PRIMARY SCHOOL OF THE MONTH: HAYES PARK SCHOOL, HILLINGDON

Hayes Park School in Hillingdon introduced Latin in September 2022, with one member of staff delivering Latin across the whole of Key Stage 2 via Minimus. The headteacher was determined to introduce Latin after she came across Minimus in the gift shop at Vindolanda! The school has a large number of students with English as an additional language and serves a very diverse community, so Latin works well to support students' understanding of English and links closely to many of their languages. The Competition is free to enter and there's a share of £1500 to be won; the closing date is 5th April.


For Primary aged children:

SPOTLIGHT ON... LIFE IN THE ROMAN WORLD

Roman Leicester (Ratae Corieltavorum) is one of the most excavated urban centres in Britain and archaeological evidence shows us that it was a vibrant multicultural centre from its earliest phases. This website provides a wealth of resources, activities and information which examine the nature of everyday life in Ratae and the wider Roman world, focusing on the experiences and responses of ordinary people over four centuries of Roman rule. It is inspired by recent archaeological discoveries in Leicester carried out by University of Leicester Archaeological Services (ULAS) and is informed by the research of the School of Archaeology and Ancient History (SAAH), University of Leicester.

Their materials are based on cutting-edge research and provide a complete scheme of work designed to address the Romans and local history content of the KS2 - you don't have to be living in Leicester to benefit from using the resources.

CLASSICS FOR ALL WORD ROOTS CPD

A reminder about our 60-90 minute FREE Word Roots CPD session that can be delivered to your school. The session talks teachers through some key links between Latin and Ancient Greek and English, and shows how the study of the languages can help students develop Tier 2 and 3 vocabulary. WORD ROOT OF THE MONTH:

What is the difference between "astronomy" and "astrology"?

"Astronomy" and "astrology" both have a similar beginning root - the Greek word "aster" meaning "star".

However the second part varies:

"-nomy" comes from the Greek word "nomos", which means "law"; "-logy" comes from the Greek word "logos", which means "study of".

So, "astronomy" is about the "laws of the stars" (e.g. their movements in relation to each other, formations of stars, etc.), and "astrology" is about the "study of the stars" (looking at how they affect us, like our horoscopes, etc.).




