Case will provide landowners in Missouri with technical assistance focused on grasslands and grazing native forages

Houston, MO – July 16th, 2025 – Pheasants Forever and Quail Forever in Missouri is excited to announce the hiring of Nate Case to serve as the Coordinating Grazing Lands Biologist (CWB) position. Case started his new role on July 1.

The Coordinating Grazing Lands Biologist (CWB) position is made possible through a collaborative effort among the Missouri Department of Conservation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service, Ducks Unlimited, and Quail Forever to further the delivery of the native grassland programs in Missouri. Case stationed in Houston, Missouri, will provide grazing and wildlife technical assistance for associated Farm Bill conservation programs to agricultural producers and landowners in Missouri, primarily focusing on priority landscapes. He will also work collaboratively to promote the grazing of native forages by working with local communities, producers, and partner agencies.



"Nate brings a strong background in grazing management, focusing on native forage systems. His expertise has been instrumental in his current role in Houston and will be a valuable asset in this statewide position," said Missouri State Coordinator Andrew White.
