On November 7, Dr. A. Truman Schwartz was honored at USD's College of Arts & Sciences Pillars of Distinction Awards and Hall of Fame Recognition. Schwartz, '56 AG 530, is one of our oldest and dearest living alumni, and was given the Pillar of Enlightenment Award.

Dan Radigan (AG 1035), was inducted into the Coyote Sports Hall of Fame in November.

Esbenshade Recalls 60 Years of Dakota Days

Wilson Kleibacker and Jeff Esbenshade were freshman during the fall of 1965. Over the last 60 years, they have each attended 55 Dakota Days!

Jeff's mother Dorothy Esbenshade witnessed the Lambda Chis take first place in the USD Mother's Day Sing each year in 1966, 1967, and 1968.

The Fraternities were judged on several points, one of which was total chapter membership on stage. The Alpha-Gamma chapter had 100% on stage, but not all could sing! Their music director, Tom Henry, told the poor singers to move their lips, so they (including Jeff) became known as "mouthers."

Jeff never had the nerve to tell his mother about the mouthers, even though she spoke of the event for many years.

Jeff's mother died this past May at age 105. She grew up during the Depression of the 1930s, and always wished she could have gone to college, but there was no money.

To honor her, Jeff has established the Dorothy Esbenshade School of Education Endowment at the University of South Dakota.



Albert Truman Schwartz Ph.D. - Pillar of Enlightenment Award

A. Truman Schwartz, University of South Dakota class of 1956, built a distinguished career in chemical education while championing the integration of science into the liberal arts. A Rhodes Scholar, he studied at Oxford before earning a Ph.D. in physical chemistry from MIT.

Schwartz began his career as a research chemist with Procter & Gamble and in 1966 joined the faculty at Macalester College, where he taught for nearly four decades and retired as DeWitt Wallace Professor of Chemistry. He also served as deputy director of the National Science Foundation's Teacher Preparation and Enhancement Program and held visiting appointments at leading universities in the United States and abroad.

The author or coauthor of three textbooks for nonscience majors and more than 60 scholarly articles, Schwartz received numerous honors for his teaching and scholarship, including the American Chemical Society's George C. Pimentel Award, the society's highest recognition in chemical education.

He and his wife, Beverly Beatty Schwartz '56, met as classmates at USD.

Lambda Chi Teaching Award Given to Jennifer Fierro

Award was created by Scott Heidepriem and Kevin Garvin

The University of South Dakota recently announced that Jennifer Fierro has won the 2025 Lambda Chi Teaching Award.

"The Lambda Chi Teaching Award acknowledges excellence in teaching first-year or introductory undergraduate courses," according to USD.edu. "The annual \$1,500 award is bestowed on one full-time faculty member and is made possible by the men of the Lambda Chi fraternity."

Dr. Meghann Jarchow, chair of the Department of Sustainability & Environment, wrote "Jenny provides the foundation for our sustainability and earth science general education courses.

She teaches the lecture portions of Sustainable Environment (SUST 113), Dynamic Earth (ESCI 101), and Earth Science for Educators (ESCI 104); mentors the graduate teaching assistants in teaching the laboratory portions of SUST 113 and ESCI 101; and teaches all of the ESCI 104 and Earth and Life Through Time (ESCI 103) labs.

Jenny also leads a study-abroad course to Malta every other January, which the students



love. Jenny is such an effective teacher: she uses evidence-based pedagogy methods, she genuinely cares for her students, and she is passionate about the topics that she teaches."

The award was created by Dr. Kevin L. Garvin, '78 (ΑΓ 1021) and Scott Heidepriem, '78 (ΑΓ 1018), and was first awarded in 2017.

"It's wonderful to see the idea of awarding undergraduate professors for their educational talents and skills come to fruition," said Garvin.

Former USD Foundation President Ted Muenster wrote, "it's a great idea to recognize the value of great teaching at USD."

"Scott and I wanted to give back to USD and to Lambda Chi Alpha in a modest way, recognizing both the University and our fraternity," explained Garvin. "Interestingly, it was because of Lambda Chi Alpha that we met."

Heidepriem and Garvin started contributing to the fund many years ago, but it only started granting awards in 2017.

"We had completely different majors so we decided to find a mutual interest/beneficiary," wrote Garvin.

