The average adult has eight to 12 pints of blood in their body. Making a blood donation uses about 1 pint, after which your body has an amazing capacity to replace all the cells and fluids that have been lost. Your body will replace the blood volume (plasma) within 48 hours. It will take four to eight weeks for your body to completely replace the red blood cells you donated.

Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood. It is essential for surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Whether a patient receives whole blood, red cells, platelets or plasma, this lifesaving care starts with one person making a generous donation. I donation can potentially save up to 3 lives. Blood and platelets cannot be manufactured; they can only come from volunteer donors. Nearly 21 million blood products are transfused each year. Platelets, critical for cancer patients, must be transfused within 5 days of donation. The Red Cross holds about 500 blood drives every day. January 22 is our day to help their effort.

Facts About Blood Needs

- Approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S.
- Nearly 7,000 units of platelets and 10,000 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S.
- Nearly 21 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 8 units.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O. Sickle cell disease affects 90,000 to 100,000 people in the U.S. About 1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.

According to the American Cancer Society, more than 1.8

million people are expected to be diagnosed with cancer in 2020. Many of them will need blood, sometimes daily, during their chemotherapy treatment.

A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.

Blood Supply Statistics

- The Red Cross provides about 40% of our nation's blood and blood components, all from generous volunteer donors. But supply can't always meet demand because only about 3% of age-eligible people donate blood yearly. Each new donor helps us meet patient needs.
- Each year, an estimated 6.8 million people in the U.S. donate blood.
- 13.6 million units of whole blood and red blood cells are collected in the U.S. in a year.
- About 45% of people in the U.S. have Group O (positive or negative) blood; the proportion is higher among Hispanics (57%) and African Americans (51%).
- Type O negative red cells can be given to patients of all blood types. Because only 7% of people in the U.S. are type O negative, it's always in great demand and often in short supply.
- Type AB positive plasma can be transfused to patients of all blood types. Since only 3% of people in the U.S. have AB positive blood, this plasma is usually in short supply.
 - Red blood cells must be used within 42 days (or less).
 - Platelets must be used within just 5 days.

My son fought MML (Multiple Melanoma Leukemia and during his 22 months of battling he needed transfusions to help him fight infections. Because others donated blood and platelets, we had extra TIME with our son. This drive is to make blood supplies available for others that have such a need. It will make you feel good about yourself and it will mean the world to someone in need.

CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Call to Order - Mayor Dimmitt called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The pledge immediately followed.

ANNOUNCEMENTS, APPOINTMENTS, **PROCLAMATIONS & RECOGNITIONS**

Swearing in of Firefighter/Paramedic - Anthony DiPaola

Chief Cottrell read the Bio (available in BoardDocs) and Anthony's father, Allen DiPaola, pinned on his badge. The City Administrator read the Oath of Office which was repeated by the firefighter. Family members were present to congratulate the new member.

(Internet was not stable - Alderman Gould had trouble with connection at this time)

PUBLIC HEARING

Public Hearing for a New Conditional Use Permit for Strictly Pediatrics Center, Inc., at 1400 Strassner Drive to Operate a Medical Daycare Facility for Children.

Mayor Dimmitt gavel opened the public hearing.

Whitney Kelly shared a synopsis of the information (available in BoardDocs) and stated that because this was a formal technicality, it was requested by the applicant, that there be a 2nd reading of the Bill tonight. The applicant, Janice Cataldi was present to answer any questions.

Mayor gavel closed the hearing.

Public Hearing for a New Conditional Use Permit and Site Development Plan approval for an 11,459 St. Ft. Addition and Renovation at Mark Twain Elementary School, 8636 Litzsinger Road.

Mayor Dimmitt gavel opened the hearing.

Whitney Kelly shared information regarding the request, noting the districts renovation project and their desire to waive the building permit fees. She stated that this project was passed by the Planning and Zoning Commission by a vote of 8 to 0. Bret Higgins, the Architect for the School District, gave a presentation of the project. Brian Lane, Superintendent of School, was also present to request consideration for the waiving of the building permit fees.

Mayor gavel closed the hearing.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Mayor opened the floor for citizen comments.

Noel Jones, 8543 Eulalie, spoke regarding a water run-off problem they have been having for several years. He noted that the inlet (sewer intake) at Rosalie and Helen is not sufficient, large enough, and since there is no curb, water runs into yards and floods. It has created a sink hole and is affecting other areas as well. He requested that curbs be installed.

Steve Keuss, 8547 Eulalie, also spoke regarding the same matter and confirmed Mr. Jones comments, noting that there was not a problem until the road was repaved a few years ago.

Mayor closed public comments.

