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

Brentwood School District residents with young children can access free parent education services through the district's Parents as Teachers (PAT) pro-




gram. Serving children from prenatal to age 5, PAT aims to support parents and caregivers in their roles as their children's first and most influential teachers.

- Enabling subscription alerts. By activating fraud detection tools with Digital Banking such as alerts for login attempts, transactions, fund transfers, and more, you'll be able to report any fraudulent activity in your accounts immediately.
- Being skeptical. Links or attachments in emails and texts are often how cyber criminals compromise your computer or mobile device. If it looks suspicious, it's best to delete it, and go directly to the source for confirmation.





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

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS

Mayor David Dimmitt - No Report

Alderman David Plufka - Ward 1 – Public Safety Committee has a Special meeting tomorrow (9.4.24) at 5:30PM because there was no quorum at the regular meeting last week. The Fire training center and traffic calming items will be addressed.

Alderwoman Nancy Parker Tice - Ward 1 – Ward 1 has a meeting tomorrow (9.4.24) at 6:30 PM at the Recreation Center. She clarified what she felt were misconstrued comments from a previous meeting regarding police/fire pension fund - stating that an average \$300K home would have about

\$150 going toward the police and fire pension fund and that Brentwood puts aside more money toward the pension than our comparators. So, when members retire, they are paid a higher percentage than our comparators. We have a great pension and just wanted to highlight this information because of the recent report.

Alderman Brandon Wegge - Ward 2 – Public Works has been cancelled since we just had a meeting last week.

OLD BUSINESS

Bill No. 6509 - An Ordinance Amending Chapter 225 of the Brentwood City Code Relating to Park Rules - Second Reading

The City Attorney did the second Reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderman Gould to perfect Bill No. 6509 into Ordinance form. Roll Call:

By a vote of 8 (yes) to 0 (no), Bill No. 6509 will become Ordinance No. 5151

Bill No. 6518 - An Ordinance Amending Chapter 605 of the Brentwood City Code Relating to Mobile Food Vendors. Second Reading.

The City Attorney did the second Reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderman Gould and seconded by Alderwoman Tice to perfect Bill No. 6518 into Ordinance form. Roll Call:

By a vote of 8 (yes) to 0 (no), Bill No. 6518 will become Ordinance No. 5152.

Bill No. 6525.1 - An Ordinance Repealing Ordinance No. 5108 And Establishing A Revised Compensation Schedule For Brentwood Employees And Related Matters And Providing For The Effective Date Of This Ordinance. - Second Reading.

The City Attorney stated the Bill is pending amendment by the text in 6525.1.

Motion was made by Alderwoman Sims and seconded by Alderman Lochmoeller to amend Bill No. 6525 by the text change noted in No. 6525.1.

The City attorney stated that this change corrects the reference that the market study to be done every two years and instead it says market study will be done at the direction of the Board as market forces and budget constraints deem appropriate.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote. City Attorney did a second reading of revised Bill 6525.1.

Director Gruenenfelder gave a quick presentation on the changes since the last meeting. The numbers presented at Ways and Means have changed –

They were initially done on a 3-year avg. CPI (2.7%), but were asked to use the 5-year avg. CPI (3.94%) which increased salaries

Overall budget continues to be refined. Estimated revenue and the effects of the TIF being paid off this year have been reevaluated which led to an increase in revenue.

Staff took into consideration retirees and an estimate of old position vs. hiring the new position

Updated estimated 3-yr budget, adding 2027. At the 60th percentile, we are still showing a net surplus through 2027 in Fund 10 and Fund 50.

Were asked to look at moving patrol officers to grade U17 (instead of U16)- salary and benefits at new level does increase amount between \$75,000 - \$85,000 a year, including

retirees. HR looked at models closely. This does create a deficit in 2027 of about \$70,000. This change, verified by Paypoint HR, would place patrol officers at the 70th percentile. This does not impact the Stormwater/Park improvement fund.

Looking for recommendation from the Board.

Alderman Plufka asked about how the model shows the increased revenue projection of TIF's, yet one has not had a full year of collection yet – and wondered if there could not be a \$70,000 error in this

\$16M+ of projected revenue. Director Gruenenfelder responded that they worked with the Finance Director and financial counsel to provide estimated projections over the next three years.

