Alumni Panel Prepares Students for Postsecondary Pathways



Brentwood High School recently welcomed back seven graduates from the Class of 2024 for an alumni panel discussing their first semester of college. The event gave current juniors and seniors an inside look at postsecondary life, covering topics such as academic expectations, time management, and building connections on campus.

The Class of 2024 submitted 216 applications to 104 institutions nationwide and earned more than \$1.6 million in scholarships. Students selected 22 different schools to continue their education, including Florida State University, Missouri University of Science and Technology, and Washington University in St. Louis.

Among the panelists was Cora Urhahn, who joined the discussion via Zoom from Germany, where she is participating in the Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange program. This prestigious scholarship provides students with a fully immersive cultural experience, including living with a host family, attending a German high school, and engaging in language instruction. Participants also have opportunities to meet with U.S. and German government representatives and join a vibrant alumni network.

“Hearing directly from our alumni helps students see what’s possible beyond high school,” said Emily Diaz, BHS college and career advisor. “Their experiences reinforce the value of preparation and adaptability, whether they’re navigating coursework, finding campus resources, or making connections that will shape their future.”

Brentwood High School Assistant Principal Announces Retirement



After three decades in public education, Brentwood High School Assistant Principal and Athletic Director Dr. Stephen Ayotte will retire at the end of the 2024-25 school year.

“Dr. Ayotte has been an incredible colleague and partner in building a positive and inclusive culture at Brentwood High School,” said Dr. Edward Johnson, Brentwood High School principal. “His unwavering commitment to servant leadership has profoundly impacted our students, leaving a legacy of care, compassion, and excellence that will not be forgotten.”

Dr. Ayotte began his career as a certified public accountant and auditor before transitioning to education. In 1995, he joined Parkway South High School as a business education teacher, where he also coached football and track and field. Six years later, he became the career and technical education curriculum coordinator for the Rockwood School District.

After a decade in Rockwood’s central office, Dr. Ayotte moved into leadership roles at Confluence Academies, including assistant

principal and director of secondary education. In 2013, he assumed his current role at Brentwood High School. Dr. Ayotte and his wife, Stefanie, relocated to the Brentwood community to ensure their three children could attend and graduate from Brentwood High School.

“My family and I are incredibly grateful to the Brentwood School District for all it has done for us,” said Dr. Ayotte. “We could not have been more pleased with everyone we have met and all our experiences here. You may look for greener pastures elsewhere, but you will never find a place as special as Brentwood.”

Three Candidates File for Brentwood Board of Education

Three candidates have filed for the two available three-year terms on the Brentwood School District Board of Education. In order

of their filing, this year’s school board candidates are:

- Katie Clark • Ryan C. Flynn • Clayton Zak

As elected representatives of the residents of the Brentwood School District, the seven-member Board of Education serves as the governing body for the community’s public school system. The school board sets district policies, selects and evaluates the superintendent of schools, adopts the annual budget, and determines the yearly tax rates. Board members serve three-year overlapping terms with two or three members elected each year.

The district will host a School Board Candidate Forum on Monday, March 3, at 6:30 p.m. in the Brentwood High School Lecture Hall (2221 High School Dr.). The forum will be moderated by the League of Women Voters.

The forum is an excellent opportunity for residents to hear directly from the candidates about their goals, priorities and vision for the district. Community members are encouraged to submit questions for the candidates in advance online at brentwoodmoschools.org/forum, or in person at the event. The League of Women Voters will collect and moderate all questions to ensure a fair and informative discussion.

The election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 8.

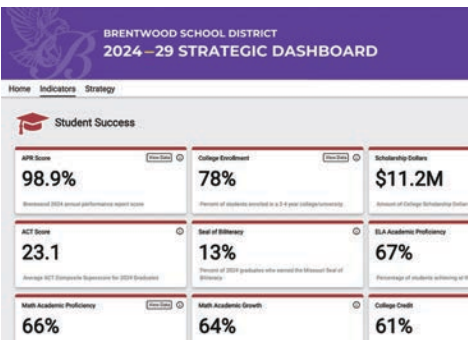

Child Care Aware of Missouri Releases 2025 Child Care Report

Child Care Aware of Missouri (CCAMO) recently released its “Child Care Landscape in Missouri” report which examines the region’s child care system from 2020 to 2024.