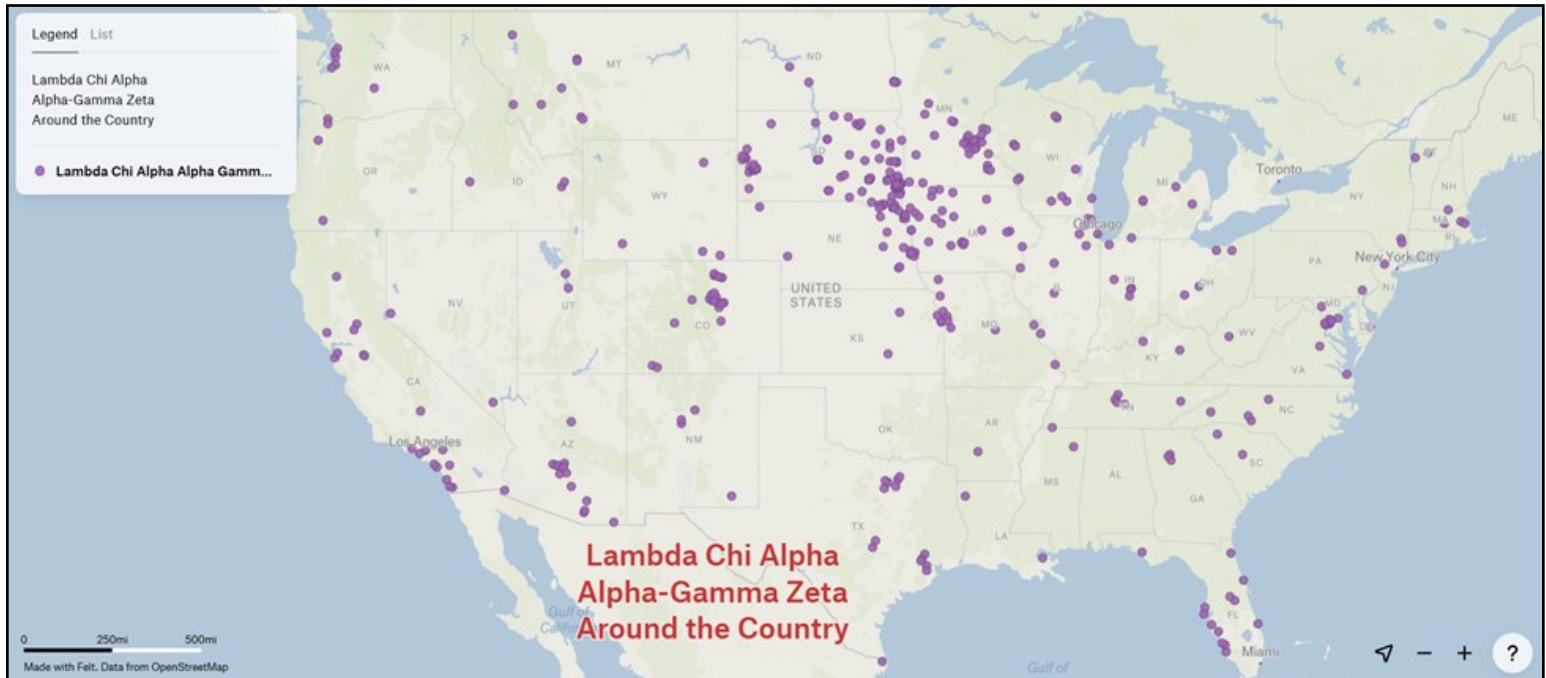

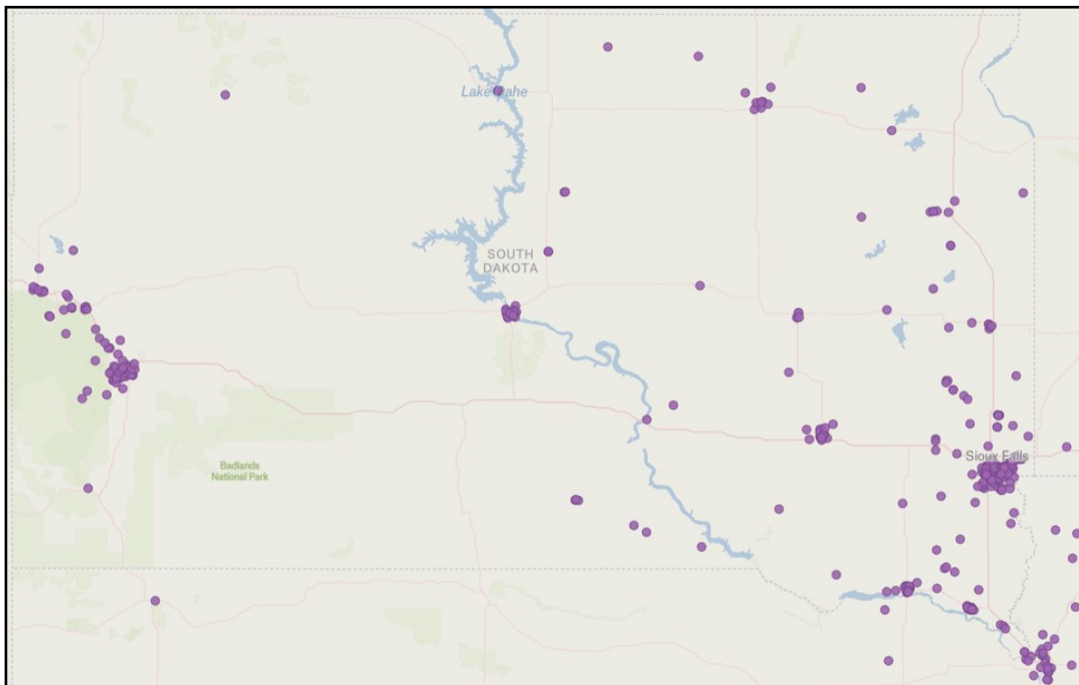
Where Do You Live?

Alpha-Gamma alumni