Parishes Partner to Serve Homebound Seniors



On Thanksgiving Day, St. Vincent de Paul parish in St. Louis city served Thanksgiving meals to people in South City. In addition to meals served on-site, they deliver hundreds of meals to homebound senior citizens. This year, those receiving these meals got a little extra: some cheer, blessings, and Thanksgiving jokes courtesy of the families at St. Mary Magdalen parish in Brentwood.

On Sunday, November 10, the community of St. Mary Magdalen gathered after Mass to decorate 400 food trays with messages of love, hope, and thanksgiving. More than 80 parishioners of all ages spent about an hour sharing their thoughts and blessings with those who will spend the holiday alone. The designs included psalms, traditional greetings, pictures, jokes, and even a cartoon turkey exclaiming, "Eat more beef!"

St. Mary Magdalen has been partnering with community agencies to complete parish-wide service projects for more than a year now. This is the first time the parish is partnering with another parish to help those in need; Sunday's successful program means there will be more partnerships to come.



St. Louis Union Station has been transformed into the region's top holiday destination with Polar Express trains, family attractions, whimsical dining, light and music shows and a new Winter Market underway for the 2019 season.

In addition to the train and Wheel, St. Louis Union Station will continue its popular holiday fire and light show set to Christmas music on the train shed lake during the Polar Express Train Ride season. The Polar Express movie will be shown in the Wheel plaza every Friday and Saturday night during the season.

Polar passengers can get a head start on their holiday shopping at The Winter Market at the Wheel, which offers a holiday shopping experience on Saturdays and Sundays from noon until 10 p.m. on the plaza near the Union Station lake.

Dinners are served buffet style with separate adult and children's selections priced between \$25 and \$32. Children ages two and under are complimentary. Tip: Select dates for the Magical Meal first, then purchase train tickets for the same date.

St. Louis Union Station is located at 1820 Market Street in downtown St. Louis. Parking is available in the Union Station lot at 18th and Clark for just \$5 for all Polar Express ticket holders.

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The St. Louis Aquarium at Union Station will open on Christmas Day, December 25, 2019.

Special Christmas Day hours will be from noon until 6 p.m.

"We are thrilled to be able to invite the public into our new home for the holidays," said Tami Brown, executive director of the St. Louis Aquarium at Union Station. "This is a great way to start a new family tradition by experiencing the wonders of aquatic life at the aquarium."

General admission tickets are \$25 for adults and \$18 for children ages 3 to 13. Children under the age of three are free. Tickets will allow access to all of the Aquarium's galleries, exhibits and interactive experiences.

The St. Louis Aquarium at Union Station will offer timed ticketing that will allow guests to avoid waiting in line. A limited number of same-day passes also will be available for purchase every day on site.

More information about Annual Passes and Combo Tickets that include admission to Union Station's other attractions -- the St. Louis Wheel, Carousel, Mini-Golf, Ropes Course and A-Maze-Ing Discoveries Mirror Maze -- is available online at <https://www.stlouisaquarium.com/tickets>. St. Louis Union Station gift cards also can be purchased and loaded with any amount at the Aquarium's retail store. Gift cards can be used for admission to any of the attractions at Union Station or in any retail location.

The Aquarium will be open for extended holiday season hours from December 26 through January 4, 2020 from 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. daily. Beginning January 5, the Aquarium will be open regular hours from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m., Sunday through Thursday and 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays.

The St. Louis Aquarium at Union Station is the centerpiece of a \$187 million family entertainment complex in downtown St. Louis. The Aquarium and other attractions -- including the 200-foot St. Louis Wheel observation wheel -- are housed at the 500,000-square-foot National Historic Landmark train shed at Union Station, which originally opened in 1894 as the biggest and busiest train terminal in the nation.

The 120,000-square-foot aquarium covers two stories and includes environments filled with more than a million gallons of water. The aquarium will include one-of-a-kind exhibits featuring more than 13,000 aquatic animals from fresh water and marine environments around the world. It will bring together state-of-the-art technology, animal care, education and conservation with the excitement of aquatic creatures.

