

Mosquito Control

For several years, the Brentwood Public Works Department provided mosquito adulticide services, a weekly application of mosquito control spray in residential areas throughout the City from late May to mid-September. In October 2018, the Board of Aldermen agreed to discontinue this service except for special events such as Brentwood Days and Music on the Menu. The adulticide services were not effective in reducing the mosquito population and instead harmed other, beneficial

The City will continue contracting with St. Louis County Vector Control Services for control of mosquito larvae.

Residents are encouraged to remove standing water on their private property and complete other preventive measures to reduce potential mosquito breeding locations. Mosquitos can only reproduce in standing, stagnant water. Mosquito larvae can't develop in moving-water ponds or streams. If you have a garden pond, consider installing a bubbling feature. Birds will find it even more attractive than a conventional bird bath, and mosquitos won't be able to hatch there.

Havens for mosquitos around any home are any kind of container that holds even a small amount of water. When you find and dump all standing water, you are doing your part to keep your environment as mosquito-free as possible.

Cardinals' Anthony Shew proving an undrafted player can still become a prospect

Between the time baseball's amateur draft begins and ends, the 30 major-league teams select more than 1,200 players from high schools, colleges and junior colleges, giving them a chance to pursue a professional career.

Anthony Shew is living proof, however, that a player does not have to be drafted to still become a prospect.

Shew has risen from his undrafted status to become a member of the starting rotation at the Cardinals' Triple A team in Memphis, just one phone call away from the major leagues.

"When you first get here (into the pros) it comes up when you talk to guys," Shew said. "'When did you get drafted? What was your signing bonus?'kn I got \$1,000 and a plane ticket (to Johnson City, Tenn.) which was more important to me. After I had made a couple of starts, I felt just like another player.

"When we come out here every day, we're not wearing our draft status on our shirts. You have the opportunity to make of it whatever you want."

What Shew has done over the course of three years is turn himself into a prospect.

The journey begins

Shew completed his senior season at the University of San Francisco in the spring of 2016, and the right-handed pitcher was not tethered to his telephone or watching the draft click by selection after selection on his computer.

He wanted one of the major league organizations to call and say they were going to take him with their next pick, but realistically Shew knew that probably wasn't going to happen.

Part of his thought process came from experience. The 2016 draft was the fifth time Shew was eligible to be selected – as a senior in high school in Mission Viejo, Calif., after each of his two junior college seasons at Saddleback College, and after his junior season at San Francisco. That meant teams had already had more than 4,800 chances to call Shew's name as a draft pick. Nobody had called. The last chance he had to be drafted passed quietly as well.

"I was sort of prepared for it because my season hadn't really ended the way I wanted," Shew said. "Mentally I was sort of prepared for it, but I still felt like a baseball player."

Shew, having earned his degree in business administration, spent a couple of weeks at his parents' house and considered his future. He said he just "hung out; took some time away from everything." He then made a trip back to college and dropped in on his coach, Nino Giarratano.

"He came in like most seniors after the draft and I asked him if he wanted to continue to play," Giarratano said. "He said he sure did. I said, 'Keep your fingers crossed. Somebody will call. They will need a pitcher."

It wasn't long afterward when Giarratano's phone rang. Randy Flores, the Cardinals' scouting director, said the organization needed a pitcher for one of its lower-level farm teams.

"He asked, 'Can Shew do it?" Giarratano recalled. "I told him, 'He's the perfect guy for you. Not only can he do it, but if he gets healthy he can pitch in the big leagues someday.' He (Flores) gave him that opportunity. Anthony is making both of us pretty happy."

Giarratano believes one of the reasons Shew wasn't drafted was because "we pitched him too much. He just needed to go someplace where he could rejuvenate and rest. As soon as he did that he really got going."

Flores had not called Giarrantano out of the blue. The Cardinals' area scout in northern California at the time, Zach Mortimer, had watched some of Shew's games and turned in a report that said he was a draftable player but the opportunity to pick him never came up during the 40 rounds of the draft.

