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MSHP Reports Three Traffic Fatalities Over Christmas Holiday Weekend; No Drownings Or Boating Fatalities

Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, provides the following preliminary statistics related to the Christmas holiday weekend:

Three people died in traffic crashes during the 78-hour counting period, which began at 6 p.m. Friday, December 23, 2022, and ended at 11:59 p.m. Monday, December 26, 2022.

2022 Christmas Holiday Traffic Statistics

Traffic Crashes — 306 Traffic Crash Injuries — 84 Traffic Crash Fatalities — 3 DWI — 52

[Note: Last year during the 78-hour Christmas counting period, there were 881 traffic crashes statewide. In those crashes, eight people were killed and another 401 were injured. During the 2021 Christmas holiday, troopers investigated 227 traffic crashes which included four fatalities and 99 injuries. Troopers arrested 67 people for driving while impaired in 2021.]

There were no boating crashes or drownings over the 2022 Christmas holiday counting period. Of the three fatality traffic crashes investigated by troopers, two occurred in the Troop F, Jefferson City, MO, area, and one occurred in the Troop D, Springfield, MO, area.

There were no traffic fatalities on Friday, December, December 23, 2022, during the holiday counting period.

There was one fatality on Saturday, December 24, 2022. Kristan R. Price, 26, of Florence, MO, died when the vehicle she was operating traveled into the westbound lanes of U.S. Highway 50 and struck a vehicle before returning to the eastbound lanes, then skidding back into the westbound lanes, and striking another vehicle. Price's vehicle then overturned. It is unknown if Price was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The first vehicle Price's vehicle struck skidded off the roadway; the driver was wearing a seat belt and was not injured. The driver of the second vehicle Price's vehicle struck was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash; he sustained minor injuries. The crash occurred in Morgan County on U.S. Highway 50 west of Lewis Drive. Dr. M.B. Jones pronounced Price dead at the scene. The Morgan County Sheriff's Department also responded to the scene.

One fatality occurred on December 25, 2022. Samuel M. Mitchell, 63, of Joplin, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving traveled off the right side of the road and struck the concrete cap of a vertical culvert. The crash occurred in Newton County on Apricot Road south of Joplin, MO. Three passengers in Mitchell's vehicle sustained serious injuries, one passenger sustained moderate injuries, and one passenger sustained minor injuries in the crash. No one in the vehicle was wearing a seat belt. Dr. Gross pronounced Mitchell dead at Mercy Hospital in Joplin, MO.

One fatality occurred on Monday, December 26, 2022. Susan C. Graham, 73, of Arcola, MO, died when another vehicle crossed the center of the roadway in front of the vehicle in which she was a passenger. After striking the other vehicle, Graham's vehicle rotated and traveled off the right side of the roadway and came to rest. The crash occurred in Camden County on U.S. Highway 54 west of Tangle Drive. Dr. Cooper pronounced Graham dead at Lake Regional Hospital in Osage Beach, MO. Graham was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The driver of the vehicle was wearing a seat belt; he sustained moderate injuries. The driver of the vehicle that crossed in front of Graham's vehicle was not wearing a seat belt and he sustained serious injuries in the crash.

NOTE: The fatality statistics in this news release could change if late deaths occur, if other departments report fatalities after this news release was sent out, or if a fatality is determined to be caused by a medical condition rather than a traffic/boating/drowning incident.

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MSHP Reports 2 Traffic Fatalities, 0 Drownings, and 0 Boating Fatalities Over New Year's Holiday Weekend

Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, provides the following preliminary statistics related to the New Year's holiday weekend:

2 people died and 75 were injured in 243 traffic crashes during the 2023 New Year's holiday counting period, which began at 6 p.m. Friday, December 30, 2022, and ended at 11:59 p.m. Monday, January 2, 2023. There were 0 boating crashes and 0 drownings over the 2023 New Year's holiday counting period.

2023 New Year's Holiday Traffic Statistics

Traffic Crashes — 243
Traffic Crash Injuries — 75
Traffic Crash Fatalities — 1

[Note: During the 2022 New Year's holiday counting period, one person was killed and 331 injured in 1,045 traffic crashes statewide. During last year's New Year's holiday, troopers worked 321 of those crashes which included 98 injuries and no fatalities. Troopers arrested 96 people for driving while intoxicated last year.]