Alderman Plufka noted that this was identified in Gonzalez report as problem #25 and it was determined there is a need for larger pipes. Mr. Keuss stated that may be fine, but the way the water runs now, the water never gets to the pipes, so he does not believe this will solve the problem.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT 2021 Audit Presentation

Andrew Zebell, Clifton Larson Allen CPA, was available to present the 2021 audit to the Board. He noted they were happy to complete the audit to restore the city's credit rating and to meet the required timeline. He noted that they will begin working with staff in the next month to prepare for the 2022 audit.

Alderwoman Tice thanked them for their extensive work,

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderman Lochmoeller to accept the 2021 audit as presented.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Brentwood Bound Update

Craig Schluter, Navigate Building Solutions, gave an update since the last board meeting on Construction costs and soft costs, noting there were no property acquisitions. He stated we received a reimbursement from Great Rivers Greenway and received the Missouri Municipal Grant and he noted additional funding sources. Complete report is available in BoardDocs.

St. Louis County Treasury Operations Department – City of Brentwood, Mo Remittance of a portion of the 1% Local Option Sales Tax Proceeds.

Dan Cook, Cook & Riley LLC, was present to share the information regarding the over-distributed funds from the County. He stated that the county had a mapping and coding issue involving the City of Brentwood over the past 5 months, resulting in millions of dollars that were disbursed to City of Brentwood. The city brought this to the county's attention and is prepared to give money back, however, we are not confident in the amount that was requested for return (bill was received for over \$7M). Therefore, the city will request computation of their work. As of today, we have returned \$5.3M back to the county based on our computation, so as not to hold up monies meant for other municipalities, however, will meet to discuss the remaining difference since our calculations do not match.

City Administrator said she spoke to them and asked for meeting. We may have the Mo. State Auditor look at this as well as county auditors to explain the numbers and give an accurate accounting. City Attorney noted that these are public records, and they should be able to provide the data and records for review. We will hold for more information.

Occupancy Inspection Agreement - Movement Center of STL - 645 Hanley Industrial Court, Brentwood, MO 63144 Whitney Kelly presented the information stating that some buildings sublease office space and with this, the code requires an occupancy permit. Planning would like to have an agreement that tenant would allow for one inspection per year to cover the entire space, and any sub-tenants would still have to obtain a business license but would not need to pay for or complete an occupancy inspection.

The Mayor asked that staff can implement this, and City Administrator agreed to direct this with the Planning and Development Director and would bring items forward when they enter into a new agreement, but feel we could keep this process administrative at this time.

Building Division Presentation

David Fairgrieve, Chief Building Official, gave an overview of the department. He noted that the codes are all 2018 thru International Code Council and shared all areas of responsibility and their respective response times. He noted the significant numbers (including both residential and commercial) of inspections, coded enforcements and permitting they have completed this year to-date, in addition to work with FEMA due to flooding. He shared an explanation of re- inspection situations and noted how the current team works cooperatively to accomplish tasks.

Alderman Wegge inquired about the MyGov system and its ease for use with residents. Whitney responded that they are upgrading to version 5 which is more user friendly, but that staff is helpful with navigation of system and any questions. He also asked how we track things in the que to make sure request are getting done or completed. David noted that they have an internal process for reviewing projects each day with the inspectors that seems now to be working.

Alderman Wegge also asked if we using Gonzalez Engineering for plan review, and David replied that they are only used for stormwater permits, if needed upon review. The Alderman also asked if we feel we can handle the New Development area (Manchester Corridor) with existing staff. It was noted that there could be a concern once all that is being developed. Inspector training for staff is 1-2 times per year and inspectors can get certifications for their trainings.

OLD BUSINESS

Bill No. 6425.1 - An Ordinance Approving Operations Of Low Speed Vehicles On Public Streets- Second Reading Director of Public Works shared the changes that were made to the wording from previous meeting per the discussion.

Motion was made by Alderman Wegge and seconded by Alderman Shelton to approve the amendment of the Bill to 6425.1.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

Motion was by Alderman Wegge and seconded by Alderman Plufka to Perfect the Bill into Ordinance form. Roll Call:

Bill No. 6428 - Missouri Fire Fighter Critical Illness Trust and Pool - Second Reading

Motion was made by Alderman Shelton and seconded by Alderwoman Tice to perfect the Bill into Ordinance form. Discussion took place:

Alderman Plufka expressed concern that the organization has only been in business less than a year and feels that the wording in the agreement makes participating cities potentially liable for replenishing reserves. They don't have loss experience. Chief Cottrell stated that some of the concern was addressed at Ways and Means Committee meeting and stated that they are well funded based on actuarial reports and have years of reserves. They also looked at data and experience in Colorado's program to determine funding.

Alderman Plufka also asked about a concept within Workman's compensation program regarding credits. Program director validated that if down the road a workman's compensation settlement is received, it does come off of the payment amount. Alderman Plufka does not recommend the city participate in this program. He feels they are too new and not sufficiently funded.

