## **Brentwood Middle School Service Projects COMPLETED!**



Every student at Brentwood Middle School participated in two service learning opportunities on their last day of school before winter break. They packaged ingredients and supplies for 48 complete meals that were delivered to Operation Food Search, an organization that distributes food to community partners in Missouri and Illinois. Students assembled ingredients for meals suggested by Operation Food Search that included Asian Stir Fry, Tuna Noodle Bake, Pizza dinner, Spaghetti dinner, Chili, and Chicken and Biscuit Bake.

The second service project was creating care kits to be distributed to people who are homeless. Donations from Brentwood Dental Group, Dierbergs, Walgreens, and Drury Inn, along with items purchased by the school were assembled into 90 care kits containing socks, water bottles, granola bars, cheese cracker packages, tissues, toothbrushes, toothpaste, flossing picks, bandages, chapstick, lotion, combs, and cough drops. Students colored notes of encouragement to include in each care kit. These were delivered to Peter and Paul Community Services shelter in Soulard, which provides housing and supportive services to people who are homeless.



## 10 People To Watch in 2019

As we say our final goodbyes to 2018, we do so with a hope that 2019 will be a much better year on the St. Louis sports scene.

In the past 12 months, we saw our town's two major-league franchises, the Cardinals and Blues, both fail to make the playoffs. That was only the second time that happened in the same year since 1979.

Both teams also changed coaches during the season. The only other time that happened in the same year was in 1978.

So as we look ahead to 2019, here is our annual list of the 10 most important people to watch in St. Louis sports this year. Hopefully these individuals, listed in alphabetical order, will ensure that area sports fans do not suffer a repeat of what they watched last year.

**Jeff Albert** – The Cardinals' new hitting coach arrives from Houston and will be charged with the responsibility of improving the team's offense. One of the ways he can do that is by helping his hitters develop a better recognition of the strike zone, hoping to reduce the number of strikeouts. His work with youngsters such as Harrison Bader and Tyler O'Neill could be a key to the team's overall success this season. Albert also worked with Matt Carpenter during his years in the Cardinals' farm system before he was hired away by the Astros.

**Doug Armstrong** – The general manager of the Blues fired another coach, Mike Yeo, after the team's poor start this season. Unless the roster of players he has filled with trades and free agent signings starts to establish more success, sooner or later the pressure should begin to mount more on Armstrong than on whoever is coaching the team at the moment. Failing to make the playoffs again this season might leave the Blues' ownership with no choice but to find a new person to put in charge of the team's operations.

Matt Carpenter – He knows where he is going to hit in the Cardinals' lineup, the place where he wants to hit. He knows he is going to play third base, and even if it is not his best position, he is happy to play there because he knows adding Paul Goldschmidt makes the Cardinals a better team. Now the question for Carpenter is can he avoid disappearing for two months of the season, like he did in April and September last season. A consistent performance out of the leadoff spot from Carpenter would greatly improve the team's offense.

**Dexter Fowler** – If this list was ranked first to 10th instead of in alphabetical order, Fowler might be listed as the most important person in St. Louis sports in 2019. The Cardinals say they are committed to him playing right field despite his horrible season in 2018, so much so they didn't really make a serious run at signing Bryce Harper. Will Fowler prove to be worthy of that faith? His singular performance will play a major role in how much success the Cardinals have this season.

Paul Goldschmidt – Whether or not Goldschmidt can become the face of the Cardinals that the team has lacked since Albert Pujols left after the 2011 season will depend on if 2019 is his only season in St. Louis. He is the best player the Cardinals have had on their roster since Pujols left, and signing him to a contract extension before he can become a free agent should be the top priority on John Mozeliak's to-do list this season.

Carlos Martinez – This could be the most important season of Martinez's career. Limited by injuries in 2018, Martinez was used as a late-inning option near the end of the year to try to keep him on the field, but he is projected to return to the Cardinals' rotation this year. Can he make it through the year in that role, especially if the Cardinals find themselves needing a closer again? How Martinez performs this season, in whatever capacity, could be a determining factor in whether his future includes staying in St. Louis.

Yadier Molina – One of the most used phrases in sports when discussing a player's advancing age is that Father Time is undefeated. He may have found a worthy opponent in Molina, who seems to not only refuse to age but refuse to concede playing time to whoever is the Cardinals' backup catcher. Can he do it again this season? The Cardinals certainly seem to be counting on that being the case, hoping Molina can stay healthy and productive for at least one more season.