Both fatal traffic crashes occurred in the Troop E, Poplar Bluff, MO, area.

There were no traffic fatalities on Friday December 30, 2022.

One fatality occurred on Saturday, December 31, 2022. Roger Vinson, 63, of Piggott, AR, died when the vehicle he was driving crashed at the intersection of Route C and State Highway 25, in Stoddard County. Vinson was pronounced dead at the scene by Stoddard County Coroner Brent Stidham. The crash is being investigated by the Advance Police Department.

One fatality occurred on Sunday, January 1, 2023. Roger G. Morrow, 55, of Benton, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving travelled off the right side of the roadway and overturned. The crash occurred in Scott County on Missouri Highway 77 near Scott County Road 352. Morrow was pronounced dead at the scene by Scott County Coroner Scott Branam. Morrow was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.


There were no traffic fatalities on Monday, January 2, 2023.



The Brentwood Police Department has partnered with St. Louis County and Municipal Police Academy to assign an officer, full time, to the academy as an instructor. Corporal Nick Lang was handpicked by the command staff at the academy as one of their newest academy instructors. We are very proud of Corporal Lang and are confident he will be an exceptional representative of the City of Brentwood.

While we will miss Corporal Lang, we are excited to announce we were able to onboard Officer Divas Alibasic. Officer Alibasic comes to us with several years of experience with the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. Below is a brief biography of Officer Alibasic.

Divas Alibasic moved here with his family from Bosnia in the late 1990's and grew up learning Bosnian and American culture, simultaneously. Divas practiced Shindo Jinen-Ryu Karate for over ten years and is still very passionate about traditional martial arts. He developed a hobby with cars and motorcycles and strives to help his family in any way possible.

Officer Alibasic has wanted to be a police officer since he was a child. When he was 21 years old, he began his law enforcement career with the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. After four years of service, Divas took the next step in his career and applied with the Brentwood Police Department. Officer Alibasic is proud to serve a community that cares about each other and their police officers.

During the month of October Officer Mundorf was selected as Officer of the Month and below is a snapshot from his nomination.

On 10/10/2022, Officer Mundorf conducted a traffic stop on a suspicious vehicle in the Hanley Industrial Ct. After initially investigating the driver for traffic violations, it was determined she was in possession of methamphetamine. The driver was also wanted for Tampering 1st from Jefferson County.

On 10/11/2022, this department received a call from a suicide hotline in reference to a guest at the Springhill Suites. Officer Mundorf responded and after determining the location of the guest in question, he was given entry to the hotel room where the subject was located unconscious. Officer Mundorf removed the cord surrounding the subject's neck, causing him to gasp for air and regain consciousness. The subject was then transported to the hospital in

On 10/24/2022, Officer Mundorf, along with Corporal Wurth, responded to the YMCA in reference to a male subject attempting to capture a photograph of a male juvenile in the locker room. Upon his arrival, Officer Mundorf observed a male subject matching the description given to dispatch by the juvenile's father. That subject was immediately taken into custody. Officer Mundorf interviewed the subject who admitted to placing his iPhone over a bathroom stall occupied by a male juvenile.

During the month of October, Officer Mundorf was assigned 90 total



During the month of November Officer Alex Wilcox was selected as Officer of the Month and below is a snapshot from his nomination.

In November of 2022, CRO Wilcox began an investigation into numerous thefts of power tools from Home Depot. CRO Wilcox was able to determine the subject stealing the power tools was working with another suspect who was utilizing several online platforms to sell the stolen items across the United States and Europe. CRO Wilcox spent countless hours investigating, planning, coordinating, and preparing documents that culminated into the issuance of a search warrant. CRO Wilcox coordinated with the St. Louis County Tactical Operations Team to execute the search warrant on November 15, 2022. Approximately 50 stolen power tools, from Home Depot, with a value of \$21,244.00 were recovered from the suspect's residence. During an interview, the second suspect admitted they had been purchasing stolen Home Depot power tools, on a weekly basis, for approximately a year and

Saturation Details

More than ten law enforcement agencies teamed up in November and December to saturate central and west county municipalities in an effort to curb violent crime. Brentwood Police Department participated in two of the three dates that were selected for this effort of targeted enforcement.