Alderwoman Tice stated that based on information presented earlier, she was convinced they could support this and primarily because we could pull out of this at any given time.

Alderman Shelton shared we were told that in the spirit of the agreement we would not have to stay in program if one of our members was receiving benefit, and wording was to be reviewed for clarity.

Alderman Lochmoeller asked Chief Cottrell if he would be a trustee of their Board, and Chief replied that we are a member, but not one the 12-member voting Board of Trustees.

Alderman Shelton shared that the actuarial report is to be presented each year to us to review for budget.

Roll was called:

Alderman Plufka – no Alderwoman Tice – yes Alderwoman Sims – Absent Alderman Wegge – yes Alderman Gould – no Alderman Lochmoeller – yes Alderwoman O'Neill – yes Alderman Shelton – yes By a vote of 5 (yes) to 2 (no), Bill #6428 will become Ordinance #5060.

St. Louis Youth Hockey Foundation Receives Grant

St. Louis Blues' charitable trust donates \$5,000 to assist youth hockey nonprofit

The St. Louis Youth Hockey Foundation recently received a \$5,000 grant from Blues for Kids, the charitable trust of the St. Louis Blues. The St. Louis Youth Hockey Foundation – a nonprofit that provides financial support to young players who face financial difficulty – will use the grant money for the upcoming 2023 hockey season.

Blues for Kids' mission is to positively impact programs and services that improve health and wellness of youth in the St. Louis area. To date the program has contributed more than \$11 million to the St. Louis community.

This year the St. Louis Youth Hockey Foundation has awarded 14 grants to help young players continue playing hockey. Financial support is given to local club teams, as well as AAA and high school players based upon an individual's need and family circumstances. In exchange for these scholarships, youth recipients pay-it-forward through volunteerism and community service.

"The St. Louis Blues' grant allows us to assist more young players this season than ever before," said St. Louis Youth Hockey Foundation president Kristin Heffington. "Since its beginning, the Blues have not only ignited the local hockey community but have also been very supportive of youth hockey programs in our area." Heffington added that "the cost of hockey rises as players get older, and we don't want anyone to stop playing based on their financial situation."

Election Information for Brentwood Board of Education Candidates

Filing for three seats on the Brentwood School District Board of Education opens Tuesday, Dec. 6, 2022 at 8 a.m. and closes Tuesday, Dec. 27, 2022 at 5 p.m. Interested Brentwood residents who are United States citizens, 24 years of age or older and have resided in Missouri one year preceding the election are eligible for candidacy.

Candidates may file in person at the Brentwood School District Administrative Office (1201 Hanley Industrial Ct.) during the district's regular business hours, which are Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Candidates may file by certified mail if they are unable to file in person due to physical disability or are members of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty.

With the exception of Tuesday, Dec. 6 and Tuesday, Dec. 27, filing will not occur on the days when the district is closed for inclement weather, winter break or health-related reasons. Please see the dates and times below for a complete list of candidate filing availability.

- Tuesday, Dec. 6; 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. (First Day to File)
- Wednesday-Friday, Dec. 7-9; 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Monday-Friday, Dec. 12-16; 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Monday-Wednesday, Dec. 19-21; 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Thursday, Dec. 22; 8-11:30 a.m.
- Closed Friday, Dec. 23 (Winter Break)
- Closed Monday, Dec. 26 (Winter Break)
- Tuesday, Dec. 27; 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Last Day to File)

The ballot order of candidates will be determined by filing order. Candidates must observe any infectious disease procedures in effect at the time of filing.

Under provisions of Missouri Statute Section 115.124, if the number of candidates who file is equal to the number of positions to be filled by the election, no election will be held. However, if the number of candidates filing exceeds the number of positions at any time, the election will be held Tuesday, April 4, 2023.

Bidding Timeline for Mark Twain Renovation Project

The bidding process for the Mark Twain Elementary School renovation project is underway. The bid package officially opened Thursday, Nov. 10, which included publishing all documents online via the Drexel Technologies Plan Room portal. Prospective contractors were encouraged to attend a pre-bid meeting Thursday, Dec. 1 on the Mark Twain campus.

All bids must be clearly marked and submitted by Thursday, Dec. 15 at 2 p.m. There will be a public opening of the bids immediately following in the Administrative Office Conference Center (1201 Hanley Industrial Ct.). The Board of Education is expected to approve a general contractor for this project at its January 2023 business meeting.

The bidding process timeline is as follows:

- Nov. 10, 2022: Bid package opens, documents available online
- Dec. 1, 2022: Pre-bid meeting on the Mark Twain campus
- Dec. 8, 2022: Last day to submit bid questions
- Dec. 9, 2022: Last bid addenda issued (if necessary)
- Dec. 15, 2022: Bid package deadline and public opening
- Dec. 19-23, 2022: Contractor interviews
- Jan. 17, 2023: Board approval of general contractor

This project was made possible by Prop E, a \$29 million bond issue approved by the Brentwood community in June 2020 to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at the district's two elementary schools and early childhood education center.



