She replied, "I'm a Muslim, but I don't take the Quran too literally. I have my own interpretation of things. I think that after a person dies, they go to heaven or hell. After they are in hell for some time, they eventually come to be with everyone else in heaven."

"So, you think hell is remedial?"

"Yes. I also think all holy books are very difficult to understand and it's difficult to know what to believe. You have to decide for yourself what you are going to believe."

"O.K. that's interesting. Thanks!"

After a moment of silence, she asked, "What do you believe?"

I replied, "Death comes to all of us, so this is a question I think we all ask at some point. The Bible is very clear on these things. In summary, the Bible teaches that everyone will be raised from the dead, there will be a final judgment, and those who were in hell will be judged and thrown into the Lake of Fire. The Bible does not teach that hell is remedial..."

We spoke for a few more minutes, but soon it was clear that she wanted to speak about other things. She enjoyed our trip and she's already signed up for some of our other activities.

Praise God and thanks for your prayers!

Finally, I'm continually reminded just how common suffering and loss are to all of us -- but we have the victory in Christ! For the Christian, our circumstances needn't control our outlook or our attitude, rather, it's our standing as sons and daughters of our King and heavenly Father that gives us the grace and strength to trust him in every situation.
