








WALTER A. WOOD HORSE HAY RAKE.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

OF HOOSICK.

"Hoosac" is an Indian name, and when translated means "Owl Valley," or Valley of the Owl, "Hoo" being the Indian name for owl, and "sac" for valley. The U. S. Government has, however, established the spelling of "Hoosick" for its post-offices in this township.

Hoosiek, the northeastern town of the county, is bounded north by Cambridge and White Creek, in Washington county; east by Bennington, in Vermont; south by Petersburgh and Grafton, and west by Pittstown. The boundary-lines are straight, or nearly so, following, however, somewhat the course of the Hoosiek river. The town is considerably wider at the north than at the south. The farm acreage of the town is about 40,000 acres. The present population of the township is about 11,000.

The scenery is of a varied character, combining many elements of beauty. The highest peaks are those of Fonda Hill, in the southwest. These are said to be 900 feet above tide water. The valleys are bordered in many places by steep hillsides.

The town is divided into two nearly equal parts by the Hoosick river. This is an old historic stream, whose valley was the war path along which the French and Indians made their stealthy marches upon the villages of New England.

In the southeast part of the town are mineral springs, and deposits of slate exist in various parts of the town.

The settlement of the Hoosick valley was delayed by the long and often sanguinary struggles of the French and English for supremacy and dominion in the valley of the St. Lawrence and the adjacent provinces.

This stormy period extended from 1688 to 1760. Hoosick, from its location, being in the direct route from Canada to the

towns and villages on the Deerfield and Connecticut, was the most exposed to attacks of these merciless foes.

The one great event of the revolutionary era in this immediate section was the battle of Bennington. This was fought in the town of Hoosick, and, as Judge Ball and others have suggested, it might well have been called "the battle of Walloomsac," as it was fought in the valley of that stream, or upon the adjacent hills, and near the village of Walloomsac.

HOOSICK FALLS.

Its Manufacturing Industries, Churches, Organizations and Local Institutions.

On April 14, 1827, the village of Hoosick Falls was incorporated, Seth Parsons being elected president of the board of trustees. It is said that at the time of its incorporation the population of the village was 200, the number of buildings 36, the electors 50, and the valuation of the property \$96,370.

This village, known throughout the country for its thriving manufacturing enterprises, is situated upon the Hoosick river, which supplies valuable water power. The river runs in a serpentine manner through the village and has a picturesque appearance from the hills. It is also on the line of the Fitchburg railroad, which connects with the entire railroad system of the United States.

In Hoosick Falls are the extensive works of the Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Co., with facilities for employing between 2000 and 3000 operatives.

The first known lease of land of the Hoosick patent, at Hoosick Falls, was made of 220 acres by Jonathan Fuller from Augustus Van Horne of New York. The survey of this tract began at a marked birch tree standing below the falls of Quequick. This farm was next conveyed to Henry Northup, of North Kingston, R. I., who shortly after removed to it, where he lived until his death in 1797. The other part of the village west of Main street and east of the Hoosick river, was a part of the farm of 250 acres belonging to Henry Barnhart. The first store in Hoosick Falls, it is said, was one opened in 1785 by Isaac Turner. In 1784 Joseph

Dorr came to Hoosick Falls, and, leasing of Barnabus Bratt 280 acres of land, together with all the water power on the north side of the river, began the erection of a carding and fulling mill. Subsequently a flax mill, a distillery, and a saw mill were also erected there. Benjamin Colvin, about the year 1786, built a grist mill on the south side of the river. His successors were John Chase and Theophilus Comstock. In 1791 the first bridge was constructed over the river at Hoosick Falls. In 1822 the first post-office was established in the place, Seth Parsons being made postmaster.

In 1823 Joseph Gordon, a Scotchman, built what was known as the Caledonian cotton factory, on the south bank of the Hoosick river between the bridge and the grist mill. About 150 persons were employed in the factory. In 1827 the factory was purchased by Samuel S. Crocker, John Knickerbocker, John House, of Waterford, and Jacob Merritt, of Troy. In 1868 this property was sold to The Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company.

In 1831 George W. and Lyman Benedict erected the Tremont cotton factory on the north side of the river.

About 25,000 yards of cloth were manufactured weekly, the number of employes being about 70. In 1855 the property was sold to Walter A. Wood. The village is a lively, bustling and thriving place of about 8000 inhabitants, and wears an air of solid thrift and substantial comfort, and is fast being equipped with all the conveniences of city life, as will be found detailed in the following pages.

