

PASTOR'S PAGE

The first Sunday in March is the Second Sunday in Lent ...

This week we will be in John's Gospel as we listen in on a conversation between Jesus and a religious Leader named Nicodemus. He comes to Jesus under the cover of darkness to gain a better understanding of what Jesus is all about. Maybe he is just like us; as his head rested on his pillow that night and shadows stretched out on his bedroom wall, profound and troubling questions began to emerge from the nooks and crannies of his mind. Questions about Jesus and his kingdom.

So, with shadows dancing in the torchlight, Nicodemus makes his way to Jesus, with questions that he can only ask under the cover of darkness. Nicodemus is irresistibly drawn to the light, Jesus, the light of the world, the light no darkness can overcome. As people filled with our own questions, we follow in the furtive footsteps of Nicodemus, falsely believing our naked honesty will remain hidden in the gloom of night. But the Spirit, through the light of Christ, calls us out from the shadows, and in fact, exposes us to the brilliance of God's love—a love that meets our questioning hearts with nothing less than life eternal.

Lent 3 ... Meeting an "Other" at the Well ...

Jesus' encounter with The Samaritan Woman at Jacob's well is a familiar story. However, as with all Bible stories that we *think* we know, we might do well to take a fresh look!

Lent 4 ... God's Eyes do not see like Our Eyes ...

This theme of sight runs throughout today's texts, both in terms of how God does not see as we see and culminating with Jesus' healing of a man born blind. Jesus chooses to heal a blind man on the sabbath with dirt and saliva, to the dismay of the good religious people who were certain they knew better than to display such questionable judgment and behavior. This shows us how Lent is a time to reevaluate. Let it also be a time to examine the ways in which we do not see what God is doing around us because we think we know better. Bottom line: God often uses the unexpected to accomplish redemption.

On the last Sunday in March we will celebrate the Fifth Sunday in Lent ...

This week our focus will be on The Hope of New Life offered by Jesus as we again turn to John's gospel and witness Jesus weeping with those who wept over the loss of Lazarus. This hope-filled story of raising Lazarus from the dead gives us encouraging words that will sustain us through the approaching despair of Christ's passion and brings us to the fulfillment of hope on Easter. This inspires us to tell others of The Hope Jesus offers, the hope that overcomes despair for God's people. This is a preview of the hope of the resurrection that will sustain us through these final days of Lent

The Hope of new life is also evident in the Old Testament story of "dry bones" as told to us by the prophet Ezekiel. Even as the children of Israel declare their hope is lost, the prophet's experience in the valley of dry bones inspires him to preach renewed hope to the people.

Psalm 130 leads us to sing in response of hope in God and God's word. Through the writing of the Apostle Paul, the church in Rome was assured of the power of the Spirit of God that gives hope of new life. We enter the last leg of pour Lenten journey with the reminder to place our hope in God and God's word.
