THE PARSON'S TALE

At this moment we are suffering under a pandemic, though I am not speaking only of COVID-19, the disease that has infected 6-million people worldwide (1.8 million in the US) and killed 370K people (103K+ in the US). I am talking about a far older, far more insidious pandemic, one that has exacerbated COVID-19, one that has given birth to all of the unrest, violence, and suffering of this present day. **We are suffering under a pandemic of sin.**

As a modern, progressive religionist I do not talk about sin very often. You can probably count on two hands the times I have even said the word from the pulpit in the six years I have been your pastor. So, let me say it again: **we are suffering under a pandemic of sin.**

As optimistic global citizens—and particularly as Americans—we are drawn to the idea of the fundamental goodness of people. After all, we all know good people; we all see good people doing good work; and most of us strive to be good. Yet, the sober truth of our human condition is that we are not, fundamentally, good. We are broken. Our actions break other people. Other people's actions break us. Our choices break the creation. Our fear creates broken systems. Our brokenness, the brokenness of other people, and the brokenness of the systems we create collide, coalesce, and compound into ever new heights of brokenness. **We are suffering under a pandemic of sin.**

When I say this, please hear me well, I am not talking about sin as a list “do-s” and “don’t-s” from

God. The situation we are in is not punishment for making God angry or doing things other religious people say we ought not to do. The “sin” I am talking about is a disruption of our relationships with God's people and God's creation. As I have said before, the consequence of breaking the Ten Commandments is having to live in a world in which the Ten Commandments are broken. The consequence of not loving your neighbor as yourself, is that, eventually, your neighbor will not love you. We are part of a chain of actions started long before we were born and that will continue long after we are gone. This cycle of brokenness has spiraled through the aeons: from Cain and Abel (Gen 4), to the Slaughter of the Innocents (Matt 2), to the *São João Bautista* that brought the first enslaved Africans to Jamestown, to the *Trail of Tears*, to the furnaces of Dachau and Auschwitz. The sin is still here—striking fear into the hearts of black and brown bodies, sacrificing victims on the altars of prejudice and power, and showing callous disregard for vulnerable people in the face of an unseen virus. **We are suffering under a pandemic of sin.**

Above all, love each other deeply, for love covers over a multitude of sins. 1 Peter 4:8

Our hope is not in the goodness of humanity, but in the Goodness of God's love. God's love working in **our** hands, in **our** feet, and in **our** prayers has the power to mend the broken pieces of our common life and to usher in the justice we so desperately need. **We are suffering under a pandemic of sin, and love-in-action is our only cure.**



MOMENTS IN HISTORY
FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, MEDFORD
Summer Moments

1841 On July 7 a Baptist church was organized, and Robert L. Ells was chosen to be Deacon, by twelve Medford residents, three men and nine women. These were the founders of our church.

1957 In August, the sign was placed on the lawn of our church. That same year, the church office was moved to the first floor of the Parsonage (then at 27 Oakland Street).

1973 “We Look to Jesus” was the theme for our Daily Vacation Bible School this year, held from June 18 to June 29.

1977 On August 1, Rev. John Perry Ryan was welcomed as our Associate Minister of Education.

1984 A retirement celebration took place on June 17, for Pastor Louis Beckwith and Dorothy. There were many distinguished guests present. After this, the Beckwiths drove off in their trailer. However, they had to stop at the rotary under Route 93 so that Pastor Beckwith could come back to the church and collect his robe and baptismal boots.

1991 On August 11 we traveled to Maine for “Medford Day at Ocean Park.” This was just part of the 150th Anniversary celebration for our church. Rev. Beckwith, Pastor Emeritus, brought the message at the Temple, assisted by Rev. Jack Vars, and Rev. Phillips Henderson. Following the church service a summer buffet was served to past and present members and friends.

2012 We decided to have a Vacation Bible School in July, something we hadn’t done for quite a few years, having helped with the one at Community Baptist Church instead.

These historical moments are excerpts from the monthly articles for the Carillon by our last church historian, June Sturgeon.

THE RETIREMENT OF DR. NANCY CRANDALL, DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

The First Baptist Church of Medford would like to thank Dr. Nancy Crandall for many years of faithful and outstanding service since 2006. Dr. Crandall brought to our church mastery of the organ, and a deep passion for the way scripture and music mingle in the service of worship to create an experience of beauty and inspiration. For her deep commitment to the church and enormous contributions to our well-being and flourishing, the Director of Music Search Committee has offered her the honorary title of *Organist Emerita*. She will always be welcome in our church, and, especially, at our organ bench.

Dr. Crandall graduated with a degree in organ literature and performance from Eastman School of Music of the University of Rochester in the class of the late Russell Saunders. She has taught music in Kingsway College, Oshawa, Ontario, Canada, Greater Boston Academy, Stoneham, MA and as a Musical Specialist in the public school districts of Lawrence, MA, and Worcester, MA.

