ARTIST KIM BECK LAUNCHES NEW ANNUAL FLAG PROJECT AT LAUMEIER

In August 2021, Laumeier Sculpture Park will debut a new flag artwork titled Here, 2021 by Pittsburgh-based artist Kim Beck. The flag will feature patterns and textures captured from Laumeier's landscape through the process of rubbings, a technique used to transfer surface texture onto paper. By literally and metaphorically elevating traces of the Park's organic and built surfaces, Beck's work will foreground aspects of the Park's landscape that are often ignored or overlooked. The flag will be on view in Laumeier's Northern Grove from August 7 - December 19,2021.

To complete the project, Beck will partner with Laumeier's Studio Practice Coordinator, Sarah Harford, who will work onsite to create multiple rubbings of a range of surfaces in the Park using newsprint and lumber marking crayons. This drawing-like technique will capture impressions to inform Beck's finished piece. Once the rubbings are completed at Laumeier, they will be sent digitally to Beck to use in the design and creation of the flag for Laumeier.

In her artistic practice, Beck aims to bring the ordinary, often overlooked topographies and structures that make up our built environment into focus. As reflections and abstractions, Beck's Here, 2021, elevates the status of something that is trod on, laid upon, or leaned against to something that is looked up to or even revered.

"What a wonderful way to see the Park from a different perspective," adds Laumeier's Curator Dana Turkovic. "I am excited to see how Beck uses the gesture and movement most often associated with drawing to create a flag representative of the many materials and textures experienced while here at Laumeier. Within our green space is infrastructure such as paved trails, pathways and buildings that are equally meaningful and beautiful."

Children from families whose current income is at or below those shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Applications are available at the school office. To apply, fill out a Free and Reduced Price School Meals Family Application and return it to the school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. A complete application is required as a condition of eligibility. A complete application includes: (1) household income from all sources or Food Stamp/TANF case number, (2) names of all household members, and (3) the signature and last four digits of social security number or indication of no social security number of adult household member signing the application. School officials may verify current income at any time during the school year.

Foster children may be eligible regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for these benefits.

Households will be notified of their children's eligibility status for free or reduced price meals. If any children were not listed on the eligibility notice for families receiving SNAP, TANF or FDPIR, the household should contact the school to have free meal benefits extended to those children.

If any child(ren) was not listed on the eligibility notice, the household should contact the LEA or school to have free meal benefits extended to that child(ren).

Under the provisions of the policy, the **Building Principal's Secretary** will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official, they may wish to discuss the decision with the hearing official on an informal basis or he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to **Dr. Alex Tripamer** (314) 962-4507, atripamer@brentwoodmoschools.org).

Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the central office where any interested party may review it.

How to Protect Yourself from Fraud

Cyber attacks have been dominating the headlines lately. You've probably heard about several high-profile cases like at Colonial Pipeline and JBS (the largest meat packer in the U.S.). Attacks like these are an important reminder that we all play a role with information security, both professional and personally. Here are some of the ways cyber criminals attempt to gain access to your information:

PHISHING relies heavily on social media, text messaging, and email communication. Cyber-criminals use emails and social media websites to find information about you and use it to create a message tailored to you. Phishing emails and websites can also include a link that directs you to a site that steals your information.

*If you receive a phone call, text message or email from someone claiming to be your financial institution asking for any personal identification, online banking information or account details, DO NOT respond. HANG UP immediately and call your financial institution directly to ensure you are speaking with an authorized representative and report the instance.

MALWARE is a software that secretly accesses a device without the user's knowledge. Malware can infect your device in many different ways, including: downloading software that may be secretly infested with malware, clicking on links or pop-up windows that cause malware to start downloading, opening email attachments that contain malware, or visiting a site that is contaminated with malware.

RANSOMWARE is a branch off of malware where your computer or device is locked until you pay a sum of money (like the gas and meat plants recently). It is not encouraged to pay the ransom, as there is no guarantee that your files will be unlocked after the payment is made.

Now, here's how you can prevent these types of attacks:

• Always "think before you click" – pop-up windows, social media articles, and ads are hotspots for malware and phishing.

• Password protect your network & always use two-step authentication when offered.

• Keep your security programs updated - regularly back up your system and files to Cloudbased services, or store your backups offline, such as external drives.

• Check for poor spelling and grammar mistakes as well as a misleading domain names in emails and text messages.

• Do not send your personal information to anyone unless you are 100% sure it's legitimate.

Cyber criminals are constantly developing new and more sophisticated scams to evade detection. Shower Shoes for Everyone



In May, the Maplewood Lions Club launched a flip flop/ shower shoe drive for Gateway 180, a homeless facility located just north of downtown St. Louis. Gateway 180 is the largest homeless facility in the area and the only one that can accommodate entire families. Most shelters accommodate only women or women with small children. Gateway 180 houses babies, pre-teens, teens, adult men and women, and sometimes a couple of senior citizens; with a total capacity of 165 persons. Oddly enough, the total amount of shower shoes collected by the Lions Club was 165 including several pair for small children as well as for older children and adults.

