All those with Parkinson's disease or a derivative Parkinsonism along with family members, friends, or care-givers are encouraged to attend.

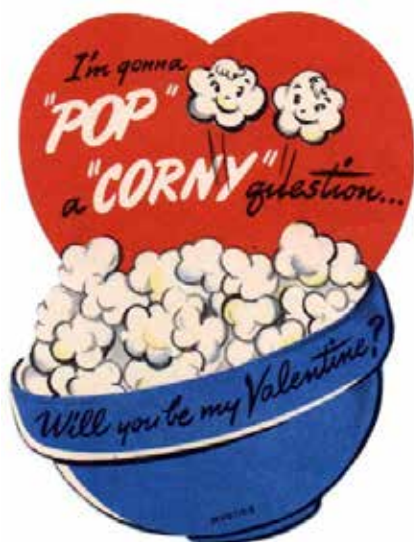

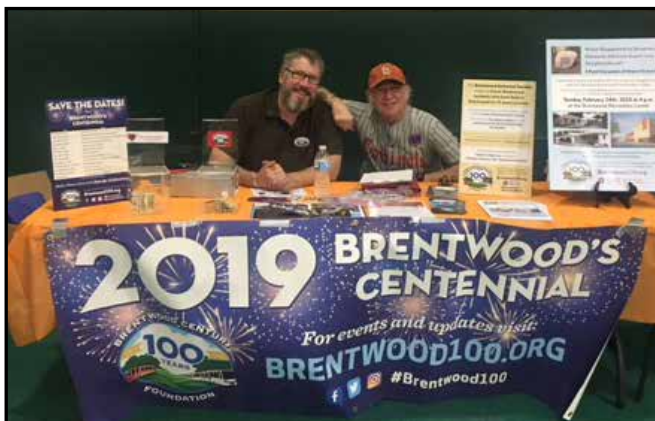

Brentwood Centennial Celebration Off to A "Trivial" Start



It's "Time to Centennialize"! Almost 200 people attended the kick-off event to Brentwood's year-long Centennial celebration on Saturday, January 26th at the St. Mary Magdalen Church gym. A Trivia Night was put on by the Brentwood Century Foundation, which is the official Centennial organization for the city. The sponsor for the night was long-time Brentwood institution, West Community Credit Union.

Twenty-two tables of celebrants participated in the competition with questions in a variety of categories from "Colorful Bands" to "News of 1919", that being the year that Brentwood was incorporated. Each category also had a bonus question about Brentwood.

The competition winner wasn't decided until the final round but a table led by Mayor Chris Thornton and other city leaders prevailed with a score of 105!

People could also win at the usual Trivia Night features, including "Heads or Tails" and "50/50". A variety of valuable raffle baskets were distributed to those whose tickets were drawn. The 10 Most Important Cardinals to Watch During Spring Training

All of the dozens of players and coaches who already have begun arriving in Jupiter, Fla., in advance of the official start of spring training next week have a story to tell.

The story of what will happen to the Cardinals this season, however, could well be determined by what happens with 10 people out of that larger group. Here is our annual pre-spring training list of the 10 most important Cardinals to watch over the next six weeks, presented in alphabetical order:

Jeff Albert – The new hitting coach has been tasked with improving the Cardinals' offense, and how well he can incorporate his philosophy of controlling the strike zone and not having hitters swing and miss balls outside the zone will be critical to the team's success. Albert has a lot of people to work with as he blends analytics with a traditional coaching approach but a key might be to watch the influence he can have with young hitters such as Harrison Bader and Tyler O'Neill. Other hitters, such as Kolten Wong and Paul DeJong, also have expressed how much they look forward to working with Albert, and one of the coach's biggest supporters has been Matt Carpenter.

Genesis Cabrera – The Cardinals are really curious to see what they have in Cabrera, a 22-year-old left-handed pitcher coming off a dominating performance as a reliever this winter in the Dominican Republic. Cabrera joined the Cardinals' system last July after being acquired in the trade that sent Tommy Pham to Tampa and made just six appearances before the end of the season. He can throw 100 miles an hour but had a history of wildness as a starter before he moved to a relief role this winter. It will be noteworthy how hard he pushes the other left-handed relievers this spring even if he doesn't end up making the big-league team to open the season.

