Mosaics Fine Art Festival Holds 30th Annual Event
More than 100 juried artists from throughout the country will participate in the St. Charles fair.

The 30th annual Mosaics Fine Art Festival will be held on Fri., Sept. 12 from 4 to 9 p.m., Sat., Sept. 13 from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., and Sun., Sept. 14 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The free family-friendly event will be held along several blocks of North Main St. in Historic St. Charles, Mo. where more than 30 restaurants and over 75 shops are located.

The three-day festival includes over 100 juried artists from more than 15 states exhibiting and selling their artwork. Media categories include clay, drawing, glass, leather, metal, pastel, oil/acrylic, photography, printmaking, sculpture, watercolor, and wood. A total of \$5,000 will be awarded to the top nine artists.

The Children's Village area will feature hands-on art experiences for children to create their own make-and-take art masterpieces. Hours are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sat. and Sun. Mary Hediger's Memorial Art Shop for Kids is a kids-only gallery where children ages 14 and younger can buy professional artwork. Designed to foster art appreciation at a young age, all pieces are donated by participating festival artists and can be purchased for a nominal fee.

The H. Robert Pank Memorial Music Stage will showcase a variety of performing artists throughout the weekend. The Artists for Adoption Pet Pavilion, located at the north end of the festival, will be open to families interested in adopting pets from Stray Paws Adoptables.

The Joyce Rosen Founder's Scholarship art display will include select high school students' works of art. Scholarships will be presented in memory of Joyce Rosen, the original festival founder and a longtime supporter of St. Louis artists and events.

The nonprofit Mosaics Fine Art Festival showcases local and regional artists while educating the community about how art can enhance their lives. The group was originally based in Springfield, Missouri. Their acclaimed 1973 debut album, recorded in London under the direction of producer Glyn Johns, contained the U.S. Top 30 single "If You Wanna Get to Heaven," while a second success, "Jackie Blue," came from the band's follow-up collection, "It'll Shine When It Shines."

Producing 16 albums and selling over 3 million records are a testament to the enduring commitment to their craft. In essence, their legacy endures not only through their timeless melodies but also through their embodiment of the American spirit and their unwavering dedication to crafting music that speaks to the soul. They remain a cherished chapter in the story of American rock, leaving an enduring legacy that transcends time and genre. This year marks their retirement from touring. 





For those unfamiliar, Scholar Bowl is an academic competition where teams of students compete and answer questions from a wide range of topics like literature, history, science, current events, and more. It’s a team-based competition that uses a buzzer, kinda similar to Jeopardy.

“Questions start off simple, so that the people who are newer to Scholar Bowl are able to answer, then they begin to get more difficult,” said Ms. Musterman, BHS’s Scholar Bowl coach. Ms. Musterman began coaching in 2018, making this her 7th season coaching for BHS.

Not only has this year’s team won districts again this year, but this past Tuesday, April 22, the team traveled to Bloomfield, Missouri, to compete in the state quarterfinal rounds, where they pulled off a 2-game win against Bloomfield. This win means that the team will get to compete in the MSHSAA state tournament in Columbia on Friday, May 9th.

In addition to the state tournament, this year the Scholar Bowl team qualified for a separate national tournament, the NAQT Small School Nationals, which was held in Chicago this past weekend, April 25-27.

At the NAQT Small School Nationals, the team played 10 full games on Saturday, April 26. They had multiple close games and a very tough draw, playing four teams that made it multiple game rounds into the double-elimination finals bracket, also competing with the tournament winner!

Scholar Bowl students work hard during practice, but also by paying attention to what they are learning in school, for they never know what will come up as a question in a competition. “In practice, Ms. Musterman helps us study subjects and gives us guides to study; she’s also very encouraging in games,” said sophomore Odysse Morgan.

The team has obviously been doing great as a team, but they’ve also earned accolades as individuals. This year, Juniors Alex Tung and Rohan Dixit placed third and fourth as All-District scorers.

Another shout out to Alex Tung; at the nationals tournament, he placed 33rd individually out of 520 students in the public school division, and 5th place individually in the state of Missouri! Congratulations to Alex!