Alex Reyes – There might not have been a more disappointed player on the Cardinals in 2018 then Reyes, their best pitching prospect for each of the last few years. Recovered from Tommy John surgery that forced him to miss all of 2017, Reyes returned in 2018 to pitch a total of four innings before getting hurt again. Making it through this season without another injury has to be Reyes' primary goal, and if he can do that, then capitalizing on his talent should follow – whether he is used out of the bullpen to try to limit his innings or as a starter.

Mike Shildt – The Cardinals got a quick idea of what Shildt could do as the manager when he took over the team in mid-season last year, but now he gets to start fresh in spring training. Shildt earned this opportunity by his work last season, and his years or preparation in the Cardinals' farm system. Nobody will work harder or be more prepared, and it will be up to the players to follow Shildt's leadership if they hope to end a three-year absence from the postseason.

**Tom Stillman** – The owner of the Blues cannot be happy with his team's performance. Who pays the price for their disappointing play? How involved will Stillman get in making decisions that could affect the team for years to come – concerning the general manager, the coach, or by trading away key veteran players. Stillman has given Doug Armstrong almost carte blanche authority to make decisions in recent years, but maybe this is the year that he steps in and takes more control over personnel moves.

## **Recycling Challenges and Changes**

Single-stream recycling is experiencing challenges due to increased stringent standards overseas and increasing recycling costs. When waste processor Resource Management closed its recycling center in October 2018, the City of Brentwood had to find an alternative materials recycling facility. Brentwood's Board of Aldermen approved an agreement with Republic Services so the City can continue to offer single-stream, curbside recycling to Brentwood residents.

## How to Recycle Responsibly

Contamination in recyclable materials led China to impose stricter policies on the materials it would accept. This policy change raised costs for recycling processors. Residents can help sustain single-stream recycling services by knowing what to put in the recycling bin and what to leave out of the recycling bin.

**DO Add to the Recycle Bin:** Paper, Flattened Cardboard, Plastic Bottles and Containers, Glass Bottles and Jars, Metal Food and Beverage Cans, Food and Beverage Cartons. Keep these items loose (not bagged), clean and dry to avoid contamination.

**DON'T Add to the Recycle Bin:** Plastic Bags and Film, Styrofoam, Sharps and Needles, Food Waste, One-Time-Use Disposables (such as plastic straws and utensils, batteries, household hazardous waste and yard waste).



## FREE DENTAL CARE AVAILABLE AT "GIVE KIDS A SMILE" CLINIC

Gum disease, cavities and tooth decay is avoidable. Much comes down to brushing, flossing and visiting the dentist. The problem is many kids do to not have access to the dental health basics and are living in pain, having trouble concentrating in school and dealing with self-esteem issues. To raise awareness about the epidemic of untreated



dental disease and increase access to oral health care, Give Kids A Smile is hosting a free dental clinic for those in need on Friday, Feb. 8 and Saturday, Feb. 9, 2019 at Saint Louis University's Center for Advanced Dental Education. The local clinic is one of more than a thousand events taking place nationwide in February as part of the American Dental Association Foundation's Give Kids A Smile program. Care is provided by appointment only. Patient registration can be completed through Friday, Feb. 1, by calling Give Kids A Smile at 636-397-6453.

The two-day FREE dental clinic is designed to meet the dental health needs of newborns through school-aged children up to 14 years old (8th grade), who are Medicaid-eligible, qualify for the free school lunch program or need dental assistance due to other special circumstances. Registered children will receive X-rays, professional cleanings, fluoride treatments and sealants, as well as fillings, root canals and oral surgery, if needed. All care is provided in a non-intimidating, fun-filled environment that includes an entertainment area featuring music, interactive games, face painters and balloon artists. Each child goes home with a free healthy lunch and smile bag that includes a toothbrush, toothpaste, floss and more.

"Thanks to the selfless dedication of hundreds of volunteer dental professionals and sponsors like Delta Dental of Missouri, Cardinals Care and The Orthwein Foundation, we have the capacity and resources to provide comprehensive dental services, completely free of charge, for up to 600 local kids," said Erica Steen, executive director of Give Kids A Smile. "We want to make sure as many kids can gain access to this care as possible, so we recommend parents and other caregivers register now."

