River des Peres Watershed Coalition invites experienced water quality monitors and interested citizens to participate in Bike with Your Boots On on Gravois Creek Greenway in St. Louis!

Join us on September 21 at 9:00 a.m. Meet at the Tesshire Trailhead parking lot at the intersections of Grants Trail and Tesshire Drive, St. Louis, Missouri. No experience in water quality testing is required, but everyone must wear a bike helmet if bike riding. Trained water quality monitors will collect water quality monitoring data from sites and can offer opportunities for new trainees or interested citizens to observe.

Volunteers can bike ride on the greenway trail or drive directly to the monitoring sites. Please bring a water bottle to keep hydrated and be prepared for the possibility of getting your feet wet. We can use the data collected throughout the day to have a snapshot of the health of the River des Peres watershed.

DO YOU OWN A PET?

If you own a dog or cat, or were planning to obtain one soon, you might find the past discussions at City Hall

of some interest.
At the March 21, 1977 meeting of the Board of Alderman there was discussion of the bills relating to dogs and cats. Although nothing was finalized there was some

Mayor Arthur J. Oppenheim made a statement that he had prepared relating to these bills.

- There exists ordinances which prohibit dogs and cats from running at
- large. The Mayor is empowered to contract with a person to perform the duties of a dog warden and such per son has all the powers a policeman except the right to bear arms.
- Relative to the section dealing with rabies, evidence must indicate that a dog or cat has had a current rabies immunization. It would be done through a registration program which we do not have at the present time. He sug-gests there be a mandatory registration program for all dogs and cats. When they are registered, a person will be issued a dog or cat license. Such a license would not be distributed without proof of
- A change in the ordinance whereby a redemption fee be charged which is more than the present fee. At the present time the fee is \$10.00 for a dog or cat

that is picked up on the first offense, \$15.00 thereafter. There are provisions that after the fourth time a complaint is fled and the person brought into court. The present record keeping system is not adequate Mayor Oppenheim sug-gests a \$25,00 redemp-

- tion fee for all offenses Any time a dog or cat is picked up and does not have a tag the owner can be notified a complaint should be filled against this owner and brought
- into court,
 If the ordinance includes no pets in multi-family dwelling then in those cir-cumstances, a grandfather clause to be included. New people moving in would not be allowed to have pets. Present occu-pants would not be allowed to secure another pet if theirs dies. These are only sugges-

tions presented by Mayor Op-penheim to the Board of Al-

There are several mem-bers of the audience who spoke in favor of pets and the right to have them in multi-family dwellings. Some in the audience did not feel that they should be punished be-cause a few were not good citizens. If you have any suggestions tell your alderman or let us know and we will put your idea into print.



After more than three decades in public education, Brentwood High School Principal Dr. Edward Johnson will retire at the end of the 2025-26 school year.



"Serving as principal of Brentwood High School has been one of the greatest honors of my life," Dr. Johnson said. "The Brentwood community is truly special because of the connections we share — among students,

staff, families and community members. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve in a role that has strengthened those connections while supporting students as they grow, achieve and carry the spirit of Brentwood into the world."

Dr. Johnson attended the Ladue School District from kindergarten through 12th grade and graduated from Ladue Horton Watkins High School in 1987. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and management from Missouri Baptist University before turning to education as his lifelong career.

He began as a substitute teacher in St. Louis Public Schools before returning to his alma mater, Ladue Horton Watkins High School, where he worked for two years as a supervisory aide while earning his teaching certification. He then transitioned to teaching physical education and coaching football and basketball.

In his final year at Ladue, Dr. Johnson served as an administrative intern — an experience that confirmed his passion for educational leadership. During his nine years there, he discovered the impact he could have beyond athletics and made the decision to pursue school administration.

In 2005, Dr. Johnson joined the Brentwood School District as assistant principal of Brentwood High School and Brentwood Middle School. The following year, he became the high school's assistant principal and athletic director, serving in that dual role for eight years before being named principal of Brentwood High School.



As principal, Dr. Johnson has guided the school through more than a decade of achievement and resilience. Under his leadership, Brentwood High School has been recognized as a Missouri Gold

Star School and a National Blue Ribbon School, consistently ranking among the state's top-performing schools in student learning, growth and achievement.