Visitors will enter the Aquarium via a 3-D virtual reality train ride that honors the history of St. Louis Union Station's railroad past. The multimedia train delivers guests to an area that explores the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers. They will learn about the fish that inhabit the great rivers of America and explore the Global Rivers area to see fresh water species from around the world. Playful otters -- named Sawyer, Finn and Thatcher -- piranhas and doctor fish are just some of the highlights.

Lord Stanley, the rare blue lobster named for the NHL's Stanley Cup and St. Louis Blues' championship, will live in his own habitat with a hockey theme.

The Shark Canyon exhibit will offer views of 60 sharks and rays in a 250,000-gallon environment with acrylic J-walls that arch high over the heads of visitors. Divers will interact with guests from inside the exhibit. The Deep section will take visitors on a journey through the depths of the world's oceans to meet the animals that live there, including Jellyfish and a Giant Pacific Octopus.

The second floor also will include a variety of interactive exhibits and touch tanks to create a hands-on and hands-wet experience.

"Visitors will leave the St. Louis Aquarium at Union Station with wet hands and a greater understanding of the planet's rivers, oceans and aquatic life," said Brown. "They will be able to feed turtles and stingrays and interact with invertebrate animals in our touch tanks. Our staff also will have a variety of other animals such as sloths and birds to explore with the guests."

More than 1 million visitors are expected annually.

Opening along with the Aquarium is the St. Louis Aquarium Foundation's Conservation and Education Center (CEC). The Foundation is the Aquarium's non-profit partner, working to provide access to the Aquarium to underserved students and communities and to offer educational programs and field trip opportunities. The Foundation is also an advocate for water stewardship. The CEC is filled with hands-on exhibits and an art installation created from recycled plastic water bottles.

You're not the only one joyfully anticipating the holiday season. Cyber criminals are all aflutter, too, as they look forward to ripping off innocent shoppers like you. Here are some of the most common ways these thieves operate:

Antisocial media

Beware those enticing ads that turn up on Facebook and other social media sites offering vouchers, gift cards and deep discounts, as well as the online surveys these ads often link to. These offers are often only empty promises designed to steal your personal information.

Pandora's inbox

It may be a mystery to you how cyber thieves got your private email address, but it's chillingly clear they're up to no good. Your inbox may fill up with all kinds of legitimate-looking product offers and delivery notices this holiday season, but clicking on links of bogus ones or entering personal information on the linked sites can provide criminals with the opportunity to steal your identity.

Apps are far from immune

With mobile apps available for just about everything, it's a sad sign of the times that certain free mobile apps (often disguised as games) have been specifically designed to steal personal information from your phone. This is a particularly scary development since many people use their phones to secure their cars and homes. For this reason, only install apps from familiar companies and, at the very least, find a third-party review from a trusted site if you're interested in an app from an unfamiliar source.

Gifts that keep on giving ... to criminals

A spirit of generosity is traditional at holiday time, but if you're not careful, your donations may never make it to the needy. Fake charities that skillfully tug at your heartstrings abound at this time of year, just waiting for you to willingly give your hard-earned cash to scammers. Before donating, be sure to check out charities thoroughly, to make sure that they're not only legitimate, but also that they allocate the bulk of funds toward their causes rather than "administrative costs."

Tips to avoid holiday scams

- Only shop online with reputable businesses you trust, using secure websites with an address that begins with https.
- Don't shop or bank over public Wi-Fi.
- Protect your credit card privacy by covering your account number with your hand when shopping in public.
- Don't respond to suspicious unsolicited calls or emails. Only open email attachments from senders you trust, and contact businesses only through their official websites, phone numbers or email addresses.
- Monitor your credit to catch fraud at its earliest stages. By activating alerts in Mobile Banking's Credit Score features, you can protect yourself from identity theft. Monitoring your credit report makes it easy to put protective measures in place and help catch and stop fraud before it's too late.