Director DePew responded that the numbers were presented to Ways and Means, and the recommendation was to remain conservative with the numbers of the TIF.

Alderman Plufka then asked how often Brentwood is in the lower end of the collection or how often do we max it out. Director DePew responded that the cycles 3-5 years back may be slightly skewed due to the deposit from St. Louis County that is in question. Also, as the holiday season is coming up the indication is that sharing percentage increases as well but is uncertain as to what degree.

Alderman Plufka stated that as an example, EDST has exceeded projections each year by more than \$70,000 each year – which was confirmed by Director DePew.

Alderman Gould questioned the order in which motions need to be made (listed in presentation) – because if we don't pass the EDST or funding of this study, we couldn't afford to do the 60th percentile for compensation, so we should take this up first.

The City attorney responded that his legal opinion is that we do not have to do any of these things noted. The Bill establishes a range of steps and the philosophy that lead us to that is up to the Board. The philosophy is not an integral part of the Bill and is not necessary for formally adopting this Bill for legal purposes. The EDST funds is a budget decision to be made at the time the budget is adopted for when the funds are allocated for their purposes each year. Adjusting the scale by CPI each year is already a provision and will be done as affordable - the city will look to do that. Notifying the EDST Board is not necessary as they have made a recommendation to the Board. And to recommend the compensation be retro-active is already in the Bill. So, these separate motions are not necessary or required.

It is assumed the city will pass a budget amendment for 2024 compensation if this is adopted.

Alderman Gould restated that since all this is done through the operations of budgeting and staff implementation, and not policy, then it is fine to move forward.

Motion was made by Alderman Lochmoeller and seconded by Alderman Gould to perfect Bill No. 6525.1 into Ordinance form.

Discussion: Alderman Plufka made further motion to amend the compensation schedule to move police patrol officers from U16 to U17

There was no second to this motion.



Who Goes? Who Stays? As Cardinals Begin "Reset" the Questions are Easy But the Answers are More Complicated

By Rob Rains

As John Mozeliak was discussing the Cardinals "reset" for the 2025 season, he admitted the team has not finalized its planned budget for the year, other than expectations that the payroll will be less than it was this season.

Only when he has that information can Mozeliak, beginning his final year as the team's president of baseball operations, answer the fundamental questions that all of the team's fans want to know.

Who goes? And who will be back?

They are simple questions. It's the answers that are more complicated, but let's try to break it down into categories, with the caveat that a player's salary alone is not going to be the only factor in who is let go, who is traded or who will be returning.

executives on other teams, Mozeliak won't know for certain which players on the Cardiand perhaps the greatest return.

He likely knows the players that he would like to trade, if a good deal can be worked out, and which ones he most wants to keep. It is probably a safe assumption that the Cardinals would listen to trade offers for almost anybody on the roster except for shortstop Masyn Winn.

So, here's a snapshot look at what might happen:

Who is going?

The easy answer here is to start with the players who are eligible for free agency or have a club option on their contract for 2025. This list is headed by Paul Goldschmidt, with Matt Carpenter and Andrew Kittredge the other free agents to be. The Cardinals have Lynn and Keynan Middleton.

Letting all of those players go, including paying the buyouts on the options, would Cardinals don't expect to be in a pennant chop about \$50 million off the team's payroll, a significant savings. Of that group of players, a case can be made that if the budget allows it, they should pick up the \$12 million option for Gibson, who has emerged as a leader of the pitching group and a good resource for the projected 2025 roster is Miles Mikolas, due team's younger pitchers, a role somebody needs to fill in 2025.

So letting the others go, and bringing back Gibson, would net a savings of about \$38

Who could be traded?

Simply looking at contracts, the top three players in this category are Nolan Arenado, Sonny Gray and Willson Contreras. Arenado has three years left on his contract, Gray two Until he starts getting texts or calls from and Contreras three, a combined commitment of about \$190 million.

Arenado and Gray also have no-trade status nals' current roster will bring the most interest, so moving either would require them to sign off on a deal. > Contreras, owed \$54 million over the next three years, missed a good part of 2024 because of injuries which gave young catchers Ivan Herrera and Pedro Pages more playing time than had been expected. If the budget is in decent shape, one option the Cardinals might consider is keeping Contreras and try to put Herrera in a package deal.

