- * Received email stating my manuscript was selected to move forward in the *Women & Words2* incubator program. Back to New York!


SEPTEMBER

What the Author is reading!

Very little reading this quarter. I was concentrating on completing and publishing **JOY!** I hunkered down and reread my poems so many times, one would think I was memorizing them in preparation for a poetry slam. It is amazing how many errors you overlook because you are NOT reading what is actually printed, but what you think it should be printed. With each proof copy -- there were three -- I was floored by errors not seen with previous reviews. Sadly, I am certain there are still more I may have missed.





Considering how many times I have read, reread and re-reread **JOY**, I decided to provide an unbiased review!**LOL**

This book is GREAT! 'Nuf said!

Because I strongly feel one can "reach and teach through poetry," **JOY!** not only contains 26 poems, 26 quotes, and 26 inspirations, but it also contains 69 footnotes, Adinkra symbol charts and a genealogy summary which some may or may not find interesting; some might even say implausible!

Readers may not agree with everything written in **JOY!** but, spirited discussions will certainly be prompted by some of its content.

It is not strictly about jazz but about the lives and inner workings of the musicians ... how they got to where they were, how black jazz musicians were snubbed, how musicians succumbed to drugs or continued to function in spite of drugs, and how jazz is an industry where "stepping out out of bounds" was acceptable and sometimes expected behavior.


Books of Diversity for Children