“I am very proud of all the players. This was a fast-paced, high-caliber tournament like nothing we have played before, and they put in a great fight against all the teams,” said Ms. Musterman. “They work really hard.”

Congratulations to the Scholar Bowl team and good luck as they compete in the state tournament on May 9.

Project Lead The Way Lab Brings Neuroscience to Life



Brentwood Middle School eighth graders recently participated in a brain anatomy lab as part of their Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Medical Detectives course. The hands-on experience provided students with an opportunity to explore the nervous system in greater depth, reinforcing classroom learning through real-world application.

During the lab, students examined both the external and internal structures of the brain, identifying major regions such as the cerebrum, cerebellum, brainstem, thalamus and hypothalamus. The guided exploration allowed students to visualize how these parts interact to control movement, thought and bodily functions.

This lab is a key component of the PLTW Medical Detectives curriculum, which introduces middle schoolers to foundational concepts in biomedical science and develops critical thinking, collaboration and problem-solving skills.







The dinner will be held on Saturday, May 31 from 6 to 9 p.m. at 1015 S. Sappington Rd., St. Louis, MO 63126.



Missouri Botanical Garden announces latest Museum exhibition - Smelling the Bouquet: Plants and Scents in the Garden

Stephen and Peter Sachs Museum highlights the diversity of scents in plants

A rose by any other name may still smell as sweet, but without roses and other plants, we might not have the perfumes and popular sweet-smelling products we use today.

A new interdisciplinary exhibition at the Stephen and Peter Sachs Museum at the Missouri Botanical Garden explores the botanical, cultural, and olfactive history of the spectrum of scents created by plants – from floral to stinky.

“Remarkably, despite being integral to our daily lives, scents are overlooked in importance in many ways. Plants contribute so many smells that are so familiar to us, from the flowers and trees we enjoy, the foods and beverages we eat and drink, as well as the perfumes and incense we may use,” Sachs Museum Curator Nezka Pfeifer said. “The world of museums and scientific research has been focused on scent in recent years with opportunities to learn more about which pollinators are attracted by which plants’ smells, but also how artists and olfactory experts interpret the meaningful presence of smells in human culture. This exhibition is unique in that it focuses exclusively on the intersections between plants and the scents they create through the unique smells of plants in the Garden’s collections, including some endangered and not usually found in perfumery. These fragrances inspire us every day and they have important stories to tell us through their scents.”

Smelling the Bouquet: Plants and Scents in the Garden will examine how those scents considered desirable to humans are used to create perfume, incense, and other smells and flavorings. The exhibition will include interactive scent stations featuring the scents of plants in live Garden collections, contemporary scientific research, and olfactory art.

This exhibition is now open and will be open through March 31, 2026. The Sachs Museum is open 11:30 a.m.–4:30 p.m. daily and is included with regular Garden admission.

Engaging visitor opportunities, including a performance series and “sniff ‘n learn” programs are planned throughout the exhibition’s run to provide unique opportunities for visitors to connect with the exhibition. All the art and scent commissions, performance series, and sniff ‘n learns are sponsored by Nancy Ridenour.

About the Exhibition

Smelling the Bouquet will explore many aspects of plants and scents, including diverse uses like perfume, incense, and other scent-based cultural practice. The exhibition will also explore active Garden research projects. The exhibition will include sniffing stations featuring dozens of plant scents and compounds, cultural scent objects, and Garden Herbarium specimens. Visitors can also engage with the fragrant plants depicted in the Museum’s iconic botanical ceiling mural with a unique activity guide developed by olfactory experts.

St. Louis-area perfumers Shawn Maher and Weston Adam have created several interpretive fragrances of special and fragrant plants in the Garden’s conservatories and gardens ranging from the rare and endangered to the famously stinky. A special olfactory artwork commission in the exhibition is by olfactory artist Dr. Gayil Nalls who has created a 2025 edition of her World Sensorium. This olfactory artwork is a perfect dovetail of the primordial relationship humans have with plants and their scents. Around the world, each country holds different iconic aromatic plants to have special meanings in their cultures. They are used daily for medicine, rituals, and cultural practices. Through a global survey, these plants were identified and their essential oils were formulated into a one-world scent based on each country’s population percentage. They form the foundation of World Sensorium.