Scammers may be smart, but you can still outsmart them. A little foreknowledge and caution go a long way toward ensuring you'll enjoy a safe and memorable holiday season. 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Kids Rock Cancer

Kids Rock Cancer was featured at the 3rd Annual "Eat And Treat" presented by First Community on October 19 at Chesterfield Amphitheater. The John Rizzuto Show and 105.7 The Point Listeners have generously supported Maryville University's Kids Rock Cancer and raised over \$18,000 for the program this year.

About Kids Rock Cancer: Kids Rock Cancer, now celebrating its 10th year, is an innovative Maryville University program that helps families successfully cope with the challenges of a cancer diagnosis through the power of music therapy. The program provides a certified music therapist to help teens, young adults, and siblings (ages 5 and up) children, use music and songwriting as a vehicle for expressing their feelings.

Here's how it works: A KRC board-certified music therapist meets with the child and family for one or two sessions, typically around 2 hours. The therapist creates a safe space, working together to identify ideas/themes that can be turned into lyrics and they create an original tune. The child sings the special melody into a microphone and "stars" in the song they have written, with background instrumentation provided by guitar, keyboard and computer software all independently chosen by the child. When finished, the child receives this CD recording as a cherished legacy to share with family and friends.

The therapeutic songwriting and thoughtful recording process provides a positive distraction from physical and emotional pain while releasing a sense of accomplishment and pride, and feelings of happiness and optimism. Kids Rock Cancer helps children, teens, young adults and siblings (ages 5 and up) affected by cancer/blood disorders at St. Louis Children's hospitals, special camps, and other locations throughout the area. 





This was the last major event during this centennial year sponsored by the Brentwood Century Foundation, and it was a good one. Toni Bowman chaired the Gala committee and was very happy with how it turned out. “We’ve been working on this for months and tonight was the culmination of a lot of hard work by a lot of great people. It was a beautiful room, and everyone seemed to have fun.”

Many in the crowd dressed in the style of 1919 to add an extra nostalgic touch to the evening. Suffragettes, flappers, baseball players, gangsters, dandies, and all sorts of characters from the past populated the room. Everyone looked great as the evening’s festivities began. Some had arrived by special trolley rented for the evening.

Dan Fitzgerald, president of the Century Foundation, served as MC for the evening and welcomed the crowd which included former mayors, aldermen, city employees, and both long and short time Brentwood residents. Reverend Will Hanke from Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church, Foundation board member and organizer of the Community Service weekend earlier in the year, gave the blessing. After a delicious buffet dinner, the formal program began.

It started with a viewing of the documentary BRENTWOOD: A 100 YEAR JOURNEY produced by Brentwood resident Dan Duffy. Narrated by Brentwood’s “velvet voice”, Jim Doyle, this 14 minute video shows some of the history of Brentwood and the developments and strengths of our city over the years. It’s a beautiful reminder of what makes Brentwood special. It can be seen on the Foundation web site at Brentwood100.org.

Dan Fitzgerald then showed some slides of Brentwood’s past and told stories of Brentwood’s famous and infamous residents and businesses. Dan is also president of the Brentwood Historical Society and had much to share with the attentive audience. “The churches, the schools, the businesses, but most of all the people are what makes Brentwood so great.” Dan commented. “Look how many of you have lived in Brentwood for so long. People just keep coming back.” Dan polled the crowd for 50, 60, and 70 year residents. The longevity winner was Wilma Nowell, who has lived in Brentwood for 83 years. 

ARMENIA'S FIRST-EVER BREEDING CENTER FOR ENDANGERED REPTILES OPENS WITH SUPPORT FROM THE SAINT LOUIS ZOO

Reptiles and amphibians on the brink of extinction in Armenia are getting some critical assistance with the creation of the country's first-ever conservation breeding center for these species — and the Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute was instrumental in its establishment.

The new Armenian Conservation Breeding Center, located in one of the world's top biodiversity hotspots of Caucasus and near the Armenian capital of Yerevan, celebrated its grand opening and official dedication on September 16, 2019. Herpetology staff members from the Saint Louis Zoo, along with partner conservation organizations in the U.S. and Armenia, were on hand for the dedication of the facility.

"This is a huge step for Armenia's reptile and amphibian conservation. Species that are often overlooked are getting much needed attention," said Mark Wanner, Director of the Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute Center for Conservation in Western Asia and Zoological Manager of Herpetology and Aquatics at the Saint Louis Zoo.