Overall, these efforts were very successful yielding numerous felony arrests, seizure of weapons, and recovered stolen vehicles.

A meeting is planned in early January of 2023 to review procedure, policy, and to include more agencies who have shown interest in participating. Also, as a part of the 2023 efforts, we aim to operate these details in conjunction with St. Charles County's saturation detail, St. Louis County's targeted enforcement, and St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department's Anti-Crime unit.

Our hope is to collaborate with other agencies in our region to combat the rampant vehicle-related and violent crime we've seen over the last several years.

BHS Student Artwork Selected for Neediest Cases Campaign









Nine Brentwood High School students have been recognized for the powerful and moving artwork they created as part of the 100 Neediest Cases campaign sponsored by the United Way of Greater St. Louis and the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

From homelessness to illness, the artwork depicts real, everyday struggles that families and individuals are currently facing throughout the St. Louis region.

"We have a very talented group of ART 3 and ART 4 students this year," said BHS art teacher Tim Rempel. "I am so proud of their ability to illustrate the issues that so many in our community are currently dealing with."

All artwork was judged by professional artists, and students who placed in the top 40 will be published in print and digital versions of the Post-Dispatch. The artwork will also be displayed at the Missouri History Museum.

BHS matched its total from the 2021 campaign by placing nine students in this year's top 40, including:

"Our hope is that reading about these 100 cases and seeing the accompanying illustrations will help those who so desperately need it at this time," added Rempel.

Established in 1922, the 100 Neediest Cases campaign has helped thousands of families and individuals in need during the holiday season. The United Way partners with more than 50 social service agencies to select 100 cases each year, which are featured in the Post-Dispatch and illustrated by student artists. The profiles and artwork help raise awareness and encourage donations for those families and individuals, as well as others in need. Last year, annual donations to the campaign reached \$1.3 million.

Show-Me History at Mark Twain







Mark Twain Elementary School third graders spent several weeks researching Missouri's most influential individuals in preparation for their Famous Missourians Living Museum. Three Brentwood residents have filed their candidacy for the three open positions on the Brentwood School District Board of Education. The candidates, in order of filing, are:

Because the number of candidates is equal to the number of open positions, the district has submitted a request to the St. Louis County Board of Elections to be removed from the ballot this spring. If approved, this would save the district approximately \$5,000 in election expenses.

Members will be sworn in during the board's regular business meeting on Tuesday, April 18.

Class of 2023 Rakes Yards for Senior Service Day





More than 40 students from Brentwood High School's senior class gave back to their community as part of a large-scale leaf raking effort on Friday, Dec. 2. Students visited 19 homes and filled more than 150 yard waste bags during the four-hour event.

"We want our seniors to feel connected with their classmates and engaged in their community," said Senior Class Sponsor Emily Diaz. "We are excited to give back to a community that has always supported our school district."

This service was provided free of charge to Brentwood community members that had been nominated by their families, friends and





neighbors. A total of 12 homes were selected from the nomination process. Students also extended their efforts by knocking on doors and volunteering their services to neighboring homes on the day of the event.



RICHMOND HEIGHTS MEMORIAL LIBRARY TO HOST CLIMBING THE LADDER, CHASING THE DREAM: THE HISTORY OF HOMER G. PHILLIPS HOSPITAL AUTHOR EVENT



On Wednesday, January 25 at 6:30 p.m. the Richmond Heights Memorial Library will host Candace O'Connor, author of Climbing the Ladder, Chasing the Dream: the History of Homer G. Phillips Hospital. This event will take place in the Library's program room. The Library is located on the 2nd floor of the HEIGHTS Community Center at 8001 Dale Avenue.

Homer G. Phillips Hospital--founded in an era of segregated healthcare and named for the murdered attorney who fought for its existence--became a beacon of hope and healing for the Black community and a path to professional progress for hundreds of Black physicians and nurses.