"It was good teamwork," Flores said. "We had information from our analytics department, our area scout had written him up as a possible pick and then the coach raved about the kid. When those things come together, when you are looking for somebody, those factors all in tandem led to him being signed.

"It's a testament first of all to the kid. It's one thing to get an opportunity. It's another thing to get that opportunity and seize it. ... He's taken advantage of his opportunity."

Learning to read swings

Shew was smart enough even in high school to realize the reason a lot of pitchers get drafted is because of one element of their game – an ability to throw a baseball really fast, close to triple digits.

Shew watched one of those pitchers on his own team, Kiernan Lovegrove, turn that ability into becoming a third-round selection by the Indians in 2012.

"I really didn't throw hard enough then, probably about as hard as I do now," Shew said. "We all know how that works as far as the draft goes. He (Lovegrove) was throwing 98. He was right next to me. I wasn't that guy, just like now. I was more of a, 'Throw it where they are not going to hit it' guy.

"Everybody would love to have that (ability) but we all work with what we have. I'm just trying to get the most out of what I have."

Seven years after that draft, Lovegrove is now in the Giants' farm system, working as a relief pitcher in Double A.

Shew found himself at Saddleback College a couple of months after that draft, and that was where his life and career intersected with that of Chris Malec, who had become the hitting coach for the Gauchos shortly after his playing career, mostly in the Yankees farm system, had come to an end.

Shew's pitching education was just beginning. He was the student. Malec became the teacher.

"He knows absolutely everything about trying to hit a baseball," Shew said. "I was pitching that fall and he came over to me and said, 'Why did you throw that pitch?' I said, 'I don't know, it just felt good at the time.' He started in on a conversation about this guy doing this, you had just thrown that. It was something new to me.

"He was our third base coach so every time we had a scrimmage or a game I was on the dugout rail trying to get him out of the coaches box to talk to me about what he was seeing. I spent a lot of time learning about everything he knew."

Malec, now the head coach at Santa Margarita High School in southern California, remembers those conversations as well.

"Anthony had a big curiosity," Malec said. "He had a passion for the game and he really wanted to take it to another level and a deeper understanding. I could see he was a smart, studious pitcher who was trying to figure out how to learn the game at a higher level about what hitters were trying to do.

"A lot of our conversations revolved around, 'What would you try to do as a hitter in certain situations. How would you attack, or counter, what the pitcher was trying to do?' He was mature beyond his years. His desire to learn was part of the fun."

What Shew was trying to do then basically was the same thing he tries to do now when he takes the mound for the Memphis Redbirds. He knows he isn't going to blow hitters away with his fastball, which on a good day can hit 94. He has to get hitters out in other ways.

"There are very few pitchers that can pitch close to 90, but he's one of them," Malec said. "I'm proud of him for that. He's learned to do it almost like a Kyle Hendricks. He (Shew) knows how to get people out. He got people out in high school, he got people out in junior college and in college. He's getting people out now in the minors.

"There's something to be said for guys that just continue to have that hunger about how to keep going. He's a born winner. It's impressive."

Shew has taken those lessons he learned from Malec, and more he learned at San Francisco, and carried them into his minor-league career. Once he got past the first few months at Johnson City, where he was still being affected by his overuse in college, Shew has made a steady progression through the farm system.

The 25-year-old Shew began this season at Double A Springfield and was promoted to Memphis after five starts that produced a 1.93 ERA. He has made five starts with the Redbirds, going 1-1 with a 3.00 ERA.

"When I try to get a little too fancy or do a little too much it starts to go haywire," Shew said. "I pay a lot of attention to what the hitters are doing. ... I'm optimistic I will throw harder; I'm not going to say no to that. I like to think through at-bats. I think through my workload as I'm preparing for a start. There's always a thought process involved. I don't throw a pitch for no reason. There is something I want to accomplish with every pitch.

"Even guys who throw with really high velocity have a reason for making the pitches that they do. When I was a kid I was more impressed by Greg Maddux then whoever the hardest thrower was at the time. I was really locked into Greg Maddux and all of the things he could do and do it with pinpoint precision. I thought it was like magic when I was a kid."

