



Our families were good customers at these places.



PORTRAITS OF AFRICAN AMERICAN WOMEN IN MISSOURI: BEFORE, DURING AND AFTER THE CIVIL WAR

On Thursday, February 23 at 6:30 p.m. the Richmond Heights Memorial Library will host Carole Shelton, acclaimed storyteller and member of the Missouri Humanities Council Speakers Bureau, as she presents Portraits of African American Women in Missouri: before, during and after the Civil War. This event will take place in the Library's program room. The Library is located on the 2nd floor of the HEIGHTS Community Center at 8001 Dale Avenue.

This program offers first and third person portrayals of Black women in Missouri, creating biographical sketches which illustrate the impact of enslavement and pending freedom upon their lives. Ms.



Shelton's presentation will focus on two icons of St. Louis history, Harriet Scott, wife of Dred Scott, and Annie Malone, businesswoman and philanthropist.

Carole Shelton is a retired educator from the St. Louis City Schools, a professional storyteller for more than twenty-five years and an author. As a storyteller it is a calling to share the real life experiences, the myths, the legends, and folk tales of all people. Story telling evokes the imagination, it empowers, it educates, and it entertains. It is through the art of storytelling that our actions can reach new heights and contribute so much more to ourselves, our families, our communities and the world.

Nearly 10% of Apex's micro markets are hybrid facilities, which highlight a chef-prepared hot food component available for purchase.

Both Elite Cuisine and Superior Vend-All will maintain their offices at 314 Marshall Rd. in St. Louis, Mo., 3707 East 14th St. in Kansas City, Mo., and 2309 W. Main St. in Sedalia, Mo. The consolidated company plans to immediately expand by adding a Columbia, Mo. office to handle clients that include 3M and Good Day Farms. Orchid Show Returns to Missouri Botanical Garden

The beloved Orchid Show returns to the Missouri Botanical Garden this winter for the first time in three years.

See thousands of vibrant orchid blooms in nearly every color of the rainbow in the Garden's brand-new Emerson Conservatory. The Orchid Show is open January 28–February 26 during regular Garden hours, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday. The Orchid Show is included with general Garden admission.



The show is a once-a-year opportunity to see plants from the Garden's impressive large and diverse orchid collection. Different orchid species bloom at different times, so the Orchid Show is constantly changing as new orchids come into bloom and are brought out on display. The Emerson Conservatory opened at the end of 2022 as a new year-round conservatory at the Garden. Permanent displays of Mediterranean plants highlight plants from South Africa, Australia, and the Eastern Mediterranean. Many of these species are new to the Garden.



PARTIAL MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 17, 2023 BOARD OF ALDERMEN MEETING

CALL TO ORDER & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Call to Order - Mayor Dimmitt called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The pledge immediately followed. Pledge of Allegiance

ROLL CALL

Roll Call – all members were present. Alderman Plufka – Present Alderwoman Tice - Present Alderwoman Sims - Present Alderman Wegge - Present Alderman Gould – Present Alderman Lochmoeller – Present Alderwoman O'Neill - Present Alderman Shelton – Present

Additional people present at the meeting included: Eric Gruenenfelder (Director of Parks and Recreation), Whitney Kelly (Director of Planning and Development), Larry Cawvey (IT Director), Jim Mc Intyre (Police Major), Ronnie Cottrell (Fire Chief), Bola Akande (City Administrator), Kevin O'Keefe (City Attorney), and Kelle Silvey (Deputy City Clerk)

PUBLIC HEARING

Public Hearing for a New Conditional Use Permit for Arts In Motion Children's Dance And Music School within the tenant space addressed as 2949 S. Brentwood Boulevard.

Mayor gavel opened the Public Hearing.

Whitney Kelly presented the application stating that tenant is leasing the space and has been in this location since 2016, but license lapsed and requires Conditional Use Permit since the original documents cannot be found. This is a technicality for cleaning up licenses. They are making no changes to the space or exterior of the building. The tenant, Alicia Jonas, was present and requested a first and second reading since this matter is a technicality.

