HISTORICAL SKETCH

OF HOOSICK.

Hoosick, the north-eastern town of the county, is bounded north, by Cambridge and White Creek, in Washington county; east by Bennington, in Vermont; south by Petersburgh and Grafton, and west by Pittstown, The boundary-lines are straight, or nearly so, (following, however, somewhat the course of the Hoosick river). The town is considerably wider at the north than at the south. The farm acreage of the town is given in the census of 1875, at 37,448 acres, but this is somewhat less than the actual area.

NATURAL FEATURES.

The surface of this town consists of the narrow valley of the Hoosick river and that of the Walloomsac, the mountainous regions of the Taghcanic range on the east, and those of the Petersburgh on the west. The scenery is of a varied character, combining many elements of beauty. The highest peaks are those of Fonda Hill, in the south-west. These are said to be 900 feet above tide water. The valleys are bordered in many places by steep hillsides.

The town is divided into two (nearly equal) parts by the Hoosick river. This is an old historic stream, whose valley was the war path along which the French and Indians made their stealthy marches upon the villages of New England. This river, having received the waters of Little Hoosick just within the town of Petersburgh, enters this town a little east of the central point of the southern boundary, and flows slightly west of north until

it reaches the line of White Creek. It then turns to the west and forms, with a curving line, the northern boundary until it enters Pittstown. The north-eastern portion of the town is drained by the Walloomsac, which flows from the east line in a generally westerly course until its junction with the Hoosick. In the south-east is a small tributary of the Hoosick, draining quite a portion of the old Schneyder patent.

New Petersburgh junction, is a small tributary of the Hoosick from the east, and another rivulet from the same direction flows in at Hoosick Falls.

In the north, a branch running some distance nearly parallel with the river, enters the Hoosick a short distance below the mouth of the Walloomsac.

In the south-east part of the town are mineral springs, and deposits of slate exist in various parts of the town.

THE EARLY SETTLEMENT.

The original grantees of the Hoosick lands do not seem to have taken any immediate steps for their settlement and cultivation. For more than fifty years they were left to a few Dutch families and a small number of Mohican Indians, whose ancestors were dispossessed of their hunting grounds, and the tribe nearly destroyed by the fierce Mohawks. The settlement of the Hoosick Valley was also delayed by the long and often sanguinary struggles of the French and English, for supremacy and dominion in the valley of the St. Lawrence and the adjacent provinces.

This stormy period extended from 1688 to 1760. Hoosick from its location being in the direct route from Canada to the towns and villages on the Deerfield and Connecticut, was the most exposed to attacks of these merciless foes.

THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

The one great event of the revolutionary era in this immediate section, was the Battle of Bennington. This was

fought in the town of Hoosiek and as Judge Ball and others have suggested, it might well have been called "the battle of Walloomsac," as it was fought in the valley of that stream, or upon the adjacent hills, and near the village of Walloomsac.

HOOSICK FALLS.

This village known throughout the country for its thriving manufacturing enterprises, is situated upon the Hoosick river, which supplies valuable water power. The river winds in a serpentine manner through the village and has a picture-sque appearance from the hills. It is also on the line of the Troy and Boston, and Hoosac Tunnel and Western Railways.

The present prosperity of the village is almost entirely due to the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Co., who employ 2,000 men, and whose pay roll amounts to \$85,000 a month.

The first known lease of land of the Hoosick patent, at Hoosick Falls, was made of 220 acres by Jonathan Fuller from Augustus Van Horne of New York. The survey of this tract began at a marked birch tree standing below the falls of Quequick. This farm was next conveyed to Henry Northup, of North Kingston, R. I., who shortly after removed to it, where he lived until his death in 1797. The other part of the village west of Main street and east of the Hoosick river, was a part of the farm of 250 acres belonging to Henry Barnhart. The first store in Hoosick Falls, it is said, was one opened in 1785 by Isaac Turner. In 1784 Joseph Dorr came to Hoosick Falls and leasing of Barnabus Bratt 280 acres of land, together with all the water power on the north side of the river, began the erection of a carding and fulling mill. Subsequently a flax mill, a distillery and a saw mill were also erected Benjamin Colvin, about the year 1786, built a grist mill on the south side of the river. His successors were John Chase and Theophilus Comstock. In 1791 the


first bridge was constructed over the river at Hoosick Falls. In 1822 the first post office was established in the place, Seth Parsons being made postmaster.