Give Kids A Smile was founded by a group of St. Louis dentists in 2002. Two-day clinics have been held every February and October since then, providing a total of more than 16,500 local kids with \$9.6 million worth of free dental care. The American Dental Association Foundation adopted the program in 2003 and has served as the catalyst for a nation-wide effort by the same name that has provided care to 5.5 million kids. This February, there will be more than 1,400 free dental clinics, ranging in size and scoop, held across the nation with the help the help of 6,200 dentists and 57,500 other volunteers. ## Preparing for Natural Disaster for People with Disabilities and other Special Needs - Lighthouse for the Blind - Saint Louis

About 56.7 million people — 19 percent of the U.S. population – have a disability, with more than half reporting a severe disability, according to a U.S. Census report.

FEMA and The American Red Cross have published a booklet to help people with disabilities prepare to protect themselves, their personal care assistant and others in case of an emergency. The booklet also applies to elderly and other special needs populations.

Here are helpful excerpts from that booklet:

Create a personal support network to help a person with disabilities prepare for a natural disaster with assistance before, during and after the emergency occurs.

Support network members should be trustworthy people recruited from among friends, family or coworkers who will provide assistance in challenging conditions.

Learn what to do in case of power outages or personal injuries. Know how to connect and start a back-up power supply such as a portable electrical generator for essential medical equipment.

• Consider getting a medical alert system that will allow a person who is disabled to call for help if they are immobilized in an emergency. Most alert systems require a phone "land line," so have a back-up plan, such as a cell phone or pager.

is overloaded.

- If you use an electric wheelchair or scooter, have a manual wheelchair for backup.
- Store back-up equipment (for mobility, medical applications, etc.) at a neighbor's home, school or your workplace.
- Instruct support network members who may need to assist in an emergency how to operate necessary equipment. Label equipment and attach laminated instructions for its use.
- Arrange for more than one person from the personal support network to check in before, during (if possible) and soon after an emergency, so there is at least one back-up if the primary support person is unavailable.
- If vision impaired, deaf or hard of hearing, the person who is disabled should plan ahead for someone to convey essential emergency information that is broadcast by TV or radio.
- If a personal care attendant from an agency is used, determine if the agency has provisions for emergencies, such as providing services at another location if evacuation is ordered.
- Ask apartment managers to identify and mark accessible exits and access to all areas designated for emergency shelter or
- safe rooms. Ask about plans for alerting and evacuating people with sensory disabilities.

   Keep an extra cell phone charged up and ready for use by people who are disabled so they can let someone know where they are and guide them to safety. Keep extra first response phone numbers handy in case the local 9-1-1 emergency number
- Be prepared to provide clear, specific and concise instructions to rescue personnel. Practice giving these instructions (verbally, pre-printed phrases, word board) clearly and quickly.
- Prepare the personal support network to assist with handling emotions associated with disaster and traumatic events (confusion, thought processing or memory difficulties, agitation, fear, panic or anxiety).

## MAYOR AND ALDERMEN REPORTS Mayor Thornton

Mayor Thornton spoke on the Brentwood Bounds project and questions that have arisen. Stated that it was important to remember how we got to this point and why the city is taking this on. Two years ago, there was a group meeting at the Bricklayers Council regarding priorities for the city, at that time there was discussion regarding if attacking the flooding on Manchester road as an option. Hanley Industrial Court and other issues were discussed. In two years, the city has come a long way. The flooding in that area of town has been a problem in the city for a very long time. The Mayor also pointed out that the city has come far enough in the project that the city is confident that the improvements to Manchester can be done and that Brentwood Bounds will work. The goal is to claim the area of town that has been held back due to the flooding problem in place for over one hundred years. The flooding is a geographical issue. There is not an easier, softer way to do this and had there been any other way, the city would have explored it by now. Mayor Thornton stated the city should go forward with the project because no one else will. The onefourth portion of the community is affected and is severely hampered by this one-hundred-year project. It is the right thing to do and there is no one else anywhere that will focus the time, energy or resources on making it better. The people that live in that area deserve the attention and the resources of the rest of the city. It is an opportunity to take care of the problem as well as make that area something that is unique. Done the right way with giving a share to green space and parks to that reclamation, Brentwood will have something that is unique and better than anything else in St. Louis County. Even if the city isn't successful, people will understand and say, "at least they tried to get something done that really affected the entire town." However, there is a very good chance that the project will succeed. Mayor has started and will bring some things forward to promote the project. Many that have heard about it from Metropolitan Sewer District (MSD) to other mayors that are impressed with the project. Promoting will provide the recognition that the project deserves. Mayor has also spoken with City Administrator to obtain a quote from an independent accounting firm that reports directly to the board with quarterly audits. As this is a lot of money in question, assurance that the funds are being used prudently, this will be beyond just an audit function; it will be someone that the board can rely on directly that will attest to prudent and board intended use of funds. This will make sure that the board will have as much supervision over the financial aspects of the project as possible.

