far from completion, has been and continues to be cathartic.




WHAT THIS AUTHOR READS!

I have become an audiobook convert. I love holding and flipping pages of a book. I love underlining, highlighting and writing notes in margins, but carrying a book around is not always feasible. It has taken a while, but I have finally embraced audiobooks!

Started *reading Harlem Rhapsody* by Victoria Christopher Murray. A LOT was learned from this historical fiction. Jesse Redmond Faucet was familiar, but I was unaware of the depth of her contributions to our history. Ms. Murray has the gift of breathing life into her historical characters bringing forth relatable qualities, some endearing and some not. Definitely glad I decided to switch to Audible, rather than reading, because Robin Miles does an excellent job expressing the subtle nuances of Murray's conversational novel.





"Everything happens for a reason!" Of the many books I could have read after *Harlem Rhapsody*, I chose *Half American: The Epic Story of African Americans Fighting World War II at Home and Abroad.* A non-fiction by Matthew F. Delmont, *Half American* sheds light on familiar and unfamiliar names of Black men and women. This was an emotional book to read. I was aware that many *Negro* soldiers were assaulted, lynched, and burned while still in uniform upon returning to AmeriKKKa after fighting for the

freedom of others. *Half American* identifies and provides graphic first-hand accounts of pervasive racist attitudes of AmeriKKKans, including commanding officers and elected officials. AmeriKKKa's racist history was very much prevalent in World War II when Black American soldiers were fighting the Double Victory or Double V Campaign -- victory over fascism abroad and victory over racism at home. Often angered and on the verge of tears, I completed *Half American*, on Audible.

NOTE: 45/47 is pushing for the erasure and downplay of achievements and

contributions of many non-whites, including but not limited to legends Jackie Robinson, Navajo Code Talkers, 442nd Regimental Combat Team, Harlem Hellfighters, Tuskegee Airmen, etc.

It was my choice to use AmeriKKKa and AmeriKKKans in lieu of America and Americans. We cannot, we will not, go back!

Happened upon *The Motherlode* on Audible. This was an interesting listen. I had not heard of 98.9% of the female rappers mentioned, but discovered the origins and backgrounds of many well-known names of today, including American filmmaker, screenwriter, and producer Ava Duvernay who rapped in the early 1990s as MC Eve, one-half of hip-hop duo *Figures of Speech*. Also, there



was a narrator whose voice I recognized and was identified as Janelle James; it was "Ava" from "Abbott Elementary." *Though identified as the narrator; I did not recognize her government name. But, I knew that voice!* TRUTH: I struggled to finish listening to *The Motherlode*; its content contains a lot of profanity as well as hardcore and graphic lyrics. Not ashamed to admit that I did some fast-forwarding.

The Message by Ta-Nehisi Coates was another listen through Audible. CONFESSION: I am not knowledgeable about world events. I chose The Message because of the author, not because of a recommendation or prior knowledge of its content.



My takeaway were the similarities shared and experienced by oppressed regardless of time and circumstances. Coates breaks down the current events of Gaza. Through his travels he witnessed and comprehended the history of Palestinians being pushed out by Israelite Jews. In listening to his observations, experiences and revelations, I acknowledge the erasure and rewriting of history by

transgressors and conquerors is global as are the ruthless atrocities commonly practiced against those targeted for enslavement, extraction and/or extinction. Sadly, many times, perpetrators of atrocities were once victims themselves, but fail to see the correlation and outcome of their own actions.

PODCAST

Multi-tasking with technology is fun! While driving recently, I was thoroughly entertained by a podcast of IMO with Michelle Obama and Craig Robinson. The podcast was titled "KATT WILLIAMS and The Many, Incredible, Unbelievable Lives He's Lived." There were moments of laughter and moments of Are you serious? My characterization of Katt Williams,



the entertainer, is 180° from the man I heard on the podcast. Katt Williams spoke deliberately and seemed to take his time in contemplating outcomes and effects of his life's choices.

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