Brett Cecil – This could be a make or break spring for Cecil, whose first two years with the Cardinals have been a major bust. He now has just two years left on his contract and will have to prove that the weight he reportedly lost this winter will allow him to report to camp in better shape and allow him to stay on the field. There probably is only one spot available for a second left-hander in the bullpen behind Andrew Miller, which means Cecil should have to out-pitch Cabrera, Chasen Shreve, Tyler Webb and possibly Austin Gomber – if the Cardinals decide to make him a reliever – if he wants to win that spot.

Dexter Fowler – He might be the most polarizing figure on the Cardinals' roster to fans who hoped the team's starting right fielder this year, and for years to come, would have been Bryce Harper. There is no debate about how horrible a season Fowler had in 2018 but the Cardinals' front office stuck behind him and Fowler says he is motivated to show that the faith was justified, even though the biggest reason likely was how much money is left on the remaining three years of his contract. The unanswered question is what happens if Fowler has a poor spring, and how long the team will give him before turning the bulk of playing time in right field over to Jose Martinez or Tyler O'Neill.

Paul Goldschmidt – Goldschmidt's track record is not in question so there really isn't anything he has to do this spring to impress his new teammates. What will be important to watch this spring, however, is how Goldschmidt seems to like his new team and surroundings. He isn't likely to make a decision in the next six weeks on his long-term future and whether he will sign an extension before he can become a free agent but this is the start of the learning curve which could lead to that decision later this summer.

Carlos Martinez – The first thing the Cardinals want to see from Martinez this spring is that he is healthy and free of the injuries which curtailed his 2018 season. Next, they want to see a renewed focus proving that he wants to stay in the rotation. There were questions about his focus last year, as there have been in the past. It seemed to improve when he was moved to the bullpen and that remains as an option for this year as well if the issue is still there this spring. There are some people who think Martinez would be the Cardinals' best closer option and that it also would be the best fit for him. Time will tell.

Tyler O'Neill – Unless there is a move or an injury that frees up a roster spot, O'Neill appears to be heading to camp without a major-league job to start the season. That all could change over the next six weeks, however, and what O'Neill needs

to do is stay healthy, show he can cut down on his strikeouts and still produce the same or better power than he displayed a year ago. That could force the Cardinals into making a trade that would open up a spot and change the makeup of the four-man bench which as camp opens appears to be set with Jose Martinez, Jedd Gyorko, Yairo Munoz and Francisco Pena.

Marcell Ozuna – The question Ozuna will have to answer with his performance this spring is how is his surgically-repaired right shoulder? He suffered with an injury all of last season, affecting his throwing more than his offense, and the unknown is how well he has recovered since most of his off-season rehab was done away from the Jupiter complex and Cardinals' supervision. The Cardinals will be more concerned with Ozuna reaching 100 percent health before the start of the regular season instead of March 1, but he has to be able to play enough to get his timing down and be ready to go at the end of the spring.

Alex Reyes – There probably is nobody Cardinals fans will be rooting for to succeed more this spring than Reyes because of how much he has had to go through the last two seasons.

Reyes is still regarded as one of the top pitching prospects in baseball even though he has logged only four innings at the major league level since 2016 because of Tommy John surgery and a torn lat muscle. The Cardinals will wait to see how Reyes is performing and feeling before deciding whether to use him as a starter or reliever this season, and in either case their whole goal in 2019 is to get him through the full season without more injury problems.

Mike Shildt – Even though he took over as the Cardinals manager in the middle of last season, there is a difference when a manager is in charge of a team from the first day of spring training, which is where Shildt finds himself this year. He knows most of the players and they know him, which should make the transition easier, but it bears watching about what kind of camp Shildt runs and how he stresses the fundamental work which has appeared lacking in the past. It's likely the camp will be fast-paced, positive and designed to have everybody ready to play when the regular season opens on March 28 in Milwaukee.