Built to serve St. Louis's rapidly expanding African-American population, the grand new hospital opened its doors in 1937, toward the end of the Great Depression. "Homer G.," as many called it, joined a burgeoning group of black hospitals amid a national period of institutional segregation and strong racial prejudice nationwide. Candace O'Connor draws upon contemporary newspaper articles, institutional records, and dozens of interviews with former staff members to create the first, full history of the Homer G. Phillips Hospital. She also brings new facts and insights into the life and mysterious murder (still an unsolved case) of the hospital's namesake, a pioneering Black attorney and civil rights activist who led the effort to build the sorely needed medical facility in the Ville neighborhood.

The author will be on hand to discuss her work and to answer questions. Copies of Climbing the Ladder, Chasing the Dream will be available for purchase from Subterranean Books.



INSIDE BASEBALL

Who are the 10 most interesting Cardinals to watch in 2023?



There are many reasons for baseball fans to look forward to 2023 and it only requires remembering what was going on a year ago to realize that.

On New Year's Day 2022, baseball was one month into a lockout and nobody knew when spring training or the season would start. The pandemic was still affecting the country, and the world.

Luckily, as we begin this new year, baseball has labor peace. While there are still lingering health concerns, the worst of the pandemic appears to be behind us.

All of that means that for the first time in a few years, we can take a "normal" look into what is coming up with the Cardinals. In what has become a New Year's Day tradition at STLSportsPage.com, our look ahead focuses on the 10 most interesting Cardinals to watch in the coming year, listed in alphabetical order.

Dusty Blake – One of three new coaches on manager Oli Marmol's staff, Blake takes over the pitching coaching duties from Mike Maddux. While new bench coach Matt Holliday is well known by Cardinals' fans, Blake has spent his first two years in St. Louis in the background working as a "pitching strategist." Blake is eager to show that he is more than just a "numbers" guy and one of his goals, as directed by Marmol, is to see if the team's pitchers can increase their strikeout total after ranking last in the majors in that category in 2022.

Dylan Carlson – Coming off a third-place finish in the Rookie of the Year voting for 2021, Carlson began his second full season with expectations of an even better performance. That didn't happen as his home run total dropped from 18 to 8 and he hit just .207 from the left side of the plate, a drop of 36 percentage points from his rookie season, as he struggled with a thumb and wrist injury. Being able to reverse those numbers will be necessary for Carlson to continue to earn the bulk of the playing time in center field, where he excelled defensively last year after the trade that sent Harrison Bader to the Yankees.

Willson Contreras – The biggest off-season addition to the Cardinals' roster, at least so far, Contreras seems ready to take on the challenge of being the successor to the retired Yadier Molina. Signed to a five-year contract, Contreras should definitely provide an offensive upgrade, where the Cardinals' catchers were among the worst in the majors last season. There have been questions about Contreras' performance behind the plate in the past, so he will need to prove himself there – but there is no doubt he was signed primarily for his offensive skills.

Brendan Donovan – If there was an award for who was the biggest surprise for the Cardinals in 2022, Donovan likely would have been a unanimous selection. He arrived in the majors with limited expectations, then proceeded to finish third in the Rookie of the Year voting and won the first Gold Glove given to a utility player. Donovan now has to prove that he can repeat that success, likely in the same role he filled last year, when he started games at six defensive positions and as the DH, as Marmol tried to find the best way to get him as many starts as possible.

Jack Flaherty – One of three holdovers on this list from a year ago, Flaherty goes into 2023 with basically the same questions hanging over his head: Is he healthy, and can he regain the form that made him one of the best pitchers in the game four years ago? Flaherty's performance since then has been slowed by one injury after another, which limited him to just eight starts and 36 innings in 2022. Since the end of 2019, Flaherty has pitched a combined 154 innings. For the Cardinals to be better than they were a year ago, Flaherty has to step up and become the number one starter. Personally, this is the most important season of his career as he heads into free agency.

Paul Goldschmidt – The Cardinals' first baseman doesn't have to be a repeat winner as the NL's Most Valuable Player for 2023 to be a successful season. What he does need to do is find a way to be just as effective as he was for the first five months of last season – and avoid the collapse that he suffered in September. Nobody realizes that more than Goldschmidt, the team's best player, who needs to be at his best in the most important time of the season. Goldschmidt should be helped by the addition of Contreras's big bat in the middle of the lineup.