in South Dakota and north-west Iowa.

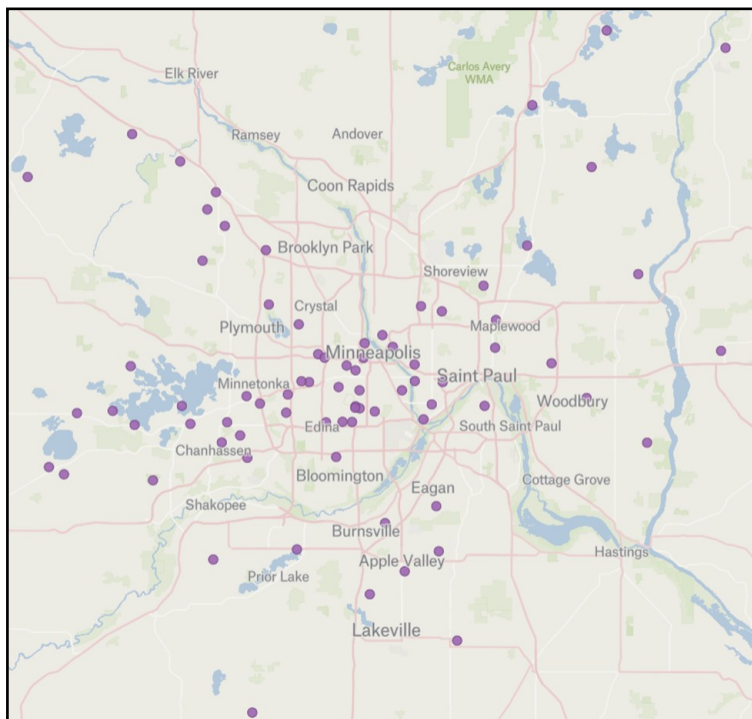
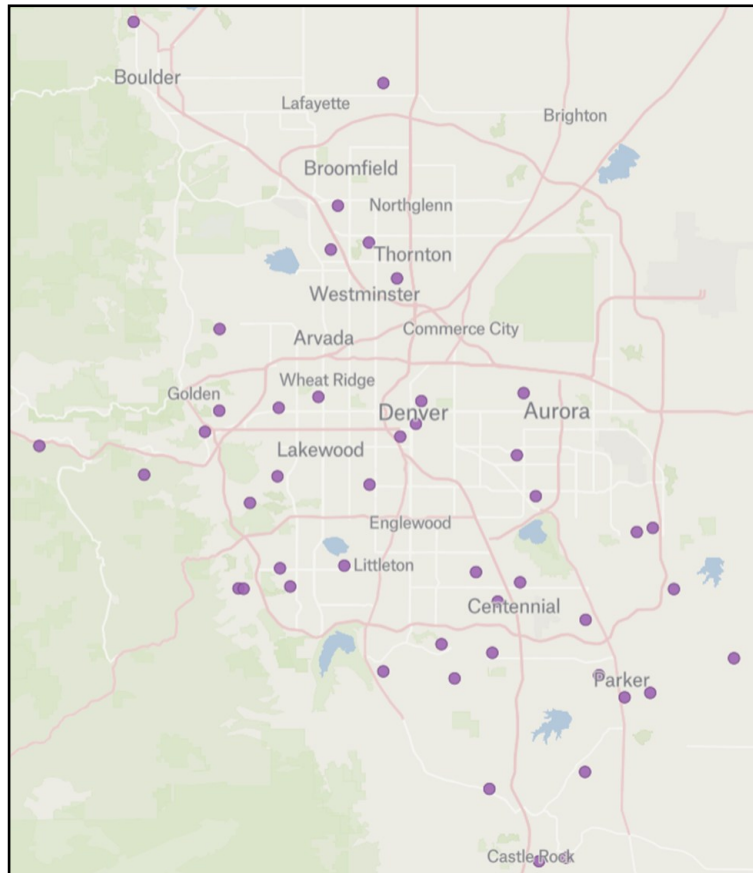