Other needed items added to the collection included 50 pair of ladies underwear, 3 wallets, 1 purse, 1 scarf and 2 boxes of books. All the items were delivered to the shelter on June 17 by Lions Sue Templeton, Judith Yearling and Verneal Barlow along with Verneal's daughter Donna Douglas and grandson Ricky Douglas.

Tips for Reducing Mosquitoes on Your Property

We at the City of Brentwood encourage residents to keep your lawns mowed, keep rain gutters clean, remove standing water on your private property and complete other preventive measures to reduce potential mosquito breeding locations. Additional tips:

• Clean up trash or litter around your yard

• Remove or regularly flush places where water can collect around your home, including pet dishes, bird baths, fountains, flower pots and old tires

• Don't let water accumulate in rain gutters, piles of leaves, or in vegetation

• Remove sources of standing water in and around your home in plant pot saucers, pool tarps, etc.

• Tightly cover water storage containers (rain barrels, etc.)

For containers without lids, use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito

Bicentennial Time Capsule Needs Public's Help to Document Missouri History

The Missouri Bicentennial Time Capsule is seeking submissions from clubs, schools, community groups, businesses and government agencies to commemorate Missouri's bicentennial this year. The deadline to submit to the time capsule is Aug. 10, Missouri Statehood Day. All Missouri-based profit and nonprofit organizations are eligible to participate. The time capsule is sponsored by the State Historical Society of Missouri and the Saint Louis Ambassadors with a goal to collect items that document Missouri's past, present and future. The two organizations are asking for public participation in this project. Organizations and businesses are invited to participate by contributing three items: one to represent their past, one to represent their present, and a note to future Missourians. Items should measure no larger than 8.5 x 14 inches – i.e., no larger than legal size paper - and combined be no more than a quarter-inch thick. All submissions need to be in printed form and not electronic. Go to missouri2021.org to access the downloadable submission form and further instructions. All participants will be notified of their successful submission and receive a certificate for participating in the time capsule. Contributions will be accepted through Aug. 10, 2021, and an event to commemorate the time capsule will be held Aug. 27, 2021 in St. Louis. *Once sealed, the time capsule will be* housed at the State Historical Society of Missouri until Aug. 10, 2046, when it will be reopened and shared with the public 25 years later.

In 1921, Vinnorma Shaw designed a poster to commemorate the Missouri Centennial and advertise the Missouri Centennial Exposition at the Missouri State Fair. One hundred years later, what should a Missouri Bicentennial poster look like?

In 2020, Missouri students helped the Missouri Bicentennial Commission commemorate the state's 200th anniversary by ubmitting design concepts for a Missouri Bicentennial poster. Four concepts were chosen, with each winner receiving \$200

and a certificate acknowledging his/her achievement, as well as an invitation to attend the poster unveiling.

Since the pioneer days of the American Midwest, quilts have been a cornerstone of Missouri culture, fashion, and tradition. In honor of our great state's two-hundred-year anniversary, the State Historical Society of Missouri, a partner in the Bicentennial Alliance, and Missouri Star Quilt Company, in partnership with the Missouri State Quilters Guild, teamed up to create the Missouri Bicentennial Quilt! With one quilt block to represent every Missouri county and the independent City of St. Louis, the Missouri Bicentennial Quilt showcases the unique characteristics of Missouri culture and style.

Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) Program

2021 families that qualify for free or reduced price meals at school can once more apply for Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer (P-EBT) benefits to help cover food costs they experienced while their student was not doing in-seat learning due to the pandemic. However, the P-EBT 2020-2021 program is very different from last year's program. Please review the P-EBT Letter to Families. Here are highlights of those changes:

• All families must apply to get the P-EBT benefit, regardless of whether or not they receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)/Food Stamp benefits.

• A child may be eligible for P-EBT only if the school was closed, not doing in-seat learning, or had reduced attendance or hours at least five school days in a row due to COVID-19 (in most cases, this includes hybrid modes of learning).

• P-EBT benefits are available for the months of September 2020 through May 2021.

• The P-EBT benefit is based on the school's report of how much of the month was not in-seat learning. If most of the school's month was not in-seat learning, the monthly P-EBT benefit amount is \$129.58. If only some of the school's month was not in-seat learning, the monthly P-EBT benefit amount is \$77.75.

• Families download the P-EBT at dss.mo.gov.

Families must directly email or mail the P-EBT application to the Family Support Division address listed on the application by July 31, 2021.

• Families must not submit the application to the school district.