The town, though beautiful and inviting, is essentially an industrial centre. Ensconced among wholesome hills, secure from the deleterious excitements often found in large mixed communities, it is nevertheless perfectly convenient for all the needs of commerce and for constant communication with the world at large.

WALTER A. WOOD MOWING AND REAPING MACHINE CO.

The works of this great industry render the name of Hoosick Falls familiar all over the earth. This immense establishment cannot be duly appreciated from any attempt at description on paper. On adjacent pages we have shown the different departments as well perhaps as the hilly contour of the land permits.

The officers of the company are: —Hon, Walter A. Wood, president; William S. Nicholls, vice president; Willard Gay, treasurer; Charles M. Coulter, secretary; Danforth Geer, assistant secretary; J. M. Rosebrooks, superintendent of construction.

On other pages we show pictures of several styles of the Waiter A. Wood machines, and although it is possible that advance may still be made in some details, it seems that for mechanical excellence, symmetry, and the union of all desirable lightness with tremendous strength, Walter A. Wood has reached the perfecting of his special line of productions. At all events, he stands at the head as a prize-winner in every land and community where prizes for harvesting machines have been offered.

The annual product of The Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Co. is believed to be the greatest known, and their total output up to this time is 875,549 machines—a record without a parallel.

The history of these extensive works began when Walter A. Wood, a young man of vigorous mind and active body, came to Hoosick Falls, and engaged himself as a journeyman machinist to work for Parsons & Wilder. In 1852, having carefully inspected

the working of the combined mowing and reaping machine patented by John H. Manny of Illinois, Walter A. Wood was induced to purchase a territorial right, and to begin the manufacture of the machines at Hoosick Falls. Besides occupying the old foundry building, he in 1855 purchased the old Tremont cotton factory. In 1858, Ball & Parsons, who had also been engaged since 1852 in manufacturing the same machines, quitted the business, leaving Walter A. Wood the only one to carry on this branch of manufacturing in Hoosick Falls. In 1859, finding that he needed more conveniences for his increasing business, Mr. Wood rented the mill formerly occupied by Ball & Parsons. In November, 1860, a disastrous fire swept away in flame all of the buildings. The same year the work of rebuilding began, and the new buildings erected on the site of the old ones were the next year noisy with the hum of machinery, and another period of manufacture began. "The Wood Mower," constructed by the mechanical ingenuity of Mr. Wood in 1859, was sent out among the farmers and achieved a notable success. In 1861, "the self-raking reaper," patented by Mr. Wood, which was further perfected in 1863, added to his greater celebrity as a maker of excellent harvesters. It was at that period a wonder of the times.

In 1870 a second fire swept away all the buildings. The Caledonian mill having been bought in 1869, became the workshop where most all the machines were constructed during the year 1870. From the date of this calamity new buildings have from year to year been erected, which now form this extensive manufacturing establishment.

The present stock company, known as The Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company, was formed in 1865. From this time until 1879, various useful attachments and additions were made to the machines invented by Mr. Wood.

A CONSTRLLATION OF MEDALS.

In 1876, at the centennial exhibition, he obtained the highest awards for his harvesters. Austria conferred upon him the knight's cross of the imperial order of Francis Joseph, and France, in 1869, decorated him with the cross of the chevalier of the legion of honor, and in 1878, added two gold medals and the cross of officer of the legion of honor—the highest award of honor.

The U. S. National Agricultural society gave him its highest prize as early as 1857. He secured the gold medal at the London World's Fair of 1862, at the Paris World's Fair of 1867, at the Vienna World's Fair of 1873, at the Bremen, Germany, World's Fair of 1874, at the Melbourne, Australia, World's Fair of 1880, at the Amsterdam, Holland, World's Fair of 1884, and at the London Inventions Exhibition of 1885. He has also received first prize at a very great number of important field trials and expositions, held under high official auspices, in the United States, Australia, New Zealand, and different European countries. In France, where the management of such matters is very strict, he has secured all the first prizes given at government field trials for seven years past, with no interruption. The total number of gold medals and other important first prizes taken by him in competition with all the various makes of reapers, mowers and binders in the world, now exceeds 1200-a truly marvelous record, and one which, of course, has never been approached by others.