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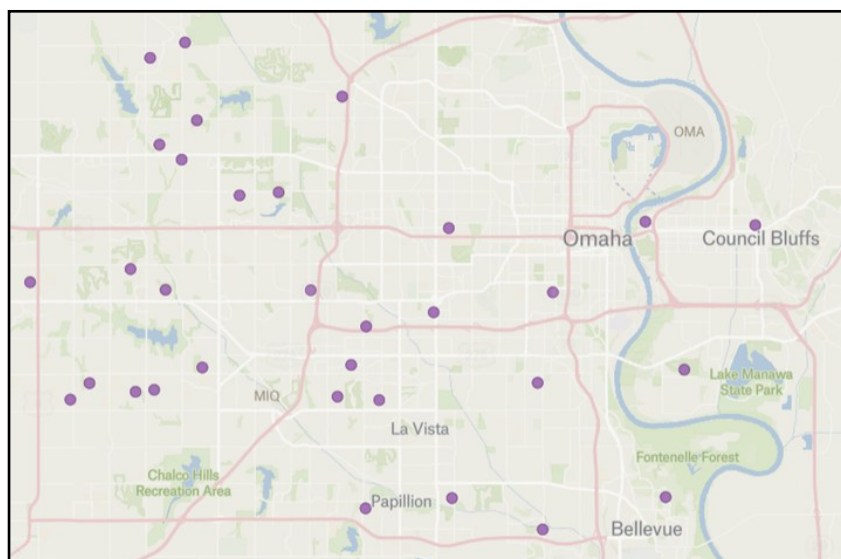
Where Do You Live? (cont'd)