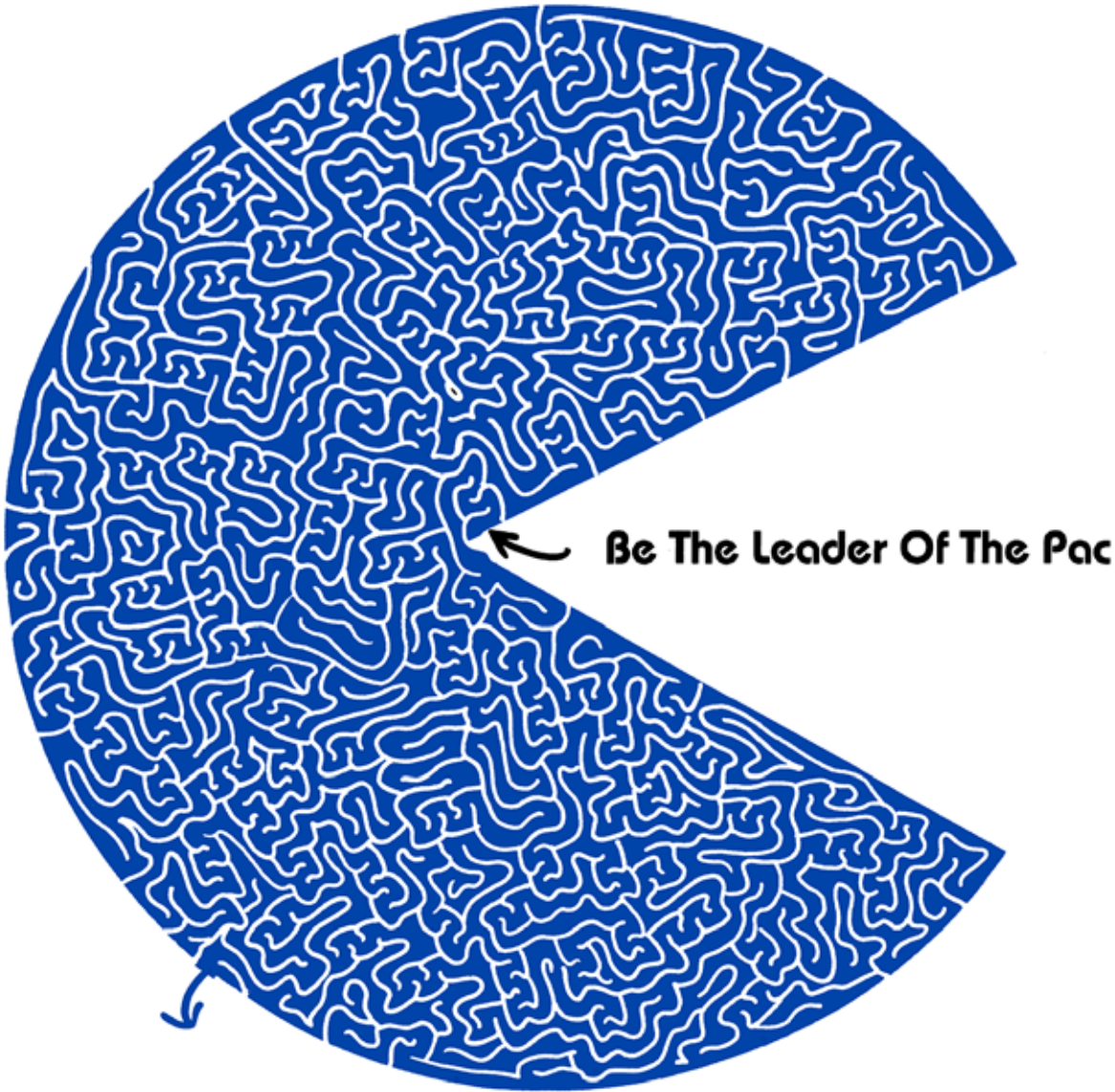

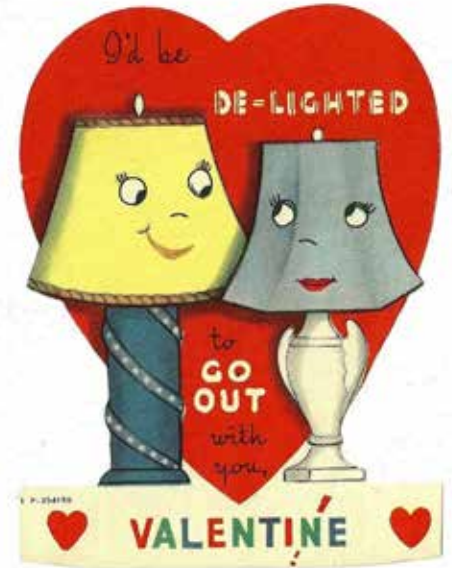

Childhood Memories Still Live!

Returning from Chicago, we stopped in Springfield, IL to visit a radio friend and Channel 20 meteorologist, Joe Crain. He took us to Keefner's Sandwiches, Subs and Stories for lunch.

Joe told us that the original Keefners was a soda fountain in downtown Springfield and my memory flashed upon huge ice cream sundaes and delicious chocolate malts!