In 1823 Joseph Gordon, a Scotchman, built what was known as the Caledonian cotton factory, on the south bank of the Hoosick river between the bridge and the grist mill. About 150 persons were employed in the factory. In 1827 the factory was purchased by Samuel S. Crocker, John Knickerbocker, John House, of Waterford and Jacob Merritt, of Troy. In 1868 this property was sold to the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company.


On April 14, 1827, the village of Hoosick Falls was incorporated, Seth Parsons being elected president of the board of trustees. It is said that at the time of its incorporation the population of the village was 200, the number of buildings 36, the electors 50, and the valuation of the property \$96,370,

In 1831 George W. and Lyman Benedict erected the Tremont cotton factory on the north side of the river.

About 25,000 yards of cloth were manufactured weekly, the number of employes being about 70. In 1855 the property was sold to Walter A. Wood. The present population of the town is about 10,000.

WALTER A. WOOD MOWING AND REAPING MACHINE CO.

On the opposite pages we present three views of the most celebrated manufactory of harvesting machines in the world. This immense establishment is the property of the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company, the officers of which are the Hon. Walter A. Wood, president; Wm. S. Nicholls, vice-president; Willard Gay, treasurer; Chas. M. Coulter, secretary; Danforth Geer, assistant secretary; J. M. Rosebrooks, superintendent of construction.

The history of these extensive works begins in the year when Walter A. Wood, a young man of vigorous mind and active body, came to Hoosick Falls and engaged himself as a journeyman machinist to work for Parsons & Wilder, being at the time 20 years of age. Subsequently he became interested in the manufacture of plows and other agricultural implements. In 1852, having carefully inspected the working of the combined mowing and barvesting machine patented by John H. Manny of Illinois, Walter A. Wood was induced to purchase a territorial right, and to begin the manufacture of the machines, at Hoosick Falls. Besides occupying the old foundry building, he, in 1855 purchased the old Tremont cotton factory. In 1858, Ball & Parsons, who had also been engaged since 1852, in manufacturing the same machines, quitted the business, leaving Walter A. Wood the only one to carry on this branch of manufacturing in Hoosick Falls. In 1859, finding that he needed more conveniences for his increasing business, Mr. Wood rented the mill formerly occupied by Ball & Parsons. In November, 1860, a disastrous fire swept away in flame all of the buildings. The same year the work of rebuilding began, and the new buildings erected on the site of the old ones, were the next year noisy with the hum of machinery, and another period of manufacture begin. "The Wood Mower," constructed by the mechanical ingenuity of Mr. Wood in 1859, was sent out among the farmers and achieved a notable success. In 1861, "the self-raking reaper," patented by Mr. Wood, which was farther perfected in 1863, added to his greater celebrity as a maker of excellent harvesters.

In 1870, a second fire swept away all the buildings. The Caledonia mill having been bought in 1869, became the workshop where most all the machines were constructed during the year 1870. From the date of this calamity new buildings have, from year, to year, been erected, which now form this extensive manufacturing establishment.

The present stock company, known as the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company, was formed in 1865. From this time until 1879, various useful attachments and additions were made to the machines invented by Mr. Wood. In 1874, the wire self-binding harvester was brought out, and achieved the signal success which has made the machines of this character known in all the grain producing countries of the earth. Oliver Dalrymple, the great grain grower, employed in 1879, in harvesting his immense fields of grain, 106 of these machines, each of which reaped on an average, 15 acres of grain a day.

A CONSTELLATION OF MEDALS.