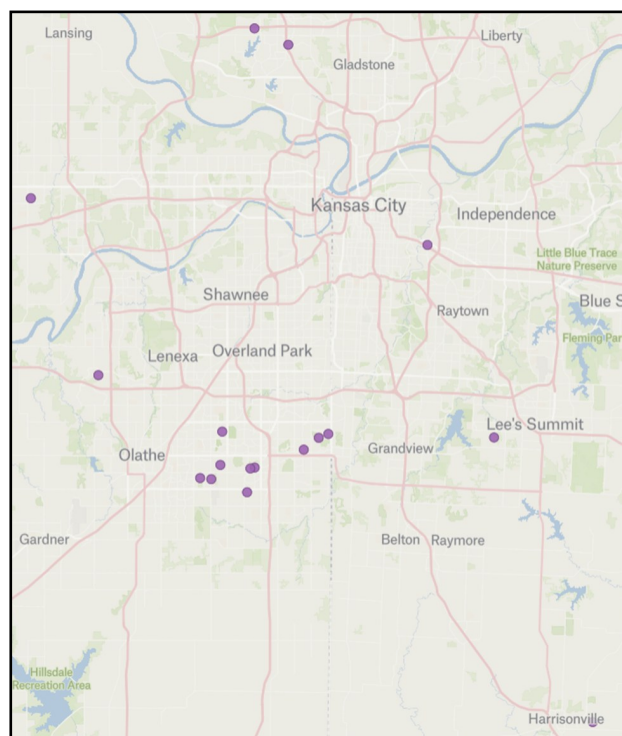

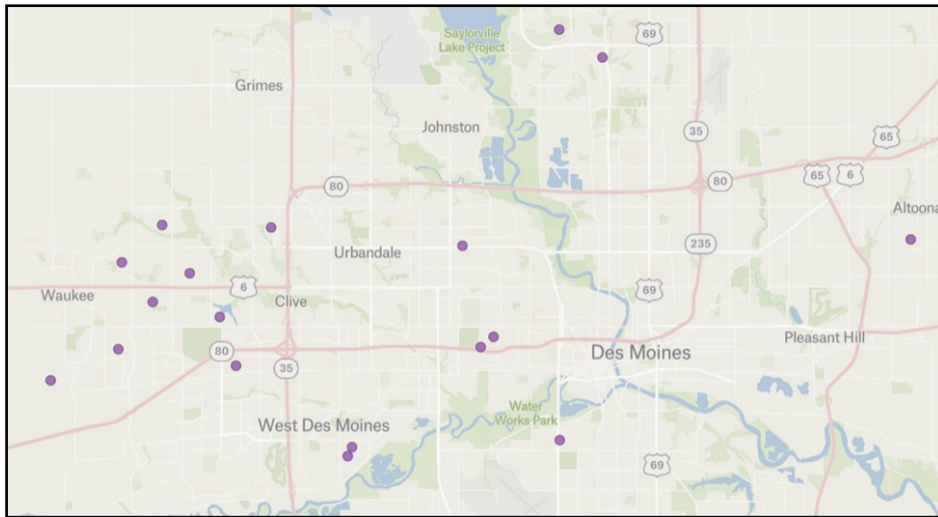


Alpha-Gamma alumni in the Kansas City area.

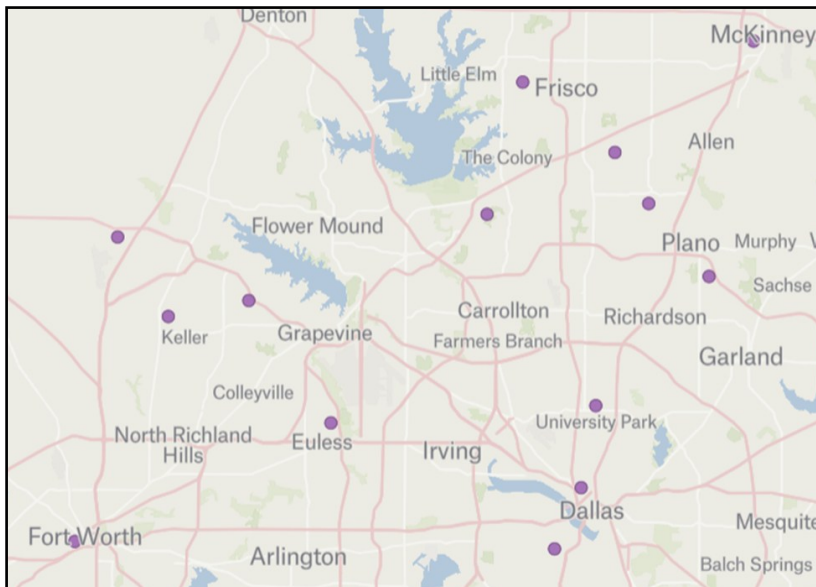

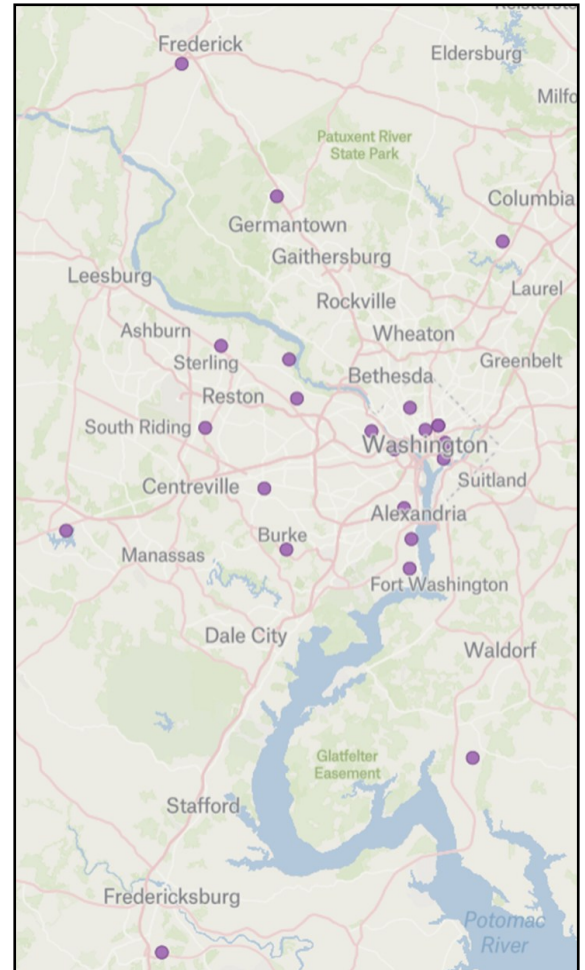


Alpha-Gamma alumni in the Des Moines area.