As a child, I would visit my uncle during the State Fair and he would take me to Keefners on each visit. Needless to say, these are very fond memories. I told this to Angie Keefner, who is the second generation proprietor of Keefner's and she pointed to a shelf above the bar. Low and behold, the original, green, Hamilton Beech mixer was sitting there in a place of honor. They also have the old adding machine and cash register on display as well.

The menu is filled with comfort food and gourmet selections as well as some "healthy" items and of course, the mandatory Springfield favorite, the Horse Shoe and Pony Shoe sandwiches. A Horse Shoe is your favorite protein on a piece of toast piled with french fries and covered in cheese sauce, YUM! A Pony Shoe is half the size of the Horse Shoe. Almost every restaurant and bar in Springfield serves their version of this local favorite.

Keefner's also has a small bar and a great selection of craft and premium beers. A large chalk board covers one wall. You will see a very colorful display of the available beers as well as an ever changing, floor to ceiling, tribute to Spider Man. The Chef, another family member, is also the in-house artist responsible for these drawings.

My wife, Sue started her lunch with the Lobster Bisque. It was delicious. I had the home made Mushroom Soup, also delicious. Sue had the Italian Beef sandwich with home made chips and I tried the Braunschweiger sandwich with a slice of onion. It's difficult to find a good Braunschweiger sandwich and this was very good one and larger than I expected. A bit of spicy brown mustard and it approached perfection. I also had a small side salad that was enough for two people.

The portions were large enough that I had to pass on that chocolate malt for dessert, so we will be going back!

The next time you visit Springfield, IL you can experience the history of Abe Lincoln and Keefner's Subs and Stories. Its worth a visit!

Susan G. Komen Missouri told supporters today to expect some changes at its signature fundraising event this spring. Komen has been hard at work on the next evolution in the history of the Race for the Cure® series, and residents of the Greater St. Louis area will be among the first in the country to see it!

Komen Missouri will be one of 26 locations across the country to launch the new Susan G. Komen MORE THAN PINK Walk™. About African Lions

Big Cat Country at the Saint Louis Zoo is home to African lions Ingozi (male) and Cabara (female). The lion is the only social cat that lives in family groups, or prides. African lions live in a number of different habitats: grassy plains, open woodlands, semi-desert areas and in high mountains. Lions usually hunt with members of their family group, but it is the adult females who do most of the hunting. Lion populations are declining in the wild due to habitat loss and prey depletion, poaching and other illegal human activity. The Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute Center for Conservation of Carnivores in Africa is working to save this species from extinction.