Writing of the first trial of the Wood automatic twine binder in England, in October, 1879, on the farm of Simeon Leather, Delamere lodge, near Northwich, Cheshire, an observant witness says: "I saw it make 500 sheaves without one stoppage, in the most perfect manner possible, at the rate of 27 sheaves per minute." The rightly merited praises bestowed upon these wonderful and useful machines have not only placed thousands and tens of thousands of them upon the great grain plains of the United States, but have carried them to those of Europe, Asia, Africa, South America, Australia and New Zealand, As the visitor inspects the 200 and more, gold, silver and bronze medals handsomely displayed in the vice-president's room, at the works, at Hoosick Falls,

awarded to Walter A. Wood as testimonials of the unexcelled merits of his harvesting machines, he cannot but think that " worth makes the man." In field competions between American and European reaping machines. in Europe, the Wood harvesters took 500 first prizes. The brilliancy of this honorable mention is further increased by the Wood machines during the same time, taking 250 first prizes on other fields of competition against all the leading machines. In 1876, at the centennial exhibition he obtained the highest awards for his harvesters. Austria conferred upon him the knight's cross of the imperial order of Francis Joseph, and France, in 1869, decorated him with the cross of the chevalier of the legion of honor, and in 1878, added two gold medals and the cross of officer of the legion of honor-the highest award of honor. The amazing record of the machines manufactured since 1853 at the Hoosick Falls establishment is the following:

This monthly pay roll is \$85,000 the number of regular employes being about 2000.

In 1880, the Wire Binder was abandoned, and a machine substituted for the Wire Binder in which twine is used for the binding material. As Mr. Wood was the first manufacturer to put the first practical Wire Self-Binder into the hands of the farmer in 1875, so it will be

seen in 1880, he was the first manufacturer to put a practical Twine Self-Binder upon the market. Since 1880, up to the present time the Twine Binder has been built exclusively, having been from time to time, improved, as suggested by experiments in the harvest field from season to season.


For the season of 1886, the Wood Company will build, exclusively, their New Light Steel Wheel Harvester and Binder, which may be regarded as the result and consummation of all previous endeavors to reach perfection in Grain Harvesting Machinery. It is acknowledge to be, by far, the most practical and best adapted to the wants of the farmer, of any Harvester and Binder yet built, and possesses all the advantages of a light machine, and at the same time embraces strength and durability.


To give the reader and idea of the growth of the Harvester and Binder business since the introduction of the first Self-Binder in 1875, by Mr. Wood, we have only to state, that up to 1880, this company built 25,000 Wire Binders. Since the introduction of the Twine Binder, in 1880, up to the present time, this company have made and sold 50,000 Twine Binders, which, with the Wire Binders would make 75,000 Wood Harvesters and Binders made and sold in the past ten years.

The Walter A. Wood Enclosed Gear Mower is claimed to be the best mower ever produced, and, since its introduction in 1878, over 115,000 of these mowers have been made and sold, and 65,000 of this number were made and sold in the last three years.

For the coming season of 1886, this company expect to make and sell 50,000 machines, which will require an average daily production for eight months in the year, of 250 machines.

The works are encircled with five miles of rail road track, and the company uses its own engines and cars, for conveying the machines to their warehouses, connecting with the Troy & Boston R. R. Over eighty-five acres of land are occupied by the different shops, lumber-yards and storehouses.

THE ORIGIN OF THE AUTOMATIC GRAIN BINDER.

The successful operation of this machine is a triumph of genius, and was first manufactured and practically introduced, by the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping

Machine Co., in 1870.

Our sketch would be incomplete, indeed, if it was not regarded as an important factor in establishing the present and prospective wealth and prosperity of Hoosiek town-As early as 1861, Sylvanus D. Locke-to whom the invention of the machine is to be credited-commenced his experiments of perfecting a Grain Binder, and in order to give the public a more perfect idea of this. useful invention, we will trace its history somewhat briefly. Mr. Locke was continuously engaged from 1861 to 1869 in what, at that time, and to others, seemed a fruitless endeavor to construct an automatic machine for binding grain. His life during this period, and subsequently, with reference to this machine, will constitute one of the most eventful chapters in the history of American inventions; for to him, more than to any other man living or dead, does the world owe the present successful Automatic Binding Harvester. With a good income from his surveying and engineering, every dollar of it, beyond the necessary provision for his family, was freely put in this machine. Against the advice, warnings, and even entreaties of his best friends, who declared that he was sacrificing the best years of his life in useless efforts to achieve what never before could be achieved, he pursued unfalteringly his purpose. Defeated often, but discouraged never, failure seemed only to confirm him in his purpose, and to add to his determination to succeed. Wonderfully gifted

for the work, he knew always that he would succeed. So, for nearly ten years, he battled, almost against fate, to produce what the world had never seen—a successful automatic binding harvester. The difficulty was not so much in the production of devices to manipulate the bands, as in bandling the grain and adapting the machine to it.