Nolan Gorman – Another holdover selection from last year's list, Gorman was the hot new toy a year ago, the top prospect in the Cardinals' farm system, ready to make his major-league debut. Maybe the expectations were a little too lofty, but there still was a lot to like about Gorman's rookie season after he was promoted from the minors, including hitting 14 homers in 283 at-bats as a 22-year-old while also playing solid defense at second base. The Cardinals hope he can build off that performance in 2023 with one goal to reduce the number of strikeouts (96 a year ago) which would give the team another power threat in the middle of the lineup to offer protection to Goldschmidt and Nolan Arenado.

Tyler O'Neill – If there was an award for the most disappointing Cardinal in 2022, it would have to go to O'Neill, primarily because one injury after another kept him off the field. He played in just 96 games, down from 138 in 2021, and saw his home run total drop from 34 to 14. With the Cardinals having numerous players competing for playing time in the outfield, O'Neill will have to show that he can stay healthy, and hit, to hold onto his spot as the primary left fielder.

Adam Wainwright – A year ago there was speculation about whether 2022 would be the final year of Wainwright's stellar career. There is none of that talk now, as Wainwright has announced that he will retire after 2023. He is going to use that status as a motivator to go out and pitch well – starting with his assignment with the U.S. squad in the World Baseball Classic. He believes pitching in those games will help put him in a more competitive frame of mind for the start of the season. Wainwright has a goal of winning at least 16 games, which would move him into second place, behind Bob Gibson, for the most career victories for the Cardinals surpassing Jesse Haines' total of 210.

Jordan Walker – Now the top prospect in the organization and one of the best in all of baseball, Walker will be one of the most scrutinized players in the Cardinals' camp during spring training. A strong performance there, coming off a big 2022 in Double A and the Arizona Fall League, could springboard Walker into the Cardinals' lineup in right field as a 20-year-old without a single game at the Triple A level. Whether that happens will be dictated by his performance, and the possibility of the Cardinals making other roster moves before the season begins. Whether it's on opening day or two months into the season, however, Walker appears set to make his major-league debut in 2023 and like Gorman, could become the extra hitter the team wants in the middle of their lineup.

THINGS CHANGE IN BRENTWOOD... BUT MEMORIES REMAIN

I remember the old Chili House on the southeast corner of Manchester and Brentwood Boulevard. This is now the site of businesses and used to be the Schnucks store before it moved to the southwest corner. Small world... my older brother remembered the owner as a thin tall man. When I was first married, he was our next door neighbor in South St Louis and had learned how to make chili as a cook during the armed services.

One of my grade school classmates had a brother who sold papers at the intersection of Manchester and Brentwood Boulevard, referred to as "The Intersection". One weekend he could not make it, so Judy and I sold papers; but it was great fun and something not many girls got to do at this time. Oh yes...the pony ride track near the northwest corner of The Intersection was a favorite of most of us kids; we loved riding those little ponies. That's now the site of a special auto dealership, which by the way, is next to the Hounsom's Drug Store building which still stands.

I have a picture of our class first communicants in the early 50's in front of St. Mary Magdalen Church. Though I did not go to the grade school there, I did get to meet and know many of those kids later at our Brentwood High School.

Some of us who worked at the Brentwood Theater looked forward to going to Caruso's after work on Friday nights. Of course, this was on the southwest corner of The Intersection. A teacher once told us he saw Elvis Presley and his entourage dining at Caruso's one night. Imagine...here in Brentwood!

A little west of Caruso's, there were several shops, i.e. a barber shop, a cleaners, and a shop that made plaster figurines. My brother worked part time at the plaster shop and painted many of those figurines, some of which I still have. I think the barber was named Joe and he loaned his beautiful Ford convertible to a friend of mine who worked occasionally for him. It was great fun riding in that convertible.