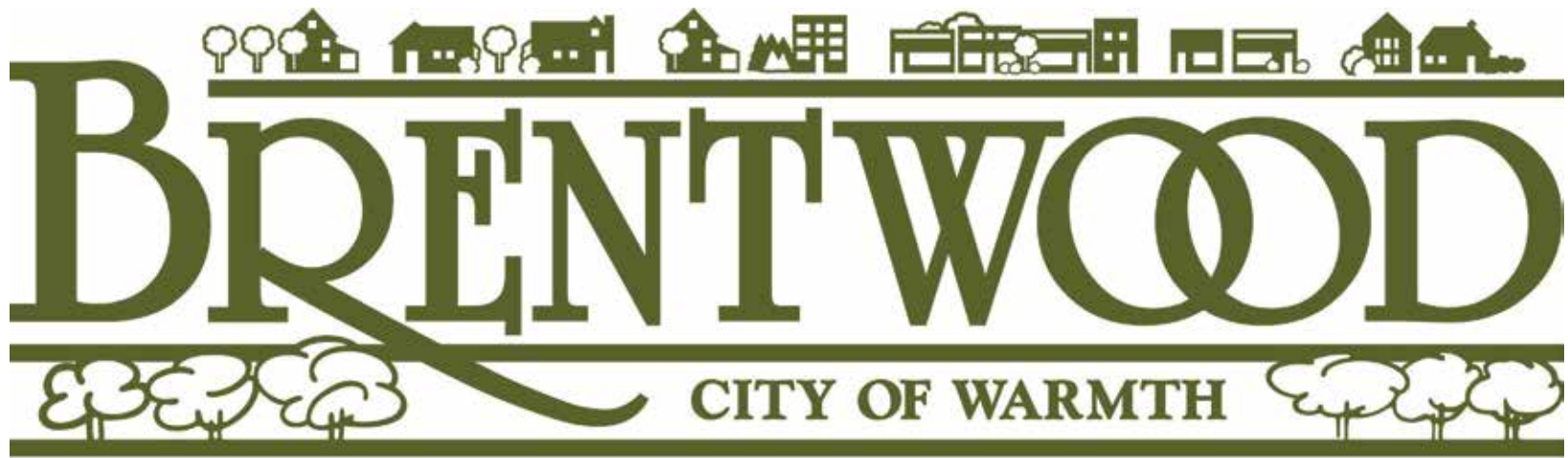

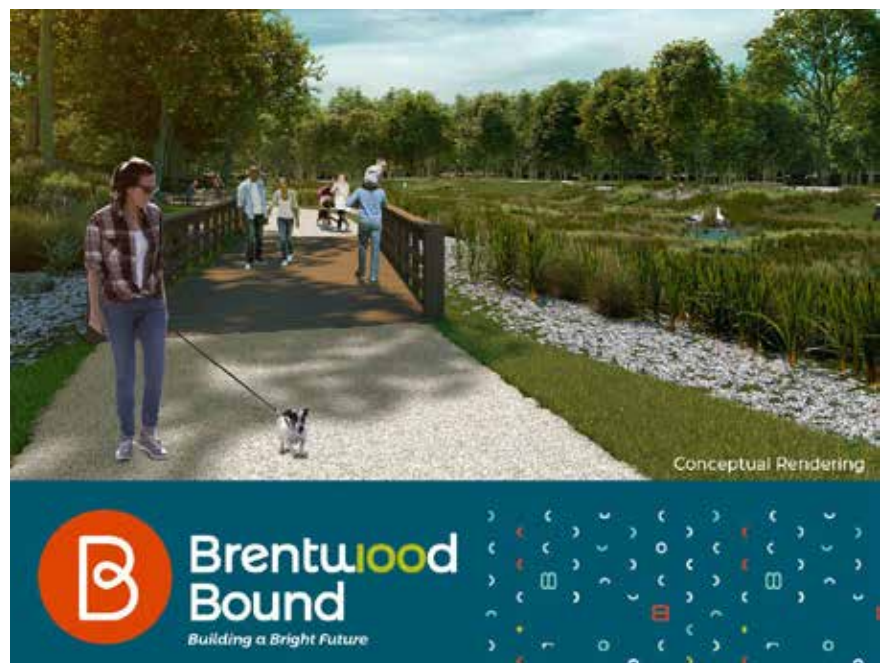

City of Brentwood

The City of Brentwood currently has Certificates of Participation (COPS) to fund a portion of the project. This is an alternative to traditional bond funding that allows cities to acquire land, buildings and equipment through a lease-purchase agreement without increasing taxes.

Potential Funding

Economic Development Sales Tax

Municipalities are authorized by state statute to implement a sales tax for economic development.

- This sales tax must be used for economic development activities detailed in the statute.
 - This can include improving or building roads, sidewalks and other infrastructure, adding parks and trails and updating existing buildings and property if it will improve the community.
- The tax must be approved by the majority of voters.
- The Board of Aldermen must vote to collect the tax and can suspend or repeal it any time.
- This sales tax does not authorize the City to incur additional debt, it only authorizes the City to collect a sales tax to produce revenue for economic development activities.

