BRENTWOOD CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH IS CLOSING

The Brentwood Congregational Church at Brentwood and Eulalie has been sold to Christ Church STL. Brentwood Congregational will hold their last Sunday Service on September 19, 2021 at 11:00 a.m. Everyone is invited.

The Brentwood Congregational Church has been in Brentwood since 1903 when



it was "planted" as a Sunday School by the First Congregational Church of Webster Groves. The Church grew but had to close in 1918 due to the flu epidemic. The Church was reopened in 1922 and purchased the property at 2400 S. Brentwood at Eulalie in 1924 and a basement church for worship was completed in 1930. The sanctuary was built in 1940 and dedicated in 1941. The bell in the belfry was purchased in 1910 and is still in use today. During the 1950s and 1960s, the Church had "Teen Town" and the Catholic Church had "CYC" dances to keep the youth of Brentwood busy.

Over the years, the Church held annual Craft Fairs, Chili Dinners, Rummage Sales, Lenten Dinners, Men's Breakfasts during Lent, Birthday Luncheons and made and sold "candied dill pickles". They always had a booth at Maddenfest/Brentwood Days and participated in Community celebrations. These activities were used to support the Church's mission of serving God by helping others. The Church helped to support; Evangelical Children's Home (Every Child's Hope), Neighborhood Houses (Unleashing Potential), Emmaus Homes, Board of Religious Organizations, Church Women United, Habitat for Humanity, Brentwood School District Christmas gifts, Lydia's House, Aid Africa, Deaconess Foundation, Fit and Food Connection, Webster Rock Hill Ministries, Heifer Project and Interfaith Partnership of St. Louis. The past several years as the congregation aged, the membership became less. The members decided to sell the church building. When searching for a buyer, the Church required two things: 1) The building remains a church and 2) the Brentwood Christian Childcare remain in operation. Christ Church STL had been renting from the church and they made an offer to purchase the building. Although, Christ Church agreed to let the members of Brentwood Congregational Church continue to meet in the building, the congregation decided to disband and continue our spiritual lives elsewhere. Christ Church meets at 9:00 a.m. and will welcome visitors. Please join the members of Brentwood Congregational Church on Sunday, September 19th at 11:00 a.m. for their final Church Service.

New entertainment club holds preview party fundraiser to benefit nonprofit's food pantry

Jewish Family Services (JFS), which provides mental health and social services for all St. Louisans, recently received a \$35,000 donation from a preview party hosted by the Staenberg Group at its new music club The Factory. Proceeds from the fundraiser will support the JFS' Harvey Kornblum Jewish Food Pantry.

The Factory is a \$25 million, 52,000-square-foot music venue that recently opened at 17105 North Outer 40 Rd. in Chesterfield, Mo. The two-level building – which will feature 25 shows during the 2021 season and more than 160 shows in 2022 – can hold up to 3,000 guests and is available for corporate events and private parties. The Factory is one of the anchors in the 40-acre space called The District, an entertainment and dining complex created by owner Michael Staenberg and The Staenberg Group.

The preview party also raised funds for Feed My People, a Christian food pantry and help center. "The reason we chose one of the two food pantries to be the Jewish Food Pantry is because of the outstanding job that they do in a variety of areas within St. Louis County both west and north," Staenberg said. "They have been around for over forty years, and they are very inclusive. You do not need to be Jewish to go there ... Everyone is Welcome."

Founded in 1871, JFS is a multiservice nonprofit that supports families and seniors, alleviates hunger, and improves mental health for all St. Louisans. The organization serves individuals and families in crisis, as well as helps seniors remain independent and connected to the community. JFS – which supports the emotional and physical well-being of more than 50,000 area children, families, and seniors annually – provides hunger relief through its Harvey Kornblum Jewish Food Pantry (HKJFP).

"Michael Staenberg has been a long-time supporter of JFS and our continuous efforts to serve the community," said JFS Chief Executive Officer Miriam Seidenfeld. "We truly appreciate his ability to bring people together and make this significant donation, which allows us to provide comprehensive assistance to those who are experiencing life's challenges."

Grow Solar Program Hits First Benchmark for 2021

Bulk Purchase Program Helps New Solar Buyers Learn and Save, Benchmark Unlocks More Savings

Group-buy solar programs Grow Solar St. Louis and Grow Solar Metro East hit their first benchmark with more than 50 kilowatts of solar scheduled to be installed throughout the region, which means more savings for participants.