Then there was Hounsom's Drug Store across the street. Everyone knew and visited this store. Further north of the pony track, Dr. Bockelman had his beautiful, unique brick home and office across the street from St. Mary Magdalen. An alum owns that house now and it still looks the same. Going a little further north there was Frosty Manor, where the Optimist Club sold Christmas trees in winter, EJ's Drug Store and the Moss Farm across from the theater. This is now the site of the Kimberly Building. The Mosses (sister and brother) had a row of beautiful lilacs next to a path to Brentwood Blvd. from the homes on Kentland Drive and Florence. They lived in an old two story farmhouse. South of the farm was a big empty lot full of dirt paths and a hill, where kids played. Stepping away to the north part of the Moss farm, there was a huge lot, a great hill for sleigh riding, a few wooded areas with paths, and a flat area where some ingeneous kids made a ball diamond for playing baseball. In winter, so many kids went down that hill with their sleds. It was like a mini Art Hill



A Little Brentwood History

Editor's Note: I contacted Dan Fitzgerald of the Brentwood Historical Society asking if he had any pictures of the nursery that used to be where the Gene-Del Printing/Pulse Newspaper offices are located. He replied with these pictures and information. Thank you so much, Dan!



No pictures of the nursery. They ran ad's in a Webster paper from 1946-1955. Not sure how long it was around. The Hodapp family were in the area for years. They ran a truck farm on Gilbert Ave. in Rock Hill.

Herman Hodapp, who ran the nursey, lived on Shortridge Ave in Rock Hill.



This is the home of Edward and Anna Schinke. It was at 9005 Manchester Road. It was likely where the bowling alley was.



This is Edward Jr. and Robert Schinke. This picture is significant because across the road from the Schinke house was the infamous Links Chicken Farm. Links was one of many roadhouses in Brentwood and developed a shady reputation; especially during Prohibition.

The Schinke family lived here in the 1920's.

According to the old street numbering on Manchester, 9025 Manchester was a filling station, probably Carl's building.

9015 Manchester was a residence. It drops from the records when the nursery is built, around 1946.





Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.





DID YOU KNOW THAT FOOD OUTREACH OFFERS MISSOURI FOOD PANTRY TAX CREDITS?

SIX COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT THE MISSOURI FOOD PANTRY TAX CREDIT (MFPTC):

1. What is the MFPTC?

The MFPTC incentivizes Missouri taxpayers to donate to their favorite food pantries each year. By making a donation, an individual, corporation, or trust can receive up to 50% of their gift back through a state tax credit. The maximum value of the credit is \$2,500 for an individual or \$5,000 if filing jointly. Not all nonprofits participate in the program so it is important to reach out and ask your favorite food insecurity agencies if they offer the credit.

2. Are there any exclusions to receiving the MFPTC?

Gifts-in-kind, stock donations, and gifts from Donor Advised Funds do not qualify for the credit. Only direct cash donations are eligible.

3. I made a cash donation to Food Outreach in 2022. What happens next?

All gifts received by year-end may be eligible for the credit. If you make a gift of \$100 or more before December 31, 2022, you will automatically receive a tax form in the mail in February 2023. This form must be submitted with your state tax return by the filing deadline. If you are a Missouri resident and make a gift of less than \$100, you can reach out to keith@ foodoutreach.org after February 1, 2023, to request the MFPTC form be sent to you.

4. I plan to file an extension for my taxes in the coming year. Am I eligible for the MFPTC?

Unfortunately, the state is very strict on filing deadlines. You must file your Missouri taxes by April 18, 2023, in order to be eligible for the credit. If you file them later, you will be eligible to apply the tax credit to a future tax year.

5. Am I guaranteed the MFPTC?


The State of Missouri apportions \$1,750,000 into the MFPTC program each year. MFPTC claims will be held by the Missouri Department of Revenue until after all returns received on April 18 have been processed to determine if the total amount claimed exceeds \$1,750,000. If claims exceed \$1,750,000, the Department will apportion credits in an equal ratio among all valid returns filed. Any remaining credit from an applicant can be applied to future tax years.

6. I have additional questions related to my specific tax situation. Can you help?

Food Outreach is grateful to be able to offer the MFPTC to our donors. However, we cannot give tax advice. 4. Remove the pan from the oven and let them cool completely, before slicing and serving.







City of Brentwood offices will be closed Monday, Jan. 16, in observance of Martin Luther King Junior Day.





