It's Fall! Perfect time to remember ... The Righteous Live by Faith

Faith is the theme for the readings on Sunday, October 5. But not just any faith. It is a life-transforming faith, one that demonstrates the very presence of God moving, alive, and active in God's people. In response to Habakkuk's oracle, the Lord answered him that "the righteous live by their faith" (Hab. 2:4b). But just what does it mean to be righteous?

- It's a righteousness imparted by God,
 - o who creates and claims each of us as God's own sons and daughters,
 - God brings us into this family through baptism and gives us faith that makes us God's holy children.
- Being part of this divine family gives us our worth, even at those times we may not think of ourselves as worthy. In 2 Timothy, the author shares the history of the faith in Timothy's family, beginning with his grandmother and then passed on to his mother and to himself.
- This is how many of us were first brought into the family of God:
 - o we had faithful parents who knew of their own God-given righteousness
 - o and then passed this gift on to their children.
 - But again, it's all God's doing!
- Finally, Jesus' disciples boldly ask their teacher to "Increase [their] faith" (Luke 17:5).
 - They knew that faith was something they needed, and Jesus explains that even a small amount of faith can do great wonders.
 - What does it mean to have this sort of faith, a faith that can serve God's purposes here to truly be God's work and yet it's done with our hands?
 - On this first Sunday in October, we re-experience this faith that God has freely given us.
 - It's a gift and it's our connection to our God.

In October Blessings and Miracles Abound

We will see signs of how God is active and alive and present in our world and in our lives when we are open and receptive to the possibilities.

- We hear, read about, and experience healing.
- Fragile relationships are restored.
- Hope is experienced in profound ways.

Kyrie eleison: We are reminded to be Persistent in Prayer

Many have known persistent prayer as a kind of wrestling with God. Many have pleaded with God for justice and mercy. We are reminded this month that God's grace and mercy is known in the blessing of baptismal remembrance and our identity as beloved children of God.

We Hear The Good News All Over Again on Reformation Sunday

We need to hear the good news constantly since we so easily lose sight of our bondage to systems of oppression and the unjust hierarchies they create. We so often fall prey to thinking we are better or less than others because of the arbitrary dynamics that create a false sense of status. Reformation Day reminds us that our impulse to contain God's grace in structures of our own making cannot hold back God's determination to claim the whole world in a love as encompassing and intimate as words written on our hearts. That was good news for the Israelites in exile, for the early church in Rome, for those living during the Reformation, and for us today.

2025 STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM—Go and Do the Same—Feed the Hungry

In households, we sometimes have to have talks that have a little edge. Sometimes we have to be honest in ways that make us uncomfortable. Such is the case today. But it turns out to be a good discomfort. As you know, we are being guided in our stewardship campaign this year by readings from Luke in the Revised Common Lectionary. As we approach the second Sunday in our stewardship campaign, we come to the parable of a person who had wealth and an impoverished, hungry person named Lazarus.

If we hear this story on only one level, it could make us uncomfortable in the negative. Here we have a person who has material resources. That person wears the finest clothes, drives the biggest car, and eats sumptuously every day. Every day that person passes Lazarus, a beggar at the gate, hungering after a scrap from the rich person's table, covered with sores, and the dogs come and lick the sores. They both die. In the afterlife, Abraham gathers Lazarus to his bosom. That's a way of saying that Abraham takes care of Lazarus in the next world. But the person who had been wealthy is in torment. Flames. Agony. This person calls out to Abraham to send Lazarus with just a touch of water on Lazarus's finger to touch the tongue of the rich person. Can you imagine how good that would feel? Just a touch of water on a parched, cracked tongue. But no. Now you may not like this, but it is the storyteller's prerogative to say that a great chasm had been fixed between them that could not be crossed. The person who had had the big bucks pleaded for Abraham to send Lazarus to the family home to warn the brothers, so they can avoid the torment. But Abraham refuses, saying they have Moses and the prophets who already provide the guidance they need. Pressing again, the person who once had wealth says, "But if someone goes to them from the dead, then they will repent," to which Abraham replies, "If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone rises from the dead."

Now, from one point of view, that's a pretty encouraging text. If you are like Lazarus, it is a word of promise that God will make up in the next life for what you lose in this life. But if you are a person who has some material resources, the text can come across like a threat. If you do not do your part in caring for the Lazaruses of the world, torment awaits. From this point of view, the text is a warning.

That makes me a little uncomfortable, especially on a Stewardship Sunday.

So we should look at the parable not as a threat but as an invitation. Luke invites us to use our material resources for the well-being of all in the community. When we do that, we discover that Abraham's bosom reaches from the future into the present, at least a little bit.

Of course, there is an honest edge here that we need to face. When we have resources, and we do not share them, then we put in motion processes that limit security and blessing to others and that eventually limit security and blessing for ourselves.

But, the emphasis this morning is on the invitation. God invites you to consider how you will share your material resources through this stewardship campaign in the interest of building a better community in the congregation and beyond.
