## THE JAPANESE MAUSER LUGER

Through the years many strange and interesting things were done with the Luger pistole. The Luger has appeared (probably) in more forms, variations, barrel lengths, different manufacturers etc. than any other weapon of its time. Certainly this adds much to the hobby of Luger Collecting. Not all Lugers are "standard issue". The JAPANESE MAUSER LUGER is one of these rare odd balls. I do not believe that any Luger authority supports the theory that Lugers were made on a contract basis for the Japanese Government. Luger specialists do not agree however on the origin of the Japanese Luger. Most feel, I believe, that this variation is a captured Nazi Luger that was proofed and marked with Japanese characters. How Japan, who was an ally of Nazi Germany, happened to capture Lugers is to much of a mystery for this writer. support the captured theory we must assume that some of Japans enemies first fought Germany and then were transferred to the far east and lost the captured weapons to a Japanese soldier who surrended the gun to his Government who then proceeded to have a gun in a foreign caliber proofed. I find all this difficult to believe. I find it more reasonable that these Lugers were sold or GIVEN to Japanese dignitaries who visited Germany during the war, and by German dignitaries who were stationed in Japan during the war seeking rubber and other supplies for the Hitler War Machine.

One thing is certain these Lugers are RARE and difficult to find for any price. JAPANESE MAUSER LUGER #7255 is the possession of Mr. James Brown of Miami. Number 7255 is a near mint, 42 toggle, 1940 dated, Mauser. Except for the Japanese markings this Luger is standard all the way. The receiver bears the Japanese crest (The Rising Sun?) and the barrel Japanese characters. While I have seen several Jap. Lugers I have never seen two with the exact same markings. If you have one of these rare models the author and Mr. Brown would appreciate having a drawing of the barrel markings. Please address all correspondence to the Luger Journal.

## TRANSITION LUGERS

Since the Luger Journal has been in print I have received several letters from collectors who have Lugers that do not fit the usual description, and have features of 2 or more type series. These Lugers are of course extremely interesting and open up whole new avenues of speculation concerning the manufacture of the various Lugers.

One such letter concerns Luger number 25019. According to serial number records that places this Luger at the begining of the 1906 series. Note this Luger in cal. 7.65 has the late model toggles as the 1904 Naval (with toggle locks) the wide trigger guard and narrow trigger, The fat barrel of the 1902, the early flat mainspring with the new style frame, the extractor interesting enough is marked charge. This Luger has no proofmarkings except the triangle in circle found in the well.

This Luger then presents an interesting appearance. At first sight it looks like a 1902 or 1906 depending upon where you look first. Could this be a prototype? Possibly but more than likely it is a true transition piece.

Incidentally I have a complete set of photos of this gun that I hope to run in the Journal with a more detailed article if additional facts become available.

If you have such pieces, those that do not appear to fit the usual pattern please write the Luger Journal. We will comment on what we think the gun is, and with your permission describe it to the readers for their comments.


## LUGER PROOF MARKS
