NEW PORT RICHEY FARMNET WEEK OF DECEMBER 2, 2024



WEEKLY UPDATE BY DELL DECHANT

Growing conditions are challenging, with very dry conditions requiring considerable irrigation daily. The cooler temperatures are welcome for the winter greens, but the arid conditions are stressful.

Beware and be aware: Forecasts call for a possible freeze on Tuesday night into Wednesday morning before dawn. Freeze is likely in areas north of Pasco. In Pasco County, the US 19 urban corridor will probably avoid a freeze, especially in southern Pasco. The further east you are the greater the chances of a freeze.

This week's forecast calls for oscillating temperatures – starting off cool (a bit below normal), then getting colder around mid-week (with the possible freeze Tuesday night into Wednesday morning), then warming to near normal toward the end of the week.

Growers are reminded that we are in the dry season, which will continue until next June. Thus far, the fall has been even dryer than normal, and fronts have brought little if any rain. In the dry season (September to



June), most rain occurs when cold fronts pass over the area. If the fronts do not bring rain, irrigation is necessary. All plantings will need irrigation this week. Remember to start or expand a rain collection system – even putting a heavyduty trash can under a gutter downspout will work.

This week's recommendations for CSA shareholders are collards, kale, and arugula. This is the third full week of harvesting, and shares are getting a bit larger. We are still about a month out from full production. We have a special offering of sweet potatoes, left over from the Round-Up.

We encourage Growers and gardeners to plant all winter vegetables: collards, kale, arugula, broccoli, cabbages, even brussels sprouts. All are members of the Brassica family. All will thrive throughout the winter and into the spring. Additional good news, these greens can survive a freeze.

Collards, are the champions in this regard, and can survive a hard freeze (to about 10 degrees). The other Brassicas are a bit less hardy, with mid- to upper-20s the safe zone for them.

In the meantime, pick up seeds and seedlings from FarmNet, which feature organic heirloom seeds from Seed Savers Exchange, and the FarmNet seed bank – the largest collection of local seeds. Seedlings are also available, including tomatoes and collard greens.

Besides the winter greens, right now, three excellent transitional vegetables are cucumbers, tomatoes, and peppers. We also like Dragon Tongue Beans. All of these transitional crops will produce through the rest of the fall, through winter and into spring. Be advised, however, unlike the winter greens noted above, they do not thrive in very cold temperatures and a freeze will kill them. So, growers beware.