Walter A. Wood is the man to whom belongs the credit of giving the world the first machine to bind the grain in sheaves while reaping it. The introduction of the grain binder by him was achieved after great and protracted efforts to render the first attempts the grand success so early reached. It made an era. It caused a revolution in grain raising in America; and the changed methods thus brought about are now steadily forcing their way into adoption in many other countries, as it saves not only labor, but vast amounts of grain formerly lost in scatterings, and worse yet, by delays and sudden injurious changes of weather at the harvesting season.

In 1874 the wire self-binding harvester was brought out, and achieved the signal success which has made the machines of this character known in all the grain producing countries of the earth. Oliver Dalrymple, the great grain grower, had employed at one time, in harvesting his immense fields of grain, 106 of these machines, each of which cut and bound, on an average, 15 acres of grain a day.

Writing of the first trial of the Wood automatic twine binder in England, in October, 1879, on the farm of Simeon Leather, Delamere lodge, near Northwich, Cheshire, an observant witness says: "I saw it make 500 sheaves without one stoppage, in the most perfect manner possible, at the rate of 27 sheaves per minute."

The rightly merited praises bestowed upon these wonderful and

useful machines, have not only placed thousands and tens of thousands of them upon the great grain plains of the United States, but have carried them to those of Europe, Asia, Africa, South America, Australia and New Zealand.

In 1880 the wire binder was abandoned, and a machine substituted for the wire binder in which twine is used for the binding material. As Mr. Wood was the first manufacturer to put the first practical wire self-binder into the hands of the farmer in 1875, so it will be seen in 1880 he was the first manufacturer to put a practical twine self-binder upon the market. Since 1880 up to the present time, the twine binder has been built exclusively, having been from time to time improved, as suggested by experiments in the harvest field from season to season.

For the coming season, the Wood Company will build their new harvester and binder, which may be regarded as the result and consummation of all previous endeavors to reach perfection in grain harvesting machinery. It is acknowledged to be, by far, the most practical and best adapted to the wants of the farmer of any harvester and binder yet built, and possesses all the advantages of a light machine, and at the same time embraces strength and durability.

The Walter A. Wood mower is claimed to be the best mower ever produced. Its sale is so enormous as to exceed that of all other makes of mowers in the world; and it is the only mower made that has the honor of attempted imitation. Not only in America, but in foreign lands, it is the mowing machine of first choice by farmers, and particularly those with much or difficult cutting to do.

The works now produce an average of about 300 completed machines per day, equal to one every two minutes. A tour of the works is like a journey. The degree of organization necessary for the results attained is of course remarkable, if not without parallel anywhere.

The works are threaded by over seven miles of railroad track, connecting the different departments with each other and with the Fitchburg railroad, and the company uses its own engines and cars for conveying materials and for communication with the entire railroad system of the United States. The works are lighted by the electric arc method on a scale proportioned to their extent, and are required to be operated by night as well as by day, to keep up with the demand for machines. Steam heating is used

throughout the place. The advantage of a large water-power from the Hoosick river is an economic advantage of much value to these great works, although large steam power is also used in addition. Every advantage that mechanical ingenuity and enterprise can furnish is found throughout the long shops, and all the materials are handled by railway in passing along from the raw to the completed state. Over eighty-five acres of land are occupied by the different shops, lumber yards, storehouses and freight depots.

The Hon. Walter A. Wood.

A sketch of The Walter A. Wood Mowing and Reaping Machine Company would be incomplete without a passing tribute to the Hon. Walter A. Wood, whose good judgment and executive ability are felt in every pulsation of this vast and growing enterprise, and who has reared it from its infancy to its present stalwart position among the foremost industries of the world.