• Each eligible student will get an EBT card in his or her name with the lump sum P-EBT benefit amount for the 2020-2021 school year. Ineligible families will receive a denial letter.

Sachs Museum To Reopen at Missouri Botanical Garden

After more than a year of closure, the Stephen and Peter Sachs Museum at the Missouri Botanical Garden will reopen to visitors on Wednesday, July 7.

The Sachs Museum will open with its newest exhibit Grafting the Grape: American Grapevine Rootstock in Missouri and the World.

Grafting the Grape explores the various American grape species that are most used in viticulture, grafting, and winemaking, and how they were and continue to be used by the Native peoples of Missouri. Today, these American grapevine rootstock species continue to provide research challenges as scientists study and understand how the rootstock plants affect the scion plant's berries and chemical compounds (which affect the final wine product) as well as how climate change is impacting the future of viticulture around the world.

The exhibit also tells the story of the innovative botany and history of how these American plants saved the worldwide wine industry in the late 19th century thanks to scientists and viticulturists in Missouri, as well as the contemporary crop science being done today that addresses how the wine industry is responding to climate change.

Grafting the Grape features the work of three contemporary artists who create digital media and 3D artworks at the intersection of science and art. Dornith Doherty, renowned for her photographic work on seeds and global seedbanking, created three works in her series Roundabout (Circuition) especially created for the Grafting the Grape exhibition, which are inspired by the intersection of the historical innovation and the contemporary scientific research taking place in Dr. Allison Miller's Vitis Underground project. Artist collaborators inspired by the impact of climate change on grapevines, Lei Han and Lorraine Walsh focused their work for Grafting the Grape on environmental shifts as seen through the seemingly disparate practices of ancient horticultural grafting techniques and contemporaneous machine learning (a subset of artificial intelligence). They created one sculpture, one series of drawings, two series of digital images, and three series of short films for the exhibition. Their art focuses on the native grapevine species Missouri Vitis aestivalis (also known as the Norton grape) and the process of this mediation in order to bring a fruitful awareness of the significant effect climatic change has on life. The Sachs Museum is open 10:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Tuesday-Sunday. Entrance is included with Garden admission. In addition to the in-person exhibit, a virtual lecture series is scheduled for Grafting the Grape. Brentwood Public Library Director Gina Gibbons Elected President of Municipal Library Consortium

The Municipal Library Consortium of St. Louis County elected Brentwood Public Library Director Gina Gibbons as President. She will serve a two-year term.

The Municipal Library Consortium was formed in 1966 when seven municipal libraries created a cooperative arrangement to enhance services and share collections. Patrons of any of the member libraries could borrow items from the other libraries.

Members of the original Municipal Library Consortium included Brentwood, Ferguson, Kirkwood, Maplewood, Rock Hill, University City and Webster Groves. Now they are joined by Richmond Heights and Valley Park.

Together, these libraries have more lending power than if they stood as individual libraries. The member libraries also pool resources to purchase e-books, downloadable audiobooks and e-magazines.

"My goal as president of the Municipal Library Consortium is to establish a relationship with the St. Louis County Council," said Gibbons. "They were very supportive of area libraries during the COVID-19 pandemic, and we would like to be able to tie into that network of service. We would love to be able to duplicate useful services, such as Chromebooks and iPads for seniors, for the citizens who reside in the municipalities in St. Louis County."

Charging Stations Ribbon Cutting



On June 9, Brentwood Mayor David Dimmitt, members of the Brentwood Sustainability Commission, and City staff hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony for the City's electric vehicle charging stations.

The City has installed four charging ports, covering four parking spaces in the Brentwood Recreation Complex parking lot. The EV charging stations were ready for public use in mid-February 2021. The stations are available for the public to use, at no cost to the user, during normal business hours. To use the stations, users download the ChargePoint app and then locate the Brentwood station via the app.

Brentwood's Sustainability Commission began work in January 2021 and includes five Brentwood residents representing each of the City's four Wards: Andy Burkemper (Chair), Melissa Boban, Alex Porter, Tika Shah and Lindsay Spencer.

The Commission will help to develop a city-wide coordinated effort to advance energy conservation, environmental improvement, and sustainability of resources for Brentwood.

Sign Up for Weather Warning Alerts Through the CodeRED **Community Notification System**

Brentwood's CodeRED Community Notification System now includes CodeRED Weather Warning, to provide residents and businesses with automated severe weather alerts. Those who choose to opt in to this service will receive flash flood, tornado and severe thunderstorm warnings just moments after an alert has been issued by the National Weather Service.

To activate the Weather Warning Alert options, you'll need to register for CodeRED again. To activate these severe weather warnings, please visit Brentwood's CodeRED enrollment page by

clicking on the "Brentwood CodeRED" icon on the home page of www.brentwoodmo.org. You also can text WARNME to 99411 from your mobile phone.