Grow Solar St. Louis and Grow Solar Metro East are sister group-buy discount and education programs that help make navigating the solar industry simpler and more affordable. The goal of these programs is to bring property owners around the Gateway region together to lower the price of solar while simultaneously increasing the deployment of clean energy. With support of community organizers such as Missouri Botanical Garden, Midwest Renewable Energy Association, Washington University in St. Louis, Madison County Building & Zoning, Glen Carbon Cool Cities Committee, Sierra Club Piasa Palisades Group, Godfrey Climate Protection and Energy Efficiency Committee, and the Collinsville Cool Cities Committee, the Grow Solar program hopes to have the St. Louis and Metro East regions shining brighter with renewable solar energy. Reaching the 50-kW goal means a \$0.05 per watt discount for all participants. All of this is in addition to federal incentives that can cover a large portion of the cost of going solar. While there are many reasons residents are choosing to go solar these days, the environmental and financial impacts have never made a better case. The Grow Solar programs enable residents to save resources and improve local energy security, conserve energy, and reduce long-term energy costs. These dual programs have resulted in over 350 installations on homes and businesses in the Gateway region since 2016. Through a competitive selection process, an advisory committee chose St. Louis-based StraightUp Solar as the program's solar installer. They offer high quality solar installations, certifications for solar work, and emphasize education and customer service. StraightUp Solar also has an excellent history in working in solar group buy programs and is familiar with the region.

We're writing today to share some news with you, our dedicated supporters. Yesterday, The Rep and the St. Louis community lost a true champion of the theatre when we said goodbye to our dear friend, longtime Rep Artistic Director Steve Woolf. After a short illness, Steve passed away Monday, July 12 at the age of 75.

As members of our Rep family, it's likely you saw Steve at the theatre, always a fixture at every production, greeting the audience or swaying to the music in the back of a crowded house. Steve became Artistic Director of The Rep in 1986, during a period of struggle for the organization. He and his small staff worked tirelessly to stabilize the theatre both financially and artistically, and over the course of his 33 years, he built The Rep into the thriving organization it has become today.

Always focused on creating unmatched art for the St. Louis community, Steve brought more than 300 shows to The Rep stages, directing dozens himself including Arcadia, Death of a Salesman, Red, The Diary of Anne Frank, Oslo and many, many more. In his long and lauded career, Steve was recognized with many distinctions, culminating in Lifetime Achievement Awards from both the Arts and Education Council and Arts for Life. His contribution to The Rep, St. Louis, and the national theatre community cannot be overstated.

Upon his retirement from The Rep in 2017, he mused "It's not often you get to live your dream, but I've been able to do just that at The Rep. My life's work has been about the theatre, and making it all come together has been a grand experience. Our theatre has had major successes and some bumps in the road. But through it all, I've had fun – it's too hard a gig not to have fun. I am wildly proud to have been a part of the collective effort that has built our institution into a community leader."

We are honored to have played a small part in Steve's enduring legacy. It was truly a thrill to watch him come alive in the rehearsal room, full of anticipation, wonder and awe at the magic of his cherished art form. He was an artist, an icon and a dreamer through and through.

The Rep family is saddened by the loss of our longtime leader. We will miss you, our wonderful friend.

"Pretty good" Jordan Walker earning rave reviews in quickly becoming one of Cardinals top prospects

PEORIA, Ill. – It was the sound that provided Chris Swauger's introduction to Jordan Walker.

Just a few weeks after the Cardinals selected Walker in the first round of last year's amateur draft, he was invited to be part of the organization's alternate site camp during the canceled minor-league season.

Swauger was there too, as one of the instructors. After clearing COVID quarantine, he walked from the clubhouse into right field during a scrimmage at the camp in Springfield, Mo. Walker happened to be batting, but Swauger didn't know that at the time.

"I wasn't watching, but it sounded like a shotgun went off," Swauger said. "I looked up and saw the ball clear the wall. I looked at the plate and said, 'I don't know that guy... who is that?"

"Joey Hawkins (another instructor) said, 'That's Walker, the guy we just drafted in the first round.' I said, 'Out of high school?' When Joey said yes, I just looked again and said, 'That's pretty good."

Swauger got to see plenty more of Walker last summer as the then 18-year-old native of Georgia took full advantage of being at the camp, the only place for him to gain experience in what normally would have been a year spent in the lowest levels of the minor leagues.

Walker and Swauger were reunited just over a month ago when Walker, after ripping through low Class A pitching for 27 games at Palm Beach, was promoted to the high A Peoria Chiefs, where Swauger is the manager.

In Walker's first few weeks at the higher level, Swauger has learned that his initial opinion that Walker was "pretty good" is proving be an accurate scouting report.

"Everything he's done has been really impressive," Swauger said. "It makes you understand why he was drafted where he was."

