The "Home Away From Home" campaign begins!

After a very successful silent phase of our fraternity's fundraising efforts to build a new chapter house at 327 North Pine Street, the Alumni Council is proud to announce the start of the public phase or our campaign to build a "Home Away From Home!"

In under ten months, with the professional help of Constellation Fundraising followed by Lambda Chi Alpha National Fraternity and the leadership of our own brother Nick Bratvold (A Γ 1881), we raised \$2.3 million from only 82 donors. This is well over half of our goal of \$3.25 million, and marks the start of the public phase of our fundraising.

Campaign co-chairs Jim Abbott, Dennis Daugaard, and Mark Mickelson have lent their time, treasure, talent and influence to help spread the word and encourage brothers to build a future for the next century of Lambda Chi Alpha at USD.

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Last D-Days at the Brown House

This fall will be our last chance to celebrate D-Days at the Brown House! With the latest milestone of

fundraising reached, demolition has been set for May 2023 (actually date TBD). Construction of the new house will begin soon after.

We are planning another robust schedule of Dakota Days events, October 20-23. Reunions include the Classes of '72, '82, '92, '02, and '12! A Welcome Back Party is planned for Thursday, October 20, from 3 to 6pm at Jim Abbott & Debby Vander Woude's home in Sioux Falls.

But you know what? For our first twenty years, our brothers lived someplace else. We didn't move to 327 N. Pine until 1937 and we had already been a chapter since 1916, and we obviously survived and thrived after that transition.

So we will with this change as we move forward into our second century at USD. And we still have the chance of getting acquainted with our new chapter house! In fact, we'll be inviting back brothers to live in the new house for reunions in the summers following completion, getting to know the new place and making new memories and connections with our future brothers.

Great turnout for Founders Day 2022

On April 15 the Alumni Council held **Founders**

Founders Day 2022 had a great turnout in Sioux Falls, April 15. Several families gave histories and testimonies of their time with Lambda Chi Alpha

Day at the Country Club of Sioux Falls. Over 80 alumni and spouses attended with great repre-

sentation from all eras, including Actives who were home for the Easter weekend.

Nick Bratvold (AF 1881) announced that fundraising efforts to build a new house at 327 North Pine Street are ahead of schedule, raising over \$2 million from just 78 donors in less than ten months! (For reference, it took the Sigma Alpha Epsilon chapter about ten years to raise that much for the new house they completed last year.) Alumni Council members were recognized for their ongoing commitment.

The group heard from prominent families from past eras including Active members. Tyler Tordsen (AF 1863) spoke about what Lambda Chi meant to him and his family, including father Troy Tordsen (AΓ 1876), who was an honorary initiate and S.D. School of Mines Lambda Chi chapter adviser, and brother Quinton (AΓ 1974), who is currently attending USD. Tyler pledged that both of his sons would someday become USD Lambda Chi's—we won't hold him to it, but hope they do!

Founders Day 2022, continued

Scott Heidepriem (A Γ 1018) whose grandfather Eric Heidepriem (A Γ 21) was a founding father of our Alpha Gamma Chapter in 1916 spoke next. Scott told several fascinating stories, including how Eric travelled by train from Custer to Vermillion to attend USD. Scott's father Herbert (A Γ 274) later joined in 1941. We then heard from Scott's son Pete, who, although did not attend USD, still initiated Lambda Chi at Arizona State.

Mark Mickelson (AF 1337) then spoke to our assembly, laying out the complex network of Mickelsons, past and present, along with several brothers-in-law and spouses who were Crescents. Lambda Chi Alpha, the University of South Dakota, and the entire state of South Dakota would certainly not be what it is without the legacy of the Mickelson family.

Indeed, for onesixth of South Dakota history, a Lambda Chi has been governor, including former governor and campaign cochairman

Dennis Daugaard (AF 917) who was also in

attendance.

We also heard from Mark's nephew Max Mickelson (AF 1986), who became a brother of our bond with the Fall 2021 rush class. Max, who is a political science and economics double major, talked about rushing every fraternity at USD and why he chose Lambda Chi. Even though his family legacy was obviously a factor, he said that it was ultimately the fellow Active brothers who were the deciding factor.

Max then proceeded to present a list of issues the actives are currently experiencing with the physical structure in Vermillion, which included mold in the basement, rotting window sills, poor Wi-Fi, a crumbling rear staircase, failing electrical outlets, low water pressure and boiler troubles making the case for a new building.

Nick Bratvold concluded the evening with personal testimony of what Lambda Chi meant to him, along with an ask for assistance as we begin the public phase of our "Home Away From Home" campaign to rebuild our chapter house at 327 North Pine Street, paving the way for another century of building men of character, service and success.

Brother Kevin Brady (A Γ 999) has been serving as U.S. Representative for the 8th Congressional District in Texas since 1997. The district encompasses The Woodlands and the northwestern suburbs of Houston.