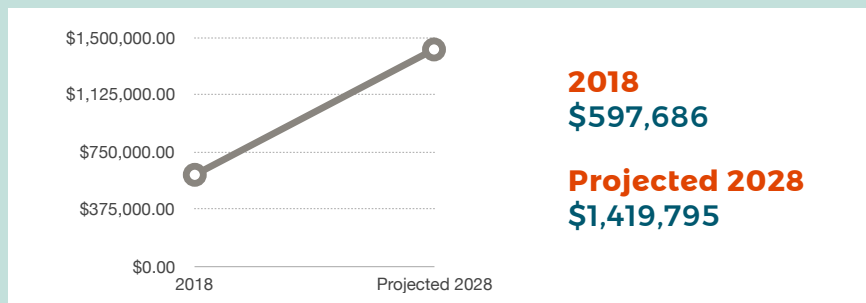

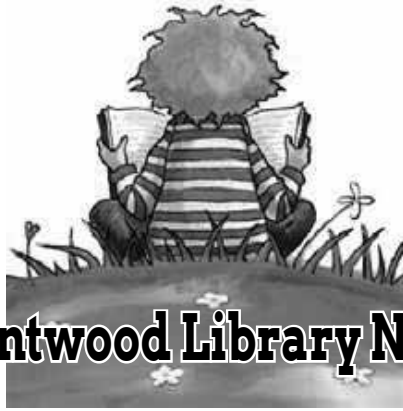

Zoo Welcomes New Babies



Over a 10-week period, November 20, 2018, through January 30, 2019, 11 calves from six different ungulate species were born at the Saint Louis Zoo! The newborns — three Speke's gazelles, two addaxes, a Soemmerring's gazelle, a Grevy's zebra, two lesser kudus and two lowland nyalas — are healthy and bonding with their mothers behind the scenes at Red Rocks. Zebra foal Nova and her mom can be seen in their habitat, weather permitting. These important births were recommended by Association of Zoos and Aquariums Species Survival Plans (SSP), which are responsible for maintaining genetically healthy populations of these ungulate species in North American zoos. Five of these SSPs are coordinated by Zoo staff. The Saint Louis Zoo WildCare Institute Center for Conservation in the Horn of Africa and Saharan Wildlife Recovery Center support conservation of unique species in Africa.

Living in the Past in Iowa

This time of the year thoughts of spring and spring break are on our minds. You don't have to fly south to find sandy beaches and sunny days to find an enjoyable destination to spend with the family. A short drive north from St. Louis to Urbandale, Iowa will provide a fun and educational family vacation. Urbandale is located west of Des Moines, Iowa.

Visit the Living History Museum that was opened in 1970 to find an outdoor interactive history museum. The museum is celebrating 300 years of the Iowa history of agricultural farmers and their families. Climb aboard a tractor drawn wagon for a tour of the 1700 Ioway tribe farm, the 1850 and 1900 farms. The 1700 Ioway Indian farm is a teepee and the exhibit portrays the farming techniques and lifestyle of the Ioway Native Americans. Guides are dressed in period clothes and are available to answer any questions from visitors.

You'll walk down the dirt road and visit each of the old farmsteads. The tractor wagon will pick you up at the end of the road after you have visited each of the farmsteads. The next farm is the 1850 farm. Settlers bought cheap land and farmed for profit. You'll walk past a log barn and fields of hay where there will be chickens, turkeys, cows, pigs and horses. The farmers raised corn, wheat and potatoes. The livestock provided power in the fields, and food for the families to eat and sell. The 1900 farm shows how horse-power helped the farmers. The tours are self-guided so you can spend as much time as you like wandering down the country road, visiting the farms and talking to the costumed guides in period clothes. The historic interpreters are at each homestead and will explain what it was like to live in that era. 300 years of agricultural history are represented that show rural life in the 19th century Midwest.

The end of the tour will take you to the 1875 historic town of Walnut Hill. You can walk on the wooden plank sidewalks to each building. The town has several wooden and brick buildings. The village has a drugstore with apothecary jars and a sign "Leeches Sold Here." Watch a blacksmith at work and step inside the newspaper office "The Advocate." In the Greteman Brothers General Store you will find a millinery shop and maybe see a quilt being made.

Be sure to see the white church where on October 4, 1979, Pope John Paul II delivered his homily to more than 350,000 people. "You who are farmers today are stewards of a gift from God which was intended for the good of all humanity. You have the potential to provide food for the millions who have nothing to eat and thus to help rid the world of famine."

We stayed at the 4-star boutique Renovo Hotel resembling a modern farm house. Renovo is latin for "refresh, relax, renew."

Another place nearby to see is the beautiful 1867 victorian mansion, the Flynn Mansion, Farm and Barn, an Iowa Historic Site. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. The Flynn home was one of the first homes built in Urbandale.

The general touring season at the Living History Farm is May 1 through October 14. Many special events and historic dinners take place in off-season. Check the website for details. Hours are Sunday 12noon - 4pm and Monday - Saturday 9am - 4pm.

David C. Ekin to Retire as President of Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired

After 25 years of serving as President and Chief Executive Officer for the St. Louis Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired and over 35 years in services to those who are blind



or have low vision, David C. Ekin will step down in August 2019.

Under Ekin's leadership, the organization's budget increased from \$400,000 to \$2 million, enabling it to provide more specialized education and training for those who are blind or visually impaired to enhance their independence, health, safety, developmental growth and social interaction.

Seeing the need for services to children, he evaluated the need and implemented school-age services to area school districts.

He enacted a development program to address the need for more diverse funding sources that included direct mail and events, receiving the first multi-year grant, achieving more robust grant writing programs, and hiring the first director of development.

Working with the Board of Directors, he put into place a policy for term limits, board recruitment tools, board member expectations and other policies.

Before coming to the Society, Ekin was Executive Director of Delta Gamma Center for Children with Visual Impairments

where he inherited a \$100,000 deficit which, by the time of his resignation, was balanced through a combination of cost control and increased revenue.