Performance Series

Complementing the exhibition, the Sachs Museum Performance Series series will present dancers, singers, and poets who have created special programs that intersect with scents commissioned from the exhibition’s perfumers. Each set of two performances takes place at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturdays, when the Garden offers free admission till noon to St. Louis City and County citizens with proof of residency. All performances take place at the Sachs Museum and are about 30–45 minutes in duration. The lineup for the performance series is:

July 19, 2025: Saias: Dance and Scents with Charis Railey and Amara Arts

September 27, 2025: Musical Scents: Voices in the Garden with Benedetta Orsi and St. Louis Women’s Chorale

October 11, 2025: Poetry and Scents with Devin Johnston

In addition to the series, a short documentary and discussion will take place at 6 p.m. on Thursday, August 21 in Farr Auditorium in the Garden’s Jack C. Taylor Visitor Center. This will take place during the Garden’s extended Thursday evening hours and will be included with regular admission.



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2025 AIR QUALITY FORECASTING SEASON KICKS OFF AS LATEST “STATE OF THE AIR” REPORT REVEALS UNFAVORABLE RESULTS

Despite drop in high ozone days over the past 30 years of forecasting, region back among 25 most polluted U.S. cities

As daily air quality forecasting makes its return for the 2025 season, the American Lung Association’s latest “State of the Air” report finds that even after decades of successful efforts to reduce sources of air pollution, 46% of Americans – 156.1 million individuals – are living in places that received failing grades for unhealthy levels of ozone or particle pollution. This is nearly 25 million more people breathing unhealthy air compared to the years covered in last year’s report (2020–2022), and more than in any other “State of the Air” report in the last 10 years. The data reinforces the need to protect our local communities from the continued risks to public health resulting from a combination of factors, including extreme heat, drought, wildfire smoke and more.

Looking back at the “State of the Air” data from almost 30 years ago, when the average number of high ozone days in the St. Louis region approached 50 in the summers of 1996–1998, the drop to just 10.5 high ozone days in the most recent report is a sign of progress. But that progress is tainted by the fact that, for the first time in nine years, the St. Louis region ranked among the top 25 most ozone-polluted U.S. cities, coming in at number 21 on the list for high ozone days out of 228 metropolitan areas. The region also ranked 17th on the list for most polluted cities by annual particle pollution, which is up 13 spots from the previous year. Additionally, St. Louis was reported among the top two cities with the largest change in rank, worsening from 30th to 21st for the topmost ozone-polluted U.S. cities, falling second only to Tulsa, Okla., which moved from 31st on the list to 19th worst overall.

The most up-to-date report findings have added to the extensive evidence that a changing climate is making it harder to protect this hard-fought progress on air quality and human health. Increases in high ozone days and spikes in particle pollution related to extreme heat, drought and wildfires are putting millions of people at risk and adding challenges to the work that states and cities are doing across the nation to clean up air pollution. And after several years of reporting that the worst of the nation’s air quality problems were increasingly concentrated in western states, “State of the Air” 2025 finds the geographic distribution of air pollution shifting back East.

“For 30 years, the St. Louis Regional Clean Air Partnership has been encouraging voluntary steps to reduce emissions in order to protect lung health, but the latest air quality data makes it clear our region remains a long way from achieving truly healthy air,” said Susannah Fuchs, Director of Healthy Air Solutions for the American Lung Association in Missouri. “As we approach summer when poor air quality becomes more frequent, we urge residents and businesses to renew their commitment to the individual and collective efforts that are essential to improving air quality and protecting public health, especially for children, older adults and those with respiratory conditions who are most at risk. Continued vigilance and community participation are key to ensuring cleaner air and healthier outcomes for everyone in the region.”