Director of Planning and Development Koerkenmeier provided an update of project costs:

### **Flood Mitigation Questions**

Phil Blonn, Project Manager of Jacobs Engineering was present and answered flood mitigation questions.

When will Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) flood maps be reviewed again and how will it affect my property or if my property will be removed from the flood map?

Mr. Blonn stated FEMA timing for flood map review is a two-step process. Coordination with FEMA has begun, Conditional Letter of Map Review (CLOMR) review process will take up to 3 months (approval early 2019) and takes place in parallel with the design of the project. At that point know what to expect the flood map post project to look like. After about 2 years when the project is constructed (early 2022) can do an as-built survey, prepare another package to FEMA and apply for the Letter of Map Revision (LOMR). At that point, a new flood map can be issued.

Alderman Wegge asked if there were other things that city should be doing to not have the flood map moved?

Mr. Blonn responded not sure what board can do, the plan is to put together CLOMR application that is well documented and summarized well so that there is no miscommunication, providing what FEMA is looking for. Participation in CRS (community rating system) FEMA's program helps the community.

Alderman Wegge inquired about the software used by FEMA. Mr. Blonn advised it is the same software CFM uses as well as the Army Core of Engineers.

Alderman Wegge asked if there were concerns about the amount of time to review the CLOMR or if it will put construction at risk

Mr. Blonn advised that review can take a little longer than stated but shouldn't put construction at risk. There is also coordination with reviewers contracted by FEMA on technical issues so that they agree on approach so there shouldn't be a problem.

Alderman Wegge then asked if CFM will have any visibility if the process is breaking down or not meeting FEMA expectations.

Mr. Blonn stated that there would be coordination throughout the process, once it is accepted, they will know where the flood plain will end up.

Alderman Dimmitt asked Phil when he projected that the CLOMR would be submitted to FEMA?

Mr. Blonn responded that he anticipated doing that in early 2019.

Alderman Dimmitt estimated possible result received in maybe April or May of 2019? He then asked if Mr. Blonn envisioned a scenario where the results would differ from the original submission of the CLOMR.

Mr. Blonn advised that if there are webbies in the design there is a possibility that the review may come back different.

Alderman Dimmitt inquired if CFM had experience submitting CLOMR's under these circumstances and what his experience was in mirroring initial analysis when submitting them?

Mr. Blonn advised that CFM is experienced in submitting CLOMR's and that in his experience if there were no changes then the review usually came back as expected.

### **Mosquito Adulticide Service**

Assistant City Administrator Koerkenmeier invited Public Works Director Dan Gummersheimer to give a briefing about changes to be contemplated by the board regarding mosquito abatement services. Director Gummersheimer reviewed four strategies that CDC and EPA state are effective against mosquito population: larvicide and adulticide mentioned. Public works determined that larvicide would continue to be undertaken by public works but not adulticide.

## Brentwood Bound Focus On Manchester Road Improvements

The City of Brentwood is working with the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) to make the Manchester Road corridor from Hanley Road to Bremerton Road safer and more pedestrian friendly. The improvements to Manchester Road are one component of the Brentwood Bound plan.

Starting in late 2020, MoDOT plans to resurface Manchester Road from S. Big Bend Boulevard to Lindbergh Boulevard, which includes the Manchester Road corridor in Brentwood. This project gives the City of Brentwood a unique opportunity to work with MoDOT to improve the corridor and pedestrian access.

MoDOT's plans for the project include resurfacing the roadway, major improvements to sidewalks along the corridor, new curbs and a new bridge over Black Creek,

just west of Hanley Road. The bridge is more than 90 years old and is in need of replacement. The new bridge will be wider, with plans for sidewalks along both sides. A new signal at the intersection of Manchester Road and Hanley Road will allow for safer pedestrian crossing.