The up-to-date report explores how Missouri’s child care system has been significantly shaped by the long-term effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Various challenges addressed include an increase in child care deserts, child care affordability, limited resource accessibility, and the expiration of federally funded programs like the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Founded in 1999, CCAMO is a statewide nonprofit organization that focuses on comprehensive early childhood education and its impact on families, child care professionals, businesses, and communities. CCAMO holds exclusive statewide licenses for Show Me Child Care Resources, a web-based portal providing more than 2,000 resources for child care educators and business owners, as well as T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood Missouri Scholarship Program, which has awarded more than 2,600 scholarships across Missouri since its inception.

CCAMO’s report provides researched solutions and actionable recommendations such as expanding affordable care access with a focus on rural and underserved areas; investing in workforce retention through better wages and benefits; sustaining public funding to stabilize and grow the sector; and promoting innovative child care models to meet diverse family needs.

“Our detailed analysis depicts numerous barriers in Missouri’s child care infrastructure since the pandemic,” said CCAMO CEO Robin Phillips. “We have addressed these issues – from workforce development resources to policy recommendations – to assist our region in its quest for quality answers to our current child care climate.”

Child Care Aware of Missouri’s services include workforce development, child care business supports, advocacy and policy work, and its new Child Care Keeps Missouri Working, a regional campaign offering concierge solutions to businesses undergoing employee recruitment and retention challenges due to the overwhelming shortage of quality child care options. The Saint Louis Zoo will host a job fair from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, Feb. 15, in The Living World building located at the Zoo’s North Entrance on Government Drive in Forest Park.

The Zoo is seeking applicants interested in part-time work at the Zoo with immediate availability starting as early as the beginning of March. Energetic, responsible and service-oriented individuals with day and night availability are needed for part-time positions, including catering and food service personnel, attraction operators, education interpreters, security beats, retail and parking lot attendants and more.

Flexible weekday and weekend positions are available for ages 15 (work permit required at time of hire) and up. The job fair will include information on employment, plus an opportunity to interview with possible same-day job offers, pending successful completion of pre-employment paperwork process.

Pediatric mental health facility can move forward after Webster Groves vote

Plans for a pediatric mental health hospital in Webster Groves can



move forward after the St. Louis suburb’s city council Tuesday evening approved zoning and permitting changes to the proposed site.

St. Louis Children’s Hospital and the behavioral health provider KVC needed the council’s approval before building the complex, which includes a planned 77-bed inpatient hospital and an outpatient facility.

The council unanimously approved zoning changes to the property at Gore Avenue and Rock Hill Road. The ordinance also grants two conditional use permits for the property.

“Their unanimous vote, along with the community’s voice of support throughout this process, will enable us to provide care for kids who so desperately need it,” representatives from KVC and Children’s wrote in a joint statement. “We will continue to encourage and engage in conversations and discussions with neighbors to share more about the project and how we can be the best partners to the community.”

The council passed the measure with an added amendment to limit the use of the facility to what was contained in the operators’ initial application. Mayor Laura Arnold said the amendment was added in response to residents’ concerns about KVC and Children’s expanding the hospital in the future to include an emergency room or other additions.

Children’s Hospital, which is part of the BJC health system, and KVC, which operates pediatric residential care properties in the Midwest, announced plans to build the facility last year. KVC already runs a school on the property for children and teenagers with behavioral and emotional issues. It bought the land in 2023 from the organization Great Circle.

Some residents in north Webster Groves objected to the plans to build the hospital, expressing concerns about safety, traffic and a lack of transparency about the planning process.

Some have argued that the site, which is surrounded by residential plots, is the wrong place for a health care facility.

Officials at Children’s have said that its Kingshighway hospital has only 14 inpatient beds available for children and teens with mental health emergencies and that the unit is consistently full.