Ekin's other positions included Director of Programs and Services at Junior Blind of America (Foundation for the Junior Blind), Los Angeles, CA; Instructor of Social Work, MacMurray College, Jacksonville, IL; and Director of Social Services, Illinois School for the Visually Impaired, Jacksonville, IL. Throughout his career he implemented and managed service delivery models for individuals from birth to older adults, leading to a significant increase in numbers served.

As a member and officer of the Association for Education and Rehabilitation of the Blind and Visually Impaired, Ekin was instrumental in the creation and development of a national certification process for Vision Rehabilitation professionals. He was also the recipient of the VisionServe Alliance's Excellence in Leadership Award and MacMurray College's Distinguished Career Award.

Ekin graduated from MacMurray College, Jacksonville, IL in 1977 with a Bachelor of Science, Sociology, and Psychology, with honors in Sociology. He received a Master of Social Work at Washington University, St. Louis, MO.

"It has been an honor to serve under Dave's leadership on the Board of Directors," said past Board Chairman Greg Levine, President, Nidec Motor Corporation, Motion Control.

"With Dave's gentle, but focused leadership style he successfully led and strengthened the Society through the multiple strategic plans, maintained services through the great recession and celebrated the Society's amazing 100 year anniversary with the St. Louis community," he said.

"Dave's focused leadership and tireless work made a lasting and significant impact on the Society's ability to enhance,

empower, and enrich the clients of the St. Louis Society for the Blind," he added.

According to current Board Chair Michael B. McKinnis, General Counsel Emeritus, Bryan Cave Leighton Paisner LLP, "David first joined the Society as President in 1994 after many years in the blindness /low vision field, and he has been the rock of the Society ever since. His, calm, steady and effective leadership has caused the Society to flourish greatly during his tenure and, although we are looking forward to a bright future for the Society, we will certainly miss his day to day presence, leadership and genuine good cheer."

Ekin said, "In my 37 years of work in the field of blindness and vision impairment I have been fortunate to have worked with some of the most committed and professional persons one could ever hope to work with.

"It has been an honor to be part of the Society for the Blind for 25 of those years and witness the impact and difference our staff makes in the lives of the children and adults they work with every day! If my impact was even a small portion of what they do my career was well served," he said.

Ekin said he has no plans after retirement except to relax, having spent 35 years in the blindness and vision impairment field.

Founded in 1911, the Missouri Association for the Blind has grown from a small organization to one which now serves more than 1,500 individuals of all ages annually through comprehensive Vision Rehabilitation and Special Education Services.

Today's St. Louis Society for the Blind and Visually Impaired provides specialized education and training for individuals in order to enhance their independence, health, safety, adjustment, developmental growth, and social interaction.

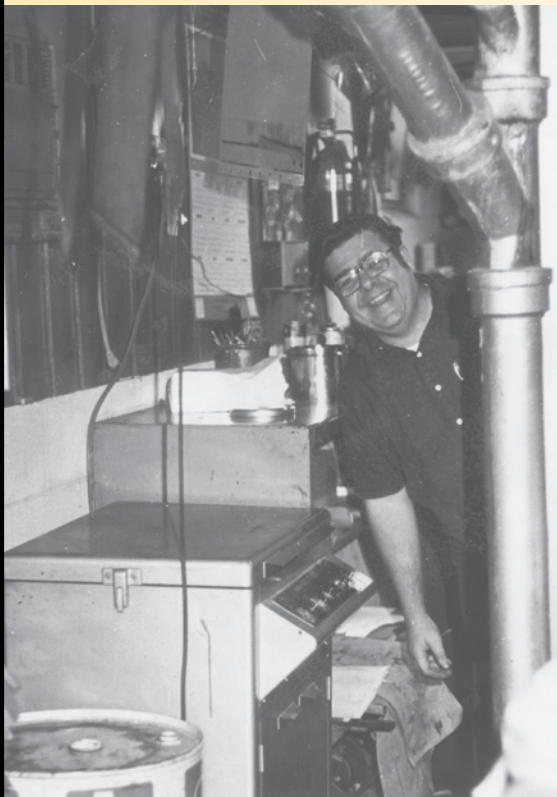

Saint Patrick's Day in Dogtown!

Preparations are moving ahead for the big upcoming Saint Patrick's Day celebration in the Dogtown (Clayton-Tamm) on March 17. Those planning to attend the big event in the old South Saint Louis neighborhood on the saint's feast day should be prepared for a few changes and increased security.