Why Dusty Blake will be more than just "the numbers guy" as Cardinals pitching coach

One of the biggest reasons why Dusty Blake is now the pitching coach for the Cardinals is that he never considered getting that job as a goal for his career.

"I wouldn't say I was looking toward a certain end point or end game for my career," Blake said.



That was true when Blake was a Division II college pitching coach. It was true when he became a head coach at the collegiate level. It was true during the three years he spent as the pitching coach at Duke before joining the Cardinals' staff in 2021 with the title of "pitching strategist."

"That's how talented people are wired," said Chris Pollard, the Duke head coach. "If you are really wired that way, you don't worry about what the next job is. You just try to be as good as you can be at the job you have. That's what the great ones are really good at."

The relationship between Pollard and Blake goes back to 2004, when Blake finished up his college eligibility pitching for Pollard at Pfeiffer University while pursuing his master's degree after graduating from Appalachian State.

Over the years as Blake's coaching career progressed through various schools, he and Pollard often discussed working together, but it wasn't until after Pollard twice failed to hire Blake that he finally brought him to Duke.

"I don't mind saying this – I made a mistake in 2012 when I got the job at Duke, I considered him for the pitching coach position and again in 2015 when the job opened back up I considered him again," Pollard said. "I should have hired him both of those times.

"The job opened back up in 2018 when Pete Maki went to the Twins (where he is now their pitching coach) and I knew after two times of passing on hiring Dusty it was a no-brainer."

Their relationship over the years and frequent conversations had convinced Pollard that Blake was a talented coach – but it didn't take long after he joined the Duke staff for Pollard to realize he had probably underestimated Blake's abilities.

"I didn't honestly know how talented he was until we started working together on a day in, day out basis and I realized he is without a doubt the most talented individual I've ever had the privilege of working with," Pollard said. "I started saying after just one year of him being on our staff that this guy is going to be a major-league pitching coach within five years and sure enough he is."

Blake came to the Cardinals with a reputation of being able to understand and disseminate the multitude of analytical data which is now available in the game. That was his primary role the last two years, when he worked behind the scenes to try to identify which pieces of the reams of data would be the most beneficial to each individual pitcher in trying to help them improve their performance.

"It's really figuring out what makes this guy great; he is good because of these reasons," Blake said. "My main goal is to help these guys become their own pitching coach. At the end of the day their name is on the line and they are the ones being held most accountable to their performances and they are the ones who deserve a ton of credit for that.

"I just want to be a conduit and a resource for them to help give them guidance or feedback in certain areas."

Pollard has no doubt Blake can be successful doing that with the Cardinals because he has watched him do it before – knowing the reasons for that success go far beyond being able to analyze data points.

"There's dozens of people in every organization who can break down a Trackman file," Pollard said. "But you still have to have the relational piece and he's as good on that side as anybody I've ever been around in any profession. He can connect with people and really understands how to push them to achieve.

"That ability to connect with each individual and find out what makes them tick and what is going to be the best approach to helping them along their journey – that's the essence of coaching and that's what he's really, really special with.

"He's one of the most talented baseball people and one of

the most talented people in terms of emotional intelligence and people skills that I've ever been around."

Pollard remembers watching how Blake worked with one young Duke pitcher in particular.

"A lot of times pitchers come to the college level with physical readiness but they don't have the mental or the emotional readiness," Pollard said. "We had a former pitcher, who is now in pro ball, who when he got to us had one of the most talented arms in the country but was struggling with readiness in some of the other areas. He was an uber talented guy that candidly we couldn't even get in a game when he first got here because you didn't know what you were going to get."

As that pitcher worked with Blake, however, he developed into the team's starter in an NCAA regional championship game.

"That speaks to what he's able to do to help guys achieve their full potential," Pollard said.

Bryce Jarvis was an incoming freshman at Duke when he first met Blake. The son of Kevin Jarvis, who spent 12 years pitching in the major leagues, the younger Jarvis thought he arrived on campus with a pretty advanced idea of what pitching was all about.



After meeting Blake, Jarvis found out he still had a lot to learn – and who was going to be able to teach it to him.

"His ability to take in all of the different theories about pitching that are out there right now, from new age stuff to the old school mental game of pitching, his ability to take that in and then send it back out to players on an individual basis is unlike any coach I've ever been around," Jarvis said.

Jarvis pitched for Blake for three years before becoming the first-round pick of the Diamondbacks in the 2020 draft. He spent this past season in Double A and still relies on the lessons he learned from Blake, and continues to seek out his advice.

"It's awesome that we have all of these data points and metrics out there, especially when it comes to pitching, but you can really get bogged down with paralysis by analysis," Jarvis said. "I grew up in the game and had a very strong base of baseball knowledge because of my dad but he (Blake) was able to take all that I knew and build upon it and really refine the skills that I came in with.