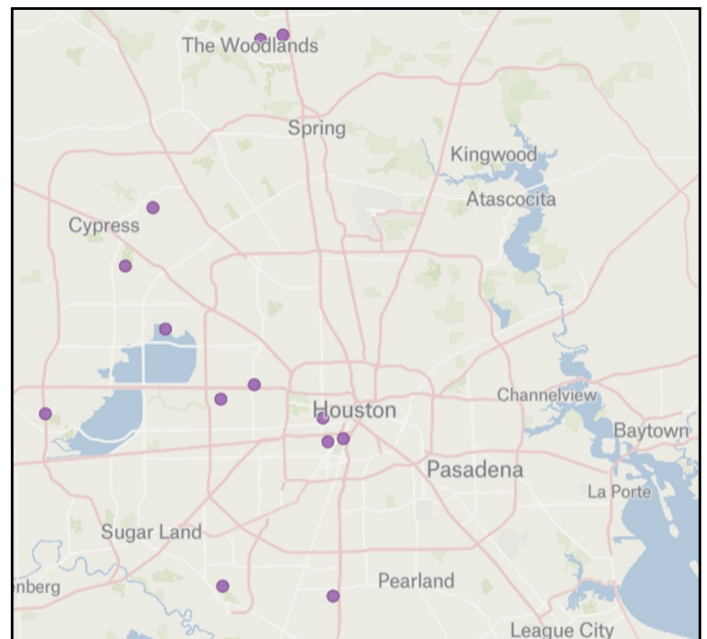


Alpha-Gamma alumni in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

Alpha-Gamma alumni in the Houston area.

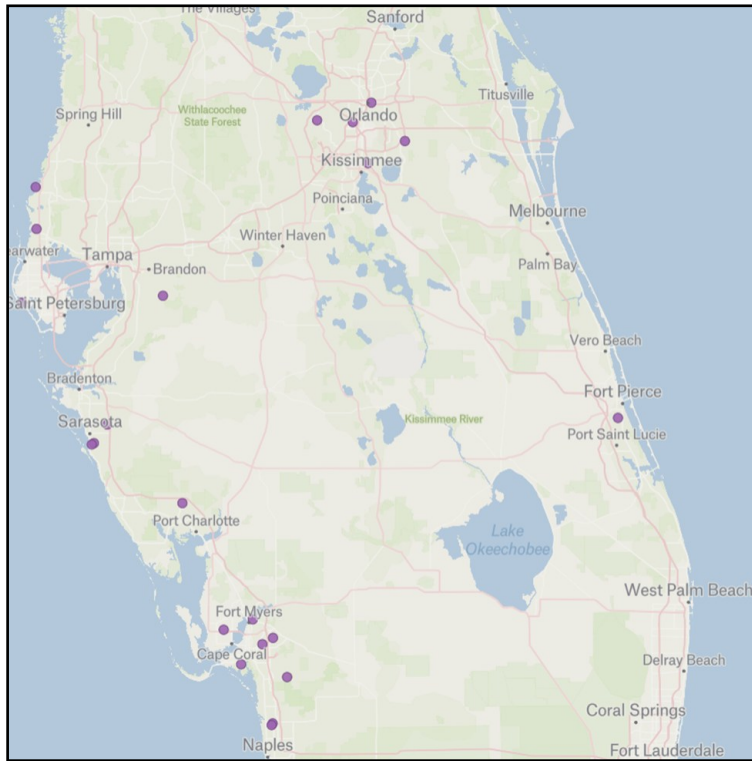


Alpha-Gamma alumni in the Washington, D.C. area.