According to the 2025 “State of the Air” report, exposure

to unhealthy levels of ozone air pollution continues to make breathing difficult for more people living in the U.S. than any other single pollutant. For the three years covered in this year’s report (2021–2023), 37% of the population – some 125.2 million people – were exposed to levels of ozone that put their health at risk. This is an increase of 24.6 million people over last year’s figure, and includes tens of millions of infants and children, people aged 65 or older and others whose conditions make them especially vulnerable to health harm from air pollution. Nationwide, nearly five times as many counties’ ozone levels worsened as improved. Nine states saw the number of unhealthy days for ozone get worse in every one of their counties monitored for this pollutant, including all 23 monitored counties in Illinois and all 17 in Missouri. This encompasses the combined eight counties on both sides of the Mississippi River that fall into the designated non-attainment area in the bi-state region.

Despite the widespread worsening in parts of the country, the list of the worst 25 cities for ozone pollution in “State of the Air” report and their order of ranking remains relatively stable compared with last year’s report. In one other small piece of good news, none of the cities on the list reported a worst-ever average number of days of ozone smog, which is created in part from sources like vehicle exhaust.

As it marks its 30th year, the Clean Air Partnership is renewing its commitment to increasing awareness of regional air quality issues and encouraging activities to reduce air pollution emissions. Area residents can visit CleanAir-St-Louis.com to sign up to receive color-coded, daily air quality forecasts via their email inboxes or text through the Environmental Protection Agency’s EnviroFlash air quality alert system to stay informed about ozone pollution levels in the region and how those levels can affect their health. This is especially crucial on orange or red unhealthy air quality days when individuals should plan to alter their outdoor activities to minimize exposure to polluted air. While on the site, people can also access a wealth of air quality information and tips to do their share for cleaner air all summer long.

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
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Brentwood Officially Receives Missouri Blue Shield Designation

How Kyle Leahy turned dark times and sleepless nights in the minors into major-league success with the Cardinals



There were days, and sleepless nights, not that long ago when Kyle Leahy wondered if his baseball career was going to end in the minor leagues.

He was struggling back in 2021, often going home to an apartment he shared with teammates in Springfield following another poor performance. Getting through those nights often was harder for Leahy than when he was getting hit hard during a game.

“There were definitely some dark times, some sleepless nights, some times when I wondered,” Leahy said. “As bad as some of the results were, as bad as some of those games were, it wasn’t the results on the field that kept me up at night even though it did add to it ... The late nights get later when you are not pitching well.”

“What was really driving me crazy was knowing that I wasn’t getting everything out of myself and that there was more in the tank. I wasn’t showing my best self to the world, to the game, to my teammates, to my coaches, to everybody.”

It didn’t help Leahy that his apartment wasn’t an inviting source of comfort either.

“There were squirrels and raccoons and who knows what else living in our walls,” Leahy said. “It was not luxury living.”

While waking up after those long nights offered the promise of a new day, of another game, of a fresh start, for Leahy, it often only produced more stress.

“There were days where the last place I wanted to be was at the baseball field, which is crazy,” he said. “But at the same time, deep down, I knew I still wanted to go to the field. I knew there was more there. I knew that wasn’t how I was going to end my career.”

“What’s so frustrating sometimes is you bust your butt as hard as you can and you still don’t get the results on the field. That’s a dark feeling when you’ve given it your all and there’s nothing to show for it.”

In the back of his mind, despite his struggles, Leahy’s dream of playing in the major leagues was as alive as it had been when he first started playing the game as a young boy growing up in Colorado.

“Until they told me it was over I wasn’t going to believe it was,” Leahy said. “There’s always some fight left in you.”

Did Leahy really think back during those dark days that four years later he would be one of the Cardinals’ most effective relievers?

“The weird thing is I would have been like, ‘Yeah, I can do that,’” Leahy said. “At the same time, I would have been like, ‘I don’t know how I’m going to get there.’ I just always hoped I could get it out of myself. But trust me, there were some dark times when I didn’t know how.”

The story of how Leahy rose from that dark place to get to where he is today, enjoying success in the major leagues, is a testament to his own determination and the help he received from others in the Cardinals’ organization.

It started with a look in the mirror.

“What I’ve always said to myself is I just need the chance,” Leahy said. “I’ve always been fighting uphill. I just need that chance. I might not figure it out right away but I will give everything I can to figure it out.”

“I had to believe in myself. You have to start there. Nobody else is going to believe in you if you don’t believe in yourself.”