Shew is not by any means comparing himself to Maddux, a Hall of Famer, except for the similarity in their style of pitching.

"That's something I try to bring to the table," he said. "No one is ever going to be as good as that guy and the things he did, but that's something that's definitely stuck with me over the years."

One memory that has stuck with his college coach, Giarratano, over the years was a game against St. Mary's when Shew was a junior. His pitching opponent that day was a sophomore, Corbin Burnes, now a member of the Milwaukee Brewers. Even though he has spent more than two decades as San Francisco's baseball coach, Giarratano has no problem recalling the details of that game.

"Both guys went over eight innings and Anthony won 2-1," Giarratano said. "I think that's the greatest memory I have. Burnes is now a big-leaguer, and Anthony is at Triple A knocking on the door. Who would have ever known then what was going to happen in their careers. It was a wonderful matchup.

"One equalizer for Anthony will always be his ability to throw his changeup. Without that he would be like a lot of guys trying to get outs without much velocity. That changeup helps his fastball, and his command on his fastball is extraordinary. That, and his competitiveness, is what separates him."

Major-league connections

One of Shew's cousins is pitcher Ian Kennedy, now with the Royals and in his 13th season in the major leagues. It was Kennedy, indirectly, who taught Shew how to throw his changeup.

"I stole my changeup off his baseball card," Shew admitted.
"He's always been ahead of me because he's older, so he's helped give me insight into what the next level looks like. I try not to bug him too much, but I do ask questions about taking care of his arm, about certain things during games."

Shew's baseball journey already has provided him with a couple of major-league connections besides his relationship with Kennedy. When he was a junior in high school, his team played for the southern California championship in Dodger Stadium. Shew warmed up three times during the game in the bullpen but didn't pitch in the game.

As a senior in college, he did pitch in AT&T Park (now Oracle Park) in San Francisco. Two months ago, he faced off against a rehabbing Clayton Kershaw in Tulsa.

"I got to hit off him too, that was an experience," Shew said. "I got to see a Kershaw curveball. It's as good as they say it is."

Getting a chance to pitch in another major-league stadium, for real, against major-league hitters, has been and remains Shew's goal. He has a lot of people rooting for him, not only because of the road he has taken to try to get there, but also because of how hard he has had to work to get the most out of his ability.

"I'm so happy for what he's been able to accomplish," Giarratano said. "I'm not shocked. All he needed was a chance. All he needed to do was get healthy. I've seen him at his best at times and he's got a lot of components that make a really successful pitcher.

"He continues to persevere. We keep rooting for him. I think all of baseball keeps rooting for a guy like this to make it. It's all those kids who don't throw 95 to 98 but love to play and they just master their craft like him. There are so many kids who will get overlooked, so many kids who have to wait years like Anthony did to really get that opportunity.

"I think he's going to show everybody. He keeps believing in himself and working. He's a very simple guy, not complex. He knows what he wants to do."

Said Malec, "It's not an easy road. There's different ways to get there. If you get to the ultimate final destination (the major leagues) it truly doesn't matter how you get there. He's worked really hard at finding his way to what makes him successful."

Memphis manager Ben Johnson also can be included in those who have been impressed by Shew's performance and those rooting for him to succeed.

"Every time he has taken the ball he has given us a chance to win," Johnson said. "What I like about Anthony is he knows who he is as a pitcher and he kind of stays within himself. He just goes out and pitches. He's almost a throwback in a sense. He utilizes the art of pitching to his advantage.

"It's refreshing, as someone who's been watching the game for almost 40 years now. Kyle Hendricks is a prime example. It can still be done. ... I think Anthony could help a major-league club."

Three years removed from his last draft snub, Shew knows there were a lot of players disappointed that they were not selected in this year's draft. He has some advice for them.


"Understand your path," he said. "There's a lot of guys who get phone calls after the draft. They get a chance to play even though they weren't drafted. There's guys who go to Indy ball and end up in the big leagues.

"There are all kinds of pathways, all kinds of stories. If it's what you want, stick with it."

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Arkansas Italian!

My first thought about the term "Arkansas Italian", I assumed I was dealing with an oxymoron.