Dr. Crandall studied Choral Conducting at Royal School of Church Music, Croydon, England.; Music Analysis and French solfege’ at the American Conservatory, Fontainebleau, France (w/ Nadia Boulanger and Annette Dieudonné) and Longy School of Music, Cambridge, MA; Theory/Analysis Lessons with Dr. Arthur Komar, Boston , MA; Choral Directing/Voice Building at Lehrgang für Chorleitung und Chorische Stimm- bildung, (Choral Directing/Voice Building) St. Moritz, Switzerland; Education Through Movement: Foundation at High/Scope

Educational Research Foundation; and Vocal production at McClosky Institute of Voice, Boston, MA; She holds Kodály Level I, II & III certificates from Kodály Institute, New England Conservatory of Music.

She studied piano and organ under Virginia- Gene Rittenhouse, Frank Araujo, Barclay Wood, George Faxon, Emory Fanning, and Russell Saunders.



FROM THE DIACONATE. . .

Observations from our sage local shepherd:
“Far, far off are the days when we can:

- Greet our beloved friends with kisses, hugs and handshakes,
- Be together without masks and gloves and temperature check-ins,
- Sing together – the aerosol cloud produced by singing spreads up to 20 feet,
- Eat together or even chat casually while lingering in the pews
- Touch a hymnal or thumb through a pew Bible
- Pass the Communion vessels or the offering plate.”

When we decided, on March 15th, that we would become a community that convenes virtually, we had no idea how this would turn out. Since that day we have continued to have weekly Sunday services; twice weekly prayer services; and certain business and committee meetings – all with leadership from Reverend Matt and all with the grace and effort of the FBC Medford community.

Our virtual Sunday services generally include 45 households - an estimated 70 souls present. Music continues to play a vital role in Sunday worship; produced by Reverend Matt and provided by the Director and Fellows of our Choral Fellows and Scholars program – special thanks to Gina, Logan and Erin, Laura and Sam. Our services continue to be graced with leadership from our affiliate pastors, Greg Sakal, Florence King and Rand Peabody; Children’s stories – produced by the Frazier-Booth Family: Kimberly, Mary Lorraine and Mike; and from members of the congregation acting as responders for the congregants.

Our Wednesday & Friday Prayer services engage about 20 households – 30 souls; and provide an opportunity for more personal engagement, reflection and fellowship.

At the Diaconate meeting, held virtually on May 19th, the committee determined that we will continue to meet virtually, through Labor Day Weekend. Sunday Worship will continue to be celebrated at 11:00 a.m.; Wednesday and Friday Prayer services will continue at 8:00 p.m. on those days. We are also preparing for a “virtual communion” service; details for that will be included in an upcoming FBC Update – emailed twice weekly – on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

As we move into summer, the Diaconate request that you please:

- attend Worship & Prayer services when you can, and pray with us
 - take some time call, write, send cards to your friends – at FBC and beyond
 - sing along with the hymns, exercise your voice in the privacy of your own home
 - go outside, breath in the fresh air and enjoy God in nature
 - consider what you might contribute to Worship – a prayer, a reading, an audio and/or video segment
 - walk in the sunshine – and maybe even the rain
 - share your celebrations & concerns
 - ask for assistance if you have a need
 - offer your assistance as your skills & your circumstances allow
 - pray

DONATING TO FBC USING YOUR BANK’S AUTOMATIC BILL PAY

It’s simple and it’s free! Even though your pledge donations to **First Baptist Church** aren’t technically "bills," you can still set it up to have your bank send one-time or recurring gifts to **FBC**. **Here are some guidelines to help you get this set up with your bank.**

1. Follow the directions on your bank's website to set up a new bill or payee
2. If given a choice, choose to pay a company rather than a person.
3. In the space for "Company Name" enter: **First Baptist Church.**
4. In the space for "Company Address" enter:
Attn: Financial Secretary
34 Oakland Street
Medford, MA 02155
5. In the space for "Company Phone Number" enter:
781.396.3811

6. In the space for "Account Number" enter your first initial and your last name, for example: MRASURE
7. After you have set up First Baptist Church as a biller, it is added to your list of bills or payees and you can select it at any time and enter a payment amount and a payment date
8. You will also have the option of setting up automatic or recurring payments (this adds greater convenience but is not recommended if there is a risk of overdrawing from your account)

Bill Pay is usually a free service of your checking account, but some banks charge a monthly fee for their bill pay service which can be waived depending on account balance, etc.

The church is not charged any fees for receiving a donation through your bank’s bill pay service, so what you donate is what will appear on your annual giving statements.