Walter Abbott Wood was born in Mason, Hillsboro Co., N. H. His father, Aaron Wood, and his mother, whose maiden name was Rebecca Wright, were natives of Massachusetts, and both of English descent. Aaron Wood, who was a manufacturer of wagons and plows, had lived in Mason from a very early period in his life, but the year following the birth of his son Walter, he removed to New York state, and settled in the neighborhood of Albany, in which locality Walter grew to manhood, receiving his education in the district schools of Albany county, and serving his apprenticeship to the trade of wagon and plow making in his father's shop. At twenty, having mastered this trade, he went to Hoosiek Falls and secured employment as a journeyman machinist, but soon afterwards engaged in business on his own account in a small way. For about seventeen years, till 1852, he carried on the manufacture of plows and castings for machinery. The subsequent career of Mr. Wood is so interwoven with the present gigantic enterprise bearing his name, that we are compelled to refer the reader to the historical sketch of the works in the preceding pages of this book. Aside from his business character, Mr. Wood has ever been known as a benefactor to his workmen. Having emerged from their midst, his warm heart has ever beat in unison with them in their struggles. In his manner quiet and unobtrusive, easily approached, but very firm in declaring for the right and condemning the wrong. His

benefactions are so numerous and varied and have likewise been so quietly bestowed, that the world can never know their extent and character; indeed our country is indebted to this class more than to any other for being to-day a nation of exporters and importers.

A certain class of Americans possessing inventive genius, with pluck and enterprise, have made this country what it is by contributing so largely to the advancement of the arts and sciences, and the perfection of machinery, whereby the comforts of life have been multiplied and the fruits of labor increased.

Among this class of American born citizens who have been such benefactors to their country and people, Mr. Wood stands conspicuously prominent.

Despite the demands of his extensive business, Mr. Wood finds ample time to perform his duties as a useful citizen and to cultivate the amenities of social life.

THE FUTURE OF HOOSICK FALLS.

Among the evidences that the village has improved since our last issue may be mentioned the organization of a "live" Board of Trade, and the enlargement of the fire department, the erection of the Holmes block, Byars block, and over one hundred residences; the increased volume of business in the "Hosiery" and "Shirt" factories, and above all the positive assurance that the peerless W. A. W. M. & R. M. Co. is here to stay. Among the proposed improvements are electric cars, a letter carrier delivery, and in due time a city charter.

A NOTABLE BUSINESS ENTERPRISE.

Among the largest and most successful business houses worthy of mention, is that of Easton, Rising & Worden, lumber, coal, hardware and agricultural implements. In the year 1875, Mr. C. W. Easton located in the village, and opened a general insurance and coal business, which he soon established as a successful undertaking. In 1880 Mr. Easton formed a partnership with Mr. G. F. Rising, when the foundation of the present large and lucrative business was laid. In 1883 Mr. L. E. Worden, a builder of repu-

tation, was admitted. Mr. Worden has since then represented the town two terms in the board of supervisors, and is at present the representative of this district in the Assembly of the State.

This business, from its inception to the present time, has been a success, and can be attributed, in a great measure, to the faithfulness of the members of the firm, all being young men of good business abilities, and each with particular qualifications for the different departments. In addition to their business of merchants and fire insurance, they have contracted for and built many of the finest residences and most of the public buildings in the place, and stand unrivalled by any concern in the same line outside of the larger cities in eastern New York.

THE HOOSICK FALLS CUSTOM MILLS.

Messrs. Hurd & Co., are proprietors. A local history of this village would be incomplete without a notice of this the only grist mill in the village, and the largest grain handling concern between Troy and North Adams.

The mill is a large wood and brick structure, built in 1878 by Chas. Q. Eldredge, and enlarged by him in 1880, and enlarged several times since by the present proprietors. The most important addition is the dry house that will dry several cars of lumber at once. In the same building is a large room on the first floor devoted to wood working, and all classes of job work are here performed. Part of the first floor is fitted up with machines for the manufacture of chair stock. The lumber is taken in the log and worked up into chair stock and the waste is worked up into kindling wood, which is kiln dried, and sold at 5 bundles for \$1. In the wood working shop planing and matching, scroll and band sawing, and all kinds of ornamental work are done.

SHIRT FACTORY.

A branch of the firm of Miller, Hall & Hartwell, shirt manufacturers, of Troy, occupies two floors 35x100 feet over Hurd & Co's wood-working shop. The firm was induced to locate here by Chas. Q. Eldredge, who erected the building, and its success here is shown in a constantly increasing business. The firm employs about 200 persons, produces 40,000 dozen shirts annually, and pays out \$40,000 per year for help alone.

HOOSICK FALLS HOSIERY COMPANY.

This concern began operations in 1886, and was re-organized in 1889 with a capital of \$30,000. The mill is what is known as a three-set mill, and employs eighty persons, the pay-roll amounting to \$2500 per month. The product is merino and all-wool underwear. Its officers are—President, Chas. A. Brown; Secretary and Treasurer, Henry T. Smith; Superintendent, George W. Clark.