The Saint Louis Zoo has supported conservation and research in Armenia for over 15 years and is a recognized leader for its husbandry and breeding of the Armenian viper at the Charles H. Hoessle Herpetarium at the Zoo. The WildCare Institute and other conservation organizations contributed support through scientific expertise, as well as money to help build and operate this important breeding center.

"The center will focus on breeding vipers and reintroducing them into native habitats until populations are stable. Data from our research indicates that some populations of vipers in Armenia have declined to a point where human intervention, like this ex-situ breeding center, is necessary to prevent the species from going extinct. Through capacity building, strong collaborations, field research and education, we hope to help our Armenian partners self-sustain their conservation goals and protect these amazing animals into the future," said Wanner.

Two renowned Armenian herpetologists, Aram Aghasyan, Ph.D., and his son, Levon Aghasyan, Ph.D., oversee the breeding center. Dr. Levon Aghasyan, director of the breeding center, spent eight months in St. Louis in 2015 and 2016 learning proper husbandry and propagation methods for vipers at the Charles H. Hoessle Herpetarium at the Zoo.

"Aram and Levon are pioneers in Armenian herpetology and have made brilliant strides in saving Armenian wildlife," said Wanner.

About the Breeding Center

The Armenian Conservation Breeding Center is currently housing 28 mountain vipers from three species in conservation need — the Armenian viper, Armenian steppe viper and Darevsky's viper. Future plans call for housing all 11 Armenian reptile and amphibian species that appear on the International Union for Conservation of Nature Red List of Threatened Species.

Researchers brought the group of snakes into the center from field sites where viper populations have declined in recent years due to habitat loss, livestock grazing and human persecution. Offspring born at the center will be raised by care staff to increase survivability in the wild and then released to their native habitat.

The 1,200-square-foot, three-story facility — a renovated dwelling built in the foothills of Mt. Aragats — takes advantage of the natural weather patterns for heating and cooling the building. The underground reptile and amphibian room cools naturally during the winter season, creating a hibernaculum where the animals go into brumation, or a hibernation-like state with periods of wakefulness. A hibernaculum is a key tool for breeding high-elevation mountain vipers. The facility also includes meeting rooms, offices, and bedrooms for visiting researchers and scientists. An outdoor area has several habitats for endangered tortoises and additional space for other priority species in the future.

Capacity Building and the Future of the Breeding Center

The building is not open to the public at this time, but in the long-range plans, it could serve as an educational facility for people to visit and learn about wildlife, according to Wanner.

In the near future, the breeding center hopes to invite college biology students to study and possibly help with animal care. In 2020 Saint Louis Zoo veterinary and herpetology staff will develop and execute a reptile and amphibian workshop in Armenia focusing on treatment, disease, parasitology, pathology and minor surgery. This training will provide the breeding center with an in-country trained veterinary group to help with any medical needs that might arise.

POTATO EXHIBIT OPENS AT GARDEN'S SACHS MUSEUM

The latest exhibit at the Missouri Botanical Garden's Sachs Museum, "Potato (*Solanum tuberosum*): Apple of the Earth," has opened.

In addition to being a favorite holiday side dish, the potato is the most important non-cereal food crop in the world and is a significant part of the diet of more than 1.5 billion people. The exhibition at the Stephen and Peter Sachs Museum highlights botany, history and contemporary art focused on this underestimated tuber around the globe.

"It has such an interesting story," Sachs Museum Curator Nezka Pfeifer said. "It's gone from being an American plant to being ubiquitous around the world."

Its story continues today as the potato's pervasiveness ties it to global issues including climate change, food insecurity and food sovereignty.

The Sachs Museum show includes 40 specimens from the Garden's herbarium representing a variety of potato species found in different parts of the world. The exhibit will also showcase tools used for farming and cooking potatoes, including antique agriculture tools and more than 100 potato mashers from many different countries. Other items, like Mr. And Mrs. Potato Head, highlight the potato's role in pop culture.