The other prime player to watch as trade discussions begin is closer Ryan Helsley, who set the franchise record with 49 saves this season. Helsley is due for a major raise for 2025 from his \$3.8 million salary in his final year options on the contracts of Kyle Gibson, Lance of arbitration. He can be a free agent after the 2025 season.

race next season, would moving Helsley agency be the right choice? It is certainly one Mozeliak will be exploring.

The biggest remaining contract on the to receive \$18 million in the final year of his deal. To move him likely would require the Cardinals to package him with a more attractive player, such as Helsley, or agree to eat at least part of that contract. Steven Matz, due \$12.5 million in the final year of his contract, falls into that same category.

There is another possibility of trade chips as well, even if moving them would not strictly be a case of trying to reduce payroll. One of the mistakes the Cardinals have seemed to make too often recently on the trade market is holding onto a player longer than they should, then not getting much of a return when that player was eventually traded.

Can Andre Pallante ever have a higher to say, but maybe not. The same might be said about Alec Burleson or Michael Siani. Those are question Mozeliak, Chaim Bloom and the rest of the Cardinals' braintrust must decide as the off-season progresses.

Who stays?

Winn is a no-brainer. It seems likely that Brendan Donovan and Lars Nootbaar are keepers too. Thomas Saggese definitely fits the mold of players the organization will look to build around as it goes forward.

The two biggest questions about the young players concern Nolan Gorman and Jordan Walker. The two former first-round draft picks should be at the center of the reset movement, giving them a chance to play every day and develop their talent, not having to constantly be looking over their shoulder to see if they are going to get jerked around again. Victor Scott II falls into that category too.

The major-league performance of all three players, however, leaves room for doubt about how well any, or all, of them will perform even if they are given the chance for regular, uninterrupted playing time. Making the right decision about Gorman, Walker and Scott II's future could

The argument can be made that if the be the most important decision the team has to make this winter.

The top position player in the minors, infielder for a bunch of prospects before he hits free J.J. Wetherholt, had a great half-season in his first exposure to pro ball and it will be fun to watch his development and see how close he is to the major leagues.

> If the Cardinals want this reset to be successful, they have to make a commitment to the young players and stick with them. There will be mistakes. There will be growing pains. But those lessons learned in 2025 should pay valuable dividends in the future.

> The Cardinals should commit to the young pitchers too. Michael McGreevy should be in consideration for the starting rotation, and Matthew Liberatore - despite his success in the bullpen - should be a candidate too. Gordon Graceffo deserves a longer look. Ouinn Mathews and Tink Hence should get long evaluations in spring training to see how close they are to being major-league ready.

> The Cardinals should be able to add to that group of young players and prospects through trades this winter.

> Mozeliak has gone on record in the past of saying that he did not believe Cardinals fans would be interested in a rebuild, the way the Astros and Cubs did it in recent years. This shouldn't be a tear-down, rebuild it situation.

> There is enough young talent currently ready or near-ready for the majors that going with the youngsters doesn't mean the team would be looking at a 100-loss season in 2025.

> And really, what does the organization have to lose? There were record numbers of no-shows at Busch Stadium this summer. The team failed to draw 3 million fans for the first time since 2003. Put a good product on the field, even if it is loaded with youngsters, and people will come.

> The Cardinals had four seasons with Goldschmidt and Arenado and one of the mystifying realities of the recent stretch of the team's history is that they did not win a single playoff game with those two potential Hall of Famers on the roster.

> The team is sitting at home in October for the second consecutive year. They have won one playoff game - game, not series - over the last five seasons. They have lost nine out of their last 10 postseason games.

> This reset could be coming at a good time for the Cardinals and their fans. For 2025, the goal should be simple. Play the kids. It's time.

Mac-O-Lantern and Cheese Bowls



INGREDIENTS

Kosher salt

6 medium orange bell peppers

8 ounces elbow macaroni

1 1/4 cups half-and-half

8 ounces cream cheese, at room temperature

4 ounces mild Cheddar, shredded (about 1 1/2 cups)

Bring a large pot of generously salted water to a boil. Fill a large bowl with ice water.