“It’s the easiest vote I’ve had to take,” council member David Franklin said during the meeting. “I look forward to a partnership with BJC in our community and demonstrating to the county writ large that Webster Groves cares not only about its own citizens but the citizens of its region.”

Detractors and supporters had packed previous public hearings regarding the development. Health care providers have supported the bill, saying that the region needs more pediatric mental health treatment capacity.

Several council members on Tuesday said they appreciated that many Webster Groves residents became involved in the debate.

“People get introduced to city government in different ways, and it’s so important that people can be involved at the local level,” said council member Emily Hixson Shepherd. “I love the idea of being involved with this and then transferring that into further engagement at the community and local level.”

Arnold said she knows that some people will be unhappy with the final decision. The council will keep residents’ concerns in mind as the project moves forward, she said.

“It’s our responsibility to make sure we work with BJC, KVC, Children’s Hospital and the neighbors to make sure that everyone is happy with this project when it’s completed and it’s operating,” Arnold said.



Crescent Roll King Cake



INGREDIENTS:

- 6 ounces cream cheese, softened, divided
- 2 cups powdered sugar, divided
- Finely grated zest of 1 lemon
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- Pinch salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 (8-ounce) cans refrigerated crescent roll dough
- 1 pecan half
- 1 tablespoon milk, as needed
- Food coloring, as needed
- Colored sanding sugar for decorating

DIRECTIONS:

- Preheat the oven to 350°F.
- Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

Make the filling:

In a medium bowl, combine 4 ounces of the cream cheese with 1 cup of powdered sugar, plus lemon zest, cinnamon, salt, and vanilla. Beat with a wooden spoon or electric hand mixer until creamy. Set aside.

Pop open the cans of crescent roll dough and separate it into triangles. Arrange them in a circle on the baking sheet, overlapping slightly. Spread the filling evenly in a ring, leaving a 3 1/2-inch circle in the center and 3-inch border at the edges.

Lay the pecan on the filling. Fold the inner points in like a pinwheel, then fold in the outer points so they overlap. You should wind up with a ring. (Don't worry if it's a little sloppy. The cake will look better once it's baked.)



Bake until golden brown, about 30 min.

Make the icing:

In a medium bowl, beat the remaining 2 ounces of cream cheese together with the remaining 1 cup of powdered sugar. Add the milk to make it thin enough to drizzle, but not so thin that it's soupy. Divide between three bowls and tint one green, one purple, and one yellow.

When the cake is completely cool, drizzle or spread it with icing and sprinkle with enough sugar to make it sparkly. The cake will keep, tightly covered, at room temperature for 3 days.

A West County Dining Tradition!

"Massa's, of course" "The Old House" emblazoned at the top of their menu defines this Classic Italian restaurant in Bridgeton, MO. I have enjoyed dining there since the mid 1970's.

Massa's exemplifies the idea of an old fashioned Italian supper club. It is small, cramped, dark and decorated with abstract art work and art deco chandeliers. I love it, but some feel it is a bit crowded. Relax and enjoy, you will become a "regular" like most of those around you.

We met our friends Casey Van Allen and his wife Stephanie, and Ken Kensey and his wife Robin. As a party of six, we were concerned that they don't take reservations, but one cocktail at the bar, and we were quickly seated. I will say that after 7pm seating appears to open up with little or no wait.

We started with the obligatory toasted ravioli and garlic cheese bread. Both of these items were perfect examples of St. Louis favorites. I also ordered a small house salad with their creamy Italian house dressing and grated cheese. I highly recommend this as an accompaniment to your dinner.

Our friends ordered Chicken Bianco, chicken breasts with mushrooms in a white wine sauce, and Cajun Pasta, penne pasta with red



peppers and a spicy light red sauce. They were completely satisfied with their meals.

Sue and I ordered the Gamberi, linguine with sea clams, shrimp, scallops, mussels, fresh mushrooms, and tomatoes in a light seafood sauce. This was a gourmet seafood feast with a slightly spicy, clear seafood sauce. I went face-down in this platter of goodness and could not finish it all. We took home enough for another complete meal for both of us.

