- 1. What do you think when you hear the phrase, "Don't judge!"?
- 2. Have you ever judged someone by external appearances and then realized you were wrong? Share with your group about what you learned.
- 3. Which of the points in today's teaching was most convicting to you? How can you apply this moving forward?
- 4. How do you know what gossip is? How can it be avoided?
- 5. How does the course for resolving conflict laid out in Scripture (especially in Matthew 18:15-16) contrast with gossip (described in Proverbs 18:8)?
- 6. Ephesians 4:29 is a wonderful verse to commit to memory, and a reminder to gauge if our words are wholesome, helpful, building up, and benefitting those to whom we speak. How is this verse a help to you in regards to today's passage?
- 7. Read 2 Timothy 2:16. What is slander? What is godless chatter? How do we determine what is appropriate and what is not?
- 8. Read James 4:11. How is judgmentalism a sin against the law and the Law-giver?
- 9. When and where should we as Christians make judgements about others (hint: Read Romans 2:1-3, 1 Corinthians 6:1-6 & 5:11-13)? It is helpful to remember that James is writing against haughty judgmentalism not against a helpful discipleship.
- 10. Why is judgmentalism wrong?
- 11. What are the consequences of judgmentalism?