High expectations? No problem

While Swauger's introduction to Walker came from the sound of his bat hitting a long home run, the first impression most people get from Walker is his physical size. Two months after his 19th birthday, Walker stands 6-foot-5 and weighs 230 pounds.

"What's most impressive is how big he is, but how he is still able to organize his body athletically," Swauger said. "A lot of guys that big struggle with what somebody once called 'baby giraffe legs' syndrome. He doesn't have that. He moves around like a guy who is 3-to-4 inches shorter than he is. That's just how fluid he is."

A third baseman, Walker arrived in Peoria with the high expectations that come with being a first-round draft pick, the 21st overall selection in last year's draft. He turned down a scholarship to Duke to sign with the Cardinals for a reported bonus of \$2.9 million. After only three months of games, Walker was recently ranked as the 45th best prospect in all of the minors by Baseball America. Derek Walker believes there are reasons for his son's quick success – and his ascension into the ranks as one of the game's best prospects. The first was the transition that began last summer in Springfield, followed by the fact Walker doesn't pay much attention to expectations or rankings.

"He's humble by nature, and has always been that way," Derek Walker said. "He grew up introverted or shy if you want to use that word. He didn't want to be in the spotlight. Even in high school as he started to get more attention, he really didn't want it.

"He has loved baseball for a long, long time ... It just so happens that his talent and makeup has blessed him to be able to get there (the pros). He's been pretty focused and dedicated for a long time.

"He's also a very smart kid. He's pretty dedicated in whatever he does. He did well in school. He's always been driven."

When Walker was growing up, his parents put him on the same athletic teams in soccer and baseball as his brother, who is 2 years older than Walker.

"He always held his own," Derek Walker said. "He was the goalie in soccer because he was the most mobile kid on the team and he could stop the ball and kick the ball really far. In baseball we saw a little of the high-level ability. That's probably where it started.

"He's always had a pretty high baseball IQ and when he got to high school you could really see him become more serious about the sport ... In school and in sports, my wife and I kind of pushed him that if you are going to do it, do it the right way. Put the time in or don't do it.

"We told him to find what he liked and what he had interest in and go forward. Try different things, and what you don't like we will stop doing, but we will then double down on the

things that you do enjoy, but you've got to work hard at it."

Walker has continued to do that, and his rise on the prospect rankings reflect how hard he has worked. It might also be due in part to the fact he wasn't as well known as some other players coming into last year's draft. He did not have as much history on the showcase circuit, with his dad saying the term he heard from scouts in the summer of 2019 about his son was "raw." Then came the pandemic in the spring of 2020, which stopped Walker's senior high school season after just a dozen games.

"In some sense he's had to catch up over the last couple of years," said Derek Walker.

He's doing so now in a hurry – but the increasing attention is not affecting Walker or his serious approach to his job. with him the rest of his career.

"I just saw a pitch I wanted to hit and tried to hit it hard," Walker said. "It was all a blur honestly. It was a pretty exciting moment."

Walker's time at Palm Beach included facing major-league pitchers Noah Syndergaard and Jacob deGrom when they were making rehab starts. Walker can brag that he hit two foul balls off deGrom before striking out.

"It was a pretty tough at-bat, but it was definitely a highlight getting to face him," Walker said.

Against the low A pitchers, however, Walker had more success – connecting for six homers and posting a .374 average in 99 at-bats before his promotion – in a league that notoriously is tough on hitters. One of his home runs came with an exit velocity of 116.2 miles per hour. According to Baseball America, only 16 major-leaguers have hit a ball harder than that this season.

Learning from his mistakes

Since arriving in Peoria, Walker has homered twice in his first 20 games as he is adjusting to better, and older, pitchers, most with at least a couple of years of professional experience. After missing a week in mid July with back soreness, Walker has posted a .324 average (12-of-37) in his last nine games.

He is learning from his mistakes, something else Swauger is happy to see.

"There's no better teacher than the game," Swauger said. "You talk about situations, go over fundamentals, harp on little details, but those situations and tough times coming up at game speed, you just can't simulate that. When a guy makes a mistake that in that moment costs us an out or a run, those are great teaching moments for guys.


"Everybody here is building a rolodex of experience which then turns into instincts. When anybody makes a mistake, that is going to help them learn and be a better player down the road."

Swauger already has seen similarities between Walker and one of his former players, Dylan Carlson, who is having a solid rookie season in the major leagues with the Cardinals at the age of 22.

"When Carlson struggled, he had to kind of learn what made him good," Swauger said. "It was awesome to be able to do that in A ball. If you can check that box early in your career it makes the adjustments a lot easier.

Some players wilt from the pressure that comes with those expectations. That hasn't been the case so far for Walker. He believes a big part of the reason for that comes from the way he was raised by his parents, Derek and Katrina.