Mayor gavel closed the hearing.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Natalie Smith stated she runs a business, Bauserhaus, in Brentwood, Business permit from Webster Groves and is zoned in Webster Groves, located in Breckenridge Industrial Ct., and has been there over a decade. She stated that the City of Brentwood bought the building and since the flood she can't get any response regarding her property. She wants acknowledgement from Brentwood.

MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS

Mayor David Dimmitt - Welcomed everyone to the new year. He offered thanks to all who contributed to the annual "Pillow Fight", noting the donations go toward a great cause. They received 425 Pillows (302 Police, 123 Fire).

Alderman Brandon Wegge - Ward 2 - Offered awareness that at the Public Works meeting, direction was given to staff to keep carnival rides for Brentwood Days, even though the new park is not conducive to having rides and the event may need to continue at the sports complex.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Brentwood Bound Update - Craig Schluter with Navigate Building Solution presented the update report (Information available in BoardDocs). He noted construction costs, soft costs, and category of funding information update included the West Community Credit Union donation of \$400,000.

Brentwood Bound - Kerb, Eck & Braeckel, LLP 3rd Quarter Audit Presentation - The City Administrator presented the information stating that KEB was hired in 2018 for the oversight of 2018/2019 Certificates of Participation (COPs) and how funds are being expensed. It was noted that there were no exceptions in the 3rd quarter report.

Alderman Plufka noted there was an exception on page 3subsection 2, regarding Armstrong Teasdale. It was noted that there was an error that had since been corrected. The reason for the error will be shared upon review.

The City Attorney amended the City Administrator's report, should the record of this meeting be unclear or inaccurate – stating that the City of Brentwood has communicated with the owner/tenant of the Bauserhaus operation month after month through the city's official legal counsel, engaged by the city to deal with the property and has explained the city's position over and over again. This matter is in litigation, and he respectfully suggested that any further communications be directed solely to the city's counsel to be addressed by the city in that matter in the future. Statements made with respect to the lack of responsiveness and lack of concern are totally and completely inaccurate.

City Attorney did the Second reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderwoman Sims to perfect Bill into Ordinance form.

The City Attorney clarified that the 3% was not statutory but a constitutional amendment by Missouri voters that set the maximum of 3% point of sale tax within the corporate limits of any city. We [Brentwood] could levy less if wanted, but not more than 3%.

Roll Call: By a vote of 8 (yes) to 0 (No) Bill #6439 will become Ordinance # 5072.

The Bill No. 6442- Intergovernmental Agreement for the City of Clayton to Provide the City of Brentwood Technology Services - An Ordinance First and Second Reading

City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill.

Information was presented by Larry Cawvey, IT Director, who stated that the current agreement is ending and for the continuation of services they want to co-term the agreements for the cities to the same end-date as Richmond Heights, meaning the new initial term will be for 18 months, and then the future terms will be 36 months after that. In the current term, Brentwood paid 35% and this will be going down to 31% as this is a good partnership for Clayton, Brentwood, and Richmond Heights.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka, seconded by Alderman Gould for Second reading of the Bill. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

City Attorney did a second reading of the Bill and noted that he helped prepare the legislation as he also works for the City of Clayton.

Motion was made by Alderwoman Tice and seconded by Alderman Shelton to perfect Bill into Ordinance form. Roll call:

By a vote of 8 (Yes) to 0 (No), Bill #6442 will become Ordinance # 5073.

NEW BUSINESS

Bill No. 6443 - Mission and Purpose of the Communications Committee First and Second Reading City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill.

Information was presented by Alderman Gould as Chairman of the Communications Committee. The Alderman stated this was the committee's first order of business, to update the previous description of the committee so it does not restrict the purpose, and so it aligns it more closely with other committees in the code.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderman Lochmoeller for a Second reading of the Bill.

Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

The City Attorney did a second reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderwoman Tice and seconded by Alderman Wegge to perfect Bill into Ordinance Form. Roll call: By a vote of 8 (Yes) to 0 (No), Bill #6443 will become Ordinance # 5074.

