Houston, MO-May 16, 2024—Pheasants Forever and Quail Forever are excited to share that Nate Case was hired for the Houston, MO. Farm Bill Wildlife Biologist I position. He started his new position on May 6<sup>th</sup>.

The Farm Bill Wildlife Biologists on the Missouri team are partnership positions supported by the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Missouri Department of Conservation, and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. Case will be a valuable resource for private landowners in Howell, Texas, and Wright counties. His role will involve assisting landowners with wildlife management planning and securing funds to implement those plans.