Even in times of adversity, including the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Johnson kept the focus on excellence in teaching and learning. His work

to strengthen the academic program, foster teacher leadership and build meaningful relationships has helped create a culture of collaboration and pride that defines Brentwood High School today.

Outside of school, Dr. Johnson enjoys spending time with his wife, Dr. Tiffany Taylor-Johnson, who currently serves as director of student services for the Ladue School District. Their son, Tristen, a freshman at St. Louis University High School, keeps them busy with football, basketball, and track and field.



"As I look ahead to retirement, I am excited to spend more time with my family and to support Tristen in all of his endeavors," Dr. Johnson said.

"I will always cherish my time in Brentwood
— the relationships, the partnerships and the
memories — and I look forward to cheering
on the Eagles for years to come."

Demeterius Thompson's Journey from Brentwood Freshman to College Football Commit

When Demeterius Thompson first walked the Brentwood School District hallways, he made an impression before ever stepping onto the field.



"I'm originally from the city, but we moved to Brentwood because my mom wanted a better life for me, my eighthgrade year," Thompson said. "When I got to high school, freshman year, coach (Chris) Robin saw me and he's like, 'Dude, you got to

play football.""

Now a senior, Thompson has become a household name for Brentwood-Clayton football. A dynamic, do-it-all standout whose athleticism, work ethic and determination have captured attention far beyond the St. Louis area.

"In the second week of practice his first year here, I said, 'I think you might be the first Division I kid I ever coach," Brentwood-Clayton associate head coach Chris Robin said. "And here we are."

Thompson is a true three-sport athlete. Last winter, he led the area in rebounds for the Brentwood boys basketball team. In the spring, he won the Class



2 Triple Jump State Championship. Then, just three minutes after stepping off the podium, he was already preparing for what came next.

"He has all these physical abilities most guys don't have," Robin said.

Still, it's football that holds Thompson's heart and his future.

"I built a love for the game that made me want to pursue it at the next level," Thompson shared. "My mom won't be able to pay for college. Now that I'll have the opportunity to go to college, I would be the first in my family to do that. It means something to me."

He spent the summer with coach Robin, traveling the country to showcase his talent from Kansas State, to Mizzou, to a 3 a.m. wake-up call for a camp in Memphis.

"Every time he went somewhere, he was impressing people," Robin said. "He keeps showing what he's capable of. Every time he gets in front of one of these major coaches, they're really impressed, seeing what we've seen for a long time."

In late July, Thompson made a verbal commitment to Southeast Missouri State University.

"Their term 'brick by brick' stuck to me a lot," Thompson said. "It reminded me how I grew up. My mom, single mother of three, I grew up with her. From where we came to where we are now, it's been a very slow process of each brick being laid down bit by bit. Something about their culture and how I grew up, it makes me want it."

With a college commitment in place and his senior season ahead, Thompson's story is far from over.

"The sky's the limit for this kid," said Robin.

No injuries were reported in the incident, and the cause of the fire remains unknown at this time.



Director Gruenenfelder noted that participation in this program and award recognition came from work of the Sustainability Commission and that we are just a step away from the Silver and then Gold designation due to the city's commitment to solar panels and power in the city.

No action was needed on this matter.

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS

Mayor David Dimmitt offered congratulations to the Police Department for achieving the designation of a Blue Shield City. This speaks highly of our police department.

Stated there are lots of events going on in the Parks – like Summer Beats – and he encourage people to please join in.

Alderman David Plufka - Ward 1 noted that the Parks Department will close Brentwood Park to implement a goose management program and asked if this item could be addressed at this time, prior to implementation. Board members had no objection to discussing at this time.

Alderman Plufka stated there should be conversation about who our partners are in this project, how we go to this remediation, and what is going to happen on Wednesday.

Parks Director Gruenenfelder stated that they have been dealing with this matter since 2018, starting with the gateway fountain. He shared that there are lots of mitigation options (presentation available in BoardDocs) such as habitat modification, mylar tape, nets, dogs, lasers, pyrotechnics, air horns, chemical repellants nest and egg destruction (to avoid imprinting) and capture. We have done this.