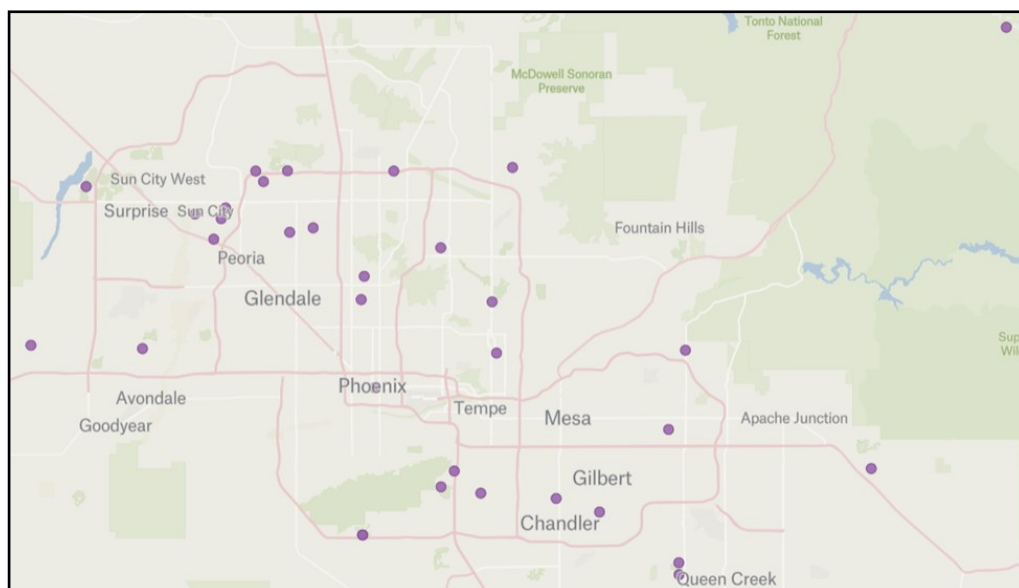

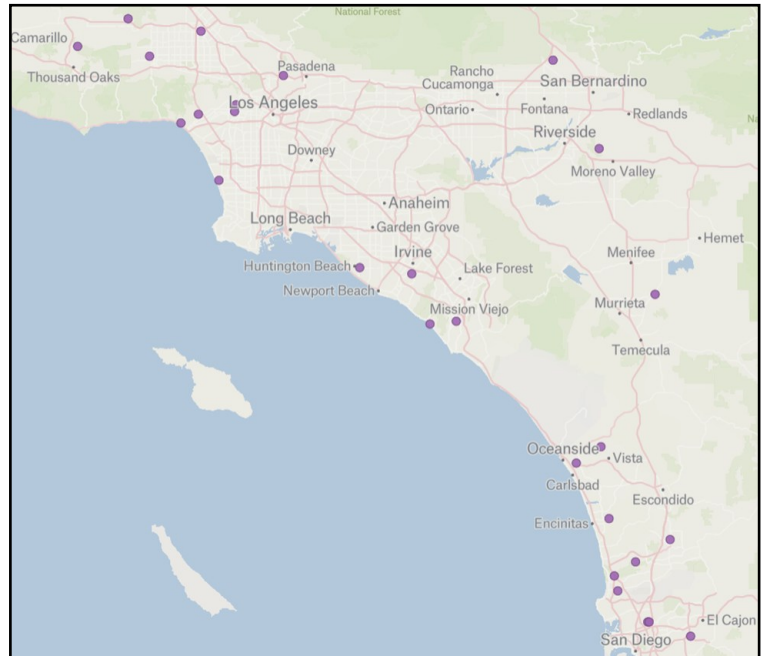


Alpha-Gamma alumni in Central and South Florida.