"My mom was all about your mind, not just your body," Walker said. "I really do appreciate that from her. My dad always told me that hard work would pay off. He lives by that. ... The biggest thing, I think, is just being around the right people.

"I know people who had coaches that made them hate the game of baseball. I've had coaches who baseball was their favorite sport. Just having people around you who know the game and love it as much as you do is probably the biggest thing that has helped me."

Derek Walker is happy to see that his son's career is off to such a great start.

"It's better than even we expected it to be," he said. "It's sort of surpassed our expectations. He's always been a pretty mature kid so we didn't expect there to be any issues with him being off on his own, but what we didn't know was about the rigors of the pro ball life, the wear and tear it would take. So far that hasn't been the case ... he's very much exceeded where we thought he would be at 19." "It's best for me not to think about it (the rankings and expectations," Walker said. "When I start thinking about that, I start trying to do too much. I do my best not to look at the rankings at all. I don't really care about that too much.

"I just try to play my game and keep on having success with whatever I'm doing. I just try to repeat that. I think that's the most difficult part, trying to do it consistently. If I focus on that, I feel like success will come."

Part of the expectations for Walker's success were a result of the fact that on the first pitch he saw in his first pro game for Palm Beach in May, he hit a home run. That's a fact which is going to stick

"Walker's maturity reminds me a lot of what Dylan was like. I'm not trying to put the two together, but just the underlying confidence and the ability to deal with failure when they make mistakes – not let it carry over at-bat to at-bat or a mistake on defense that carries over. His (Walker's) ability to process and move on and learn, you don't see that a lot with guys out of high school.

"He never really looks overmatched. He will have a tough atbat, but he bounces back. His mindset is really good at keeping the vision of what he's here to do and what he's working on. He's very intentional about his work every day."

Having fun on the field

Part of what Walker knows has made him successful to this point in both his high school and pro career is how much fun he has on a daily basis.

"I love everything about being here," he said. "You've got to enjoy it. When you are doing what you love, it's pretty cool. I wouldn't trade this for anything in the world right now."

There's no doubt one of the reasons Walker always seems to have a smile on his face is being able to spend so much time with Masyn Winn. The two were together at the alternate site camp, after first becoming acquainted on the showcase circuit when they were in high school. Winn, who plays next to Walker at shortstop, also was with him in Palm Beach before he too was promoted to Peoria.

Winn, the Cardinals' second-round pick last summer out of a Texas high school, also does not hide how much fun he has playing the game and getting to play with Walker.

"People ask us what we're doing out there on the field, they see us talking so much," Winn said. "We have a running talk between every pitch out there. When we were at Palm Beach and were in a game at Daytona, I looked over at him and said, 'Hey you got a really big old head.'

"Then a ball gets blasted at him, he dives and makes a play, then in the fourth inning I think, he comes up and hits a 450foot home run."

Walker in turn chided Winn about the speed of one of his throws from shortstop to first.

"We just can't look at each other and not laugh," Winn said. "He's a big teddy bear, a genuine person. I'm the bigger goofball.

"The thing about Jordan is that he's 19, a young 19, and he doesn't know he isn't supposed to be hitting 450-foot home runs. That isn't supposed to happen yet."

When Winn hit his first home run at Peoria, Walker, the next hitter, was waiting for him at home plate and almost was more excited than Winn.

"Jordan is a quiet kid but he's a relationship kid," said his father. "A lot of his success in high school was because his closest friends were on the baseball team with him. Masyn and a couple of other guys represent the same thing.

"He likes to be around kids who are highly competitive who love the game as much as he does and who like to have fun. Masyn is very much like that. They play off each other very well. They make a great team."

The pairing of Walker and Winn and their relationship is similar to that of the players generally considered the top two prospects in the Cardinals organization, childhood friends Nolan Gorman and Matthew Liberatore, now together at Memphis.

"I hope they get the opportunity to kind of be a pair going forward as long as possible," Derek Walker said. "I think they make each other better because they play off each other so well."

The ability to have success, have fun, and remain humble in the process, is something Walker's older teammates have noticed about him.

"What sticks out to me is just how physical he is at such a young age," said Chandler Redmond. "And he is a lot more mature than a typical 19-year-old. He handles his fame really well and he's an unbelievable player. "He interacts really well with people and is always super respectful. I just see how good of a guy he is. He's not bothered with fans wanting him to sign stuff. Even on days when he doesn't get a hit, he's got 20 people outside the gates trying to get him to sign something and he signs it with a smile on his face." Walker intends to keep smiling. He knows where he is, and he knows where he wants to go - and what he needs to do to get there. "All I can control right now is progressing myself as a player," Walker said. "I will just let it play out on how I do in the game and how I progress." Added Derek Walker, "If I had to script it I couldn't have scripted it better; from getting drafted by the Cardinals, to the ability to go to the alternate site camp, to the way it's worked out this year in Palm Beach and Peoria. In my wildest dreams I wouldn't have thought it would have worked out this way."