The South and Lower Level Galleries feature work from contemporary artists Seamus O. Hames, Dornith Doherty, and Corina Kennedy. Each artist has interpreted the unique story of this food crop in their artworks, especially the historic impact of the late potato blight that devastated the potato crop in Ireland in the mid-19th century.

"Potato (*Solanum tuberosum*): Apple of the Earth" will be on display through March 17. A visit to the Stephen and Peter Sachs Museum is included with Garden admission. The museum is open daily from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Last month my article left off with a visit to Reims and this month's article and photos will give you a "taste of NE France."

This area is very historic with canals, locks, cathedrals, Champagne Cellars/Houses and beautiful scenery. We were escorted down the idyllic canal by a bevy of swans waiting for the passengers to toss tidbits of crusty bread. We can't forget the wineries along the banks waiting for us to sample.

We had time to enjoy the scenery and stop by some of the towns along the Marne. Deck chairs were set out for relaxing and feeling the warmth of the sun's rays. The people we floated past were so friendly and the children were excited and waved. We had lunch outside on the deck with colorful umbrellas shielding us from too much sun. Our boat, the Ramonde, glided silently along the Marne. Total capacity for the Raymonde is 22 passengers and there is a handicap accessible room available on the main deck. The boat anchors at night.

During the day there are many things to do ... or do nothing at all. There are books to read or look up info on your destination. Bicycles are available to use along the path beside the boat. You can get off at one lock and ride to the next lock. If you are more adventuresome you can just walk along the path, the boat only moves about 3 mph.

Stops are made at several river towns with time to shop or sightsee. In Chateau-Thierry one of the passengers from our boat bought a beautiful blue and white bolt of material to make pillows back in her home in Australia. We walked up the hill to a castle and took part in a Falconry show. Along the path was a permanent exhibit of Aesop's Fables drawings by famous French poet Jean de la Fontaine, 17th century. As a child I loved the Fables that were meant to "teach truths in a simple way," as in the Lion and the Mouse. "Little friends may prove great friends."

We visited the "birthplace of Champagne" in Hautvillers and at the top of the hill we visited the battlefield at Chateau-Thierry. There is a statue of a plane and monument honoring those with the Resistance.

A favorite place we went to was by shuttle to the village of Meaux "Home of Brie Cheese." We had a demonstration from the "Confrerie du brie de meaux" and how the cheese is made. There is a museum on the history. We had time to walk through the Meaux Cathedral and stop by the Meaux Tourism Office.

A drive through the countryside took us to a tasting of Champagne Demiére and a tour through the wine cellar. If you see vinyards with a rose bush at the beginning of the row, that is a way to let them know how healthy the bush is. Pests will attack the roses first.

The scenic route back to the Ramonde was the same route used by the Tour de France.

We also traveled on the famous road where the Champagne Houses are.

Once back at the Ramonde we were greeted with a nice refreshing cocktail and served by our Purser Joanna. Dinner was served inside and the following morning we departed for Paris and our return home. So far, we have cruised on three of the luxury barge cruises: the Bordeaux region, the Burgundy region and the Champagne region.

The Saint Louis Zoo's bull Asian elephant, Raja (pronounced RAH zhä), will celebrate his "golden birthday" when he turns 27 on Dec. 27 this year. A golden birthday (also known as "grand birthday" or "lucky birthday") occurs once in a lifetime when one turns the age of their birth day.

Raja will receive special presents to stomp open at his annual birthday party at 11 a.m. on Friday, Dec. 27, at River's Edge in the Zoo, weather permitting. Visitors are invited to sing "Happy Birthday" and cheer for Raja. After the celebration, visitors can sign a super-sized birthday card and learn more about the elephants and elephant conservation through keeper chats, activities and biofacts until 1 p.m. at Lakeside Cafe. Birthday cupcakes and hot chocolate will be available for purchase.

Born on Dec. 27, 1992, Raja was the first Asian elephant born at the Zoo. He is the father of three female calves at the Zoo — Maliha, 13, Jade, 12, and Priya, 6 — and another calf due in summer 2020 to mother Rani.