At last, in 1870, at Hoosick Falls, N. Y., where he is now residing, his efforts were crowned with that success which sooner or later in life's grand battles, unwavering devotion, and indomitable energy are certain to bring. In the harvest of that year he had the Pioneer binder. This machine cut and bound rapidly and well, a swathe eight feet wide. This was at least two years in advance of any and all inventors and competitors in the grainbinder field. Having produced a successful machine, the way has been easier for others to follow. About March 1, 1869, having previously arranged with Walter A. Wood to assume the financial burdens of his undertakings, Mr. Locke came to Hoosick Falls to reside. His family came the first of October following. deavor that year to apply his binder to Mr. Wood's chainrake was a failure. Later in the season, he applied his present "rotary binder," to a side-delivery apron machine. This machine was destroyed by the terrible conflagration that swept away, in a single night, in March, 1870, the extensive works of the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Co. Immediately after the fire, he commenced rebuilding his machine, and during the following harvest it proved an eminent success.


So year after year passed, constructing machines, at the manufactory at Hoosick Falls, and testing them in the west, to adapt them to run in the hands of unskilled farmers, in all the varied conditions of grain, soil and weather. In 1874, twenty-five machines were built; in 1875, three hundred; in 1876, twelve hundred; in 1877, three thousand; in 1878, five thousand, five hundred were built and sold. These machines bound with wire, and were, and are to-day, eminently a success. We give, at the head of this article, a cut of this machine, the pioneer binder of this or any other country. Its memory should not be allowed to die out, at least not in Hoosick, where

it was produced.

Since 1878, Mr. Locke has been at work on a twine binding harvester that is said to be several hundred pounds lighter than any of its competitors. It is not only very light, but also very strong, compact and simple. Having several new and distinctive features that commend it to the farmer, it seems to be the worthy successor of the Pioneer. We give an old cut of this new twine binding harvester at the close of this article. It is now being built by the Wm. Anson Wood Co., at Youngstown, Ohio, and also by Whiteley, Fassler & Kelly at Springfield, Ohio.

Mr. Locke has obtained, on his own inventions, over seventy-five patents relating to harvesters and binders, and owns or controls over one hundred. So, in return for a life work of usefulness to others, a harvest of wealth is gathering for Mr. Locke. May it come, in full measure to him and to Walter A. Wood, whose strong heart, clear head and open hand, have been extended to Mr. Locke in

A NOTABLE BUSINESS ENTERPRISE.

Among the largest and most successful business houses worthy of mention, is that of Easton, Rising and Worden, lumber, coal, hardware and agricultural implements. In the year 1875, Mr. C. W. Easton, located in the village and opened a general insurance and coal business, which he soon established as a successful undertaking. In 1880 Mr. Easton formed a partnership with Mr. G. F. Rising, when the foundation of the present large and lucrative business was laid. In 1888 Mr. L. E. Worden, a builder of reputation, was admitted. This business from its inception to the present time, has been an apparent success, and can be attributed, in a great measure, to the faithfulness of the members of the firm, all being young men of good business abilities, and each with particular qualificaions for the different departments. This firm now occupy large stores, warehouses and yards on each of the railroads running through the village. In addition to their business of merchants, and fire insurance, they have contracted for and built many of the finest residences, and most of the public buildings in the place, and stand unrivaled by any concern in the same line, outside of the larger cities in eastern New York.

THE HOOSICK FALLS CUSTOM MILLS.

Messrs. Hurd & Hoyt, Proprietors. A local history of this village would be incomplete without a notice of this, the only grist mill in the village, and the largest grain handling concern between Troy and North Adams.