Bill No. 6444 - An Ordinance Approving a Subdivision Plat To Subdivide Property Located at 8828 W. Pendleton Avenue Into Three (3) Single-Family Residential Lots. First and Second Reading

The City Attorney did the first reading of the Bill.

Information was presented by Whitney Kelly who shared that the acreage is to be separated into 3 lots, which received a 7 (yes) to 0 (No) vote by Planning and Zoning Commission. This is just to subdivide lots and it not for homes. Applicant requested a second reading.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka, seconded by Alderman Shelton for a Second reading of the Bill. Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.

City Attorney did a second reading of the Bill.

Motion was made by Alderman Plufka and seconded by Alderman Gould to Perfect Bill into Ordinance form.

Public Invited to New McGrath and BECC Grand Opening

The Brentwood School District invites the community to tour the new home of McGrath Elementary School and the Brentwood Early Childhood Center during a Community Open House event on Saturday, Feb. 25 from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. The new McGrath and BECC is located on the northwest corner of Litzsinger Road and High School Drive.

Construction on the 60,000-square-foot building was completed in December 2022. It features flexible, collaborative learning spaces that are designed to engage students and support innovative instruction. There are 18 total classrooms, as well as dedicated spaces for art, music, physical education, counseling, intervention and special education services.

The building has separate, secure main entrances for both McGrath and BECC that meet school safety and security best practices. This includes a visitor management system to screen guests in each main office before granting access to the rest of the school. The McGrath gymnasium also serves as an ICC 500 storm shelter, which meets FEMA specifications and provides near-absolute protection in extreme weather events.

This project was made possible by Prop E, a \$29 million bond issue to enhance safety, accessibility and student learning at the district's two elementary schools and early childhood center. The building was designed by HTK Architects, managed by Navigate Building Solutions and built by ICS Construction.

"Opening a brand-new school is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," said Superintendent Dr. Brian Lane. "This building will meet the needs of our students, families and community for generations to come, and we are excited to cut the ribbon, open the doors and welcome the new McGrath and BECC to the neighborhood."





February is National Children's Dental Health Month

The American Dental Health Association annually reminds the public of the importance of tooth brushing and oral hygiene. Research confirms oral health matters for all ages as it is key to overall health and well-being. Tooth decay is identified as the most common childhood chronic disease, and cavities may occur in baby teeth. Parents and caregivers are encouraged to begin modeling healthy habits at a young age by teaching children to prioritize nutrition, brushing, and flossing.



"Families can make tooth brushing a regular, enjoyable activity to share," explains Fouad Salama, BDS, MS, professor and specialty care unit director for pediatric dentistry at A.T. Still University-Missouri School of Dentistry & Oral Health (ATSU-MOSDOH) and the St. Louis Dental Center. "Our goal is to inspire children and parents or caregivers to adopt lifelong habits for oral healthcare at home and to make a bi-annual dental exam routine for the whole family."

Suggested best practices at home include:

- Brush teeth in the morning and evening for two minutes with toothpaste containing fluoride.
- Brush gums gently, and brush all the way to the back of the mouth.
 - Brush the tongue from the back to the front.
- Make tooth brushing fun with colorful brushes, accompanied by favorite songs or reading special books afterwards.
- Floss once a day if the child is old enough to understand flossing and has tight contact between teeth.
- Ensure a positive dental experience for children, building the foundation for lifelong oral health habits.
- Don't forget to establish a "dental home" for your child by having a dental office/dentist no later than 12 months of age, as well as visit the dentist regularly for a cleaning and oral exam.

"It is imperative kids learn oral hygiene is critical for health," emphasizes Poonam Jain, BDS, MS, MPH, vice dean for clinical affairs and advanced dental education, AT-SU-MOSDOH and the St. Louis Dental Center. "Brushing twice a day is one of the most important investments we can make in our health. It pays huge dividends!"





Combine all ingredients in a food processor and pulse until smooth. If you do not have a food processor, you can combine all ingredients in a bowl and whisk together until smooth. Cover and chill for 30 minutes.