"We all look forward to celebrating Raja's golden birthday with the entire St. Louis community this year," said Katie Pilgram-Kloppe, Acting Curator of River's Edge, Saint Louis Zoo. "It's a privilege to care for these amazing animals and to see how Raja inspires our guests to care about elephants in the wild."

For the party, zookeepers and volunteers have constructed birthday presents filled with some of the elephants' favorite things, including cereal, peanuts, bananas and popcorn. Large trees will be provided for the elephants to push over and encourage natural browsing. Other elephants from the family also may be celebrating with treats of their own in River's Edge.

From 10:30 to 11 a.m. (weather permitting), visitors can meet a keeper and watch animal training demonstrations at the elephant habitats. The Zoo's three-generation Asian elephant family is thriving under the excellent care provided by a highly-trained professional animal care team.

Italian In The Valley

The "Hill" is known worldwide as the place in St. Louis to find great Italian cuisine. But, Open Table has said that Filippo's Italian Kitchen and Bar in the Chesterfield Valley is one of St. Louis' top 10 restaurants overall! Filippo's is very highly rated by Trip Adviser, Yelp and many other online restaurant guides.

Filippo's has a rich pedigree dating back to 1976 when Franco's opened their doors in Cahokia. Franco's was a small family operation where you may find members of the St. Louis symphony in their tuxedos sitting next to a truck driver and his family enjoying delicious home made Italian food.

This is where I first met Franco's teenage son, Joe. As their reputation grew, they opened a white linen restaurant in Belleville. Unfortunately Franco passed from Cancer and that operation closed shortly after.

In the mean time, The Drury Hotel organization had offered the family an opportunity to expand into their hotel next to the Dome. Joe said he would like to do that, and J.F. Sanfilippo's opened in 1991. After twenty-seven years, Joe and his family closed J.F. San Filippo's to continue the family tradition serving St. Louis amazing Italian food at a reasonable price with their newest restaurant, Filippo's Italian Kitchen and Bar in the Chesterfield Valley.

It had been a while since we had visited Filippo's, so we dined there for our anniversary. We arrived 15 minute before our reservation and I was surprised that there was no one at the greeting station in the entryway. The restaurant was less than half filled, and a waitress was chatting with a table of customers. She glanced at us a couple of times and after about five minutes came to us and asked if she could help us. I said we had reservations and she simply said follow me. We were seated and served a plate of olive oil and balsamic vinegar for bread dipping and were eventually brought a basket of wonderful home made bread. Mama Concetta is a master baker.

We started with an order of Calamari Fritti, perfectly bat-

tered and lightly fried. Served with a side of red sauce. Although the menu said it came with red sauce and lemon, we had no lemon. Still it was very tasty.

I had Chicken Limone, two chicken breasts served with a lemon butter sauce and fresh mushrooms. I could have had a pasta side dish, but I decided to have roasted vegetables. Again everything was perfect.

Sue ordered the Vitello Filippo, veal cutlets with a cabernet sauce and fresh mushrooms. She also decided upon the vegetables. Again, perfection.

All main course items come with a Filippo Insalata, a house salad that includes mixed greens, artichoke hearts, tomato, red onion, pimento, parmesan and mozzarella topped off with a homemade Italian style dressing. It was spot on.



Pricing is very reasonable considering the portion sizes. We both took home enough for another dinner the next day!

In the interest of journalism, we split a piece of lemoncello cake. WOW, exceptional flavor without being too sweet and melt in your mouth texture. Don't pass on this one.

The wine list is more than comprehensive, there is a large selection of many wines in all price points as well as many "by the glass" options. Unlike many restaurants, the by the glass wines are a larger than average pour, so enjoy.

Filippo's décor reminds me of a modern bistro restaurant. Open ceilings, dual level seating, a separate bar area, a few TV's for major sporting events and videos of Italian country side. Colorful European posters and art work hang on the walls. There is also a small area near the front where live musicians perform later in the evening.

While you are there, you will usually meet Joe, his brother Paul and his wife and their son, his sister Connie and perhaps Mama Concetta. After all, Filippo's is still very much a family restaurant.
