



It's Summer Again!



Let's get the easy stuff out of the way first! I am trying to remain true to my commitment of keeping you abreast of what this author reads. I think this quarter, the variety of books read may have included something which might be of interest for everybody.

WHITE FRAGILITY by Robin Diangelo




Prejudice is foundational to understanding white fragility because suggesting that white people have racial prejudice is perceived as saying that we are bad and should be ashamed. We then feel the need to defend our character rather than explore the inevitable racial prejudices we have absorbed so that we might change them. In this way, our misunderstanding about what prejudice is protects it.

In March, I was still reading **White Fragility** and constantly reminding myself the author, Robin Diangelo, a white woman, was directing her text to others racially like herself. That is not to say I did not find the read interesting because it was. As a matter of fact, I may find myself actively using some of her techniques in the future when confronted by those who find it difficult to talk about racism in America, i.e., she states, *When white people ask me what to do about racism and white fragility, the first thing I ask is, "What has enabled you to be a full, educated, professional adult and not know what to do about racism?" It is a sincere question. How have we managed not to know, when the information is all around us. When people of color have been telling us for years? White Fragility is definitely NOT light summer reading, but it is worth putting on your book list!*

BORN ON THE WATER by Nikole Hannah-Jones and Renée Watson

As you might imagine, *White Fragility* was not a book I read in a matter of days. As a matter of fact, I took extended breaks to mull over what I was reading. During one of the breaks, I read **Born on the Water.** Younger daughter is building a library of banned books for our grand baby. The library has become a cornucopia of books on race relations, sexual orientation and every thing else being banned. It's going to be quite some time before Robin is ready for **Born on the Water**. The book is intended for children, but is intense and not for immature audiences.



DON'T START DINNER WITHOUT US! by Erica Bradley



An attribute of being a first-time grandparent is becoming more attuned to children's books. Erica Bradley is a first-time author. **Don't Start Dinner Without Us!** was prompted by her own challenges of getting her wee ones to eat veggies. BLACK WAS THE INK by Michelle Coles

The irony of reading **Black Was the Ink** immediately after *White Fragility* was in no way lost on me. And 'yes', the lower case 't' is intentional. First, a little background. The author, Michelle Coles, is an alum of UVA (many years behind me) and an alum of UVA's Kappa Rho chapter. Quite a few months back, I received an email asking sorors to support Michelle's first outing as an author. I would be less than honest if I stated I am always supportive of other authors, but there was something about the premise of her book which made me hit the BUY button. *THIS IS AN EXCELLENT READ*! It will probably be banned in several

school districts but Michelle has a "novel" way of relating the truths of Reconstruction and their correlation to much of what we are experiencing



today. Without giving anything away, the protagonist is a sixteen-year old Black male facing contemporary issues. A summer visit south to Mississippi from his hometown of D.C. helps him to put his life in perspective after several historical encounters.

If you do not believe my assessment, this book was presented in support of the NMAAHC exhibition *Make Good the Promises: Reconstruction and Its Legacies*

I highly recommend picking up copies; keep one for yourself and gift others. I did!

SISTERS BY HEART by Nickey Knighton

In A Minute!



Last year, I had dropped off a set of my books for the community's library and told her she could peruse them at her leisure and had my permission to print a poem. I also forewarned her of the task she was about to undertake as many of my poems may not sit well will my majority white neighbors. I did not followup to see if she was successful in locating my books and if she had, if she was able to find a suitable candidate for printing. Imagine my delight in seeing "In A Minute" from my second literary child, **Journeys of Freedom** ©2011, in the April newsletter. Undoubtedly, given the 55 and up ages of our community, many could relate to my words of how quickly time passes. This poem is one of a handful which does not have a reference to race. I don't know how long and hard she looked before settling on this one, but I give her an "A" for effort.

I never know when I might be inspired to put in words something I have seen, heard, or experienced. Sometimes the words flow with immediacy and other times, they simply sit in the recesses of my mind until they are ready to make themselves known.

In April, hubby and I ventured downtown to Saint Paul's Episcopal Church (815 East Grace Street) to view the *Stations of St. Paul's.* The fourteen individual stations were depicted on the front of the take away booklet in the form of a cross. Unfortunately, the stations will have been removed by the time this newsletter hits your mailboxes. If you did not get to see them, you missed the beauty and intricacy of their visual messages. I cannot imagine creating one of these stations much less a collection.

Fourteen stations, each approximately 2' x 4' and mounted throughout the sanctuary, were created by self-taught paper-cut artist Janelle Washington. Each station depicted a specific moment in St. Paul's history with a focus on race relations: **Station 1:** *Slavery Takes Root in Virginia*, **Station 2:**

St. Paul's is Consecrated; Station 3: Parishioners Profit from Slavery; Station 4: Few Black Communicants at St. Paul's; Station 5: Slavery Justified as Christian Duty; Station 6: St. Paul's Commits to the Confederacy; Station 7: Reconstruction and Recommitment to White Supremacy; Station 8: Confederate Memorial Embraced; Station 9: St. Paul's Supports Jim Crow Laws and Practices; Station 10: The Social Gospel Preached; Station 11: Resistance to School Integration; Station 12: Black Organizations Funded; Station 13: St. Paul's Works to Alleviate Oppression, and, Station 14: St. Paul's Works Toward Reconciliation. Never say never, St. Paul's has come a long ways.