St. Louis Area Diaper Bank to Hold Second Annual Underpants Dance

Nonprofit to raise funds for its diaper bank and period supplies program

The St. Louis Area Diaper Bank will host its second annual Underpants Dance on Fri., Oct. 22 from 6 to 10 p.m. The hybrid fundraiser offers an in-person experience at the Palladium St. Louis located at 1400 Park Place, as well as an at-home option. The in-person evening includes a cocktail hour, sit-down dinner, and a live auction. Proceeds will go toward purchasing diapers and menstrual hygiene products for the organization.

The Underpants Dance will honor three Champions of Change for their outstanding efforts and dedication during the COVID-19 pandemic to alleviate diaper need and period poverty in the region. The three honorees include Operation Food Search, the Saint Louis County Library, and the 2020 St. Louis Area Diaper Bank volunteers and staff.



The St. Louis Area Diaper Bank collects, stores, and distributes 250,000 free diapers per month to struggling families through a network of 56 community, nonprofit, educational and health care partners serving low-income women and children. To date more than 5.1 million diapers have been distributed in St. Louis including nearly 900,000 diapers during the height of the pandemic.

The St. Louis Alliance for Period Supplies (STL APS) is a Diaper Bank program that collaborates with the Alliance for Period Supplies to ensure access to menstrual hygiene products. The STL APS program distributes period supplies through community partners, as well as advocates for the elimination of "period poverty". To date more than 450,000 period supplies have been distributed in St. Louis, with 10,800 period supplies allocated each week. Last year two-thirds of low-income women in St. Louis could not afford menstrual hygiene products, with 46% of low-income women having to choose between food and period supplies.

Founded in 2014, the St. Louis Area Diaper Bank provides diaper access to the region's low-income families, as well as raises community awareness about the causes and consequences of diaper need. The nonprofit is a member of the National Diaper Bank Network, a nationwide nonprofit dedicated to eliminating diaper need and "period poverty" in America. The St. Louis Alliance for Period Supplies (STL APS) ensures access to menstrual hygiene products, which allows full participation in daily life with dignity.

"We're two young guys going on this journey through pro ball," Winn said. "We talk about five years from now, how incredible it would be to be in the World Series and winning a ring some day as teammates."

And a note about protecting your personal information

A Note from Major Hawkins Bureau of Community Policing Commander, Brentwood Police

Well, well, if the heat of the summer isn't just as delightful as the biting cold of our winters. Hello again, Brentwood Community, I hope everyone is well. The increase in COVID-19 cases has everyone on high alert again, but be assured we are still taking universal precautions.

I received an email regarding an incident at our Shell station on Manchester, and I was asked to share it. An elderly gentlemen was checking out and paying for his purchase when he noticed someone standing in line with him had taken a photo of his credit card. Luckily, the gentleman suffered no loss, and was able to change cards. Please continue to be vigilant when you are out shopping and keep a close eye on your personal information and documents.

As many or most of you already know, the St. Louis region has been plagued with an increase in vehicle crimes over the last several years. These crimes primarily include auto thefts and thefts from autos, but can also include violent crime such as armed carjackings. In fact, we see a great many of these criminals are armed even when committing "non-violent" crimes.

This uptick in crime is not exclusive to Brentwood or St. Louis County by any means. It is common in St. Charles County, Jefferson County, and parts of Illinois just over the river. The overwhelming majority of the thefts from autos and stolen autos here in Brentwood have targeted unlocked vehicles with valuables or

keys inside. The official position of Brentwood Police is that residents and visitors should ALWAYS lock their vehicles, ALWAYS store valuables out of sight, and NEVER keep firearms or extra vehicle keys inside of your vehicle, whether it is locked or not.

We have also noticed an increase in garage door opener thefts from vehicles, often in the middle of the night, while the vehicle is in a resident's driveway. This is obviously concerning because it suggests these individuals may attempt to gain access to attached garages while unsuspecting residents are asleep. We STRONGLY encourage you to keep your garage door openers with you, as you would your keys or firearm, especially if you do not park in a secured garage. Also, please ensure you routinely lock the door from your garage to your home. I do this religiously (or, as my fiancé calls it - obsessively) each evening before bed.