The Department of Agriculture has a wildlife program that has been here and helped us before. They used lasers first, then they used pyrotechnics (like a cap gun) to scare them. But the population is increasing, and they are occupying the park.

USDA recommended the goose capture, which is our next step. They recommend this happen in June during molting season when they don't fly. The USDA handles it all. Baby geese are captured and imprinted on a new location. Adult geese are killed and given to food bank.

Alderman Plufka asked what strategies were used at the fountain. The Director responded that mylar tape, wolf & owl statues, the blinking lights to deter – all of which are ineffective in the park. We have done them with no success.

Alderwoman Goad asked to confirm there was not a way to just take away the juvenile geese. The response was that since adults have imprinted here and keep laying eggs and then the young are imprinting here, to correct the cycle is the reason for getting rid of the adults too.

The reason for the park closure is to keep the distraction to a minimum. Discussion ended.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Presentation of FY 2024 Audit ending 12/31/24 – Andrew Zebell with Clifton, Larson & Allen (CLA) presented information (virtually)

Andrew stated he met with Ways and Means Committee and then gave highlights of presentation. He noted they did the financial statement as well as single audits this year making mention it was a clean audit report, and we are getting much better. The audit work is complete.

Director DePew commented the audit went well and there were no management corrections. We (the city) were able to take back the work CLA had previously done for us for fixed assets, etc.

Mayor Dimmitt commented that this was a great job and that this was done very timely. He thanked the department. It was noted we need to approve this and send it to the agencies by the end of June.

Creamy Butternut Squash Pasta

Grab a bowl of this cozy, comforting fall dinner.



INGREDIENTS

1/4 cup salted butter

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 cup walnuts, chopped

3 cloves garlic, chopped

1 Tbsp. chopped sage, plus more for garnish

6 cups cubed butternut squash (about 30 0z. cubed)

1 tsp. kosher salt, plus more for pasta water

1/2 tsp. ground black pepper, plus more to taste

2 cups chicken broth

1/4 cup heavy cream

1 lb. penne pasta

1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese, plus more serving

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place the butter in a medium pot (with a lid) over medium heat. Let melt, then add the olive oil and walnuts. Cook until the walnuts are lightly toasted and the butter is golden brown, 2 to 3 minutes. Use a slotted spoon to transfer the walnuts to a paper towel lined plate.
- 2. Add the garlic and sage to the pot and cook briefly until golden and aromatic, about 1 minute. Add the squash, broth, salt and pepper. Bring to a simmer, then cover and cook for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the squash is fork tender.
- 3. Transfer the squash mixture to a blender. Cover, then remove the top insert from the lid and cover with a kitchen towel (to let steam escape). Puree until very smooth, about 1 minute.
- 4. Meanwhile, bring a large pot of water to a boil. Season with salt. Add the pasta and reduce to medium heat (just simmering). Cook 1 minute less than the package directions. Reserve 1/2 cup of the pasta water then drain the pasta in a colander.
- 5. Return the large pot to medium heat. Add the butternut squash sauce, heavy cream, cooked pasta and 1/4 cup of the pasta water and parmesan cheese. Stir gently with a rubber spatula, until the sauce has thickened slightly and is coating the pasta, about 2 minutes. (Add more pasta water to reach desired consistency). Season with more salt and pepper to taste.
- 6. Serve immediately topped with more chopped sage, parmesan cheese, and the reserved walnuts.

Meet the Spirits of Soulard at **Inaugural Neighborhood Ghost Tour**

Walking tour on September 27 invites adults to explore Soulard's most haunted locations



Behind Soulard's historic houses, lively bars and restaurants, and iconic landmarks lurks a chilling past that will be revealed for the first time during an inaugural ghost tour September 27, 2025. Tickets are now on sale.

Presented by the Historical Committee of the Soulard Restoration Group (SRG)—Soulard's largest advocacy group and neighborhood association—the "Spirits of Soulard" walking tour will introduce adults ages 18 and older to the area's spookiest spots and the spirits who call them home.

