The Level III French language course focuses on the continued development of communicative competence in the target language and the understanding of the culture(s) of the people who speak the language.

It assumes that the students have completed a Level II course or are at a Novice-Mid to Novice-High level of proficiency and the major means of communication between students and instructors will be in the target language.

Students use basic language structures with accuracy and recombine learned material to express their thoughts. They are exposed to more complex features of the language, moving from concrete to some abstract concepts.

An important component of language classes is the use of the language beyond the classroom in the real world. The integration of technology is an important tool in accessing authentic information in the target language and in providing students the opportunity to interact with native speakers.

By the end of Level III, students will exhibit Novice-High level proficiency in speaking and writing and Intermediate-Low proficiency in listening and reading (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines, 1999).

Minimum Number of Grades

Each student should receive a minimum of 36 grades (2 grades per week) per subject each semester. Grades should be evenly distributed across the grading period and the grading categories in order to consistently reflect student progress towards mastery of the standards.

Academic Recovery

Students who have not yet provided evidence of mastery should have opportunities to receive reteaching and be reassessed prior to final grades being entered. This may occur during regular instructional time, during "lunch and learn" sessions, or at other times when students are able to attend that are not disruptive to required instruction.
