WEEKLY UPDATE BY DELL DECHANT

Growing conditions still challenging due to extreme heat. Here at the gardens, we were at or above 90 degrees twice last week and upper 80s all other days. Weather forecasts call for a cool spell later this week. Projected temperatures in the cool spell are in the normal range for this time of the year- no cooler than what the normal temperature should be.

Make no mistake, temperatures are running well above normal. Near or at record highs. Here is what the National Weather Service tells us: For November, the average high is 82 (at start of month) and mid-70s at the end of the month. Instead, this November, the coolest high temperature so far has been 86. Normal lows are mid-60s to upper 50s. Thus far in, in November 2024, the coolest low was 69. Supporting and expanding on our findings, is a very good article by Jeff Berardelli, Chief Meteorologist at WFLA: "Tampa and Earth shattering all-time heat records." Besides the heat, it is very dry. This is expected. We have entered the dry season, and we will have little rain (except with accompanying cold fronts) until next June. Unfortunately, what is also now expected is above normal heat. Together the higher temperatures and dry conditions put great stress on the vegetables, especially the seedlings, which we are now plating.

Collards, kale, and arugula are available. All three are doing well, but not really thriving – and only with abundant irrigation.

Sweet potatoes are again light this year, we have some for shares.