Enter a cell phone number, landline number and/or email address and select the types of weather warnings you wish to receive. There is no charge to residents or businesses for this service.

We'll continue to send other public safety notifications, such as road closures or specific emergency

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

Brentwood Bound Update - Craig Schluter with Navigate Building Solutions reported on the typical Brentwood Bound Construction Costs, Soft Costs, Property acquisitions and Funding Sources including the MSD Amendment on the agenda.

2021 Brentwood Days - Eric Gruenenfelder shared what he had reported at the Public Works Committee Meeting regarding the St. Louis County guidelines for gatherings regarding Pre-packaged food, social distancing, etc. and that we are uncertain about continued restrictions and what will be required during Brentwood Days. Eric presented three options for consideration and asked for recommendation:

Book the event as normal and pull back on contracts, etc. if needed-this could be a costly option and not the best.

A more "Social Distanced" event, more spread out, with fewer rides and less attractions.

A smaller (one-day) mini-event keeping the parade and fireworks. This is what Public Works Committee selected.

A motion was made by Alderman Wegge and seconded by Alderwoman Tice stating that while disappointing, they felt like option #3 was the best alternative for moving forward.

Foundation and the Black Communities Investment Initiative Advisory Committee, which is funded through two component funds of the St. Louis Community Foundation: the COVID-19 Regional Response Fund and the Black-Led Nonprofit and Community Fund supported by Facebook, Inc. The Diaper Bank will use the grant to provide diaper and period supplies to the St. Louis area.

Founded in 2014, the St. Louis Area Diaper Bank collects, stores, and distributes 250,000 free diapers per month to struggling families through a network of 56 community, nonprofit, educational and health care partners serving low-income women and children. These diapers are obtained via local diaper drives, in-kind donations, and by purchasing diapers directly with donated funds.

To date more than 5.1 million diapers have been distributed in St. Louis including nearly 900,000 diapers during the height of the pandemic. The Diaper Bank offers both emergency and long-term diaper distribution. This service is a much-needed resource since government programs – including food stamps and WIC – do not provide funding for diapers. Diapers cannot be obtained with food stamps and are classified with cigarettes, alcohol, and pet food as disallowed purchases.

Mediocre Mexican

When we are hungry and can't decide on what we want, we usually end up choosing Mexican. I had read some seemingly good interviews on Yelp about El Agave is St. Charles. I have never found Yelp to be a reliable reference, and once again, I found my previous thoughts to be correct.

We were quickly seated and got the obligatory chips and salsa. The chips were warmed and crispy, and the salsa had just the right amount of heat to make you order a margarita, and we did. That is pretty much where the term service ended.

One server took our drink order and 3 minutes later another server asked us if we wanted something to drink. Both came back and asked if we were ready to order and I suggested it would be nice if we could see a menu. He came back with "A" menu and spun on his heals and left. He came back in less than two minutes to ask if we were ready to order. I told him it would be nice if I could also have a menu, as I had given the first one to my wife Sue to look at. At this point he asked me if I wanted another menu. I said "yes I do".

The menu has eight pages of appetizers, salads soups, entree, lunch specials, kids items, drinks, desserts and more. You definitely have more than enough items to satisfy everyone.

Sue ordered the empanada appetizer. The small corn tortilla pockets were stuffed with beef and cilantro and then deep fried. They were served with a half slice of tomato, sour cream and rice. The empanadas were over-cooked to the point of being very close to burned. The rice was very tasty with a hint of garlic.

I ordered the Combination plate #16, a chalupa, enchilada, and a beef chili rellano. The enchilada was a soggy corn tortilla stuffed with ground beef and swimming in a red sauce that had a strong taste of vinegar. I was not impressed. The chili rellano was superb. The chalupa was a stale corn tortilla topped with chopped lettuce, re-fried beans, guacamole, and a half slice of tomato.

One thing I did like was the décor. It was reminiscent of the old Hacienda in Overland. There were a number of painted scenes of old Mexico. The room is divided in to sections with both tables and booths, and there was a bar and a few TVs if you wanted to watch a game. There is also a patio for alfresco dining.

The total bill was \$25.30. that is a very reasonable price seeing that we each had a margarita. Over all, I have to rate this restaurant as a 2.5 out of 5 based on preparation and service.

El Agava is located on Elm St. just north of the New town exit from I-370 and I can't say it is worth the drive from St. Louis county.. They also have locations in Wentzville and Crestwood. The Crestwood locations is at 9815 Watson Plaza, suite403 if you would like to see if it is more appealing.

THAI PEANUT BUTTER STEAK

- 2. Process about 1 minute then scrape down sides of the bowl with a spatula
- Continue to process on & off about 30 seconds or so at a time until it gets to your preferred smoothness
- 4. Add salt & honey and process until combined
- 5. Add the oil if you want it super smooth