But that was not the case. Italians immigrated to the South to work on the plantations, many of them in a position of servitude until they could pay off their cost of transatlantic transportation and other costs attributed to their immigration to the United States.

Like all legal immigrants, they brought with them their traditions, customs and cuisine. Like St. Louis, this resulted in many superb multi-generational restaurants.

The Little Rock Italian Culture and Food Festival began with a VIP, invitational dinner on Thursday evening at Restorante Capeo in North Little rock. Restorante Capeo is a well recognized Italian restaurant that is an excellent example of traditional Italian cuisine as well as a source of more contemporary Italian dishes.

This meal filled both dining rooms with the sponsors of the festival event. The evening began with a sparkling peach drink and a silent auction for the benefit of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Central Arkansas.

We also learned the proper way to cut the cheese! There was a huge wheel of parmigiana cheese on display and we were given a demonstration of how to prepare it for serving. We were told that hard cheeses should never be cut with a knife. They should be split open by puncturing the cheese with a pointed metal chisel around the center of the wheel until it can be split open. And then you should pry off small chunks of the cheese rather than slicing the cheese with a knife.

The tables were decorated with fresh flowers and dried pasta in glass vases. It was simple, yet very attractive. There was a menu program that described each dish as well as the wines that were to be served.

The wines were from Banfi wines of Italy and we were treated to a special presentation from Luciano Castiello, the brand ambassador for Banfi. He was very informative as well as entertaining! When I saw a table covered with dozens of bottles of wine, I knew this would be a special night! I was pleasantly surprised by the variety and quality of these reasonably priced wines.

Chef Eric Isaac, and his staff, prepared a multi-course dinner that highlighted the diversity of Italian dining. While some of these items may not appear on Capeo's regular menu, they certainly showed us the Chef's creative abilities of preparing very unique Italian styles of preparation. I was genuinely impressed. Especially when these items were prepared more than one hundred people. The food and the service were exceptional.

Capeo's regular menu includes all of your favorite Italian dishes, and a large number of rather unique items that can only be described as gourmet Italian. A few examples include: Baked Penne with lamb, eggplant and fontina \$15.00, Duck Valentine, pan seared duck breast with a sauce of sambucco and port wine \$26.00, Lamb With figs, a tender lamb shank braised In wine with figs And served In A rich sweet sauce \$27.00, Saffron & Honey Panna Cotta, "Cooked cream" a silky smooth dessert from the Piedmont region topped with macerated blueberries \$8.00. There are also homemade sorbetto and gelato with a new flavor each day for only \$6

Capeo's pricing is more than friendly. The most expensive item on the menu is a daily fresh fish item that varies between \$28.00 and \$32.00. Wood fired pizzas are \$12 to \$15, appetizers \$8 to \$12, pastas are \$13 to \$15, and main dishes are \$19 to \$35.

I would describe the ambiance as "rustic" There is a large open bar area with a view to the kitchen, and one dining room has a brick wall painted with an old "Mailpouch" tobacco advertisement. Another nice touch is a window table in the shape of a heart. A perfect spot for a romantic date!

You do have the opportunity to enjoy Three Course Wine Dinners starting at 6:30 pm on the Second Monday of June, August & November. This consists of three savory courses paired with three full glasses of wine. Dessert and coffee are optional (and extra). The price is only \$60 per person which will include all taxes.

Ristorante Capeo would easily be accepted on "The Hill" in St. Louis, so if you want a taste of home in Little Rock, Arkansas, I highly recommend Restorante Capeo.














A short history of ... "St. Louis Blues" (W.C. Handy, 1914)





W.C. Handy, often referred to as the Father of the Blues, first published "St. Louis Blues," his most famous composition, in 1914. He later said: "Well, they say life begins at forty. I wouldn't know. But I was forty the year 'St. Louis Blues' was composed and ever since my life has ... revolved around that composition."