While MoDOT is making these improvements, the City plans to build a pedestrian tunnel under Manchester Road at Mary Avenue. This tunnel will link to a proposed Great Rivers Greenway connector trail and Rogers Parkway. The ability to integrate these projects with the MoDOT project is a unique planning and cost-saving opportunity for the City.





## Svalbard Doomsday Seeds

A few years ago my husband, Kevin, and I returned to a country we love...Norway.

This time we decided to take a flight from Tromso, Norway to the island of Spitzbergen, and the town of Longyearbyen (population 2,100 from 50 countries.) The flight from Tromso was only 90 minutes or 3 hrs. from Oslo. We had heard about the Global Seed Vault, also known as the Doomsday Seeds Bank.

Our curiosity was to find out more about the seeds, and also to enjoy the island of Svalbard with hopes of seeing a Polar Bear. We did discover the Polar Bears were still hibernating while we were there. Longyearben is located 817 miles from the North Pole at a latitude of 78 degrees north. There are signs at the town limits showing a Polar Bear with an X across. Although it is rare for a bear to enter the town limits it is still possible to wake in the morning and see bear footprints. All tourists are told not to leave town without a guide with a rifle for protection. Polar Bears are never far away. The best places to see Polar Bears are floating on the sea ice or east coast and very rare to see one in the summer.

Our lodging was at the Trapper's Hotel Basecamp in Longyearbyen and was the most unique with décor of a traditional trapper's style (driftwood, slate, sealskins and fur.)

The hotel has 16 rooms and for 40 people with single, double and family rooms. NOK 1,750 (\$205 a night includes breakfast.) There are other hotels, guest houses, tents and hostels available.

The hotel can arrange things-to-do. We decided to try the dog sledging even though there wasn't any snow. We were picked up at the hotel and taken to Svalbard Husky where we met the dogs and were shown how to harness them to the sledge. The guide would drive the waggen while three of us sat on the reindeer blankets and the guide pointed out the other animals on the island: Svalbard deer are smaller than regular deer, bearded seals, whales and ptarmigan. We enjoyed a relaxing sightseeing ride along the coastline. Dress warm and wear water and windproof clothing. The 12 dogs were as excited for the run as we were. The cost was NOK 850 (\$99.)

Depending on the time of the year you visit other things available are: walking on a glacier, boating, kayaking, snowmobile safari and visiting the local museum, restaurants, bars and shops. We had our photo taken in front of the Global Seed Vault, but that is as close as we could get. Very few people have been allowed inside. Recently a CNN reporter, Arwa Damon was allowed inside for a tour. Check out her youtube at www.cnn.com/videos/world/2015/10/22/norway-doomsday-back-story-arwa

The seed vault is located deep inside a mountain in an old abandoned coal mine. The doors are dual blast-proof with two airlocks and walls of steel reinforced concrete one meter thick. The vault is opened three times a year to add or remove seeds. March 24-28; June 3-6; and October 21-25. The vault officially opened on February 26, 2008.

By 2013, approximately one-third of the gene diversity stored in seed banks globally was represented at the vault.

The vault currently contains samples from approximately one-third of the world's most important food crop varieties. Recently tree seeds have been added. A million seed packs from almost every country are under the perma frost fail-safe storage facility.

The Norwegian government entirely funded the vault's approximately 45 million kr (\$8.8 million in 2008.) Storing seeds in the vault is free to end users with Norway and the Crop Trust paying for operational costs. Primary funding for the Trust comes from organizations such as Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and various governments worldwide.

Svalbard doesn't have the only seed bank. There are others in the U.S., China, South Korea, Germany, Canada, Russia, Japan and India. There are 1,400 smaller vaults around the world.

The reason for the seed vaults is to ensure against the loss of seeds in other seed vaults during a large scale regional or global crisis. February 26, 2018 a shipment of 70,000 samples were delivered to the facility, bringing the number of samples received to more than one million. At this time, the total number of samples held at the vault was 967,216 (not counting any withdrawals.) 13,000 years of agricultural history was representative. A feasibility study prior to construction determined the vault could preserve the seeds from most from most major food crops for hundreds of years and some important grains could remain viable for thousands of years.