Born in Vermillion, Brady was a 1973 graduate of Rapid City Central High School and went on to get a mass communications degree from USD. He worked at the Rapid City Chamber of Commerce before being elected to the Rapid City Common Council at age 26. He moved to Texas in 1982 to work at the Beaumont Chamber, and served in the Texas Legislature from 1991 to 1997.

After announcing in April 2021 that he would retire at the end of his term, the Republican was recently honored by being named "2022 Texan of the Year" by the non-partisan Texas Legislative Conference. Below is part of the press release.

Conroe, TX - U.S. Congressman Kevin Brady (TX-08) has been named the 2022 Texan of the Year by the Texas Legislative Conference, the well-known annual statewide policy and business forum marking its 56th year. Congressman Brady was recognized for his tireless efforts as a national economic leader and his historic work as only the third Texan in history to chair the House Ways and Means Committee.

Rep. Brady accepted the honor during the 56th annual Texas Legislative Conference hosted by the New Braunfels Chamber of Commerce.

"Thank you very much for this wonderful honor... After 26 years, I leave Congress the same way I entered – optimistic," said Congressman Brady. "I am proud of the work done by the Ways and Means Committee. We redesigned the tax code for growth. Millions of Americans

could see opportunity they hadn't seen before. Businesses could grow, creating millions of jobs, and increasing wages for millions of Americans."

In accepting this honor, Congressman Brady joined an array of prominent past honorees including presidents, U.S. senators, governors and other Texas legends—several of whom he has had the privilege of calling friends and mentors.

The Texas Legislative Conference is a nonpartisan organization of Texas business and political leaders who meet annually in New Braunfels to focus on public policy issues.

Tordsen runs for state House

Tyler Tordsen (AF 1863) is following in the tradition of many USD Lambda Chi's by participating in the democratic process, running for higher office. Tordsen won his Republican primary race (June 7) for the South Dakota House District 14, which is southeastern Sioux Falls.

Tordsen is currently the Southeast Regional Director and State Director of Tribal Affairs for United States Senator Mike Rounds.

Originally from Rapid City, he is an enrolled member of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe.

Before moving back to Sioux Falls in April of 2017, Tyler spent two years serving as a Special



Assistant to Senator Rounds in his Pierre office working on constituent services focusing on outreach and specializing in tribal relations and local governments.

He and his wife Erika have two sons, Emmett and Atlas. He is also our High Pi (chapter advisor) at USD. To learn more, visit

USD's first Native American fraternity man—follow-up


There were some great responses to last winter's article on brother John H. Artichoker, Jr. (AG 476) from Mission, South Dakota, who we believed had initiated as the first Native American fraternity man at the University of South Dakota.

Richard Colwell (AG 431), who was High Alpha at the time (!), responded to the story.

"Your news letter with mention of John A brought back memories of a success at 327," wrote Colwell.

"I was high alpha at the time and the main office turned down more than once to initiate JA. I had lots of house support and we elected to initiate him anyhow even though he was not Caucasian. My final letter requested that the national office treat him as a full-fledged brother which they eventually did but as I recall it was after John was employed by the bureau of Indian affairs. I'm sure the issue was over Blacks but I don't think we ever discussed that in a chapter meeting.

"We, as a chapter, were never told to find a

token native American. Ann [Grauvogl, author of "150 Years of Pride, Persistence and Progress"] is probably correct that a member of the chapter invited John to Rush Week. I might guess that member would have been Bob Berry whose father was SD representative for "west river." Bob ended up with a career in DC. A second possibility could be that of our house manager at the time as he was an aggressive recruiter. We all looked for top candidates to go through rush. After my correspondence with national, I suppose it is possible that we forged Caucasian on the application but that would have been caught due to the many contacts we had attempted to get advance approval."

After a few other conversations, we realized that General Lloyd Moses was in fact the first Native American fraternity man at USD. Moses was born in 1904 in Fairfax, South Dakota, but spent his childhood in the surroundings of the Rosebud Sioux Indian Reservation, according to the South Dakota Hall of Fame, to which he was an inductee in 1978.

"His parents, James H. Moses (Welsh) and Alice O. Sheldon (Welsh and Sioux), were early settlers in Mellette County and entered into ranching and the building trade."

The Hall of Fame continues, "Although he attended a government Indian school and the first county public school in the area, much of his elementary schooling was accomplished at home. He attended high school at Colome, seventy miles from his home. He entered the University of South Dakota on a scholarship in 1927, graduating in 1931 and was commissioned in the Army Reserve Corps."

What perhaps was different about Moses compared to Artichoker was that Moses did not continued on next page

graduate from high school on a reservation and did not become an enrolled tribal member until 1963. At that time, he was given the name Tokahe Waste Wicasha (Chief Good Leader). Moses con-

sidered this

one of his most cherished honors.

General Moses lived in Vermillion in his retirement, and many of you may remember his visits to the fraternity house on special occasions. He died August 27, 2000.

