Fall is in the air. The beautiful weather has allowed many to enjoy being outdoors. Around the county, harvesting has begun and it looks to be an exceptional year. School has begun with added health and safety procedures. 2020 will be the fall without a **Fairfield Fall Fun Fest** or **Wayne City Bean Days** celebration. After months of very few cases of COVID19, the County Health Department has seen a swift increase. As of September 2020, the Health Department has recorded over 260 positive cases with 6 deaths due to **COVID 19.** Our sympathy goes to those families.

"DON'T LET LOCAL HISTORY BE A MYSTERY!"

VOTE

One hundred years ago on Thursday, August 26, 1920, the Wayne County Press reported that the Nineteenth Amendment, known as the Susan B. Anthony Woman's Suffrage amendment, was ratified, giving women the right to vote throughout the United States.

Suffrage movements began in Illinois as early as the 1860s, although attempts to grant women the right to vote often had limitations and restrictions. Finally, with the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, women were granted equal voting rights for all local, state and national elections.

All citizens should exercise their right to vote. The 2020 United States presidential election is scheduled for Tuesday, November 3, 2020. Voters will select presidential electors who in turn will vote to either elect a new president and vice president or reelect the current president and vice president.





WAYNE CITY SCHOOL ARCHIVES

The Wayne County Historical Society met on Thursday, September 17th, 2020 at the Wayne City Community Center. The speaker for the evening was Darla (Barnard) Green. Darla helped to organize a volunteer committee to collect and archive the memorabilia and history of the Wayne City schools.

The village of Wayne City was incorporated in 1882. The downtown area straddles the Southern Railroad tracks. About 1000 people live within the town limits. For years, Wayne City has held an annual fall festival known as Bean Days. This event usually includes a gathering of high school alumni. Local citizens and people returning to their home town often look to photos and memorabilia to reminisce and at the 2015 Bean Day festival began voicing their concerns about the fate of these items.



In 2015 the Wayne City school district began construction of the new high school and elementary building. The concern of community members grew about what would happen with all of the class photos, trophies, banners, plaques and memorabilia that were housed throughout the old school buildings. This concern evolved into a group of volunteers who approached the school board and from that concern the Archives Committee was formed. This committee reports to the school board each month on their progress.

Committee member and Archivist Darla Green consulted former Wayne City alumni Sue Ellen Lathrop for guidance. Sue Ellen Lathrop is the University Archivist at Western Kentucky University. She guided the committee on legal protocols and guidelines to properly preserve and manage all the different memorabilia.

The Archive Committee has several sub-committees to focus on the areas such as trophy collection and management led by Noeleen Tubbs. Chieftain yearbook collection is led by Trixie Lathrop, finance led by Heather Greenwalt, and technology led by Kirk Barnard. Sue Meyers is the secretary/treasurer. Guidelines were established to keep, eliminate or archive all memorabilia including trophies, banners, club awards, and memorial plaques.

More information and photos can be found on the Wayne City School District website Archives page at www.waynecity100.org. As found on the Archives page, the mission statement of the committee is to preserve the school history in order to provide the community with a location to reminisce about the strong history of the school. Class photos from 1926 through 2010 that once hung in the old school can now be viewed on-line. Soon a menu on the website will include a way to search the photos by last name and graduating year.

The committee also created a stand-alone flip display for the class photos that is now housed in the new school lobby area. Items such as plaques, trophies, banners and awards that are displayed throughout the new Wayne City school and the Agriculture building are documented by the committee. Visitors and alumni enjoy looking at the items.

The Archives committee has plans to build a memorial wall with the purchase of engraved bricks by the community. The memorial bricks are a way to recognize deceased students and staff members.


Museums are open Saturdays