Handy had arrived in St. Louis, Missouri, in the early part of the 20th century and, according to Maureen O'Connor Kavanaugh, "slept on the cobblestones of the levee until he found work as a musician." The song was allegedly inspired by his chance meeting with a woman who walked the streets of St. Louis tormented by her husband's absence, wailing "my man's got a heart like a rock cast in the sea." Tom Morgan observed that Handy "drew inspiration for many of his songs from African-American words and music, so it is not surprising that he began to compose the theme to this woman's anguish."

Since first appearing in 1914, "St. Louis Blues" has become one of the most famous, celebrated, and recorded jazz standards in history. Handy recorded his best version of the song in 1922 and three years later, in 1926, Fats Waller would play it on a Victor Studio organ as his first ever solo recording. In 1925, Bessie Smith, the greatest blues singer of the time, recorded a stellar version of "St. Louis Blues" alongside a young cornet star named Louis Armstrong, who was setting the jazz world on fire with his exciting improvisations.

Armstrong would return to this song many times throughout his career, beginning with a version he recorded in 1929 with trumpeter Red Allen and trombonist J.C. Higginbotham. Both the 1925 and 1929 recordings were inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame – the former in 1993 and the latter in 2008

"St. Louis Blues" has been called "the jazzman's Hamlet," and recorded by countless artists, including Herbie Hancock, Dizzy Gillespie, the Thad Jones/Mel Lewis Orchestra, and Greg Osby. It has also been noted as something of a national anthem given its popularity in countries outside of the United States. Ted Gioia writes: "Long before British rockers 'discovered' the blues in the 1960's, the Handy standard found favour in the United Kingdom, and in some unlikely locales: Edward VIII requested the tune from his Scottish pipers at Balmoral Castle, Prince George and Princess Marina of Greece danced to it at their 1934 wedding, and Queen Elizabeth called it one of her favourite songs."

In France, guitarist Django Reinhardt played and recorded the song many times throughout the 30's. When Nazi Germany occupied France, American songs became frowned upon, if not outright banned. In order to play them, Reinhardt and other musicians had to give them French names: "St. Louis Blues" became "La Tristesse du saint Louis."

- On May 28th, Mark Twain students and staff participated in "Laps for Lisa," a fundraiser




organized in support of a staff member's parent who suffered a ruptured brain aneurysm in December. The event raised over \$4,700 to help cover the medical costs incurred by the family.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT Brentwood Bound Update

Craig Schluter, Navigate Building Solutions, reported there were no COP expenses this week. Worked with Karen Shaw, Finance Director to reconcile the categories. The investment costs were reduced because approved at the January 17 Board Of Aldermen meeting, MoDOT property acquisition deposit of \$1,428,390 has been delayed until mid-May and the check has not been sent. Total spent to date is \$2,558,103.50. The direct project costs have been updated to reflect April 12, 2019 accounting reconciliation. Total spent to date is \$2,172,669.03. The indirect or "sunk" were updated to reflect the COP closing costs that were not already reflected in the previous amounts and April 12, 2019 accounting reconciliation. Total spent to date is \$1,203,232.07.

Phillip Blonn, Jacobs Engineering provided a Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR) status update. A few comments were received from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) on Thursday, April 11th. The comments are minor and nothing relevant to change the project. We are targeting April 25th to submit our response. FEMA will have 90 days to respond or approve the CLOMR.

City Administrator Akande responded to Kerber, Eck & Braeckel (KEB) audit inquiries from the April 1, 2019 Board of Aldermen Meeting. Cook and Riley and Avatar Studios invoices were on the initial draft findings. The Board retroactively approved those two invoices which is why they were removed. Going forward any invoice that is approved retroactive will show up on an exception report. The Outfront Media invoice was also paid retroactive. The inquiry regarding \$155,000, about \$23,000 had already appeared on the warrant list and the City was being reimbursed for those expenses because the issuance document allowed the City to recoup some of the closing costs. The balance that should have been brought to the Board but was not. We completed a requisition document that went directly to UMB Bank to pay for the costs. For example, Gilmore & Belle and Stifel, Nicolaus & Co. were the expenses ones that didn't go to the Board. Going forward, the expenses will be presented to the Board.


D-Day anniversary: Why is D-day called D-Day? What does the D stand for?