THE BOARD OF TRADE OF HOOSICK FALLS.

There has recently been organized in this village a board of trade, consisting at present of one hundred names, and representing the nerve and sinew, the pluck and grit, the intelligence and wealth of the village. The object of this organization is first and foremost, to promote the manufacturing interests of the village, and it is their determination by the use of all legitimate means within their power, to increase the general prosperity of the village by building up new industries. They believe it is only necessary that the world should know of the natural and special advantages-offered by this village, for the world to take advantage of the same, and they give evidence of that interest in and persistence towards the accomplishment of their purpose, which rarely fails in its object. We bespeak great good to the village from the efforts of this organization. At its last annual meeting, held Dec. 8th, the old officers were all unanimously re-elected, and are as follows: - President, Watson M. Holmes; First Vice President, Joseph Buckley; Second Vice President, Francis Riley; Secretary, Chas. Q. Eldredge; Treasurer, E. M. Jones.

THE EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES OF HOOSICK.

Hoosick, like most of the other first-class towns in the state, has had a care of her public schools; and ample facilities for acquiring a good education are afforded to all her children. The school course covers 12 years, S in the Primary, S in the Intermediate, S in the Grammar, and S in the High school grades. The last grade is devoted mainly to the sciences, higher mathematics, and languages necessary to enter college.

THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF HOOSICK FALLS

Was organized April 10, 1880; commenced business May 3, 1880, with a capital of \$60,000, and is the only institution of the kind in the town. The following named are its officers: President, T. J. HOOSICK FALLS WATER SUPPLY CO.

Hoosick Falls is supplied with pure water by the Hoosick Falls Water Supply Co. The source from which it is derived is a well,

Water is pumped into the main pipes direct, and also into a storage reservoir located on one of the eminences of the village. The company has eight miles of street mains, and it supplies the village with eighty-six fire hydrants. The average pressure is eighty pounds to the square inch. The force is sufficient to throw streams from the hydrants over the highest buildings. E. R. Estabrook is the Superintendent.

HOOSICK FALLS WATER POWER AND LIGHT CO.

The streets of Hoosick Falls are lighted by the Thomson-Houston system of electric lights under a long contract with the Hoosick Falls Water Power and Light Co. It operates both are and incandescent systems. The company has a tract of twenty-seven acres of land, which, together with the plant for lighting, cost \$100,000. The Hoosick River furnishes power. A dam 150 feet long and 12 feet high was built by the company, and a race-way giving a fall of about 18 feet conducts the water to the wheels. E. E. Larrabee is the Superintendent of the Company.

THE SOLDIERS' MONUMENT.

Through the efforts of the Hoosick Falls Veteran Association a beautiful monument, commemorating the lives of those who fell in the War of the Rebellion, was erected in 1878, in Monument Park, near the intersection of Classic and High Streets. The monument cost \$1500. One-fifth of the amount was donated by the town. The balance was raised by the Association.

CHURCH DIRECTORY.

ST. MARK'S CHURCH.

This parish was organized in 1883, under the ministrations of the Rev. Nathaniel O. Preston. It was incorporated November 1, 1834. The meeting for incorporation was presided over by the Rev. N. O. Preston. Geo. M. Tibbits and Dr. Salmon Moses were elected wardens; L. Chandler Ball, Jonathan Eddy, Jr., Geo. M. Tibbits, Dr. Salmon Moses, Harry Patterson, Seth Parsons, Samuel Shaw Crocker and Hezekiah Munsell, Jr., vestrymen.

The parish continued to exist in a very uncertain condition till 1858, when a new organization was effected. The corner-stone of the church was laid in the summer of 1858, by the Rt. Rev. Horatio Potter. The first services in the church were held on Sunday, August 26, 1860. The church was consecrated May 5, 1863. The church was partially destroyed by fire in 1886. It was restored the same year, and enlarged in 1888-89. This church contains a town-clock and fine chime of bells, some beautiful carved work in wood, and handsome furnishings.

The rectors of the parish have been the Rev. Nathaniel O. Preston, 1833-38; the Rev. Ebenezer Williams, the Rev. Jas. Henry Morgan, 1861-63; the Rev. Geo. A. Weeks, 1863-65; the Rev. Geo. H. Nicholls, 1865-81; the Rev. Geo. D. Silliman, October 1, 1881, now rector. On November 10, 1881, the Rev. Geo. H. Nicholls was elected "Rector Emeritus."

THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH AT HOOSICK FALLS.

This society was legally incorporated April 12, 1858. On that day the members of the congregation assembled at the place of worship,—the meeting house of the Warren society,—and elected Stephen Williams, William A. Stoney, John V. Carney, Jesse F. Dunham and Asa Colgrove "trustees of the Methodist Episcopal society at the village of Hoosick Falls." In 1860 a frame church edifice was creeted on Main street, in which services were first held on Christmas day of that year, at which time it was dedicated, Rev. J. E. King, D. D., preaching the sermon on the occasion. The building cost about \$3300, and had a seating capacity for 800 persons. It was further enlarged in 1877. A fine toned bell, weighing 1866 pounds and costing \$642, was placed in the belfry of this church in the summer of 1874. In 1887, during the pas-

torste of Rev. C. W. Rowley, Ph. D., it was determined to build a new church, the old one having been outgrown. The Russell homestead was purchased, the old house converted into a parsonage, and the corner-stone of a new church laid October 20, 1887. This edifice was completed in about a year, at a cost, including furnishing, of about \$30,000; the value of the entire property—lot, parsonage and church—being about \$40,000. This building was dedicated October 31, 1888. The society is a strong and flourishing organization, having a present membership of over 450 persons.

THE CHURCH OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

The first masses were celebrated here in 1834, by Rev. J. Shannahan, in the old school on Elm street, and in the Baptist church (then used as a union church). Rev. J. B. Dailey attended this place in 1836-7, and subsequently Rev. Fathers Haverman, Farley, Finnelly and Quigley, officiated, until 1849, and in that year, Rev. Hugh Quigley built a church on Church street, which was afterwards enlarged by Rev. John McDermott, who officiated until 1862, assisted by Rev. Father Cahill.

In 1862 the Augustinian Fathers took charge of the parish. Rev. J. A. Darragh, O. S. A., was appointed first pastor, and remained in charge until 1865, succeeded by Rev. E. A. Dailey, O. S. A., who remained in charge until 1874.

The church proving too small for the increasing congregation, the corner-stone of a new church on Main street was laid, Aug. 15, 1869, by Very Rev. E. P. Wadhams, V. G., of Albany. It was dedicated Dec. 10, 1871, by Very Rev. T. Galberry. A bell, weighing 2,960 lbs., was placed in the tower of the church, Aug., 1872.

In July, 1874, Rev. J. D. Waldron, O. S. A., was appointed pastor, and in 1890 was succeeded by Rev. P. J. O'Connell, O. S. A.

A new organ built by Johnson & Son was placed in the church, Aug. 15, 1881. The present edifice is a substantial brick structure with stone trimmings, and cost \$40,000; proving too small for the congregation, it was subsequently enlarged at a cost of \$18,000, giving two transepts, vestries and a large sanctuary, making the church cruciform, which greatly adds to its appearance. Its seating capacity has been increased from 650 to 1050.

The Sunday school attendance is 600 with 50 teachers.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF HOOSICK FALLS.

On the 5th of January, 1825, a number of the inhabitants of Hoosick Falis assembled at the Warren meeting house, on Main street, and there organized a religious society by the name of the "Presbyterian society of Hoosick." In 1829 the congregation erected on Church street, a frame meeting house, which, when finished, was dedicated by the Rev. N. S. S. Beman, D. D., of Troy. This building cost \$1,800, and had seats for about 300 persons. In 1854 the old building was removed, and the present church edifice was erected at a cost of about \$7,000 and having a seating

capacity for about 500 persons. It was dedicated in the spring of 1854, the Rev. N. S. S. Beman, D. D., LL. D., of Troy, the Rev. J. H. Noble, D. D., of Schaghticoke, and the Rev. A. M. Beveridge officiating. The membership of the church is nearly 300, and the Sunday school 400. Seth Parsons was the first superintendent.

The church edifice was enlarged and improved in 1879, at an expense of \$6,500.