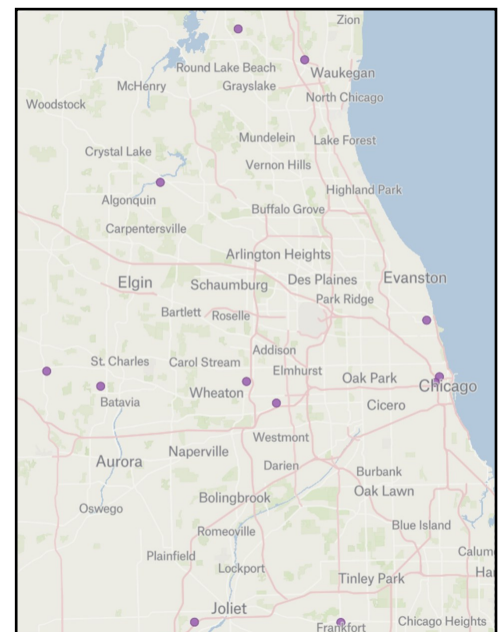

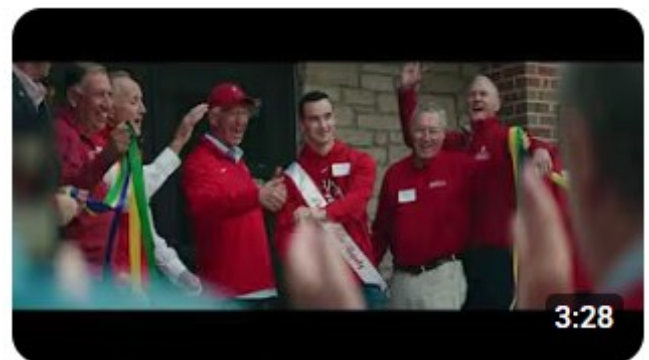

Required Minimum Distributions

For many investors entering their 70s, diligently contributing to and saving in tax-deferred retirement accounts must soon turn to making mandatory annual withdrawals. The government requires retirees to take required minimum distributions (RMDs) from such accounts after a certain age. Typically, once you reach age 73 (or 75 if you were born in 1960 or later), you must begin taking annual RMDs from all tax-deferred retirement accounts, including:

- 401(k) & 403(b)
- SEP IRAs
- SIMPLE IRAs
- Traditional IRAs

Qualified Charitable Distribution

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) allows individuals age 70½ and older to donate up to **\$108,000 for tax year 2025** (indexed for inflation) from an IRA account directly to charity—and use some or all of those funds to satisfy RMDs for the year.

For example, if your RMD for the year is \$100,000 but you only need \$50,000 for living expenses, you could donate the remaining \$50,000 via a QCD to satisfy the rest of your RMD. For those charitably inclined, QCDs can be a great tool for managing taxable income in retirement while also helping a worthy cause. Just be aware **QCDs are not permitted from 401(k)s** or other qualified plans.

Cash vs QCD

If you are interested in making charitable donations, taking your full RMD and then donating cash could result in a higher tax bill than if you were to give through a QCD.

Prior to the IRA Charitable Rollover, some individuals would take the RMD withdrawal from their IRAs, report the distribution as taxable income, make a cash gift to charity, obtain the re-

quired receipts for charitable gifts over \$250, and take an itemized deduction on their tax return as shown in **Scenario 1**:

- Take RMD of \$100,000 and donate **\$50,000 in cash**
- Other nonportfolio income: \$50,000
- Annual RMD: + \$100,000
- QCD: + \$0
- Pretax income: = \$150,000
- Itemized deduction: – \$50,000
- Taxable income: = \$100,000
- Estimated taxes due: **\$16,909**

Not only was this process rather cumbersome, but it also resulted in increased adjusted gross income. With higher income, you may have paid more income tax on Social Security or paid a higher Medicare Part B premium.

QCD

In 2025 an IRA owner who has reached the age of 70½ may transfer up to \$108,000 per year. The transfer is made directly from the IRA to a qualified public charity. The QCD is not taxable on your income tax return, so there is no need for a tax deduction. It is a simple and effective way to make a charitable gift as shown in **Scenario 2**:

- Take RMD of \$50,000 and **donate \$50,000 using a QCD**
- Other nonportfolio income: \$50,000
- Annual RMD: + \$100,000
- QCD: – \$50,000
- Pretax income: = \$100,000
- Standard deduction: – \$17,000
- Taxable income: = \$83,000
- Estimated taxes due: **\$13,180**

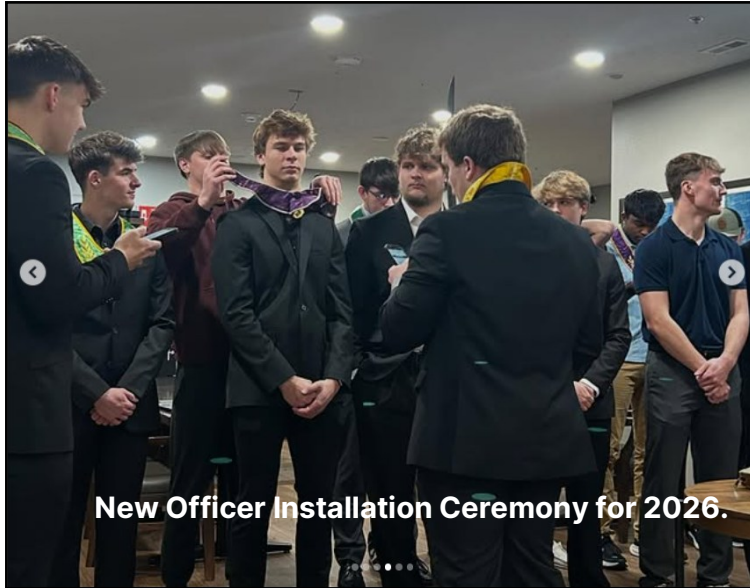