Another tip I received was actually from my parents (proud kid moment ©) who told me if you store your vehicle keys in a metal container within your home, criminals are not able to access vehicle fob codes to steal or enter your vehicles.



Enter a cell phone number, landline number and/or email address and select the types of weather warnings you wish to receive. There is no charge to residents or businesses for this service.






Peggy Viehland Fossett '62, Posthumous - Philanthropist - CARMEL, CA

After graduating from Webster College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music Education, Peggy met and married her husband, Steve, who was in graduate school at Washington University. She taught music in the St. Louis area for a year. In New York in the late sixties, Peggy worked on Wall Street as a textiles analyst for E.I. DuPont Brokerage Company. Peggy and Steve eventually settled in Chicago, where she worked for First Chicago Bank in portfolio management and

retired there as a Vice President.

Peggy's husband became a famous aviation adventurer who set more than 115 new world records in five sports and died in a tragic plane crash in 2007. The Peggy and Steve Fossett Foundation has generously contributed to the BHS Scholarship Fund. Peggy passed away October 17, 2017.



Allen C. Harper '63 - DURANGO, CO

Mr. Harper has more than forty years of business experience, primarily in the areas of real estate sales and management, development, rail transportation, and tourism. In 1984 he was principally employed as Chairman, President, and as a principal Shareholder of First Reserve, Inc., the holding company for Esslinger Wooten Maxwell, Inc., a residential and commercial real estate brokerage and management firm based in Coral Gables, Florida. First Reserve also owned Embassy Financial Services, Inc., a mortgage company, and Columbia Title, Inc. In 2003, the company was sold to Home Services, Inc., an affiliate company of the well-known Warren Buffet organization, Berkshire Hathaway. Mr. Harper

remains as Chairman Emeritus of Esslinger Wooten Maxwell Realtors and is an active broker of commercial investment properties.

From 1989-2005 he served as a Director on the Tri-County Rail Authority, a Florida stateowned commuter railroad, and was Chairman of the Board for three terms. Tri-Rail was incorporated into the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, and Mr. Harper was elected its Chairman. He also served, for 12 years, as a Director of Florida East Coast Industries, Inc., a railroad and real estate company based in St. Augustine, Florida. In May, 2001, Mr. Harper was appointed by Governor Bush, a second time, to serve on the Miami-Dade Expressway Authority Board (MDX.) He also was Chairman of Greater Miami Chamber of Commerce.

In 1992, Mr. Harper became actively involved in the tourism industry. He and his wife, Carol, through their holding company, American Heritage Railway, currently own three of the nation's most historic, scenic tourist-oriented railroads: The Durango Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad in Colorado, The Great Smokey Mountains Railroad in North Carolina, and The Mt. Rainier Railroad in Washington state. The Harpers own a hotel called the Grand Imperial in Silverton, Colorado.



Edward Jefferson Holt '58 - ST. LOUIS, MO

Mr. Holt attended K-8th grade at L'Ouverture, from 1945-1954. He was the first student in his neighborhood to complete K-12 in the Brentwood School District. He earned an associate degree at Forest Park, and a Bachelor of Arts from St. Louis University, majoring in Urban Affairs and Community Service. He also took a grad subject in Counseling Theory and Practice at SLU.

Mr. Holt and his wife, Barbara, share five children,two of which, Wendy '84 and Candice '90 were also graduates of Brentwood High School. He has 10 grand and two great-grandchildren. He was a Brentwood resident for 55 years and served as a U.S. Postal Service letter carrier for

31 years, mostly in Brentwood.

He was a member of the Planning & Zoning Commission from 1969-1972 and was President



Chad Plein '94 - NIXA, MO

Mr. Plein attended St. Louis University where he majored in Communication and earned a Certificate in Creative and Professional writing. During his senior year in college, he earned an internship at KSDK News Channel 5 in St. Louis. Mr. Plein was also a substitute teacher for the Brentwood School District, and helped out in the attendance office. Mr. Plein got his start in television as a weekend sports producer with KSDK. He worked alongside Mike Bush and Frank Cusumano and met St Louis sports legends, learned a great work ethic, and produced the weekly hour-long Sports Plus Show on Sundays.

Mr. Plein was the main sports anchor of the ABC affiliate in St. Joseph, Missouri in 2002. He then signed on as the Sports Director at the CBS station in Joplin, Missouri. His counterclockwise tour of the state took him to Springfield, Missouri, in 2007, to the NBC affiliate which is where he still works today.

He's won four regional Emmys for anchoring; awards from the Missouri Broadcasters Association, the Kansas Broadcasters Association, and the KC Press Club for his story-telling. In 2012, he was named the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Man of the Year in Southwest Missouri for his fundraising efforts to fight blood cancers.