The 75th anniversary of D-Day takes place this week on June 6 and commemorates the invasion of Normandy. The invasion took place on June 6, 1944, when allied forces landed in several points on the French coast and pushed to end Adolf Hitler's occupation of Europe. Celebrations marking the decisive allied victory in World War 2 are held at a number of locations in the UK and France. Some D-Day commemorations will happen a day early on June 5, while US President Donald Trump is visiting the UK.

Operation Neptune is the official designated codename for D-Day.

D-Day is a military term and is not tied exclusively to the Normandy landings.

The phrase refers to the day in which military forces initiate an operation.



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Preliminary Reports Indicate Seven Traffic Fatalities, One Boating Fatality, No Drownings Over Memorial Day Weekend

Seven people died in traffic crashes over the 2019 Memorial Day weekend. During the counting period of 6 p.m., Friday, May 24, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, May 27, 2019, the Missouri State Highway Patrol investigated 298 traffic crashes with 106 injuries. Troopers made 95 driving while intoxicated arrests and 93 drug arrests.

Last year, 16 people were killed in traffic crashes over the three-day weekend. In 2018, troopers investigated 294 traffic crashes, which included 124 injuries. Troopers also arrested 121 people for driving while intoxicated and made 102 drug arrests over the 2018 Memorial Day weekend.

There was one boating fatality over the 2019 Memorial Day weekend. Marine operations troopers investigated six boating crashes involving three injuries. There were no drownings during the 2019 Memorial Day holiday. Marine operations troopers arrested nine boaters for boating while intoxicated and made 27 drug arrests.

William A. Gordon-Price, 27, of Overland Park, KS, died after he went swimming off his Sweetwater Pontoon vessel. He went under and did not resurface. The incident occurred in Camden County at the Lake of the Ozarks at the one-mile marker of the Grand Glaize Arm. Camden County Medical Examiner Dee Ballard pronounced Gordon-Price dead at the scene. Gordon-Price was not wearing a life jacket at the time of the incident. The Patrol's Dive Team, Osage Beach Fire Department, Mid-County Fire Department, Lake Ozark Fire Department, and Osage Beach Police Department assisted at the scene.

During the 2018 Memorial Day weekend, there were 14 boating crashes which included 10 injuries and one fatality. Two people drowned over last year's holiday weekend. Troopers arrested 17 people for boating while intoxicated over the 2018 Memorial Day weekend.

Watercraft operators must consider the effect their actions have on others: Share the waterway and use common sense, good judgment, and courtesy to ensure the safety of all. Life jackets save lives. Wear It!!

Troopers have investigated all seven traffic crash fatalities. Five fatalities occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area, and one each occurred in the Troop G, Willow Springs, and Troop I, Rolla, areas.

One traffic fatality occurred on Friday, May 24,2019, during the counting period. Clarence E. McPherson, 67, of Virginia Beach, VA, died when he was struck by a vehicle. McPherson was in the roadway at the time of the crash, which occurred in St. Louis County south of Interstate 70 on Natural Bridge Road. Dr. Bokiej pronounced McPherson dead at SSM Health DePaul Hospital. The driver of the vehicle that struck McPherson was not injured in the incident; he was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Berkeley, MO, Police Department assisted at the scene.

Two people died in traffic crashes on Saturday, May 25, 2019. Maria I. Stone, 59, of Lebanon, MO, died when the vehicle in which she was a passenger struck another vehicle head on. The other vehicle was turning onto Missouri Highway 32 from Red Oak and entered the path of the vehicle carrying Stone. The crash occurred on Missouri Highway 21 east of Lebanon. Dr. Eric Funk pronounced Stone dead at Cox North Hospital in Springfield, MO. The driver and two additional passengers sustained minor injuries; another passenger sustained serious injuries in the crash. Stone and all other people in that vehicle were wearing seat belts. The driver of the second vehicle was not wearing a seat belt; she sustained moderate injuries.