Cut the tops off the peppers and reserve. Remove the seeds and membranes. Put the peppers and the tops in the boiling water and cook until just tender, 2 to 3 minutes.

Plunge the peppers into the ice bath. Once cool, remove them and use a sharp knife to carve a jack-o-lantern face into one side of each pepper.

Return the water to a boil, add the macaroni and cook until al dente, about 6 minutes.

Reserve 1 cup of the pasta water and drain (don't rinse the pasta).

Heat the half-and-half in a large saucepan over medium heat until it just comes to a simmer. Continue simmering until reduced to about 3/4 cup, about 10 minutes. Add the cream cheese and stir until melted. Whisk in the Cheddar until all the cheese is melted and the sauce is smooth.

Off the heat, add the macaroni to the saucepan and stir to combine. Stir in some of the reserved pasta water to thin the sauce if needed. Season with salt if needed. Let sit for 10 minutes, then divide the mac and cheese among the peppers and cap each with a pepper top.

Hot Dog Mummies



Ingredients

One 8-ounce tube crescent dough 8 bun-length hot dogsÄ 1 slice white American cheeseÄ Ketchup and/or mustard

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F.

Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone mat.

Open the crescent dough tube and unroll the dough onto a work surface. Pinch together the seams to create a rectangle. Cut the dough lengthwise into 8 long strips.

Take 1 hot dog and 1 strip of the dough and wind the dough around the hot dog while pulling gently to stretch the dough. Crisscross the dough every so often so it looks like mummy wrappings. Near the end of the hot dog, leave a narrow strip of hot dog exposed so you can add eyes after baking. Place the wrapped dog on the prepared baking sheet and repeat with remaining dough and hot dogs. Bake until golden brown, about 15 minutes.

While hot dogs bake, use the narrow end of a wide piping tip to punch out 16 small rounds of cheese for the mummies' eyes.

Remove the hot dogs from oven. Using a toothpick, smear some ketchup on one side of each cheese round and "glue" it to the open area of the hot dog to create 2 eyes. Using the same toothpick, put a dab of ketchup or mustard in the center of each eye to create a pupil.

St. Louis' Oldest Mexican Restaurant

Fifty-five years ago I was working at a financial institution in Florissant. Four hundred dollars a month was not a great salary, so I found an affordable lunch at a nearby Mexican restaurant. They are still at the same location, and this week we had dinner there with a friend.

In 1966 Jose' Ruiz, and his parents opened their restaurant in north St. Louis County not knowing how many people would drive that far north of the City. In fact, they didn't how how many people were willing to even try Mexican food. It wasn't long until their little four-table restaurant with a small bar was packed.

The Ruiz family always made you feel welcome. They would greet you as if you were family. "Regulars" were acknowledged with their name engraved on a clay mug that hung above the small bar. Dining at Ruiz' was like going to a friends house for dinner.

Fifty-eight years, and four generations, after their humble beginning some things have changed, and some have not. Ruiz Restaurant is still at their same location, but have expanded from one small "shotgun" room to occupy the entire shopping center. You will still have great service, large portions of home cooked food, and sincerely feel like you are part of the family.

The Ruiz menu has something for everyone. You will find some items may differ from the run-of-the-mill Mexican restaurants, after all,



these are home cooked, family recipes. For example, Sue ordered a chicken enchilada, and it was served with a light-

ly spiced mole sauce, rather than a red sauce. I ordered the Plato Chico served with a beef tostada, cheese enchilada and a beef taco. The servings were so large I took the

beef tostada home for lunch the next day.

The obligatory chips and salsa were excellent. The home made chips were seasoned and the salsa was perfection, not too hot, but very tasty. The guacamole was very creamy with a




few chunks of avocado as well. It was obviously made just prior to serving. The margaritas were great, and by the way, it's half price happy hour from 4pm to 6pm.

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Creamy Roasted Tomato Soup & Gouda Grilled Cheese



This tomato soup recipe pairs delicious fall favorites with the comfort of dairy. Serve it with grilled cheese and this delicious duo will have your family begging for more!