"He's going to make a difference (with the Cardinals) in ways that aren't super loud just by fostering guys, keeping them comfortable and challenging them when they want to be challenged and making sure they stay on track. It takes very careful hands to do that but he's definitely well equipped to do that."

Marcus Johnson only pitched for Blake for one season at Duke, but used that experience to launch a career that saw him become the fourth-round pick by the Marlins in last year's draft. He was traded last month to Tampa Bay.

"He showed up every day and worked at showing that we could trust him and how he could personalize all of that information for each pitcher," Johnson said. "Getting that information, and being able to ask him questions and bounce things off of him, not everybody can understand the stuff the way that he can and apply it to coaching."

Blake admits that as he has gained more experience over the years, he has refined his coaching approach – but not his overall philosophy as he has learned what information be considers the most important.

"What Trackman, Hawk-Eye and all of these systems do is they help eliminate the guesswork in areas that you don't always see with your eyes," Blake said. "The eye test doesn't always quite match up.

"There are a lot of data points but once you kind of look line by line and get used to what all of these points mean, it's really easy a lot of times to zero in on one area that's changed and taken us out of our system. You can say to a pitcher, 'This is the thing that you are doing right now 10 to 15 percent of the time. If we can figure out how to reinforce that and do it more frequently, we are going to get better results.' It really takes away some of the 'it could be this, it could be that' as a coach."

What Blake has come to understand the most about how to use all of that data is that he can't force all pitchers to follow the same plan.

"There was certainly a time, probably six, seven, eight years ago where I felt a little bit more like, 'Look, I've had some guys who I've coached who got drafted and made it to the pros and this is something that worked for them so it should work for you," Blake said. "It was kind of an immature and

closed-minded approach.

"As I continued to work and connect with guys, getting on the same page seemed to be a much more effective plan. Finding the best ways to help them identify this is who you are, this is what you do when you are great, this is how you recover, this is how you respond to challenges – all of the things involved with performance."

That will be how Blake approaches what the Cardinals and manager Oli Marmol have identified as an area they want to see improved next season – getting their pitchers to have more swings and misses from the opposing hitters.

This is especially the case once the count reaches two strikes. The Cardinals were last in the major leagues last season in strikeouts, and only six teams allowed a higher batting average with two strikes.

Blake is in favor of a pitcher being able to retire a batter early in the count if he can, but once the count reaches two strikes, getting that third strike becomes really important.

"If we have a guy who can do that (get a swing and miss for strike three) there is a big advantage," Blake said. "You are one pitch away from getting an out."

The important point is that the out is recorded without the batter putting the ball in play.

"One third of the balls hit in play are going to lead to a baserunner," Blake said. "That's a huge shift in the results of what happens."

It's finding out how his pitchers can get that third strike that brings Blake's study and understanding of the analytics into play.

"It helps them identify what they do that creates that," Blake said. "For some pitchers it's takes – what pitches are they throwing that hitters just can't get the bat off their shoulders. For other guys it obviously will be swing and miss on chase pitches.

"I do think there are some opportunities there for us to evaluate and understand when you are one pitch away, these are the areas when a swing and miss might happen or a chase may happen or a take may happen. We have to become more familiar with those areas to help guys target those locations."

What Blake ultimately wants, whether It's a swing and miss strike or a lazy ground ball, is for his pitchers to do what they do best.



"At the end of the day I want them to be great at what they are good at," he said. "If

we can maximize that I think that's ultimately what's going to help us make the most of what we have versus trying to fit a square peg into a round hole."

Whether Blake succeeds in reaching his goals ultimately will be determined by the individual success of the Cardinals' pitchers.

"How else do you judge it?" asked Pollard. "Knowledge is great, understanding analytics and data is important in today's world, but ultimately you are judged as a pitching coach by how your pitchers perform.

"I have no doubt in his ability to get the absolute most out of whoever he is working with."

At least one Cardinals pitcher, Adam Wainwright, believes he has already benefitted from working with Blake – and is looking forward to seeing how Blake can help him and the rest of the staff even more next season.

"The first year we just kind of all thought of him as the numbers guy, a guy who understood Trackman and all of the numbers," Wainwright said. "Last year was a really good awakening for me to realize the quality pitching coach that he is. He helped me with some mechanical issues I had never thought of

"Given more rope, I think he is going to be so good I can't even believe it."



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


RICHMOND HEIGHTS MEMORIAL LIBRARY TO HOST THE LAST CHILDREN OF MILL CREEK AUTHOR EVENT

On Thursday, December 15 at 6:30 p.m. the Richmond Heights Memorial Library will host Vivian Gibson, author of The Last Children of Mill Creek. This event will take place in the Library's program room. The Library is located on the 2nd floor of the HEIGHTS Community Center at 8001 Dale Avenue.

