
was not THE first week sales of newly released book and THE opening weekend of а movie determine whether the book is considered а best seller or the movie is а blockbuster.

READING, 'RITING, BUT NO 'RITHMETIC!


Somewhere, at some time, I was told in order to write cohesively and intelligently, one should read ... extensively! I made a commitment to UP my reading game.

This past April, in order to provide a proper introduction of Victoria Christopher Murray for the Delta Author Chat, I read "Envy," the first in her seven deadly sins series and one of her books made into a movie. "Envy" was light reading after "CASTE."




and blatantly contributed to placing and "maintaining a knee on the necks" of its black citizens.

I decided to alternate my reading selections between fiction and non-fiction to maintain some semblance of objectivity, civility and humanity. Therefore, I am now reading "While Justice Sleeps," by Stacey Abrams. Yes, that Stacey Abrams! I read the first few paragraphs of the Prologue and ordered a copy. A couple of days ago, I started my read; it is quite the page-turner. Brava Stacey Abrams! Brava!



As for my personal 'Riting, with all the coverage of the one-year anniversary of the killing of George Floyd, the 100-year anniversary of the Greenwood Massacre in Tulsa, the acknowledgments of Red Summer (1919), **Juneteenth, etc., I am now inspired to write something daily. Sometimes, it is just a title and other times, words flow. Nothing concrete yet, but foundations for multiple poems are developing. I am not rushing the process!

CULMINATION CELEBRATION



Many are aware of my commitment to *myself* just over a year ago. Juneteenth 2020, I committed to post daily black facts, i.e., EBONY MOMENTS, for an entire year, to Y.B. TaylorWrites Facebook page. At the time, the commitment sounded good in my head, but I cannot tell a lie, remembering to research, validate and post historical black facts daily was not always an easy task. However, I surprised myself by not missing one solitary day. There were a couple of times I had retired for the evening and had to rise and post because I had forgotten, but not a day was missed. *HALLELUJAH!*

GOOD NEWS! June 18, 2021, I posted my last EBONY MOMENT. It was in the form of a visual presentation of my poem, *YOU NEED TO KNOW*, from **LIVING WITH TEXTURE!** The poem was chosen

because of its references to the 1921 massacre of the Greenwood Community in Tulsa (OK) as well as Juneteenth, the day the enslaved in Galveston, Texas, were finally informed one-year and sixmonths late of their emancipation! With the Juneteenth Bill being signed by President Biden making it the twelfth federal holiday, we can truly say this is one of many NEW DAYS in America. I pray the history of the day is always honored and does not become commercialized. The poem was also chosen because it references July 4, which will occur in a couple of days, making *YOU NEED TO KNOW* an appropriate choice for my inaugural presentation.

Unlike my commitment to post EBONY MOMENTS for a year, frequency nor an ending date has been established for visual presentations of my poems. However, I am planning to present others in a visual and sometimes audible format on my Y.B. TaylorWrites Facebook page. If you have a favorite poem or poems you would like to see presented, please let me know, because as you all know ... "Poetry is my tell!"