Serve chilled with your choice of raw veggies, crackers, or any other snack you like to dip and enjoy!













Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.





St. Louis Area Diaper Bank Hosts Third Annual Bloody Mary Brunch

The St. Louis Area Diaper Bank will hold its third annual Bloody Mary Brunch on Sun., March 26 from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. The event – which includes Bloody Mary and mimosa bar and light brunch – will be held at the Diaper Bank's headquarters located at 6141 Etzel Ave. and is for those 21 years of age and older. Tickets are \$50 per person, and all monetary donations will go to support the Diaper Bank's period supply program, which helps nearly one million girls and women annually with period kits.

Attendees will have the interactive opportunity to count, sort, and pack period supply kits for local school partners. Other activities include raffles, a glitterati selfie station, special guest speaker Jennifer Gaines from Alliance for Period Supplies, and a brief presentation about the agency's efforts to end period poverty in St. Louis.

The period supply program distributes period supplies through community partners and advocates for the elimination of "period poverty". To date more than two million period supplies have been distributed in St. Louis, with 75,000 period supplies allocated each week. Two-thirds of low-income women in St. Louis cannot afford menstrual hygiene products, with 46% of low-income women having to choose between food and period supplies.

Founded in 2014, the St. Louis Area Diaper Bank provides diaper and period supply access to the region's low-income families, as well as raises community awareness about the causes and consequences of diaper need and period poverty. The nonprofit is a member of the National Diaper Bank Network and its sister organization Alliance for Period Supplies, a nationwide nonprofit dedicated to eliminating diaper need and "period poverty" in America. The period supply program ensures access to menstrual hygiene products, which allows full participation in daily life with dignity.

2022 SEASON OF GIVING

As has been our tradition, Bilingual International Assistant Services hosted the agency's annual Season of Giving event on December 25, 2022. Twenty-three volunteer drivers plus friends and family, some coming as far as Columbia, Illinois and Weldon Spring, Missouri, gathered at our building that morning to pick up deliveries of gifts and meals for over one hundred older adult households. Anticipating increased opportunity for social visiting as compared to previous pandemic years, volunteers were given agency t-shirts for easy identification. Eleven additional volunteers assisted with other facets: picking up donated supplies, helping assemble tote bags, shuttling meals from the vendor to our office, and checking in volunteer drivers. Some volunteers even donated toothpaste, toothbrushes, and store-bought tote bags. This year certainly was the best in terms of direct volunteer donation! We also experienced the most robust client participation since pre-COVID years.

Agency outreach staff provided the names of financially needy clients, 50 years and older, living in St. Louis City and County, who would be at home on Christmas Day. We significantly increased our client base over the last three years to include 105 households, comprised of 160 individuals. Most recipients were either single or widowed, or married couples. Also included were two households with adult sisters, and two others with a mother and adult daughter. This year's clients ranged in age from 56-97. The nationalities of clients included: Russian, Albanian, Somali, Liberian, Mexican, Congolese, Greek, Romanian, Bosnian, Kosovar, Jordanian, Nepalese, Chinese, and Vietnamese. Members of seven households were US-born African American or Caucasian recipients of agency assistance with means-tested social services benefits.

Like prior years, clients received hand-crafted gifts and other items that were donated or purchased using our Will Flores Fund grant. This year's array of tote bags, winter hats and scarves, placemats, potholders, lap blankets, and terry cloth washcloths were collected from a variety of local crafters and seamstresses: Charity Sharity, Chilicothe Correctional Center inmates, church groups, and individuals. Contributions from merchants included: plastic packaging bags from Whole Foods and Fresh Thyme Market; note pads from Gene-Del Printing; toothpaste from Rock Hill Dentistry, Scott Air Force base (from an employee who also volunteered), dental providers and social contacts of other volunteers. Another volunteer who had intended to start a handmade soap business donated enough cases of bar soap to last us through next year! Will Flores funding allowed us to purchase colorful wall calendars for each household.

Albanian immigrant-owned Arber Café provided box meals, that could be reheated at the clients' convenience. The meals, plus tangerines were purchased with Will Flores funding. Clients also received cookies donated by Bello's Bakery and Little Angels Foundation.