The mill is a large wood and brick structure, built in 1878 by Chas. Q. Eldreage and enlarged in 1880. Has two run of stone, and a capacity for grinding 350 bushels of corn, and 100 bushels of wheat every 10 hours. In the same building a large room on the first floor is devoted to wood working, and all classes of job work are here performed. Planing and matching, scroll and band sawing, manufacture of moulding and in fact all kinds of ornamental work. On the second floor one hundred and

forty operatives are engaged in the manufacture of shirts, turning out some 600 dozen per week.

Two engines furnish motive power, working singly or jointly as more or less power is required.

THE EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES OF HOOSICK.

Hoosick, like most of the other first class towns in the state, has had a care of her public schools; and ample facilities for acquiring a good education are afforded to all her children. Mrs. Julia M. Dewey is the present efficient superintendent. The Board of Education in District No. 1 of Hoosick Falls, consists of Hon. Walter A. Wood, J. Russell Parsons, and Joseph Buckley, and in District No. 22, M. S. Burke, Timothy Mulvihill, Wm. Cummings are trustees.

NEWSPAPERS.

The Rensselaer County Standard was first issued, at Hoosick Falls, Nov. 15, 1873, by James H. Livingston, editor and proprietor.

On the 6th of March, 1880, the paper became the property of Benjamin Horsley, who ably continues its publication and succeeded in making it one of the newsiest weeklies in the state.

THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF HOOSICK FALLS.

Was organized April 10, 1880; commenced business May 3, 1880, with a capital of \$60,000, and is the only institution of the kind in the town. The following named are its officers: President—T. J. ORGANIZATIONS AND SOCIETIES.

THE MOWER AND REAPER BAND.

Is a favorite institution with the citizens of Hoosick Falls and is sustained very largely by the generous contributions of Hon. Walter A. Wood. The band was organized in 1859. The band as an organization joined the 2d Vermont Regiment during the war of 1861-65. They have a fine hall and a valuable set of instruments. Chas. F. Moon is the present leader.

POST WOOD G. A. R., No. 294.

This organization was effected Oct., 1882, and now numbers nearly 100 members, amply provided with uniforms and side arms. Grand Army Hall is well worthy of a visit; upon entering the main ball which is neatly carpeted, you are at once inspired by the memories of the late civil strife. The walls are adorned by military etchings from life executed by the artist Forbes, presented by the Hon. Walter A. Wood, and twenty-seven army corps badges inscribed on flags.

In the center of the hall is a miniature castle with parapets equipped and manned.

A commissary department presided over by Benj. Devoe, is utilized on festive occasions: a library and sociable room adjoins the hall where the members indulge in conversation and games; taken altogether it is one of

THE HOOSICK FALLS VETERAN SOLDIERS' ASSOCIATION,

Was organized May 30th, 1875, for the purpose of grouping together the soldiers of the town, securing annual decoration services, and preserving in every suitable way, the memories of the war. The association owns a burial lot in Maple Grove Cemetery, for the interment of soldiers. Under the auspices of the association, the fine monument standing near the intersection of Classic and High streets, was erected with becoming ceremonies, May 30, 1878, at a cost of \$1,500. Of this amount, \$1,200 was raised by the association with the aid of citizens, and \$300 appropriated by the town. The site on which it stands is known as Monumental Park, and was donated by the village.

To the energy, zeal and patriotism of this organization, are the citizens indebted for this fitting tribute to loosick's fallen sons.

1. To promote temperance in all, by advice and example.

2. To edify our lukewarm brethren, and bring them to

the practice of virtue and religion.

3. To relieve the wants of sick members of the Society, and to bury the dead.

4. To promote concord and harmony among all men,

and particularly among ourselves,

The rooms are located in Wood's block, on Classic street, and are neatly furnished, and have a library of 300 volumes, and a number of daily and weekly papers, and are open every evening. CHURCH DIRECTORY.

ST. MARK'S CHURCH.

This parish was organized in 1833, under the ministrations of the Rev. Nathaniel O. Preston. It was incorporated under the laws of the state, Nov. 1, 1834. The meeting for incorporation was presided over by the Rev. N. O. Preston. Geo. M. Tibbits and Dr. Salmon Moses were elected wardens; L. Chandler Ball, Jonathan Eddy, Jr., Geo. M. Tibbits, Dr. Salmon Moses, Harry Patterson, Seth Parsons, Sam'l Shaw Crocker and Hezekiah Munsell, Jr., vestrymen.