Restauranteur Barry Putzke has three businesses in downtown Sioux Falls; featured on "Diners, Drive-Ins, and Dives"

Restauranteur Barry Putzke (AF 1687) owns Bread & Circus Sandwich Kitchen in Sioux Falls, and was on the "Diners, Drive-ins, and Dives" TV show on the Food Network in January 2020. The popular restaurant at 600 N. Main Ave. in downtown Sioux Falls opened in 2017 and is located in a repurposed old brick building.

"It was definitely a big boost and a lot folks came in afterwards, although it's hard to measure the total impact [of being on the show], explained Putzke. "Some travelers come just because of the show."

Putzke spent time on the West Coast in Portland, Oregon, where he met his business partner Jordan Taylor. The menu is inspired by Jordan's Japanese heritage, along with other West Coast fusion influences. While Taylor manages the back of the house, Putzke manages the front.

The original location they chose was delayed, so a realtor friend showed them their current location in downtown.

"It was exactly what we wanted," said Putzke. "Being part of the downtown community has been great. It's a small tightknit community and we help each other out. Tourism shoots up in the summer, and people stay downtown to dine and shop. There are six cranes outside our front door. In the next five years it will be on a whole other level."

In addition to Bread & Circus, Putzke also owns <u>Pizza Cheeks</u> at 120 South Phillips Avenue. "Some friends opened the Hello Hi bar which had room for a kitchen, so we created Pizza Cheeks. It's a window in the back of the bar, and we serve mostly by the slice."



Marshall Miller, Sr., AΓ 394



Marshall C. Miller Sr., 93, a third-generation professional photographer and longtime Pierre businessman, died on Nov. 26, 2020, in the Monument Health Hospice House in Rapid City.

In 2018, Marshall and his wife Merrie – married for 67 years – moved from Pierre to the Peaceful Pines Independent Living community. He passed away after being injured in a fall at home. Funeral arrangements and interment are pending.

Marshall was born March 17, 1927, in Pierre to Richard and Inez Miller. After Inez passed away in 1928 Richard married Grace Bunch in 1930, who raised Marshall and his sister Dixie. He lived in Pierre for more than 90 years where he was active in community and church activities. He graduated from Pierre Senior High School in 1945, then served in the U.S Army until 1947. Marshall liked to quip that Germany surrendered shortly after he enlisted.

Marshall attended the University of South Dakota for two years and was a member of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity. He graduated from the Progressive School of Photography in New Haven, Conn., before joining Millers Studio, the business started by his father on Pierre's downtown main street. After Richard's retirement, Marshall owned and operated the business until his retirement in 1995.

Marshall was a South Dakota Professional Photographers' Association board member from 1960 to 1965 and served as the organization's president from 1965 to 1966. His portraits won numerous awards in SDPPA competitions.

During his years as a photographer, he recorded many historic events in South Dakota's capital city, such as the great Missouri River flood of 1952, the construction of the Oahe Dam and President John F. Kennedy's dedication of the dam in 1962. Nearly every legislative session, Millers Studio took photos of legislators to create a large composite of its members.

Marshall took family pictures, senior portraits and wedding photos for generations of residents in Pierre and the surrounding area. Budding and serious photographers alike sought his advice on purchasing cameras and equipment.

Although Marshall's father once predicted that color photography would never catch on, Millers Studio introduced 24-hour color film processing to the town during the 1960s – a service usually found only in large cities.

Marshall married high school teacher Merrie Swanson on June 29, 1953, in Highmore, S.D. Merrie was initially attracted by his good looks and sense of humor. But after observing him photograph a family in the studio and seeing how good he was with children, she decided he was the man for her. They raised three children and took very seriously the "til death do us part" meaning of their wedding vows.

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Marshall inherited his father's passion for music and was an avid saxophonist, performing in an Army swing band, marching in the Pierre Kilties band and playing in the Pierre City Band throughout the 1960s and 70s.

At the time Marshall left Pierre, he was the oldest member of the First Congregational United Church of Christ, the church in which he was baptized and raised. He was a fixture in the church choir for more than six decades, singing tenor and pulling pranks on choir members.

As a businessman, Marshall served as a Chamber of Commerce board member and committee chair. For several decades, he was a regular member of the Pierre-Fort Pierre Rotary Club and served as music director during weekly meetings. He was a past president of the organization and was recognized as Outstanding Young Rotarian, Rotarian of the Year and as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Marshall is survived by his wife Merrie, Rapid City, S.D.; sister Marilyn Hale, Omaha, Neb.; brother Richard (Arlene) Miller., Pierre, S.D.; son Marshall (Audrey) Miller, Piedmont, S.D.; son Patrick (Joan) Miller, Grand Forks, N.D.; daughter Merrilee Miller (Shelly Blank), Rapid City, S.D.; four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his father Richard and stepmother Grace, and his sisters Dixie Cannon of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and Sandra Miller of Rapid City.
