2025 STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM—Go and Do the Same—Make Room

As you know, our congregation is taking an alternate approach to stewardship this year. Instead of the three-week concentrated campaign to raise the budget that we have had in late October and early November the last several years, we are making stewardship our focus once a month from May through November. Today is Stewardship Sunday (so to speak) for August.

Last year we ended the campaign by announcing the results at the big dinner on Thanksgiving Sunday. We will have a similar meal this year. It is particularly appropriate to recall the dinner motif today, because our text uses the figure of a banquet, a great meal, and how to behave at such an occasion.

In the ancient world, eating was a big deal. They did not have as much variety as we do. And they could not keep food as long or as reliably as we can. No refrigeration. No vacuum-seal plastic packages. No dehydrated or chemically-based foods that come with the instructions, "Just add water." No tin cans. (It has been so long since I opened a tin can, I am surprised I remember them). Drought could cut short food supplies. Floods would wash away harvests. Locusts and other critters that eat crops. An invading army would help itself to your food, sometimes leaving your cupboard bare.

Eating was a big deal. So you can imagine the importance they gave to big meals. A wedding celebration in a village, for instance, would go on for several days, and lots of food was a key element of such celebrations.

It was natural, then, for people in the ancient world to use the language of a banquet to describe the time when God would fulfill all of God's promises. Our text today, like some other texts in the ancient world, uses the language of a great feast, such as a wedding banquet, to describe the realm of God, that great time when the human community will live in love, peace, grace, freedom, dignity, justice, and abundance.

In the presence of such possibility, what do you do? A part of the answer is, "You participate with stewardship." From this point of view, stewardship is participating appropriately in the banquet. Yes, you give. You write your check. You commit your time to expressions of love, efforts for peace, support for actions in behalf of freedom, standing up for justice.

But here is the wonderful logic of God. In the act of giving, you receive. As you put your money, your time, your energy into the movement towards the realm, you experience the qualities of the realm more fully in your own life. I know people for whom life is a continuous wedding celebration.

It's like going to a great banquet. You take a shower. You get ready. You dress appropriately. You get yourself there. And in the process you receive. The expectation of going to the banquet reaches from the future into your present, and adds to your life as you anticipate going. And the banquet itself is its own reward with its food and drink and companionship, and the sense of community that fills your soul.