Representing diverse spiritual beliefs (e.g., Buddhist, Muslim, Christian), all clients appreciated the gifts, meals, and visits from volunteers. During the weeks that followed, our staff heard many favorable comments from participants attending our reopened Macklind International Senior Center.

Volunteers were recruited through the United Way, Volunteer Match, and Just Serve portals and from our agency's volunteer roster. Everyone was required to send in a photo of their most recent vaccination card, sign a COVID waiver, and wear masks when picking up their deliveries from our office and bringing them to clients. Volunteers were scheduled for specific times to pick up for routes of 4-6 households. Although the weather was chilly, meals were distributed from our parking lot for easy access to volunteer vehicles. These measures worked well to avoid crowding in our office and facilitate expediency.




City Offices Closed February 20 for Presidents Day; Trash/Recycling **Schedule Adjusted**

Glass is usually broken during collection or transit, so the lids may be on or off the bottles.

Metal lids may remain with metal cans or be separated, since magnets collect the steel products.

Recycling centers prefer that you leave the plastic cap on a plastic bottle so that the caps do not fall out of the conveyor system.



Pizza Is Pizza, Until...

Pizza Is Pizza, Until you visit Flingers Pizza Pub in Bloomington, Illinois. Bloomington/Normal is a college town, so you know there will be a lot of pizza joints, some good, some bad, most average and a few that are exceptional. Flingers Pizza Pub is definitely fantastic! They have won many Readers Choice Awards including best overall restaurant in 2020, '21 and '22, Best Pizza award in 2017, '18, '19, '20 and '21, and Best Pub in 2017, '18, '19. '20; '21 and '22.

There is nothing fancy about Flingers. They simply serve perfect pizzas, in many configurations along with a large number of craft beers on tap.

Flingers have nine appetizers including two that are sure to be of interest, a beer cheese bacon dip, and smoked gouda mac bites; smoked gouda cheese, macaroni and bacon that is breaded and deep fried.

Flingers multi-page menu includes many unique items such as Flinger Rolls, baked, rolled pizza dough stuffed with three cheeses and basted with garlic Parmesan butter. These go perfectly with one, or more, of their nine dipping sauces that include ranch, spicey ranch, marinara, nacho cheese, sour cream, au jus, BBQ sauce, blue cheese and garlic. FYI, the garlic sauce is really strong garlic!

Now let's talk about the pizzas. Cheese Bombs are just that, no red sauce, just a buttery pan crust topped with a three cheese blend and your choice of eight various toppings, or build your own. These all come with your choice of dipping sauces. Come hungry, these are definitely a "load".

Next are the fourteen different Craft pizzas, or a build your own toppings configuration. They are nine protein toppings to choose from, including smoked pulled chicken and Italian beef. There are more than enough choices for any appetite.

Flingers also serves wings. You have a choice of thirteen different flavors and levels of heat.

If you left room for dessert they serve a cinnamon roll Sweetza with cinnamon, brown sugar and cream cheese icing on a thin crust. Another must try is a 1/4lb skillet baked chocolate chip cookie topped with three scoops of vanilla ice cream, whipped cream and cherries. WOW!

Flingers is also a well stocked pub with twenty-five craft beers that change on a regular basis. They also have Growlers (64oz jug), and Howlers (32oz jug) as carry outs, or drive-through pickups. They also have a fully stocked bar that includes ciders, seltzers, cocktails, and spirits.

We were there on a Sunday evening with three family members and we had three different pizzas, and a couple of appetizers. We didn't have room for any desserts. In fact, we took home a large box of leftovers that easily made another entire meal. Pizzas come in two sizes' 14", less than \$22 and 12", less than \$18. This very reasonable pricing for the size and quality of these pizzas.

We found the service to be excellent. Our server was polite, quick and efficient. The atmosphere has a typical sports pub feel. TVs are viewable from any location. The walls are decorated with lots of craft beer posters that were actually more like works of art.

