

Brother Lucas Lund is enjoying exciting opportunities through the General Fraternity and the South Dakota Board of Regents. Last summer, Brother Lund was invited by Lambda Chi Alpha CEO Bill Farkas to serve on the 2018 Grand High Zeta Nominating Committee, an exclusive body tasked with evaluating and nominating candidates for the General Fraternity's Board of Directors. Lund was one of five undergraduates selected to serve on the Nominating Committee. which worked throughout the summer and during the 2018 General Assembly in Jacksonville. In August, he was elected by his undergraduate peers on the Student Advisory Committee to the position of Grand High Sigma, a role which allows him to serve as a voting executive member of the Grand High Zeta and Chairman of the Student Advisory Committee.

In September, Lund was appointed by Governor Dennis Daugaard to serve a two-year term as the student regent on the South Dakota Board of Regents, the governing board for the state's six public universities and two special schools. In his role as the Board's student representative of the 35,000+ enrolled students in South Dakota's public university system, Lund will set policy direction, approve programming, and oversee the management of personnel, facilities, and financial resources for South Dakota's six public universities, the school for the deaf, and the school for the blind and visually impaired.

Upon his appointment this fall, Lund said: "It is truly an honor to be selected to serve as South Dakota's next student regent. This is an extraordinary learning opportunity for which I am extremely grateful, and I eagerly look forward to working alongside the Regents and our institutional leaders for the advancement of higher education in South Dakota."

We are proud to have Brother Lund represent Alpha Gamma Zeta at the international level and are excited to see where his work takes him on the Board of Regents.

As of recent, a Board of Directors (B.O.D.) from the Alpha Gamma chapter have gotten together to investigate and finally recommend a path forward for the physical property of the Alpha Gamma Chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha. The B.O.D. developed the following Vision statement for what they want the physical property to encompass: "A lifelong Brotherhood and Home where leadership is fostered and expectations are exceeded." The B.O.D. and the sub-committee are in the process of distilling several potential ideas into a single plan that can be taken to the general alumni for consideration. However, on September 3rd, 2018, the B.O.D. held their Annual Meeting where they approved the following two recommendations from the sub-committee:

1. Engagement of Spencer Ruff & Assoc., for the purpose of evaluating the possibilities and limitations of our current house as they relate to the current project. Brandon Wilsey is coordinating this project and will take 90-120 days.

2. \$40,000 are to be procured for this feasibility study

From here, the next steps of this project will be to evaluate the Spencer Ruff Report prior to Founder's Day, obtain Artist's Rendering of our plan, conduct the Feasibility study that will last about 5 months, and hopefully mobilize to raise \$3 million dollars to build/rebuild our fraternity house
