a "handicapped" pet that needs a home, adopt that one before someone else has a chance to be so lucky.

The other technicians kept saying; "Hey, Annie, that dog keeps staring at you!" I was using my amazing, beautiful blue eyes to get her attention. It worked! She finally came over and said, "Hi, Chester" which was the name they gave me at the shelter. I heard her talking and saying how she would like to take me to her house until I healed. She said if I got along with her dogs, she might even adopt me. I was so excited, and the news just kept getting better. Doc was going to put a cast on my leg to see if I would heal, instead of removing it! When I woke up from my surgery, I had a funny thing on my leg that someone had drawn hearts all over. Soon I was on my way home with Annie to recover and meet her hubby and their two dogs "Etta Place" and "Indy".

They weren't too sure about me at first but I totally charmed them all with my fun, silly personality and of course my fabulous blue eyes! With the help from HSWM, I found my "Forever Home" with my new sister dogs, horses, chickens, cats, and lots of room to play. Oh, and I have a huge, fluffy bed and a couch to snuggle on with my loving new family. Oh, oh, and they named me "Pistol Pete". (Can you tell I am wagging my tail!) Life is good now.

Thank you for reading my story and helping this wonderful shelter raise money for expenses, such as medical needs, to give other dogs, and cats a chance to live and find their own "Forever Home".

When Paul Simon wrote and recorded "Me and Julio Down by the School Yard" in 1972 he never dreamt that a 6-week-old puppy would be the song's namesake!

Yes, a Pinetop/Lakeside Police Officer found him late at night, alone, cold and scared in the playground of Blue Ridge school.

As a volunteer for the HSWM I've learned how much fun (and challenging) it can be to foster pups that young, but I also know it was best for him to be in a home and learn all the things a puppy needs to know. Foundation training for young dogs is so very important as it gives them a good solid start in life and that was what I planned on doing. After getting approval to foster, I loaded him, puppy pads, bowls, blankets, toys, a crate, food, treats, an x-pen and paperwork into the car and off we went to start our adventure together.

Julio was really a very happy boy and probably the easiest pup I've ever fostered! He was quick to pick up potty training and soon was going out the back door to do his business. He met quite a few other dogs while at my house and even met a next-door neighbor's cat. Since he wasn't yet fully vaccinated, we stayed close to home but he learned to dig in the dirt, attack pine cones with a vengeance, carry twigs around, chase a ball and roll in the grass - all very important puppy lessons! He wouldn't have experienced these things at the shelter as he hadn't had his puppy shots. This is why it's so important to have foster families. When the time came for his neuter surgery, I returned him to the shelter. I have to say, as a foster, this is the hardest part for both of us BUT that is exactly where he needed to be to meet his permanent future family.

Some days later, I was volunteering at the shelter. Julio was with me as I helped Katelyn in the front office. A couple walked in and said "One year ago today we lost our beloved dog who was a rescue. We decided to honor him by adopting a dog today". That statement deeply touched everyone in the office. When asked what they were looking for the response was "We'll know when we see it". They looked at several dogs and decided to visit with Bailey who had come in as a stray. Bailey and their current resident dog, Dozo, hit it off immediately. What I wasn't aware of was all the time we were with Bailey and Dozo, the woman was cuddling with Julio! In moments, she had Julio, Bailey and Dozo playing like they had known one another forever. The couple looked at me and said "Now our family is complete". It was done and Bailey and Julio were off on their life together with Dozo.

There is a saying in rescue that every time you adopt you actually save two lives. The animal you adopted made room for another to come in. So that day that little pup helped save four lives. Bailey and Julio are living their best lives and we will forever be happy for them.

Critter Camp 2024

Do you know kids 7-13 yrs who would like to learn about how an animal shelter takes care of its residents? Would they like to know how animals help to make our community better? If so, Critter Camp is the place to bring them!

During the summer, the HSWM hosts Critter Camp for students ages 7-13. Campers learn about different aspects of the shelter and help make the animals more adoptable. We are excited to host this great camp again and can't wait to see what new experiences we can share with them.

Critter Camp currently has three sessions scheduled from 9:00am-2:00pm, with 2 beginner sessions and a Senior Camp. Senior Camp is for students who have attended for more than 2 years and are approved by staff.

Here are the current schedules:

June 10-14: 7-9 years

June 17-21: 10-13 years

June 4-7: Senior Camp: Campers who attended for more than 2 years and are approved because of the maturity level needed.

All the new campers gain knowledge from many different groups in the community who donate their time. These including Navajo County Search and Rescue, Navajo County and Pinetop/Lakeside Animal Control, Wendy's Agility Dogs, Gayle's Therapy Dogs, and they even learn about some exotic pets on Wild Wednesday. Campers also learn about the importance of spay/neuter/microchip through our PAWS clinic, and brave ones are allowed to watch surgery and microchipping. The campers get to read to the shelter pets every day and they really love it! This can help our "I think I trust you but I'm not sure" animals to relax around smaller humans and be less wary. Kids leave Critter Camp with a ton of great knowledge, and the joy on their faces when they earn their official shirt is proof of a good time.

Senior Camp looks a little different as these amazing kids apply for and are chosen to attend for the love of the shelter. They are "junior workers" and do daily job shadowing with the employees of the shelter. They wash dishes, do laundry, walk dogs, etc. at the shelter as well as work a day at the DOGhouse Thrift Store. These kiddos are our future volunteers or staff and we are so appreciative of their commitment. If your kids enjoyed Critter Camp in the past, please encourage them to continue attending.

Applications will be accepted beginning April 23rd, with each class limited to 12. The fee is \$85.00 per student, and the tuition is a 100% direct donation to the shelter, as a donor covers the cost of expenses for running the camp, including the t-shirts and pizza party.