How a Cardinals’ scout found Leahy

One of the first people in the Cardinals’ organization who was attracted to Leahy was Mauricio Rubio, who in 2018 was the area scout covering Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado.

Early that spring, Rubio had identified a pitcher on the Colorado-Mesa team that he wanted to see. It wasn’t Leahy.

“They had another righthander on the team who was popping up a little bit,” said Rubio. He made plans to go see that pitcher, JR McDermott, in a doubleheader when Mesa was on a trip to California.

McDermott was supposed to start game one, and Leahy was the scheduled starter for the second game. For a reason Rubio didn’t know, the two were switched, and Leahy started the first game.

“He was 88 to 91 and there were some signs that the slider was in there,” Rubio said. “He was big and physical and had some arm speed. I thought he probably was going to be able to throw harder.”

Intrigued by what he saw, Rubio made plans to go see Colorado-Mesa, a Division II school, again later in the year, when they played at Colorado School of Mines. This time he specifically was going to watch Leahy.



“He was touched up a little bit in the first inning because of an infield single and a bunt single,” Rubio said. “I think he gave up four runs but then he was on cruise control.”

Rubio liked Leahy enough to recommend him for the draft and the Cardinals selected him in the 17th round. McDermott went undrafted.

Rubio credits Leahy for helping in his own development as a scout even though Leahy didn’t know that happened.

“One of the things I learned from him that helped my development was that his fastball was pretty hard to see,” Rubio said. “I did weigh that, but not as much as I should have.”

Rubio also was reminded that scouting a player sometimes includes looking for abilities that are not as easy to see while watching a game.

“Makeup becomes very important,” Rubio said. “I think a lot of times the evaluation becomes a little constricted. Teams go to a game and see sort of the same thing. A contributing factor has to be how you weigh a person’s work ethic and how you weigh a person’s competitiveness. Clearly Kyle’s was at the top of the scale.”

“His college coach, Chris Hanks, always brought up how hard of a worker he was,

how studious he was. He’s incredibly quiet. But if you’ve ever watched a duck go across a pond, the top half of the duck is completely calm with not a lot going on. If you look underneath the water, that’s where the real work is happening. The flippers are going.”

“That’s kind of how Kyle is. It’s easy to misread his quietness. He likes mountain biking, hiking, skiing. He’s intensely competitive and competes against himself often. Can you improve on your last time? He was great for me to learn from.”

Leahy was sent to Johnson City to begin his pro career in rookie ball, and moved up to the low Class A levels in 2019. Just as his career really was getting started, however, he and all other minor leaguers found themselves with no place to play in 2020 when the minor league seasons were cancelled because of the pandemic.

“I just got a year older basically in terms of my career,” Leahy said. “It was not ideal to lose a year of development. I built a mound in my backyard and had a high school kid who came and caught me. I threw the whole summer and worked on everything I could but I didn’t get any game reps, so that was tough.”

When the minor league teams resumed operations in 2021, Leahy – who was about to turn 24 – was assigned to Double A Springfield.

He didn’t know how long of a season it was going to be.

“The arm was always there”

Jose Leger was the Springfield manager in 2021, and he liked Leahy’s raw talent.

“The arm was always there,” said Leger, now the organization’s assistant field and roving baserunning coordinator. “The mechanical quality of the pitches were there. Throwing strikes was never an issue for him.”

What was a problem was how many of his pitches were getting hit. Night after night, Leger and pitching coach Darwin Marrero watched Leahy struggle.

“It’s hard to ignore the fact he was getting hit around so many times, day after day,” Leger said. “It was really tough for him. We felt for him.”

Many of those nights, Ivan Herrera was catching Leahy.

“He always had good pitches, it was just a matter of learning how to use them,” Herrera said.

As was the case with the team’s staff and other teammates, Herrera said it was tough watching Leahy endure that season.


“Everybody is going to struggle in this game,” Herrera said. “When you struggle is when you have to choose what kind of player and person you want to be. He chose to get better. He was grinding. He never gave up.”