All of the meals were larger than expected servings. You definitely get your money's worth at Massa's. None of us had room for a dessert of Fazio's cheese cake or tiramisu.

Massa's menu offers a number of fish, chicken and steak items, appetizers, St. Louis style pizza, children's items and a gluten free menu. You may order take out at (314) 739-3894.

Massa's offers a step back in time to an old-fashioned Italian restaurant with a casual atmosphere. The service was good but not overbearing. Massa's will soon become a regular destination for you, and your friends and family.

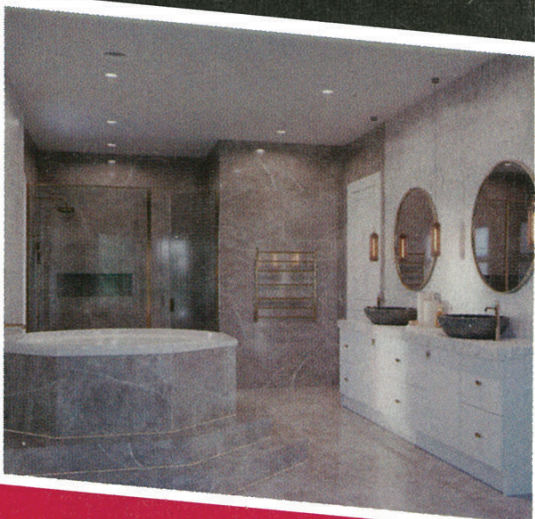

Discussion: The City of Brentwood, Missouri, is seeking an innovative partner to redevelop the site on Brentwood Boulevard that currently consists of city hall, a branch post office and four adjacent lots to the east. The city would like to reimagine its civic center, expand its capacity to house the police department, replace the outdated post office facility, and reinvigorate the area by a creative marriage of civic and retail activity in a mixed-use development. Visionary developers are invited to submit proposals addressed to Brentwood City Administrator, 2348 South Brentwood Blvd., Brentwood, MO. 63144 through March 31, 2025.

Alderman Plufka responded that maybe it could be a sub-station for Police, but did not want to overdirect the project, but instead offer wide parameters.
Alderwoman Tice asked if we had seen this combination elsewhere? Alderman Plufka responded that he had not, but noted the City of Kirkwood has something similar, although with a bigger footprint of space. Our scale may not be enticing but he wants to try and see.
Alderman Wegge noted he is in favor of this, not precluding anything with the school, but wants to make sure that we are clear in our communications and to word this so there is no misunderstanding of intention.

Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875. Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

Dept. of Energy – Weldon Spring Site

The Weldon Spring Site is located about 30 miles west of St. Louis, MO in St. Charles County. The site consists of the former Chemical Plant and the Quarry. Both sites are accessible from Missouri State Route 94.

WHAT IS IT?

During the early 1940s the U.S. Government acquired 17,232 acres in rural St. Charles County to establish the Weldon Spring Ordnance Works. 576 residents were displaced from the towns of Hamburg, Howell and Toonerville. From 1941 to 1945, the U.S. Army manufactured TNT and DNT at the Ordnance Works Site. With four TNT production lines. These lines resulted in contamination of soil, sediments, groundwater and some off-site springs.

Following the manufacturing of large amounts of explosives, and decontamination of the facility by the U.S. Army, 205 acres were transferred to the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) in 1956 for the construction of the Weldon Spring Uranium Feed Materials Plant, now called the Weldon Spring Chemical Plant. An additional 14.88 acres were transferred to AEC in 1964.

The plant converted processed uranium ore concentrates to pure uranium, intermediate compounds and uranium metal. Waste byproducts were also processed, called raffinate. The raffinate was stored in four pits located on the Chemical Plant property. Uranium-processing operations resulted in radiological contamination of similar locations previously contaminated by the former U.S. Army operations.