Yield: 6 servings Prep Time: 15 minutes

Ingredients:

Tomato Soup:

- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 1 Tbsp. minced garlic
- 4 qts. of cherry tomatoes
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 1 small white onion, sliced
- 1 cup milk (whole milk for a creamier base)
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- ½ cup chicken or vegetable broth
- 1 Tbsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 1 Tbsp. fresh basil, roughly chopped

Grilled Cheese:

- 12 slices whole grain bread
- 12 slices gouda cheese
- 12 slices cheddar cheese
- 3 Tbsp. butter (as needed)

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 425°F.

On two sheet pans, evenly place cherry tomatoes, garlic, and onion. Mix in tomato paste. Drizzle with olive oil, Italian seasoning, salt and pepper.

Place in oven and roast for 20 - 25 minutes or until tomatoes are bursting and onions are beginning to brown and soften. Remove from oven and allow to cool slightly.

While tomatoes are roasting, lay out 12 slices of bread. Spread butter onto one side of each slice of bread. Save for step 7.

Once tomatoes are slightly cooled, blend tomato mixture in a blender until smooth (or desired texture). Pour blended tomatoes into a large stock pot. Repeat until all tomatoes are blended.

Add milk, heavy cream, and broth and stir. Bring mixture to a boil and reduce heat to a simmer. Simmer for 10 - 15 minutes.

While soup is simmering, heat a nonstick skillet on medium heat. Place the buttered side of a slice of bread into the skillet and layer with two slices of gouda cheese and two slices of cheddar cheese. Top with a second slice of bread (with butter side on top). Cook until the bottom slice of bread is golden brown, then flip the grilled cheese over to cook the top slice of bread. Remove from the skillet once both slices of bread on the grilled cheese are golden brown and the cheese is melted. Set on a plate for serving. Repeat step until all sandwiches are cooked.

Remove the soup from heat. Ladle into bowls for serving. Top with a sprinkle of fresh basil and serve with a grilled cheese sandwich.

Additional Tips: Make this dinner your own by using your favorite cheese to make the sandwiches. You can also save time by making the tomato soup recipe in advance. Store the soup in an airtight container in the refrigerator if using within a week, or in the freezer and use in the weeks to come!

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.


Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.


All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

IF THEY COULD TALK – Bellefontaine Cemetery and Arboretum

In 1849 there was a cholera epidemic and there wasn't room to



on April 27, 1850. The dedication was several weeks later. Older graves in St. Louis were reinterred there.

What used to be a one hour buggy ride is now only 8 minutes from downtown to the Bellefontaine Cemetery. The cemetery is made possible through an endowment; it is non-profit non-denominational situated on 314 acres with 14 miles of roads with still having over 100 acres of open land remaining.

We decided to explore on a recent sunny day. We met a guide there (you can also do self-guided) and she drove us around to see the many sculptures, mausoleums, reflective benches and peaceful lakes. Allow at least



two-hours to drive or walk through. Be sure to pick up a map at the stone Willow Gatehouse. The map will provide you with numbered names and descriptions of who is interred in that grave. You will find famous explorers, influential St. Louisians, novelists, baseball team owners, beer barons, philanthropists, politicians, a wealthy madam, union and confederate soldiers, a fur trapper, educator, poet and philosopher, a Titanic survivor, and several Masons. A new white marble family mausoleum is the newest addition; it is secretive for now and the name will be revealed when the matriarch passes and is interred. We will go back to see it. Meanwhile, here are a few of our favorites

#11-Herman C. Luyities (1921). First proprietory drugstore in St. Louis. After a trip to Italy he met a voluptuous model, he proposed, she declined and he professed his love by having a 12 foot marble sculpture made and enclosed in a glass box. H died at age 50 and was buried at her feet. The sculpture is called "The Girl in the Shadowbox.."



#13- David R. Francis (1850-1927) State and Federal Politician; President of the Louisiana Purchase (1904 World's Fair); Mayor of St. Louis; Ambassador to Russia.

#14-Charlotte Dickson and Ellis Wainwright (1924). Beautiful domed cubic building. Walls covered with carved double-leafed bronze, grill and double doors, two burial slabs, with a mosaic floor and ceiling. Ellis was a brewery owner and Charlotte



was called "Most beautiful woman in St. Louis."