Robert M. Stump, 49, of Lake St. Louis, MO, died when the vehicle he was driving traveled off the right side of the roadway and overturned. He was not wearing a seat belt. The crash occurred in St. Charles County on Missouri Highway 94 west of Howell Road. St. Charles County EMS personnel pronounced Stump dead at the scene. A passenger in Stump's vehicle was wearing a seat belt; she sustained minor injuries.

St. Charles County Police Department assisted at the scene.

Two people died in traffic crashes on Sunday, May 26, 2019. Delphine D. Stegall, 43, of St. Louis, MO, died when the vehicle she was driving was struck in the rear. Stegall's vehicle had experienced a flat tire and she was attempting to pull over to the right shoulder at the time her vehicle was struck. Stegall was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 270 at Missouri Highway 367. Christian EMS Paramedic Perry Schneider pronounced Stegall dead at the scene. The driver of the other vehicle was wearing a seat belt; he sustained serious injuries in the crash.

Colton Ogden, 14, of Licking, MO, died when the ATV he was operating left the roadway and went through a fence. Ogden was ejected and struck a tree; he was not wearing a helmet. The crash occurred in Texas County on Pigeon Creek Road northeast of Licking, MO. Dr. Zereik pronounced Ogden dead at Texas County Memorial Hospital.

Two people died in traffic crashes on Memorial Day, May 27, 2019. Charles M. Wilcox, 60, of Ballwin, MO, died when he attempted to make a right turn and entered the path of another vehicle. The other vehicle struck the right side of Wilcox's vehicle. Wilcox was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Missouri Highway 100 at Pond Road. Dr. Tzau pronounced Wilcox dead at Mercy Hospital in St. Louis. The driver of the other vehicle was wearing a seat belt; she sustained moderate injuries in the crash.

The remaining fatality is under investigation. There is no further information available.

The only 100 percent survivable traffic crash is the one that never happens. Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Every day as we travel on Missouri's roadways, we trust that every driver on the road is going to obey the speed limit, pay attention, and drive sober. "Don't Violate The Trust." 



The Major Benefits:

- Down payments aren't required unless the purchase price is more than the appraised value of the property or it's higher than the local VA loan limit
- Mortgage rates are typically lower than rates on conventional loans
- No mortgage insurance is required
- Counseling is available to help borrowers retain a home through serious financial difficulties
- You can reuse your VA loan benefit
- VA loans limit the amount you can be charged for closing costs
- You don't have to be a first-time home buyer
- VA-backed loans can be assumable this means they can be taken over by someone you sell the house to, even if that person isn't a service member

VA loan general requirements: While a VA mortgage's qualifying requirements are more relaxed than those for a conventional loan, an applicant still needs to have decent credit and sufficient income to buy a home. And the home being financed must serve as the primary residence.

Credit score requirements: The VA doesn't set a minimum credit score to qualify for a loan. Instead, it requires a lender "to review the entire loan profile to make a lending decision," according to the VA. However, each lender you shop will have its own FICO score requirement (usually around 620+).

Required fees: While there is no mortgage insurance requirement, all Veterans using the VA Home Loan Guaranty benefit must pay a funding fee. This helps the VA cover the costs of mortgage foreclosures. The amount of the fee ranges from 1.25% to 3.3% of the loan amount, depending on the down payment, how long you served and for which branch of the military, and whether you've tapped your VA home loan benefit previously.

Many times this fee is added to the total loan amount, rather than being paid upfront. That will increase your monthly payment and the amount of interest you'll pay during the loan term.

Veterans who receive VA disability compensation and qualified surviving spouses don't have to pay the fund-

The Process of a VA Loan from Start to Home

- Find a lender.
- Get a Certificate of Eligibility.
- Find a Home and Sign a Purchase Agreement. Work with a real estate professional and negotiate a purchase agreement. Make sure the purchase and sales agreement contains a "VA Option Clause."
- Apply for your VA Loan. Work with the lender to complete a loan application and gather the needed documents, such as pay stubs and bank statements.
- Closing. The lender chooses a title company, an attorney, or one of their own representatives to conduct the closing. This person will coordinate the date/time and the property is transferred. You're ready to move

STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

Brentwood's Public Works Department provides street sweeping services on most streets in Brentwood. 