The parish continued to exist in a very uncertain condition till 1858 when a new organization was effected. The corner stone of the church was laid in the summer of 1858, by the Rt. Rev. Horatio Potter. The first services in the church were held on Sunday, Aug. 26, 1860. The church was consecrated May 5, 1863.

The rectors of the parish have been the Rev. Nath'l O. Preston, 1833-38; the Rev. Ebenezer Williams, the Rev. Jas. Henry Morgan, 1861-63; the Rev. Geo. A. Weeks,

1865-65; the Rev. Geo. H. Nicholls. 1865-81; the Rev. Geo. D. Silliman, Oct. 1, 1881, now restor. On Nov. 10, 1881, the Rev. Geo. H. Nicholls was elected "Rector-Emeritus."

THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH AT HOOSICK FALLS.

This society was legally incorporated April 12, 1858. On that day the members of the congregation assembled at the place of worship, the meeting house of the Warren society, and elected Stephen Williams, William A. Stoney, John V. Carney, Jesse F. Dunham and Asa Colgrove "trustees of the Methodist Episcopal society at the village of Hoosick Falls." In 1860 a frame church edifice was erected on Main street, in which services were first held on Christmas day of that year, at which time it was dedicated; the Rev. J. E. King. D.D., preaching the sermon on the occasion. The building cost about \$3,300, and had a seating capacity for 300 persons. It was further enlarged in 1877. The present membership embraces about 300 persons. The pastors of the church have been the following: The Rev. Reuben Washburn, 1858; the Rev. Joseph Eames, 1859; the Rev. Jesse Brown, 1800; the Rev. A. Viele, 1861-62; the Rev. B. B. Loomis, 1863-66; the Rev. William H. Washburn, 1866-69; the Rev. George C. Morehouse, 1869-72; the Rev. J. K. Wager, 1872-74; the Rev. M. A. Senter, 1874-76; the Rev. Geo. Skene, 1876-79; the Rev. William H. Meeker, 1879-82; Rev. Damas Brough, 1882-83; Rev. Edwin P. Stevens, 1883 to present time. A fine toned bell, weighing 1,866 pounds, and costing \$642, was placed in the belfry of this church in the summer of 1874. The society is a strong and vigorous organization. Its present officers are: Trustees-Wm. Kelyer, S. J. Phillips, C. W. Easton, S. D. Locke, H. K. McLean; Stewards-E. P. Markham, H.

THE M. E. SUNDAY SCHOOL OF HOOSICK FALLS.

This school is one of the largest in the Troy conference, and is in a very flourishing condition. Its present membership, is: Officers, 12; teachers, 21; scholars, 325; total, 358.

School meets at 12 M., every Sunday. All are invited to attend.

THE CHURCH OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

The first masses were celebrated here in 1834, by Rev. J. Shannahan, in the old school on Elm street, and in the Baptist church (then used as a union church). Rev. J. B. Dailey attended this place in 1836-7, and subsequently, Rev. Fathers Haverman, Farley, Finnelly and Quigley, officiated, until 1849, and in that year, Rev. Hugh Quigley built a church on Church street, which was afterwards enlarged by Rev. John McDermott, who officiated until 1862, assisted by Rev. Father Cahill.

In 1862, the Augustinian Fathers took charge of the parish. Rev. J. A. Darragh, O. S. A., was appointed first pastor, assisted by Rev. E. Mullen, O. S. A., and remained in charge until 1865, when Rev. E. A. Dailey, O. S. A., was appointed pastor, and remained in charge until 1874.

The church proving too small for the increasing congregation, the corner-stone of a new church on Main street was laid, Aug. 15, 1869, by Very Rev. E. P. Wadhams, V. G., of Albany. It was dedicated, Dec. 10, 1871, by Very Rev. T. Galberry, Com. Gen'l of the Augustinians. A fine bell weighing 2,960 lbs., and costing \$1,500 was placed in the tower of the church, Aug., 1872.

In July, 1874, Rev. J. D. Waldron, O. S. A., was appointed pastor, and is now assisted by Rev. E. A. Dailey and appointed assistant pastor.