By the time that year was over, the numbers were pretty ugly – an 0-8 record with an 8.20 ERA. In 86 2/3 innings, Leahy allowed 130 hits and walked another 44 batters and hit three more – meaning he was averaging more than two baserunners per inning.

“He didn’t pitch with confidence,” Leger said. “You could tell.”

Said Leahy, “It’s hard to have confidence when you are really struggling but I think for me I’ve always just leaned on your training and trusted that. Anytime something went bad I just said, ‘I’ve got to go back to the drawing board and rebuild and figure out how to get better.’”

“I definitely took my lumps. It was definitely a struggle. I tried to get bigger, faster, stronger, throw harder, make nastier pitches. That’s where I started and it grew a little from there.”



Leahy also grew mentally – from conversations with Brian Alazzawi, the organization’s mental skills and well-being coordinator.

“Brian has always been a big help with a bunch of us,” Leahy said. “That’s where trusting your training kind of comes from. He always says you are going to be way more confident in yourself regardless of results if you believe in everything you’ve been doing and everything you’ve been training for.”

“Having somebody reiterate those things to you gives you a different perspective.”

Alazzawi is a retired Navy Seal who started working for the Cardinals in 2020 following a recommendation from Paul Goldschmidt, who he met years earlier when Goldschmidt and some teammates on the Diamondbacks visited the Seals in San Diego.

“What sets Kyle apart is he finally started to understand that it’s not about the outcome,” Alazzawi said. “It’s about process. He was like, ‘If I’m not seeing the results or not feeling the way I’m supposed to feel, it’s a failure.’ My conversations with Kyle have been that he should look at failure as an opportunity to grow; see mistakes as a way to continue to refine.”

“Kyle kind of took it on himself to dig in and challenge his behaviors, the attitude ... I can’t help but think back about how miserable he was at times about where he was in his career.”

Leger saw Leahy begin to change when he returned to Springfield for the 2022 season.

“Darwin Marrero always believed in him and was an advocate of what he saw in Kyle,” Leger said. “He always said, ‘There’s more there; he can be good.’ He was right.”

“His preparation changed. His mentality changed. We started seeing something then. It took about a year and a half to start believing more in himself. It took a little bit of success for him to start seeing he had more in the tank and become a better pitcher.”

“A different demeanor”

Leahy’s improvement picked up in 2023 to the point where he was promoted to make his major-league debut. He rode the 1-55 shuttle between Memphis and St. Louis throughout much of 2024, but logged enough time with the Cardinals to come to the realization that he could pitch, and succeed, at the major-league level.

He was determined to take the next step in his career – remaining on the roster – this season.

“We had great conversations this spring,” Alazzawi said. “He went into this spring with the mindset that the job was already his. A lot of guys have the mindset that they are fighting for a job. I think one thing that set Kyle apart this spring was that he wasn’t fighting to get it, he was fighting to keep it.”

“I think there’s a difference in that mentality; go out and do what he knows how to do.”

Leahy did not allow a run in 11 spring training innings, spread across seven games, issuing only one walk and striking out 13. He made the opening day roster.

Already this season Leahy has had a streak of nine consecutive innings, over seven games, without allowing a hit. In his nine games he has worked 13 innings, allowing three runs on four hits. He has walked three and struck out 13 of the 46 batters he has faced.



A Statement from the Brentwood Library Board of Trustees regarding Cutting of Funds for the Institute of Museum and Library Services

As many of you know, there has been a series of funding cuts by federal and state agencies. We are now starting to feel the effects of those cuts here at your Brentwood Public Library. On March 14, 2025, President Trump signed an executive order to eliminate the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). This federal agency is responsible for distributing congressionally appropriated funds to state libraries.

Your Brentwood Public Library Board of Trustees, along with libraries throughout Missouri and the nation, strongly opposes this decision. This action could have serious financial consequences for your Brentwood Library and an even more serious impact on rural and smaller libraries. IMLS funding is crucial for a variety of services and resources in our local libraries: resource sharing, technology updates, digital preservation, staff training, and other programs.