There is nothing to take exception to at Flingers, other than the fact that I would love to see a location in the St. Louis area.

Tri Tip & Charred Onion Enchiladas

1 Tri Tip, anywhere from 1.5 to 2 pounds

Neutral oil

BBQ seasoning

1 large yellow onion, sliced

1/2 cup beef broth

2 tablespoons minced chipotle peppers

2 cups beef broth

2 cups whipping cream

2 cup shredded Monterey jack cheese

Ten 6 inch flour tortillas

Tomatillo salsa

Take trip out of fridge 45 minutes before cooking

Set up grill for 2 zone cooking (charcoal would be ideal here, just sayin)

Lightly oil tri tip, season liberally with the BBQ rub and put on the hot/direct side of grill

Sear both sides, 3-4 minutes to get grill marks, then move to indirect side to finish

Cook, turning often until done to your liking, let's call that about 135 degrees - remove and let rest

While it cooks, put a cast iron pan on your grill or stove and heat on high about 5 minutes

Add 2 tablespoons of oil, and put in the onions - cook, stirring often until they char and really start to soften, about 5 minutes - and if your doing this inside, you better turn on your fan

Add 1 cup of the beef broth and chipotles, stirring well to mix through, and when most of the liquid is gone - remove and set aside

Preheat oven to 350

When the tri tip has cooled a bit, thinly slice a pound of it and put into a bowl

Rough chop the onions and add them to the beef along with one cup of the cheese - mix well

Pour one cup of the cream into a 12 inch cast iron pan

Put remaining broth in a shallow bowl, and submerge a tortilla, remove and put on the counter

Add some of the mixture, roll up tightly and put seam side down into the pan - repeat with remaining tortillas

Pour remaining cream over the top, sprinkle with final cup of cheese, and drizzle some of the tomatillo salsa over the top

Bake, about 30 minutes or until beginning to get brown and bubbly




Who Built Ste. Genevieve, MO?

Architectural styles: Post-in-ground (poteaux-en-terre) see the Bauvais-Amoureux House. The house was built in 1792 for Jean Baptiste Bauvais, a son of one of the first residents in 1763 of Ste. Genevieve. After being flooded several times many of the residents relocated further up the hill near the rich farmland of le Grand Champ.

Green Tree Tavern: The oldest known building constructed in 1790 in French Colonial (poteaux-sur-sole) vertical logs on the exterior walls rest on a wooden sill on a stone foundation. It was built with a raised basement and a wraparound porch. A method called dendrochronology determines the date of the wood.

The house was built for the Janis family, they lived there for 40 years. They had fifteen enslaved people with the family. Clarisse was



German influence. By1860 there were more Germans than French in the settlement. Beginning in 1830, the Zieglers settled in Ste. Genevieve and the church began offering services and publications in German. French Canadians, as well as, eastern American Indian Nations crossed over the Mississippi River. The German influence is still noticeable in the culture and architecture.

In 1827, Mathias Ziegler joined in business with John Baptiste Valle. Mathias manufactured tobacco and Jean Baptiste ran the general store. Merchandise sold included: bread, beer, brandy, cigars, rubs and glasses. Mathias died in 1835 leaving his wife Barbara to run the tavern and tobacco shop with the Ziegler family until the 1850s.

Francis Ziegler, a son, closed the family business and became the sole owner in 1860, his mother lived there until she died in 1862. The Ziegler family stayed in the home until into the 20th century.

Jean Baptist Valle House was home to Jean Baptiste Valle, the last commandant of Ste. Genevieve . The position served as contact for colonial governors and townspeople until his death in 1849. The home was constructed in 1794 and was a private home until 2010.

During this time period of 200 years the territory switched from Spanish to French.

Maison Bolduc House (poteaux sur solle) posts-on-sill. 1792. The walls of the house were built with heavy oak timbers, set six inches apart,then filled with (bousillage) a mixture of mud, straw, and horsehair which hardened to a cement-like texture. This was a traditional French Colonial structure. The house is surrounded by a stockade fence. There is an outdoor kitchen and garden.
