

That era came to a bittersweet end last fall when we hosted our final D-Days at the current chapter house before it is set to be demolished in May 2023. Throughout the week, several festivities were enjoyed by actives and alumni alike in honor of the 2022 Dakota Days homecoming celebration. On Thursday, October 20, Jim Abbott and Debby Vander Woude welcomed dozens of our alumni back to Eastern South Dakota with a party at their Sioux Falls home. The following Fri-

day, October 21, the Second Annual Weapons of Grass Destruction Best Ball Scramble was held at the Bluffs Golf Course in Vermillion. Several of our active members were able to join our alumni in a fun afternoon of golf, and the first place trophy was won by the team led by active member Jaron Pesicka (ΑΓ 1969).



Then, on Saturday, October 22, following the 108th Annual Dakota Days Parade, brunch was hosted at 327 North Pine where over 50 of our alumni were able to mingle with members of the active chapter. SDSU-USD Chapters Run 130 Total Miles in **Annual Football Run**



In the week leading up to the USD-SDSU football game on October 8, the AFZ chapter conducted its yearly Football Run along SD Highway 19 in conjunction with our brothers from SDSU. Our chapter set the curve for mileage, running 71 miles to SDSU's 59, giving us a total of 130 miles ran. In terms of fundraising, SDSU outraised our chapter with a total of \$1,850 raised, while we fell just short of our \$500 goal. Both chapters raised a combined total of over \$2,000, all of which was donated to Feeding South Dakota.

USD saw big enrollment increase in 2022

After worrying drops in enrollment in 2020 and 2021, USD has returned to pre-pandemic enrollment levels, growing 7.7% to 9,856 students according to a report from the South Dakota Board of Regents.

This was the largest percentage growth of any public university in South Dakota. The average was just under 1%.

USD enrollment had hovered around 10,000 for the ten years prior to Covid-19, reaching a high of 10,284 in 2012. For comparison, the 1969 enrollment was 5,072 according to the USD course catalog provided by Dr. Daniel Palmer, Associate Vice President for Institution-

al Research. Although headcount criteria have slightly changed over time, there are roughly twice as many students at USD now than in the 1960s.

Women make up 63% of undergrads, with men at 37%, which has changed dramatically over the decades. It still amounts to 3647 men at USD, higher in total numbers than in the past.

The report also stated that USD experienced a record-setting retention rate of 81.7%, showing that students (and the university) are more serious about finishing the degrees they start (it had been 72% in 2017).

Why I Choose to Give Back

The Housing Corporation officers and Building Committee members have donated hundreds of hours over the last six years to this campaign. Some have also made in-kind donations of their construction, financing, legal, communications, and fundraising expertise.

Here are some of the reasons why they have chosen to give back to our Lambda Chi chapter at USD.

Ken Duncan (AΓ 993)

— Some men I don't even know created the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity. My first introduction was as an 11 year old when I visited my brother David in the mid-60s and saw first hand fraternity life in the 60s. Fast forward to the early-mid 70s,



wow, fraternity life was different—no house mom, just a group of boys learning how to live together and become men. Men who learned how to live together and work through issues all the while also enjoying life and being a student at USD.

For me these relationships established during this time are lasting a lifetime and have been there for me during some very difficult life events.

The current house is unlivable as-is and will slowly, unfortunately, disappear from our history and will not be there for the current and future young boys seeking to become men. I am making a contribution as the "House" is a place to gather for both alumni and actives, and Lambda Chi Alpha is a fraternity worthy of continuing to develop young men.

Terry Schmidt (AΓ 984) — Prior to the centennial event in 2016, I had been almost totally uninvolved with LXA. I sent my annual dues in once in a while.

During, and following that event, I've reconnected with brothers that I hadn't seen or talked to in more than 40 years. Once I got involved in the alumni governance process, I've reconnected with more of my old buddies and developed a whole new set friendships from among brothers of different generations.



I always knew that I was privileged to kind of grow up in college, in the midst of all of this talent and around all these leaders. I knew it was beneficial to me, but the full impact of my Lambda Chi experience didn't become obvious until I got to see all these guys in action, trying to figure out what to do with our little fraternity. This is a pretty amazing bunch of guys. The entire process has been a joy.

When it got down to it, writing a check for this project turned out to be pretty easy. My wife, Brenda, did not attend USD, and I've been particularly gratified that she is as enthusiastic as I am about this commitment. This project feels right, and we can't wait to see the final product.

E.Y. Berry Library Renovation at Black Hills State University

E.Y. Berry (AΓ 504) was the US Representative from South Dakota's 2nd District, from 1951 to 1971. Berry became an Honorary Alpha Gamma Initiate in 1952.

The library at Black Hills State University in Spearfish is named for our alumnus. The E.Y. Berry Library-Learning Center, which was first constructed in 1973, is planning a \$9.7 million renovation. A large addition is planned on the second floor, with views of Spearfish and Lookout Mountain.

E.Y. Berry served ten terms as a Republican from West River, back when South Dakota had two Congressional Districts. According to Black Hills State's website, "he served on the House Interior and Insular committee as well as the Foreign Affairs committee. He worked to pass legislation to help farmers and the betterment of conditions for Native Americans."

Upon his retirement from Congress in 1971, he and his wife Rose returned to their Black Hills home in Hisega and he donated his Congressional Papers to the library at Black Hills State.

Born in 1902, he grew up in Philip, attended Morningside College, and graduated from the University of South Dakota School of Law in

1927. He died in Rapid City in 1999, two months after his wife Rose.

Tordsen elected to SD House

District 14

Tyler Tordsen (AF 1863) was elected in November to



the South Dakota House of Representatives from District 14, which represents southeastern Sioux Falls.

Originally from Rapid City, Tordsen is an enrolled member of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe, and has been our chapter's High Pi for several years.

I wish I would have known many of you before, I have found our members are cut from the same cloth as those who I attended school with. Good people and some of the biggest contributors in our society. Makes me proud to be a brother with all of you.

Second, for many years I have chastised myself a bit for not being a better brother when I was an active. I had friends outside the fraternity that I spent a lot of time with, and am still friends with, but did not realize how important the fraternity was to me back then. I did not serve as an officer; I had limited time at the house my Junior and Senior year though I kept my core group of friends in the fraternity. Like many, I find that as I get older (67) the more I need and cherish the people I knew when I was younger.

This also makes me realize how much I missed out on not spending more time at the house. I am finding that maybe I am a better alumnus than I was an active and am feeling good about serving the fraternity now. Thank you! Brother is not just a word I use anymore; it feels literally so.

I am from Parker and was recently there visiting family and found out the entire active chapter was down the street at one of our alumni's house, Mike Miller, having a party and shooting trap off his back porch. They were all there together, 50 miles from the fraternity house, enjoying time together and you could see they were good friends. Think how hard it would have been back in our day to get the entire house coordinated to something like that. Yes, we did it in packs, but not the entire house. In some ways they are closer as a chapter because there are fewer of them. I was impressed.

So, I give, of my time and am donating what I can. It is now, or never and I do not want to let this effort fail. I owe this fraternity for what I experienced and where it has taken me. I will make sure I give both annually to the operating funds and have pledged and donated to the Capital Campaign.


