The medical team served hundreds of people in the past seven days! Pastor told me to take time to observe how things were done before I tried to do anything. It has been useful because the Zambians have different idiosyncrasies than Americans. One must observe when they are receptive to your words or you will not be heard. Secondly, one also must be careful about false professions of faith and even individuals from the JWs or Seventh day Adventist trying to sneak into the church and cause division. We saw at least one this week.



On Tuesday we packed all the equipment and medicine for next time. Then we drove all the way to Lusaka. (8 hours and 35m) Danger typifies Zambia's highway. When passing on the double laned road, you must play chicken with oncoming traffic. Never drive at night. People, Potholes, motorcycles, cows, goats, and chickens all go bump in the darkness.

Imagine now riding at night with someone re-learning stick shift while going through the mountains. It was like facing death every few minutes. Praise the Lord we arrived safely. He enabled Kyle to drive despite the pressure.