His charitable work became more personal in 2015 when he suffered a heart attack at the age of 39 and underwent open-heart surgery. Since then, he's been dedicated to helping the American Heart Association by speaking at events and raising funds and awareness for cardiovascular. At every speaking engagement, part of his message includes something he learned at BHS. Rich Neimann told us on the first day of Physics, "a body in motion stays in motion," and that is very true for a healthy lifestyle and his message to his audience. He's been living the dream attending World Series games and covered the Kansas City Chiefs in Miami at Super Bowl LIV.

The best part of Mr. Plein's life is his family. He and his wife, Cati, have two children; a son Coy and a daughter Chyler. His parents, Mike and Susan, still live in Brentwood, where his mom works at Mark Twain Elementary and has worked for 28 years. His brother, Todd '06, also lives in Brentwood.



Cindy Schmidt Ricks '77 - KIRKWOOD, MO

Mrs. Ricks received an athletic scholarship and attended Covenant College playing varsity volleyball for four years, while pursuing a Physical Education degree. For two years, she taught PE at Chattanooga Christian School and started a pre-school program at Lookout Mountain Presbyterian Church. From 1985-1989 she was the head women's volleyball coach at Covenant College, leading the Lady Scots to their first district championship and first appearance in a NCCAA tournament.

She returned to St. Louis in 1990 with her family where she ran a day care business for several years. In 2003 she was hired by Kirkwood High School as a walking counselor and

she started the Study Focus program designed to help "at risk" students. These are students who are identified as needing extra resource help. Mrs. Ricks works with around 70 students a semester as a "school mom" advocating and creating individual weekly plans to help students be successful. Over the years she has helped hundreds of students raise their GPA and the Study Focus program has helped increase the graduation rate for Kirkwood High School.



of the Evans Place Improvement Association in his neighborhood from 1979-1996. Through his leadership, a playground was established on Central Avenue, and the neighborhood always remained safe and crime-free. Cruise Ship Dining At Its Best

We just returned from a week-long cruise of the Greek Islands. This was our first visit to Greece and it was amazing. The weather was perfect and so was the cuisine on-board the Crystal, as well as the Tavernas on the shore excursions. Greek Hospitality is a real thing.

There are numerous dining venues on-board the Crystal, from snacks and sandwiches in the bars and poolside to the buffet, a casual dining room and a more formal dining room. The sports bar even offers an afternoon snack service with cookies, muffins and other items. And yes, room service is available as well, but who wants to stay in their room on a cruise.

Celestyal Cruises has a unique solution to the Covid situation for their buffet line. The line is separated from the customers by glass dividers similar to those at the meat case of your local supermarket. You point to the items you want and masked, gloved servers plate it for you. When you have all you want, they place a clear plastic cover on your plate and you are on your way to your table. Most of the buffet items are Greek foods, but there are many other items that make it easy to please a picky eater, and/or the kids.

The casual dining room means you can "come as you are" and enjoy a great meal at breakfast, lunch or dinner. As with all the dining venues on-board, the service is quick, efficient and well done.

The more formal dining room is "white linen" service, but a jacket and tie are not required. They do ask that gentlemen wear long pants and a collared shirt, and ladies are asked to dress appropriately.. This is where we ate our evening meals and it was a wonderful place to dine. On other cruise lines this would be an upscale restaurant that you would have to pay an up-charge to experience. Here is the best part of cruising with Celestyal Cruises, everything is all-inclusive! Also, you are not expected to tip anyone. We tried, the employee refused to accept anything other than a "thank you".

Each evening we were given a new menu that included a full dinner with a choice of two or three main dishes and desserts. The menu also gave us the opportunity to order everything ala carte. Greek red and white wines were served at each meal, and they were excellent. This was definitely fine dining. The staff seems to enjoy celebrating with their guests. We saw a cake presented to a couple celebrating their anniversary. Celestyal also gives you the opportunity to splurge if you like. There is a second menu that offers a 1 lb T-bone steak, broiled lobster and a few other items at a cost of \$20 to \$30. There is also a wine list for those that want to impress someone. With the tax advantage of being in International waters, a Chateau LaFite Rothschild was \$34 and a Moet et Chandon champagne was about \$40, basically half price or better than at home. This was your only opportunity to pay for any of your dining experiences. They also have a cocktail menu that changes every day, and of course, it's all inclusive.











International Rett Syndrome Foundation to Host 14th Strollathon

The International Rett Syndrome Foundation (IRSF) will host its 14th annual St. Louis Strollathon on Sat., Oct. 23 with registration starting at 10 a.m. and the walk beginning at 11 a.m. The one-mile family-friendly stroll, which will be held at the JCC-St. Louis located at 2 Millstone Campus Dr., includes a visit



from Fredbird, entertainment and food.