For one, Ancient Order of Hibernians Saint Patrick's Day Parade, now in its 36th year (34 years in Dogtown), will step off at 11:00 AM, a change from last year's start time. Parade organizers felt an earlier start time would make for a more family friendly event. But as in years past, the Hibernians promise this year's parade will be as grand as ever, with over 100 colorful floats featuring Irish Family Clans and salutes to Irish heritage, history, faith, and culture.

The second annual Dogtown Irish Festival is a joint effort of Dogtown United, a group community and businesses leaders, and the Hibernians. The purpose of the festival is to highlight the unique spirit and celebrated history of the Dogtown neighborhood. The Festival kicks off at the conclusion of the Hibernian Parade.

The festival will feature food and drink from numerous vendors, and there will be a Merchant Village on Clayton just east of Tamm with Irish shirts, jewelry, and organizers promise much more. The festival stage, located at Clayton @ Wise by the gazebo, will feature live music from Rusty Nail from 1pm to 5pm.

All outside sales will cease at 6:00 PM and business establishments on Tamm will close at 8:00 PM.

INCREASED SECURITY AND TRAFFIC CONTROL

Those attending the parade and festival will also see increased security from previous years.

Those entering the festival/parade area will be required to go thorough checkpoints. Festival Organizers has contacted for over 75 security guards from Contemporary Services Corporation (CSC) distributed between 25 entry/exit areas and along the parade route. Security will be operational between 6:00 AM to 10:00 PM to enforce festival policies, direct traffic, marshal the route, and protect street closures. A list of checkpoints is listed below.

No Parking along the parade route will be enforced promptly at 6:00 AM on the morning of the 17th. The parade route will be locked down to public traffic at 8:00 AM. All are strongly advised to avoid driving near the parade route after 8:00 AM due to traffic congestion. When possible, please consider carpooling, using a cab, or arranging a drop-off as parking in Dogtown will be extremely limited.

A new safety feature added this year is TAMM AVENUE AND ALL CROSS STREETS ONE BLOCK IN EACH DIRECTION WILL BE CLOSED BETWEEN 6:00 AM TO 10:00 PM to ensure pedestrian safety. (See "Street Closures" below)

Many of these cross streets off Tamm will be designated "NO PARKING" areas. (See "No Parking" list below)

Parking and traffic along this portion of Tamm will not reopen until later than in prior years. It will assist festival organizers in disbanding the event and also allow the group to clean the site before street parking and normal traffic resumes.

To prevent unauthorized vehicles from accessing the parade route and festival area, heavy barricades will be placed on most of the streets intersecting with the parade route along Tamm. These streets will remain blocked until cleaning is finished and they are reopened. Potentially as late as 10:00PM

When departing the festival area, please be advised that east/west traffic through the festival area will be limited on March 17th. Manchester will remain open throughout the day. Otherwise, if you are parked to the west of Tamm, please depart the neighborhood heading west toward McCausland or Skinker. If you are parked east of Tamm, please depart heading east toward Hampton.

NO OUTSIDE ALCOHOL ALLOWED

All backpacks and coolers entering the checkpoints WILL BE SEARCHED, and anyone trying to enter the checkpoints with alcohol or glass will be turned away. The rules are in place to discourage over imbibing, to stem underage drinking and to cut down on the amount of trash in the parade area. Mo State Liquor Control Agents in the Dogtown area on Saint Patrick's Day will maintain a zero tolerance policy and are efficient at recognizing offenders. Those caught drinking underage will be issued a summons that will result in a court appearance and a maximum penalty of \$500.00.

When possible, please avoid bringing any backpacks or coolers into the festival area. Families who need backpacks or coolers for childcare purposes will be admitted by security after a brief search at the checkpoint. If alcohol, or other prohibited items (i.e. glass) are comingled in the contents of the backpacks, those particular items will not be allowed and must be disposed prior to entering the festival area.

The Festival organizers want to remind those attending St. Patrick's Day festivities on March 17 that the Dogtown/Clayton Tamm neighborhood is a residential area and that everyone should be respectful of both local residents and their property.

Trespassing can be punishable by up to one year in jail and/or a significant fine. Vandalism can result in \$250.00 to \$500.00 fine and/or 90 days in jail. Also illegally parked

vehicles will be ticketed and towed.

Festival organizers urge all attendees to drink responsibly and drink plenty of water. Please help out the local residents by putting your refuse into a nearby trash bin or recycling bin which will be deployed throughout the area.


