SARAH BOGGS BEQUEATHS GENEROUS GIFT

The officers and directors of the Wayne County Historical Society are excited to announce a bequeath of \$388,000 for the purpose of preserving and promoting the history of Wayne County.

The gift was made by the estate of Sarah Boggs, the daughters of John Boggs, M.D. and Corrinne (Steiner) Boggs.

Sarah Boggs and her sister Ruth attended FCHS in the 1940s. After college, Sarah obtained a PhD. and taught at the university level in St. Louis. Ruth taught English and earned a Masters of Library and information Science. She resided most of her adult life in Seattle, Washington. The sisters liked to travel. They also did extensive genealogy research over the years and donated several boxes of items to the Historical Society archives. The Historical Society was notified of the bequeath from Sarah Boggs this summer with the passing of her sister Ruth. Ruth's estate is still in probate at this time.

The generous gift will provide an endowment of funding for years to come allowing the Historical Society to maintain and improve their facilities and services.

The Sarah Boggs gift was announced at the December meeting of the Historical Society.

Henry Voltz Hanging

The November meeting of the Historical Society included a fascinating presentation by Judith Puckett on the hanging of Henry Voltz. A lively discussion followed the presentation. Judith has researched several different sources including court records of Wayne and White County. The following summary only scratches the surface of this mysterious event.

Henry Voltz, an immigrant peddler, was arrested when the body of his partner, named Lawler, was found murdered in White County in 1853. The controversial case was moved to Fairfield for the trial. The full account is sketchy and conflicting, but Voltz, who could not speak English well, was found guilty. He was hanged on May 24, 1853 on a gallows built on a hill west of Fairfield before a large crowd. Voltz's final words were recorded as, "I am an innocent man; the man who killed Lawler is in this crowd today; you are hanging an innocent man." He was buried beneath the scaffold with the rope still around his neck. At some point Voltz reportedly identified a man named Campbell as the killer. This man left the area and later died in Memphis, TN. On his deathbed Campbell apparently confessed that he had killed Lawler and that Voltz was innocent .

George Willard

Dr. George Roderick Willard, Bradford, VT – On Thursday, June 24, 2021, surrounded by family and friends, Dr. George Roderick Willard passed away peacefully at home at the age of 82.

George was born August 25, 1938, to John and Irene (Poorman) Willard of New Kensington, PA.

George enjoyed reading, travelling (both internationally and to his farm in Fairfield, Illinois), spending time with his beloved Beagles, swimming, genealogy, history and completing the most challenging crossword puzzles he could find. After retiring from teaching, George divided his time between West Palm Beach, Florida and Newbury, Vermont where he became active with the First Congregational Church of Newbury and Newbury Historical Society.

George was predeceased by his wife Jane (Crowe) Willard; parents, John and Irene Willard; brother, Rev. Jack Willard; and nephew, Patrick Willard.

George is survived by nephew Erich and Jennifer Mann of Berkeley Heights, NJ; sister-in-law Mariolin D. Willard of Gibsonia, PA; nephew John and Emily Willard of Gibsonia, PA; nephew James Willard of



Hadley, PA; as well as numerous other nieces and nephews.

Mickey Borah

81-year-old Wayne M. "Mickey" Borah of Fairfield, died at 9:03am on Saturday, October 30, 2021 at his home.

Mickey was born on May 5, 1940, in Fairfield, to Wayne and Sylvia (Galbraith) Borah. On August 16, 1962, he and the love of his life, Emilie Kaye (Vaughn) Borah, eloped in Texas, for which he felt was his greatest accomplishment in life.

Products before taking his stand as a municipal leader. He worked his way up the ladder, beginning as a drill press operator, then becoming the machine shop foreman. He was then transferred to Allentown, PA where he worked at the industrys distribution manager for a few years. After returning home, he worked as the night superintendent and then moved to the day superintendent. In 1980, he became Airtex's general superintendent, a position he kept for 18 years before retiring.

Mickey served as the mayor of Fairfield from 2001 through 2013, making him one of only two mayors to be elected to a third term. While serving as mayor, he accomplished many things like securing the Sanyo building for Frontier Community College, selling the old Walmart building to Elastec, bringing the lamp post lighting to the downtown area, along with many other things. He had a heart for our local hospital and school systems and wanted to make sure they were taken care of. He was named Citizen of the Year in 2003 and also served on the board for the Career Development Center and served as the President of the Hands for the Handicapped for a time. Mickey was a member of the Ellen Moore United Methodist Church in Fairfield, where he served in many different positions over the years, one being Sunday School Superintendent, and was also a member of the choir.

Survivors include his wife Kaye Borah of Fairfield, one daughter Kelli Hixenbaugh of Fairfield, daughter-in-law: Shelly Borah, eleven grandchildren Elissa Suddarth, Heather Suddarth (Michael Masterson), Megan Borah, Madison Borah, Taylore Joslin (Jase Kiefer), Tallen Hixenbaugh, Alek Hixenbaugh, Adilynn Hixenbaugh, Emily (Logan) Meriwether, Grace Borah (Jake Pollard), and Wyatt Borah, five great grandchildren, one brother David Borah of Florida, and two sisters Sienna (Ted) Kelsey of Fairfield, and Billie Borah of Texas.

He was preceded in death by his parents, three sons Christopher Borah, Matt Borah, and Mike Borah, one daughter Michelle Borah, two brothers Tom Borah and Gary Borah, and one sister Shirley Pontius.