The different pastors of this church have been the Rev. C. Cheever, 1825-26; the Rev. Samuel W. May, 1826-29; the Rev. Robert Shaw, 1830-3f; the Rev. Luther P. Blodgett, 1831-36; the Rev. Leonard Johnson, 1837-39; the Rev. Thomas Gordon, 1841-50; the Rev. A. M. Beveridge, 1851-58; the Rev. A. De Witt, 1859-65; the Rev. A. B. Lambert, D. D., 1865-68, and the Rev. John Tatlock, D. D., 1868 to present time.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH AT HOOSICK FALLS.

The First Baptist church at Hoosick Falls was organized Oct. 30, 1847. On the 8th of May, 1851, at a meeting held at the place of worship, John Lyon, Jonathan Case, Allen Spencer, Hosea Daniels and Edmund Leonard were elected trustees of the Hoosick Falls Baptist church. The certificate of incorporation is dated May 16, 1851.

The following have been the pastors of the church: The Rev. John M. Gregory, 1847-50; supplies for several years, the Revs. Grant and Thos. Rogers from Hoosiek Corners; the Rev. O. C. Kirkham, 1860-63; the Rev. Thos. Rogers, the Rev. William A. Doolittle, the Rev. William Wilcox, the Rev. William Garnet, 1867-69; the Rev. E. T. Hunt, 1869-73; the Rev. A. B. Whipple, 1872-74; the Rev. H. W. Webber, 1874; the Rev. H. A. Morgan, 1875-76; 1876-1888, the Rev. George R. Robbins.

This congregation until recently occupied what was called "The Meeting-house" of the Warren society, creeted in 1800. During

the year 1884 a beautiful and commodious house of worship was built at a cost of \$12,159.55, with a seating capacity of seven hundred. It was dedicated Oct. 31, 1884. The membership at present of the church is 428, and of the Sunday school. 425. The entire value of the church property is \$20,000. The present officers are: Pastor, A. Chapman; Deacons, E. P. THE W. A. WOOD MOWER AND REAPER BAND,

Connected with Wood's Opera House, is a favorite institution with the citizens of Hoosick Falls, and is sustained largely by the generous contributions of Hon. Walter A. Wood. The band was organized in 1859, and as an organization joined the 2d Vermont Regiment during the war of 1861-65. They have a fine hall and a valuable set of instruments. Chas. F. Moon is the present leader.

POST WOOD G. A. R., NO. 294.

This organization was effected October, 1882, and now numbers nearly 110 members, amply provided with uniforms and side arms. Grand Army Hall is well worthy of a visit. Upon entering the main hall, which is neatly carpeted, you are at once inspired by the memories of the late civil strife. The walls are adorned with military etchings from life, executed by the artist Forbes, presented by Hon. Walter A. Wood, with a life size oil painting of himself, and twenty-seven army corps badges inscribed on flags. In the centre of the hall is a miniature castle, with parapets equipped and manned. A commissary department, presided over by William Cronin, is utilized on festive occasions; a library and sociable room adjoins the hall, where the members indulge in conversation and games. Taken altogether it is one of the most welcome halls we have seen. Its present officers are:—Commander, Jos. H.

THE NEW ARMORY OF THE CITIZENS' CORPS, 32" SEPARATE COMPANY, N. G. S. N. Y.

This building is the grand result of zealous efforts on the part of a few of Hoosick's leading citizens, who obtained an appropriation from the state. Its cost, with furnishings, was \$40,000, and the building adds much to the beauty and dignity of the village, and is a deserved tribute to one of the finest military organizations of the state. The 32d Separate Company was mustered in the National Guard with the highest recommendation, March 20, 1885, and has connected with it the splendid Citizens' Corps Band of 30 pieces, of which H. S. Surdam is the leader. The appearance and drilling of the company at the New York State Encampment in 1888 and 1890, commanded the highest praise from Gen. R. H. Jackson, of the U. S. Army, who inspected the troops. His opinion is contained in the following extract of his report:- "The 32d Separate Company, from Hoosick Falls, was, without doubt, the best drilled company in camp this year; its manual of arms, marching, etc., were as near perfection as possible. It was a pleasure to see it on the drill ground, and to observe how well, and without noise, the guides and file closers performed their duties." The officers of the company are :- Captain, C. W. THE HOOSAC CLUB.

The drawing room and reading room and a cosy sitting room are handsomely furnished; there are heavy tapestry window hangings and portieres; the walls are adorned with pictures; the parlor has its piano. 