The Quarry was mined for limestone aggregate used in the construction of the Ordnance Works. It was also used by the U.S. Army for burning wastes from explosives manufacturing and disposal of TNT-contaminated rubble during Ordnance Works operations. These activities resulted in nitroaromatic contamination of the soil and groundwater at the Quarry. In 1960, the U.S. Army transferred the Quarry to AEC, which used it from 1963 to 1969 as a disposal area for uranium and thorium residues (both drummed and uncontained) from the former chemical plant.

Uranium-processing operations stopped in 1966, and December 31, 1967, AEC returned the facility to the U.S. Army for use as a defoliant-production plant. The U.S. Army disposed of the equipment. The defoliant project was cancelled before any defoliant was manufactured and the U.S. Army transferred 50.65 acres of land encompassing the pits back to AEC while retaining the Chemical Plant.

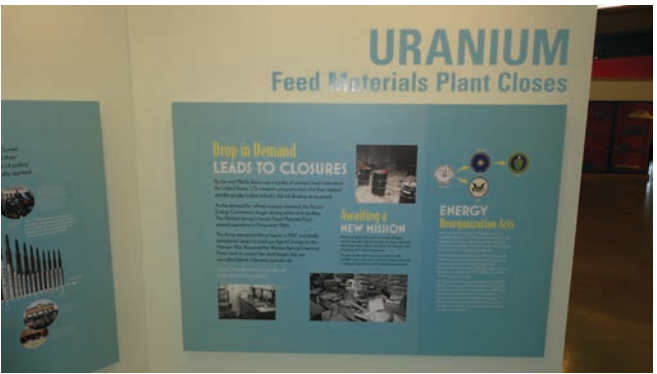
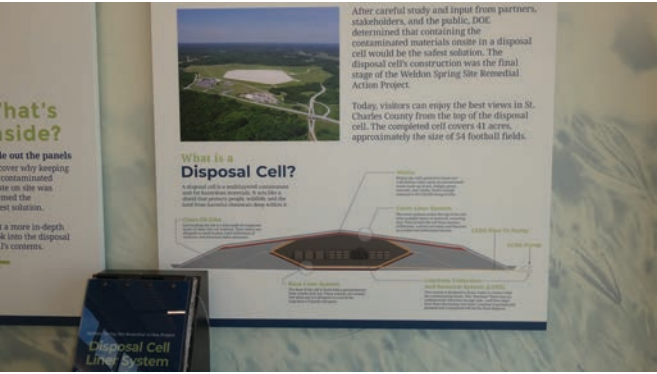
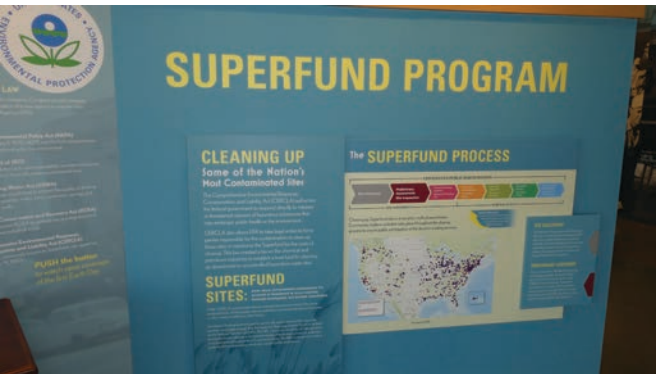
The EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) placed the Quarry and the Chemical Plant areas on the CERCLA National Priorities List in 1987 and 1989. The site was divided into four units (Chemical Plant, Quarry Bulk Waste, Quarry Residuals and Groundwater).

In 2001, the site's disposal cell on a 41-acre engineered structure designed to contain the site's waste resulting from the cleanup. The disposal site looks like a giant pillow. It contains a tightly sealed layer above and below and disposed of the waste between 3 and 45 feet. A soil cushion and a geomembrane layer sewn to the bottom liner encapsulates the waste. There are hiking trails and 150-acre native prairie grasses, flowering plants and wildlife.

The new interpretive center opened in 2021. Visitors are welcome seven days a week and there is no cost. We watched a film about the site and how it came to be. The facility features four classrooms that seat 40 people, a 4,500 square-foot exhibit gallery.