In Brentwood, we have already felt the effect: a previously approved grant of \$1,600 for our summer reading program has been canceled. We WILL find the funds for our popular summer reading program, but the cut will have an impact on other areas. We have also lost \$3,175 in grant funds for migrating our old system to the new Missouri Evergreen Consortium catalog. It appears that we will be losing funds for delivering books and resources between the Missouri Library Consortium and the larger Missouri Evergreen Consortium. These are just three examples of how the funding cuts will specifically affect your Brentwood library. As we prepare for our exciting new library in 2026, we are very cost-conscious in our everyday operations and these cuts present new challenges.

We urge lawmakers and the public to advocate for continued IMLS funding to ensure that we can achieve our mission statement here at the Brentwood Public Library: "to provide a place for the community to come together to connect, learn, and grow; to encourage enjoyment of reading and lifelong learning; to provide free and open access and expression; and to promote knowledge, history, and culture." Thank you for your support.

What can you do to help?

- Call or send a message to your Senators and Representative urging them to overturn this order and restore and protect IMLS funding.
- Write a letter to the editor in your local newspaper explaining why IMLS is important to your community and the impact of federal dollars.
- Share your story for the American Library Association's story collection about the impact of federal funding on your community.
- Become a supporter of your library, the Missouri Library Association, and the American Library Association.

It's safe to say Leahy's confidence level is a lot higher now than it was four years ago.

"There were definitely people within the organization who always believed in me, otherwise I wouldn't be here," Leahy said. "Baseball is a weird game. At every level you learn a different part of it and you adjust and hopefully you get here."

"Maybe when it's all said and done it will be more enjoyable to have gone through that (his struggles). I think all of those struggles have formed sort of a relentless pursuit of the impossible perfection. I may have had a few good outings right now and had some success, but it's not like I didn't give up zero runs. I didn't strike everybody out. There's always room for improvement."

"Had I not had those struggles and learned how to pick myself up after getting knocked down, and being a good self-evaluator about what I need to improve on ... now I know when things get off how to get past it."

Leahy knows the people who stuck by him during the struggles are as happy for his success as he is - if not more.

"A lot of guys have an easier path to the bigs, but some have a little bit of a rougher path," Leger said. "That was his case. He's one of the stories that makes you proud. He's a good example for others in the organization and the industry that if you go out there and give your best, you never know, it may happen."

Added Rubio, "It's been impressive. I'm proud of the kid."

So is Alazzawi.

"I'm super proud of him and I hope he is proud of himself," Alazzawi said. "I'm confident he will continue to do the work. There's definitely a different demeanor about him. I would say he's more confident, more capable in how he presents himself. He's not the kind of guy who is going to beat his chest, but I think being around him, you feel an energy about him."

One thing is definitely different about the Leahy of 2025 compared to who he was four years ago. These days - everyday - he can't wait to get to the ballpark.

"Hopefully when it's all said and done I can look back and say I wouldn't change it for the world," Leahy said. "I think I'm on the right trajectory to be able to say that one day but I still have a lot more that I want to accomplish."

Greek Yogurt Chicken and Vegetables

- ½ tsp. black pepper
- 1 ½ lbs. skinless boneless chicken breasts or thighs

- 1 medium zucchini, halved lengthwise and sliced
- 1 yellow bell pepper, chopped
- ½ large onion, thinly sliced
- 1 pint of cherry tomatoes
- ½ cup kalamata olives, pitted
- ¼ cup feta cheese
- 2 Tbsp. parsley flakes



Directions:

Place all Greek yogurt marinade ingredients, except chicken, into a large bowl. Whisk until combined.

Add chicken to the bowl and cover with marinade. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and place in the refrigerator for 2 hours, or overnight if preparing early.

When ready to cook, preheat oven to 425° F.

Add zucchini, peppers, onion and tomatoes to the sheet pan. Drizzle with olive oil and toss to coat, leaving spaces on the pan for the chicken.

Remove chicken from the refrigerator and place on the sheet pan with the vegetables.

Bake for 30 minutes. Remove from the oven and sprinkle with olives, feta cheese, and parsley. Place back into the oven and bake for an additional 10 – 15 minutes, or until the chicken is golden brown on top and the vegetables are cooked through.

Remove from the oven and enjoy!




Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.


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