A new organ of the best quality was placed in the church, Aug. 15, 1881. It was built by Johnson & Son, and cost \$2,500. The present edifice is a substantial brick structure, with stone trimmings, and costing \$40,000, proving too small for the congregation, has been recently enlarged at a cost of \$18,000, giving two transepts, vestries and a large sanctuary, making the church cruciform which greatly adds to its appearance. Its scating capacity has been increased from 700 to over 1100.

It was re-dedicated Sept. 28, 1884, by Rt. Rev. Francis McNeirny D.D., Bishop of Albany, assisted by Rt. Rev. J. F. Shanahan, D.D., Bishop of Harrisburgh, Pa., who preached the dedicatory sermon. The Rector of the parish Rev. J. D., Waldron, O. S. A., Rev. E. A. Dailey, O. S. A., and Rev. D. J. O'Mahony, O. S. A., assistant pastors. Joseph Haussler, organist, Prof. Wm. A. Leonard, leader, the choir numbers over 40 members, scholars attending Sunday over 600 attended by 55 teachers.

In consequence of the rapid increase of the congregation it has been found necessary to celebrate three masses every Sunday.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF HOOSICK FALLS.

On the 5th of January, 1825, a number of the inhabitants of Hoosick Falls assembled at the Warren meeting house, on Main street, and there organized a religious society by the name of the "Presbyterian society of Hoosick," and elected the following persons trustees:

Timothy Graves, Garret T. Breeze, John March Harry Patterson, Samuel Burrell and Robert Haswell. In 1829 the congregation erected on Church street, a frame meeting house, which, when finished, was dedicated by the Rev. N. S. S. Beman, D.D., of Troy, the Rev. A. Peters of Bennington, Vt., and other Presbyterian ministers. This building cost about \$1 800 and had seats for about 300 persons. In 1854 the old building was removed, and the present church edifice was erected at a cost of about \$7,000 and having a seating capacity for about 500 persons. It was dedicated in the spring of 1-54, the Rev. N. S. S. Beman, D.D., LL.D., of Troy, the Rev. J. H. Noble, D.D., of Schaghticoke and the Rev. A. M. Beveridge officiating. The membership of the church is about 165, and the Sunday school 185. The first Sunday school of Hoosick Falls was organized in 1825 by persons belonging to this congregation and those connected with the Warren society. Seth Parsons was the first superintendent.

The church edifice was enlarged and improved in 1879.

at an expense of \$6,500.

The different pastors of this church bave been the Rev. C. Cheever, 1825-26; the Rev. Samuel W. May, 1826-29; the Rev. Robert Shaw, 1830-31; the Rev. Luther P. Blodgett, 1831-36; the Rev. Leonard Johnson, 1837-39; the Rev. Thomas Gordon, 1841-50; the Rev. A. M. Beveridge, 1851-58; the Rev. A. De Witt, 1859-65; the Rev. A. B. Lambert, D.D., 1865-68, and the Rev. John Tatlock, D.D., 1868 to present time.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH AT HOOSICK FALLS.

The First Baptist church of Hoosick Falls was organized Oct. 30, 1847. On the 8th of May, 1851, at a meeting held at the place of worship, John Lyon, Jonathan Case, Allen Spencer, Hosea Daniels and Edmund Leonard were

elected trustees of the Hoosick Falls Baptist church. The certificate of incorporation is dated May 16, 1851.

The Rev. John M. Gregory, 1847-50; supplies for several years, the Revs. Grant and Thos. Rogers from Hoosick Corners; the Rev. O. C. Kirkham, 1860-63; the Rev. Thos. Rogers, the Rev. William A. Doolittle, the Rev. William Wilcox, the Rev. William Garnet, 1867-69; the Rev. E. T. Hunt, 1869-73; the Rev. A. B. Whipple, 1872-74; the Rev. H. W. Webber, 1874; the Rev. H. A. Morgan, 1875-76; 1876 to present time, the Rev. George R. Robbins.