RESTAURANT REVIEWS

Hola Brentwood



Say hello to Sal Y Limon, a new Mexican restaurant in Brentwood. By the way, the name translates into sal and lime. This addition to your dining scene is an addition to the Robles family's other restaurant, Padrinos, in south St. Louis.

We were excited to try their newest location and we were not disappointed. Their large menu has an even larger number of traditional Mexican items that we all know and love. They also have a few Midwest steak items if your carnivore instincts win out. The menu is a two-sided menu printed on black paper. I think art overrode function as the print was very small, and a portion of the print was even smaller and shaded gray, making it all but impossible to read. In fact, neither of us could read those portions of the menu. We asked our waiter to read them, and he had to turn the menu toward the window and squint to read it. This should be corrected.

We were quickly seated and were surprised to find only three other tables of customers. The floor plan has not changed much from the previous occupant of this location, the old Houlihan's. I would suggest you ask to be seated in a booth, as the chairs at the table seats are small and solid metal with no padding whatsoever. They would not be comfortable for a long dinner.



We were served the usual chips and salsa while deciding what we would order. The chips were crisp and tasty. The salsa had a nice bite, but I thought it was mostly thin tomato sauce with very little additional flavor. There was a small amount of chopped onions and cilantro, but not enough to make a difference. I think the salsa was just average.

We ordered two different lunch specials; a chicken and beef enchilada platter for \$11.99 and a steak fajitas platter for \$8.99. Both items were larger than expected, and very reasonably priced, particularly for the portion size. The enchiladas were







mildly spiced and very tasty. They were accompanied by rice and beans, the obligatory St. Louis side dishes.

The steak fajitas were spectacular. Lots of meat with steaming hot veggies. The meat was served on a sizzling platter and perfectly spiced. Sides included warm flour tortillas, rice, beans and a small salad. Everything about this meal was perfection.

Another interesting thing was the check. A grand total of \$23.24, including a 10.77% sales tax (thank you, City of Brentwood) was discounted to \$22.44 for paying with cash. I felt that was a nice touch.

This new restaurant has a few minor things to work out, and I am sure they will. This family-owned business has a history of great customer service over the past decade. It is a good choice for a lunch and I am sure the dinner service would be even better. Speaking of service, our waiter was very congenial, and attentive. In today's service arena, that is hard to find. Thank you, Sir.

Sal Y Limon is a welcome addition to Brentwood and is a destination worthy of a quick lunch, date night or family dining at a price point that won't break your budget. Catering is also available. 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

You will never run out of things to do when visiting Branson. There are almost seven million visitors each year and it is one of America's top vacation destinations featuring shows and attractions.

Things To Do

Branson Ferris Wheel. Did you know the wheel was moved to Branson from Chicago's Navy Pier? It is 150 ft. tall and it lights up at night.

Shepherd of the Hills Canopy Tour is an all new zipline.

Copperhead Mountain Coaster is the largest downhill coaster and it snakes its way through loops and curves in the Ozark Mountains.

Titanic Museum is an interactive attraction that tells stories of those who made the fateful voyage.

You could spend hours in the 26,000 sq. ft. Toy Museum Complex wandering through the five museums and collections.

You will want to enjoy the Showboat Branson Belle on Table Rock Lake for a 2.5 hr. cruise; complete with a 3-course meal, a four-piece band, country singers and dancers.

Be sure to leave time for a couple shows. I liked the Grand Jubilee where there was everything from great vocals, awesome harmonies, live bands and comics. Hits range through the 70s, 80s and 90s (Anthems of the 80s.)

In historic downtown Branson you'll find Dick's 5 & 10, which is one of the last five and tens in America. Branson Landing has specialty shops, attractions, restaurants, nightspots and a \$7.5 million fountain with synchronized lights, sound, music and fire.

My favorite thing to do in Branson was to visit the new Aquarium at the Boardwalk. A very large bejeweled octopus is draped over the Aquarium. Inside there are 10 zones of fish. Walk through the tunnel surrounded by sharks, tiny seahorses, a vibrant coral reef, Mermaids and Mermen, stingrays and schools of silver sardines.
