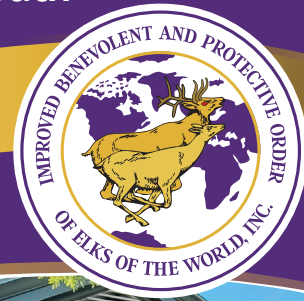

KEY MOMENTS

- 1926** Built as a YWCA for African American women and girls when downtown Portland excluded Black residents
- 1959** Acquired by Billy Webb Elks Lodge; became a hub for music, culture, activism, and community service
- 1960s–2000s** Hosted NAACP meetings, youth programs, coat and food drives, holiday dinners, scholarships, and nonprofit gatherings
- 2021** Fire destroyed the ballroom and roof; building closed
- 2026** Phase One stabilization completed; Phase Two renovation underway
- December 2026 – January 2027** Reopening as Elks Lodge and nonprofit community center for all Oregonians



“It was a meeting place for the NAACP, Oregon Federation of Colored Women’s Clubs, Urban League, and Congress of Racial Equality (CORE). We brought the Tuskegee Airmen to meet our community at the Lodge. Lodge members were central to the coalition that addressed gerrymandering, and that work allowed us to elect Oregon’s first African American State Senator.” — Senator Robert Boyer, retired