Vivian Gibson is a native St. Louisan who grew up in Mill Creek Valley, a neighborhood of St. Louis razed in 1959 to build a highway. Her family, friends, church community, and neighbors were all displaced by this act of "urban renewal." In this moving memoir, Gibson recreates the everyday lived experiences of her large family, including her seven siblings, her crafty college-educated mother, who moved to St. Louis as part of the Great Migration, and her at-times forbidding father, who worked two jobs to keep them all warm and fed.

Winner of a Missouri Humanities award for literary achievement, The Last Children of Mill Creek is an important book for anyone interested in urban development, race, and community history or for anyone who was once a child.

Cheers to Charcuterie!

Over the past few years, the popularity of charcuterie boards has expanded from restaurant appetizers to holiday get-togethers and everything in between. The infinitely customizable assortment of meats, cheeses, fruits, breads and spreads can add a pop of color and flavor to your table and provide many options for your family and guests. Do not be intimidated by this sometimes, difficult to pronounce word; there is no set recipe, which makes for a creative project each time!

What is Charcuterie?

Charcuterie is a French term for the art of preparing and assembling cured meat and meat products. Charcuterie-style meat and cheese boards have become very popular outside of France, and this concept has evolved to include many foods besides meat, along with a variety of presentation variations and ingredient themes. Charcuterie cones, skewers, jarcuterie (layered in a small mason jar) and dessert boards (although not technically charcuterie) are a few examples of this expanding trend.

Cheese Please!

Everyone knows cheese is the main event! "Not only does cheese pair well with all food groups, it is also an incredibly nutrient-rich food and a great source of protein and calcium," states Kelsey Bentlage, registered dietitian with St. Louis District Dairy Council. Select two to four types of cheeses to get started, depending on the size of the board. Soft ripened cheese like Brie or Camembert, semi-hard cheese like Gouda or cheddar and unique flavored cheese like blue or marinated feta are options that provide a mixture of flavors and textures.

Tips for the Perfect Board

Prepare a charcuterie board with a collection of foods from different categories. This ensures a wide variety of textures, flavors and colors to choose from, and makes it appealing to the eye as well. Here are suggested selections to include in the perfect board:

Cheese: Opt for a variety of textures, colors and shapes. Pre-slice for ease of serving and allow cheese to sit out to room temperature for enhanced flavor. Soft cheeses can be served in a small dish with a cheese knife.

Meat: Popular meat options are salami, prosciutto, pepperoni and ham. Roll or fold meats and stack.

Fresh Fruits and Vegetables: Grapes, apples, berries and dried fruits such as apricots and cherries are popular fruit choices. Cherry tomatoes, sliced cucumbers and radishes provide additional color and texture.

Bread and Crunch: Sliced baguette, crackers, pita chips, pretzel chips and nuts are all great options. Placing them in small bowls or plates on the side will save room on the board, if needed.

Extras: Complete the board with extra elements that add unique flavors. Examples include jams or preserves, olives, hummus, salted butter, pickled vegetables, dips and honey.

Simple Charcuterie Board

A charcuterie/cheese board is perfect for a small or large gathering with family or friends this holiday season. Serving cheese on a large plate or cheese board in the middle of a table allows accessibility from all sides- surely a good idea as everyone digs in!

Ingredients

- 8 ounces sharp cheddar, cubed or sliced
- 8 ounces Gouda, cubed or sliced
- 8 ounces havarti, cubed or sliced
- 1 wedge, Brie cheese 1 can black olives, drained
- 2 cups fresh fruit- grapes, berries, or apple slices
- 2 cups fresh vegetables- carrot sticks, cucumber slices, snap peas, cherry tomatoes
- 2 packages salami, Prosciutto or pepperoni, rolled
- 2 packages crackers, any kind
- ½ cup almonds
- ½ cup cashews
- $^{1}\!\!/_{\!\!4}$ cup jam or preserves, portioned in a small bowl

Instructions

Use a rimmed baking sheet or large serving board. Gather ingredients and

then arrange them on the board in the order on ingredient list. Space out cheeses. Provide cheese knives or tongs if needed.

Fill in some of the gaps with olives, fruits and vegetables.

Stack and tuck rolled meats in clusters on the board between other ingredients. Add crunchy elements like crackers and nuts.

Place jam or extra crackers in small bowls around the board if extra space is needed.

Glass is usually broken during collection or transit, so the lids may be on or off the bottles.

Metal lids may remain with metal cans or be separated, since magnets collect the steel products.

Recycling centers prefer that you leave the plastic cap on a plastic bottle so that the caps do not fall out of the conveyor system.



After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.


Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.