Tours begin at Pieces Board Game Bar & Restaurant located at 2727 South 12th Street near the Anheuser-Busch campus. Starting at 5 p.m., five groups of 20 will depart on foot every 20 minutes, led by Soulard residents who are well-acquainted with the neighborhood's haunted history.

The two-hour guided walking tour is 10 blocks long and covers five stops, including:

- A vacant lot, once home to a Civil War hospital and a longlost estate destroyed by fire, where a mysterious mist has been seen rising from the ground.
- A grand mansion built in the 1870s by an Austrian physician, whose spirit is said to still roam the grounds, including the underground tunnels.
- A former bar where a laborer who died in a gruesome industrial accident is rumored to linger, tirelessly working on the property.
- Homeowners will share the spine-tingling stories of events that occurred at each stop as well as their own personal encounters with the paranormal. All tours will conclude at Pieces Board Game Bar & Restaurant.

"As one of the oldest neighborhoods in St. Louis, virtually every Soulard address has been the site of a death," said historical researcher Neil Putz. "This inaugural tour offers a blend of real history and bone-chilling tales of mysterious encounters with spirits and unexplained phenomena. Adults looking to explore the dark side of Soulard will not want to miss it."

Spirits of Soulard tickets can be purchased for \$40 on the SRG website. All proceeds from ticket sales support SRG activities, including neighborhood beautification and historic preservation. With only 100 tickets available, the event is expected to sell out quickly.










Satisfying Smoothies Help Power Your Day

Milk and dairy foods provide essential nutrients that all individuals need. From calcium that helps keep bones strong to B vitamins that help bodies use carbohydrates, proteins and fats for fuel, all 13 essential nutrients found in milk are vital for overall health. And, while consuming dairy is as simple as drinking a glass of milk or adding a slice of cheese to a sandwich, there are fun and creative ways to work a serving of dairy into your daily routine. Enter smoothies!

In recent years, the popularity of smoothies has continued to rise. Combining milk and yogurt with fruits (and even vegetables) has helped individuals boost their dairy servings along with other food groups. Smoothies are both an easy grab-n-go option for busy work mornings and a quick-fix breakfast that powers brains and bodies for the day ahead.

Servin' Up Smoothies in Schools

Schools have also jumped on the rising popularity of this creamy beverage. Smoothies offered in schools contain a serving of milk (which is required at both breakfast and lunch), a serving of meat/meat alternates (think protein), and a serving of a fruit or a vegetable. These delicious drinks are the perfect option for students making their way through the breakfast line or looking for a lunch item to help power them through the afternoon. "When you consider the 13 essential nutrients found in milk, along with the protein in yogurt, smoothies provide lasting nutrition and at least one full serving of dairy for the day," said Maggie Nosic, nutrition educator with St. Louis District Dairy Council (SLDDC). The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommends individuals consume 3 servings of dairy every day. One cup of milk, one cup of yogurt and 1.5 ounces of cheese each count as one serving.

"Servin' Up Smoothies" grants were recently offered throughout St. Louis District Dairy Council's 131-county service area, and 20 local schools were awarded grants. Each school received an immersion blender, mixing bucket and recipes suited for school breakfast and lunch. Schools will offer smoothies at least two days per week and all smoothie recipes will meet school nutrition requirements. "The Servin' Up Smoothies grant is the perfect opportunity for school cafeterias to provide milk and yogurt to their students in a creative and delicious way," Nosic said.

Creating Sensational Smoothies

When creating smoothies at home, make sure to include foods from multiple food groups. This variety will help deliver many different nutrients needed for optimal health. Start with a base of three ingredients, such as milk, yogurt and fruit. Ingredients can then be added to the base. Some SLDDC favorites include chocolate peanut butter banana smoothie (made with chocolate milk, yogurt, banana and peanut butter), strawberry banana smoothie (made with milk, strawberry yogurt, strawberries, banana and spinach) and mango avocado smoothie (made with milk, yogurt, mango, banana, avocado and honey). Finally, don't be afraid to try new combinations, such as your favorite flavored milk or yogurt, or seasonal fresh produce like peaches, avocados or even kale!

Blend until smooth.


















Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.