This congregation until recently occupied what was called "The Meeting-house" of the Warren society, erected in 1800. During the year 1884 a beautiful and commodious house of worship was built at a cost of \$12,159.55 with a seating capacity of seven hundred (700). The building was designed by architect J. R. Thomas, of New York. It was dedicated Oct. 31, 1884. The Rev. H. M. King, D.D., of Albany, Rev. G. C. Baldwin, D.D., of Troy, Rev. H. O. Hiscox of Troy, and Rev. John Humpstone, of Brooklyn officiating. The membership at present of the church is three hundred and forty (340) and of the Sunday School three hundred and seventy-seven (377). The entire value of the church property is \$18,000.

VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS SINCE OUR LAST ISSUE.

Foremost among the improvements may be recorded:

THE CHENEY BLOCK—on Main street erected by C. A. Cheney, Esq., in 1884, by its commanding position and business-like appearance is the best specimen of business

architecture in the township and is creditable to the architect Mr. Cummings, of Troy.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS—The erection of the new Baptist and the enlargement of the Catholic churches in 1884, are detailed elsewhere.

Woods Hall.-Has been re-modelled and equipped with scenery etc., to meet the requirements of the drama.

THE NEW BRICK ENGINE HOUSE—On Church street, erected in the village for the Seth Parsons Co., is a model in its way.

THE NEW BRICK SCHOOL HOUSE—On Main street, erected in 1885, is commodious and attractive and cost \$35,000, including lot.

THE NEW WATER WORKS.

Geo. H. Norman of Boston, Mass., is putting in Village Water Works, under a contract awarded by the Water Board of the village to John Lockwood, president of the Hoosiek Falls Water Supply Co. The work of laying the pipe commenced in the fall of 1885, and it is proposed to finish the work and turn water into the pipes in the spring of 1886. The works are built on the Holly system with Artesian wells for a water supply. The Water Supply Co., have contracted to lay 8 miles of water pipe in the streets of the village and to furnish and maintain 75 hydrants and to furnish water for as many more hydrants as the village authorities may think proper to place on their 8 miles of pipe. The yearly water rent to be \$3,000

THE HON. WALTER A. WOOD.

A sketch of The Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company would be incomplete indeed without a passing tribute to the Hon. Walter A. Wood, whose good judgment and executive ability is felt in every pulsation of this vast and growing enterprise, and who has reared it from its infancy to its present stalwart position among the foremost industries of the world.

Walter Abbott Wood was born in Mason, Hillsboro Co., N. H., Oct. 23, 1815. His father Aaron Wood, and his

mother, whose maiden name was Rebecca Wright, were natives of Massachusetts, and both of English descent. Aaron Wood, who was a manufacturer of wagons and plows, had lived in Mason from a very early period in his life, but the year following the birth of his son Walter, he removed to New York state, and settled in the neighborhood of Albany, in which locality Walter grew to manhood, receiving his education in the district schools of Albany county, and serving his apprenticeship to the trade of wagon and plow making in his father's shop. At twenty having mastered this trade he went to Hoosick Falls and secured employment as a journeyman machinist, but soon afterwards engaged in business on his own account in a small way. For about seventeen years till 1852 he carried on the manufacture of plows and castings for machinery. The subsequent career of Mr. Wood is so interwoven with the present gigantic enterprise bearing his name, that we are compelled to refer the reader to the historical sketch of the works in the preceding pages of this book. Aside from his business character Mr. Wood has ever been known as a benefactor to his workmen. Having emerged from their midst, his warm heart has ever beat in unison with them in their struggles. manner quiet and unobtrusive, easily approached, but very firm in declaring for the right and condemning the wrong. His benefactions are so numerous and varied and have likewise been so quietly bestowed, that the world can never know their extent and character, indeed our country is indebted to this class more than to any other for being to-day a nation of exporters and importers.

A certain class of Americans possessing inventive genius, with pluck and enterprise, have made this country what it is by contributing so largely to the advancement of the arts and sciences, and the perfection of machinery, whereby, the comforts of life have been multiplied and the fruits of labor increased.

Among this class of American born citizens who have been such benefactors to their country and people, Mr.

Wood stands conspicuously prominent.

Despite the demands of his extensive business Mr. Wood finds ample time to perform his duties as a useful citizen and to cultivate the amenities of social life.