2022 Girls in Aviation Day Ignites Passion for Flight and More

More than 100 young women from a dozen bi-state area high schools and Girl Scout Troop 2184 learned about a variety of future careers in aviation during the Girls in Aviation



Day event held at St. Louis Downtown Airport on October 28. The participants climbed into the cockpits of various aircraft for a unique vantage point and an overview of the instrumentation, and they flew planes in high-tech simulators that enabled them to safely experience the thrill of flight. Saint Louis University's Oliver L. Parks Department of Aviation Science hosted the event at the airport, which is located near downtown St. Louis and has been home to the nation's oldest flight school for decades.

In addition to the hands-on activities, the event featured a career expo, where students had the opportunity to connect with representatives from more than a doz-



en organizations in the aviation industry about different job opportunities and the paths leading to them. Garmin, Greater St. Louis Business Aviation Association, Federal Aviation Administration, Ideal Aviation, SLU Admissions, St. Louis Downtown Airport, KSTL Air Traffic Control, St. Louis-Lambert International Airport, SLU Aviation Student Organizations, Southwestern Illinois College, Take Flight Girls, Inc., Transportation Security Administration, and the United States Army were among those investing their time to spotlight the world of opportunities in the industry. Ideal Aviation, St. Louis Downtown Airport Fire and Rescue and SLU provided the static displays of planes and the firetruck that participants got to see up close. Garmin, Ideal Aviation, St. Louis Lambert International Airport, the Greater St. Louis Business Aviation Association and Gateway Jets sponsored this year's event.

Addalyn Ruesing, 15, a sophomore at Mehlville High School, was excited to visit the flight simulation room and to try something she'd never done before. "It was pretty fun. I thought it was really realistic; like what you'd really see in a plane," said Addalyln, who came to the event without any expectations as to what she might discover. "I'm learning all about the job opportunities and careers in aviation and hearing there or lots of opportunities for women. I'd definitely look into it now."

Alicia Thomas brought her two children to the event – her daughter Lailah Kelly, a 14-year-old freshman student at Cardinal Ritter High School, and her 18-month-old son Major Thomas. While both en-



joyed time in the cockpit of one of the planes used by SLU's flight instructors, Thomas said she made the trip primarily to expose her daughter to the career opportunities the aviation sector holds for young women.

Amy Pries, Outreach Coordinator for SLU's School of Science and Engineering, said that is exactly the goal of events like Girls in Aviation. She said it aimed at introducing more young women to the fields of aviation and aerospace, where there is currently tremendous demand for pilots, engineers and various other positions.

"We hope to introduce young women of all backgrounds to new aspects of aviation," said Pries. "If they want to be a pilot, we want to support that. If they want to do something else in the industry, we want to support that as well. The airline industry and aviation industry at large is not very diverse and it has an opportunity to continue to grow and become more equitable, and there is a place for everyone."

A panel discussion with current aviation students at SLU gave the students a chance to hear from other young women who were in the early stages of embarking on a variety of aviation industry careers. Ellie Volansky, an Aviation Management Major and Flight Science Minor, shared her words of encouragement.

"If you know in your heart it's what you want to do and you're passionate about it, you have to tune out the noise. At the end of the day, it's going to pay off. Just keep pushing and surround yourself with the people and voices who do support you," said Volansky.

Lunch and Dinner In Ste. Genevieve, MO

On our recent visit to Ste. Genevieve we had some great dining experiences. We started out with lunch at the Anvil Saloon. This historic business and building has a long history of serving the public in Ste. Genevieve. The Anvil Saloon & Restaurant has called Ste. Genevieve home since 1855. The bar came from an actual 1850s steamboat which traveled the Mississippi River.

The Anvil Saloon is famous for its onion rings, fried chicken, pork tenderloin, and homemade desserts, They also have some very unique European items on the menu such as French onion soup and liver dumplings. I tried them both. The French onion soup was a traditional style with a crouton and melted cheese on the top and it was very good.

I tried the liver dumplings because I love the leber knudel zupe (liver noodle soup) when I am in Germany. It is somewhat like an Italian wedding soup with small liver meat balls and pasta in the broth. The liver dumplings



were a bit different. It was loosely ground liver cooked in a brown gravy. It is really very tasty, and is a just what you need for a cold weather warm up.



I love onion rings and theirs are fantastic. This platter of home made goodness was perfectly prepared and a large enough serving to be a side dish for both of us, and our

guest. Don't skip this masterpiece!

Our friend had the mushroom burger and it was a large, home made classic burger. I will order this the next time we are there. There is a large selection of sandwiches available.



Sue is fond of catfish in any form, so she ordered the fried catfish sandwich. She let me have a small taste, and it was excellent.

The menu includes steaks, pork chops, chicken, seafood and pasta entrees and a large number of side dishes, many of which are home-style comfort food items. There is a kids menu and lots of homemade desserts as well. You can't go wrong at the Anvil Saloon.