The St. Louis Strollathon has raised a total of more than \$700,000 since its first event in 2008. The Strollathon is the area's major fundraising event and brings together families from across the Midwest affected by Rett Syndrome. All proceeds will benefit the International Rett Syndrome Foundation.

Rett syndrome is a rare genetic neurological disorder that affects one in 10,000 females (and even more rarely in males) and begins to display itself in missed milestones or regression at 6-18 months. Rett syndrome leads to severe impairments, affecting nearly every aspect of life: ability to speak, walk, eat, and breathe easily. The hallmark of Rett syndrome is near constant repetitive hand movements while awake. There are currently four drug clinical trials underway, including the first Phase 3 clinical trial, but there is no cure for Rett syndrome.

St. Louis is home to a specialty clinic – a collaboration between Washington University School of Medicine and St. Louis Children's Hospital. The clinic has a team of specialists with substantial experience in the diagnostic evaluation and treatment of individuals with Rett syndrome.

The International Rett Syndrome Foundation is the world's leading private, non-profit organization that has funded more than \$51 million for research to date. IRSF's research model is focused on exploring the available therapeutic options (both drug development and genetic interventions) that can treat Rett syndrome.

Prism is also designed as a home for new and emerging artists. "Because I'm passionate about theatre education, fostering new and emerging artists was an important aspect of Prism," says Brown. "I remember graduating from college with my BA in Theatre and wondering, 'OK, what now'? It was difficult to break into the theatre scene in a meaningful way. Few companies were open to mentoring young artists at that time. We want Prism Theatre Company to be a place where emerging artists can work with kind, collaborative, seasoned professionals so they can learn, grow, build their resumes, and make connections."

CRUISING THE AEGEAN SEA

We set sail on the M/V Celestyal Crystal and met up with other press and travel agents that would be covering the inaugural cruise. www.celestyal.com I will share with you our itinerary for our 7-day trip. Our first port was Patmos, Greece. Masks are required at all times while in enclosed public areas, exceptions are in dining rooms, lounges, swimming pools, sunbathing on deck and when in your stateroom. Check your body temperature daily by 12:00 noon or prior to disembarking the ship. Thermo scanners are on select floors. Observe rules for face masks, hand hygiene and social distances.

Patmos offers charming shops and restaurants, as well as, an outstanding view. The small island is known for whitewashed houses trimmed with blue doors and winding narrow pathways through town. The Byzantine architecture dates back to the 10th century. We saw the amazing Acropolis and the Monastery of St. John founded in 1088.

John the Evangelist wrote the biblical Book of Revelation here in a cave (grotto). We went inside a monastery, but could not photograph inside. Wear comfortable shoes for exploring the small towns; the paths are loose rocky volcanic soil. We shopped at the small shops and had no problem finding my favorite blue and white colors. The Greek flag is blue and white too.

Rhodes is the best known of the Dodecanese Islands and is called "the Island of Roses."

Rhodes is architecturally varied and there is a walkable Medieval City towering over the harbor with its brilliant turquoise sea.

Santorini was what most people think of visiting and it did not disappoint me. The tiny white-washed houses trimmed in blue were connected by narrow-winding paths leading to cafes and shops. We picked up some specialty tea in one of the shops and a blue watch for our granddaughter's birthday. If you wanted to try out an unusual mode of transportation there were donkeys to ride. Kevin and I preferred to walk and saved them the anguish of carrying us. The view from the top overlooks the reddish-black caldera formed from a massive eruption around 1646. I took the cable car to return to the tinder boats that would return us to our ship. If you time it right you can see the spectacular sunset that Santorini is famous for.

Lavrio is situated on the bay noted for the Temple of Poseidon. After visiting there we returned to the port and all aboard for our next stop, It is known for the Golden Age of Athens.

Mykonos is a small island known for celebrities such as Jackie O and Aristotle Onassis. The island is known for Glitz and Glamour and we were invited for cocktails at one of the resorts followed by dinner with digniteries at a local restaurant.

Milos sits in the horseshoe-shaped bay and is a feast for the eyes. Several beaches offer swimming in the island's geothermal waters that created outstanding rock formations. Multicolored cliffs, dazzling crystalline greens and blues. The island has 126 kilometers (78 mi) of coastline. We set sail for Ag. Nikolaos where we would have our final night dinner. We were surprised by the Captain and waiters with a huge cake trimmed in red, white and blue "Thank You USA Press Trip" and topped with a roman candle sparkler. A memorable trip drew our journey to Greece and Crete to a close.
