What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision meets requirements

Children demonstrate they feel safe and secure as they confidently follow the daily routines. They understand where they need to line up at school before walking to the club. Staff talk to them about crossing the road safely using the crossing warden. Children confidently share what they know about crossing roads safely, such as looking both ways to check for vehicles. Staff promote children's self-care and encourage their independence. They teach them the importance of hygiene practices, such as washing their hands as they arrive at the club. Children develop a strong sense of responsibility for their own well-being. For example, they independently clean up after snack time and put their cups in a stack in the middle of the table ready for staff to collect.

Children demonstrate a positive attitude towards their learning. They are curious learners and show an interest in exploration. For instance, children actively engage in a wide range of imaginative play. Children play alongside their friends. For example, they take turns to fill trucks with pretend bricks on an imaginary building site. Staff work quickly to get to know children, especially those who are new to the setting. They carefully consider the different abilities and age range of children. Staff adapt and arrange play spaces and activities to ensure that they meet children's individual needs.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- Staff have a clear understanding of what they want to teach children, and how they can help them to make good progress. They sequence and organise activities for children well. Staff provide a well-designed curriculum that includes adult-led activities and an environment that encourages children to practise skills independently. Staff provide specific activities to develop children's skills. For example, children follow instructions, developing their listening skills as they make cheese rolls. They practise rolling pastry and develop their language skills. For example, they name ingredients and share their views about what they are doing.
- Staff support children's communication and language skills well. For example, they introduce new vocabulary effortlessly during their daily interactions with children and as they play. Children enjoy involving staff in their play, such as sharing their ideas for making a castle. Children talk to staff about what they are going to build and work together to make the castle walls stand up.
- Staff support children to understand the importance of a healthy lifestyle and the benefits of physical activity. They encourage them to persevere as they roll balls to knock skittles over. Children develop their small muscles and spatial awareness, such as when they complete jigsaws. They turn the pieces around so



- that they fit together. Staff encourage children to try new foods, and discuss what foods are healthy. They support children to understand that they need to drink water to remain hydrated.
- Staff show a great deal of patience and understanding of children and their individual needs. They provide understanding and support for children with special educational needs and/or disabilities and those who find it more difficult to regulate their behaviour and emotions. Staff support children's behaviour well. They give children explanations about their expectations, and help them to calm down if they feel upset or overwhelmed. Staff use effective measures, such as interacting with them while they play to explain rules, such as using 'kind hands', and sharing and taking turns with resources.
- Parents and carers comment very positively about the club and the friendly and caring staff. They state they feel secure in the knowledge that their children are safe at the club, and always want to attend. Staff work in partnership with parents to gather information about children to help them meet children's needs during their time at the club. At home time, staff speak to parents about children's experiences and care needs.
- Leaders regularly evaluate staff's knowledge and understanding of good practice. They identify areas for professional development and organise training to develop staff's skills. Recently, staff have attended training on promoting inclusive practices. The small staff team shares a commitment to providing a quality service for children and their families. Staff work as a cohesive team and have a very good understanding of their responsibilities to keep children safe and secure.

Safeguarding