We had dinner that night at the Audubon's Hotel, which is also where we stayed. It is named after John J. Audubon who live in Ste. Genevieve for more than two years.

They have a large, well stocked bar area and restaurant that has a partially open kitchen, so you can enjoy the aroma of fresh made items as you await your service. We dined with the City Manager, and his wife, and he said I had to try the schnitzel & spaetzel, a Panko breaded pork cutlet topped with creamy lemon



butter sauce and capers, served with house-made spaetzel and red cabbage kraut. WOW! It was the size of a hubcap, and absolutely delicious. It was so large, I could only eat half of it. The spaetzel was a true German noodle/dumpling that was exactly like what you would get in a German beer hall. It couldn't be better.



We started out with a baked artichoke dish topped with cheese that was shared by all. It was a very tasty appetizer. A spinach and egg salad with a warm bacon vinaigrette

dressing was extremely fresh and tasty.

Sue had a shrimp and angel hair pasta dinner and our guest's wife had a seafood penne pasta. Both items were spot on. Our other guest had an apple glazed, center cut,



pork chop covered with a sweet maple glaze. It was a picture perfect, gourmet delight. I will definitely order that the next time we are there, and we will be going back. Other entrees include a cedar plank salmon dish, steaks, and a chicken buerre blanc. Many of the entree items are also available in a smaller version as a sandwich item.



You can build your own brick oven pizza and there are daily specialty dessert items. Ste. Genevieve is a great local destination, and you won't go hungry while you are there.



- 2. The Municipal Judge to be elected At-Large for the full term of two (2) years.
- 3. A member of the Board of Aldermen from Ward 1 for the full term of two (2) years.
- 4. A member of the Board of Aldermen from Ward 2 for the full term of two (2) years.
- 5. A member of the Board of Aldermen from Ward 3 for the full term of two (2) years.
- 6. A member of the Board of Aldermen from Ward 4 for the full term of two (2) years.

All candidates desiring their names on the official ballot in the election aforesaid are hereby notified to file their names in person with the Deputy City Clerk of Brentwood, Missouri, at the Brentwood City Hall, 2348 S. Brentwood Blvd., Brentwood MO 63144. The filing hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, **December 6, 2022,** through Tuesday, **December 27, 2022.** The office of the Deputy City Clerk will not be open on Saturdays and Sundays or those days designated a holiday by the City of Brentwood.

All qualified candidates are hereby notified of the statutory requirement to provide to the Deputy City Clerk, at the time of filing, proof of identity such as social security card, Missouri driver's license, or must be recognizable to the Deputy City Clerk.

Candidates must have filed the required Campaign Finance Disclosure reports, and the Financial Disclosure Statement for Political Subdivisions (Ethics) for any prior elections before they can file as a candidate for another office.

All candidates' names shall appear in the same form in which the candidate is registered to vote except that, when certified by the candidate as a necessary means of identification, the following may be allowed:

- 1. Commonly used nicknames
- 2. Commonly used abbreviations
- 3. Parenthetical reference to married names

Persons who, after filing their names as candidates, wish to withdraw as such candidate, must file their notice of withdrawal with the City Clerk in the City Clerk's office no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, December 28, 2021.

The filing fee for each elective office shall be \$5.00 payable by check or cash. In case of withdrawal of a candidate, there shall be no refund of filing fee. All filing fees shall be paid to the Deputy City Clerk at the time of filing. Provided however, if a candidate files a sworn affidavit with the City Clerk/Administrator stating he/she is financially unable to pay the filing fee, the candidate shall not be required to pay the fee.

The Deputy City Clerk shall be responsible for the oversight of the filing of candidates and shall clearly designate where candidates shall form a line to effectuate such filings and determine the order of such filings; except that, in the case of candidates who file a declaration of candidacy with the City prior to 5:00 P.M. on the first day for filing, the Deputy City Clerk shall determine by random drawing the order in which such candidates' names shall appear on the ballot. Any drawing conducted pursuant to this Section shall be conducted so that each candidate, or candidate's representative if the candidate filed under Subsection 2 of Section 115.355.2 of the Missouri Revised Statutes, may draw a number at random at the time of filing. If such drawing is conducted, the number drawn shall be recorded with the candidate's declaration of candidacy. If such drawing is conducted, the names of candidates filing on the first day of filing for each office on each ballot shall be listed in ascending order of the numbers so drawn.

All candidates must file in person in the Deputy City Clerk's office. Filing will occur at the Brentwood City Hall. This building opens at 8:00 a.m. For this purpose, a line for filing may be formed outside the main entrance to the Brentwood City Hall on Brentwood Blvd. Then at 8:00 a.m., all persons may proceed to the receptionist's desk at that time. The forms, or notices used, shall be made available on December 6, 2022 at 8:00 am by the Deputy City Clerk at the Brentwood City Hall. Each day thereafter the forms will be available from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm, Monday – Friday.
