Rising Sophomore Selected for College Prep Program



Brentwood High School student Kyra Williams is one of 50 rising high school sophomores admitted to the ninth cohort of the Washington University in St. Louis College Prep Program. This multiyear initiative prepares high-achieving students with limited financial resources for

college.

As a College Prep scholar, Williams will spend three summers studying in Washington University laboratories and studios, attending classes led by university faculty and learning the skills needed to thrive in college. She will also have the opportunity to attend university cultural events and meet with university experts to navigate the college application process.

"I am consistently impressed with the level of thoughtfulness and individuality that our scholars bring to the table, and cohort nine scholars are true examples of that," said Ashley Prince, assistant director of programming and scholar success. "We are excited to learn from them while they learn from us over the next few years."

The College Prep Program was established in 2014 to prepare scholars for success at a college or university that best matches their interests and needs. Graduates of the program leave ready to excel, both academically and socially, with the program continuing to provide scholars with programming opportunities, college visits and ongoing individualized support.

Nonprofit organizations partner for National Foster a Pet Month to encourage more pet parents to lend a (temporary) hand or home to pets in need during busy summer season

In addition to helping a pet in need, we will have a "Spin the wheel" game for free for prize for all fosters! We are open for walk-ins from 10-5 pm all weekend.

"We took in 149 animals in 13 days at the beginning of May! For a shelter that is so small and has not enough space to put all these animals that come in daily, and limited staff, we truly need the help from the community to foster our pets waiting for a home" said Weng Horak, CEO & Founder of CARE STL. Through our partnership with Petco Love, we're excited to take part in National Foster a Pet Month and build on this event's positive momentum to help save more lives year-round."

Establishing June as National Foster a Pet Month to increase participation in fostering is just one of the lifesaving actions led by Petco Love in their 23-year history of helping pets, with \$330 million invested in lifesaving efforts and 6.5 million pets adopted – and counting. Skechers has contributed more than \$8 million to help over 1.5 million shelter pets, including saving 1.1 million rescued pets in the United States and Canada.

Cardinal Ritter Senior Services' Gala Raises Over \$200,000



Cardinal Ritter Senior Services (CRSS) – one of South County's largest independent and assisted living nonprofit communities – recently raised \$203,993 at its 19th annual Heart & Cross Gala. Proceeds from the benefit will provide social, health, and housing programs and services for those in need.

The gala honored Heart & Cross recipient Jacquelin Naunheim, a former board member and nearly 30-year CRSS supporter. The award is presented by the CRSS' Board of Directors to an individual, group or program who serves senior adults.

Two board members, Joe Downs and Steve Young, were recognized for their service as they termed off the board. Downs has served as the board president since 2018, and Young was on the board for more than 20 years. The evening also recognized the retirement of Catholic Charities president Theresa Ruzicka and CRSS' Ann Jones, who worked at the nonprofit's Our Lady of Life community for more than 30 years.

"The gala's generous supporters enable us to continue serving those who need us most," said Cardinal Ritter Senior Services' CEO Chris Baechle. "I am thrilled to say we raised more than \$200,000, which will provide a myriad of programs and services to those who live without adequate means." Baechle added that there is no Medicaid coverage in Missouri for assisted living facilities, so "the funds raised help older adults who need our assistance because they may not have safe living options in our community."


















Pictorial St. Louis A Topographical Survey Drawn in Perspective A.D. 1875

This is a reprint of the 1971 version of the original book. The book was painstakingly scanned from the original in my collection. Each page is reproduced in high resolution and coil bound so the pages lay flat while viewing. Printed on 12" x 18" high quality acid free paper. A nice edition to your historical book collection. Perfect coffee table book as people are attracted by the cover art.

PICTORIAL ST. LOUIS: The Great Metropolis of the Mississippi Valley A Topographical Survey, Drawn From Perspective 1875.

Illustrations by Camille N. Dry and designed & edited by Rich. J. Compton.

Over 220 pages of illustrations and descriptions of life in St. Louis in the late 1800's. The preliminary drawings for this work were made early in the spring of 1874. After a careful consideration of the subject, it was determined to locate the point of view so that the city would be seen from the southeast, believing that to be the most advantageous in all respects. Accordingly, the point of site was established on the Illinois side of the river, looking to the northwest, and at sufficient altitude to overlook the roofs of ordinary houses into the streets.

A careful perspective, which required a surface of three hundred square feet, was then erected from a correct survey of the city, extending northward from Arsenal Island to the Water Works, a distance of about ten miles, on the river front; and from the Insane Asylum on the southwest to the Cemeteries on the northwest.

Every foot of the vast territory within these limits has been carefully examined and topographically drawn in perspective, by Mr. C. N. Dry and his assistants, and the faithfulness and accuracy with which this work has been done an examination of the pages will attest. Absolute truth and accuracy in the representation of the territory has been the standard and in no cases have additions or alterations been made unless the same were actually in course of construction. In a few cases, important public and private edifices that are not yet finished are shown completed, and as they will appear when done.

All the buildings within the limits of the survey in July, 1875, are shown; and a very large number of those executed or commenced since that date have been also introduced, the pages having been constantly corrected up to the last possible moment before publication.

Preliminary Reports Indicate 11 Traffic Fatalities, No Boating Fatalities, & One Drowning Over Memorial Day Weekend

Missouri State Highway Patrol troopers investigated the following over the 2022 Memorial Day holiday weekend:

Traffic Statistics

Crashes -- 304 Injuries -- 115 Fatalities -- 9 DWI -- 121

Drug Arrests -- 79

[Note: The Aurora/Marionville Police Department and the Florissant Police Department each investigated one traffic fatality, bringing the total traffic fatalities to 11 for the 2022 holiday weekend.]

Boating Statistics

Crashes -- 19 Injuries -- 13 Fatalities -- 0 Drowning -- 1 BWI -- 6 Drug Arrests -- 0

(Note: During the 2021 counting period, the Patrol investigated 258 traffic crashes, which included 84 injuries and four of the 10 fatalities. Also, over the 2021 Memorial Day holiday: Marine operations troopers investigated 12 boating crashes, which included one fatality and three injuries. Troopers made 57 driving while intoxicated arrests and eight boating while intoxicated arrests. One person drowned over the 2021 Memorial Day holiday.)

One person drowned Sunday, May 29, 2022. Matthew D. Frazier, 40, of Neosho, MO, drowned after he entered the Elk River to retrieve a boat paddle and was swept downstream. Overcome by exhaustion, Frazier drowned. The drowning occurred in McDonald County on the Elk River one-half mile south of Ginger Blue. McDonald County Assistant Coroner Johnathan Fletcher pronounced Frazier deceased. Frazier was not wearing a life jacket.

There were no traffic fatalities within the counting period on Friday, May 27, 2022.

Three people died in traffic crashes on Saturday, May 28, 2022. **Terry M. Hirschy, 63,** of Collins, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating turned into the path of another vehicle while attempting to cross the highway. The crash occurred in St. Clair County on Missouri Highway 13 north of Collins, MO. Hirschy was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Assistant Coroner Michael Watson pronounced Hirschy dead at the scene of the crash. The other vehicle's driver was not injured.

Mary M. Gladbach, 28, of Shawnee, KS, died when a vehicle crossed the center of the roadway, sideswiped another vehicle, then crashed head-on into the vehicle transporting Gladbach. The crash occurred in Laclede County on Missouri Highway 32 east of Lebanon, MO. The driver of the vehicle transporting Gladbach sustained serious injuries; both he and Gladbach were wearing seat belts. It is unknown whether or not the driver of the vehicle that crossed the center of the roadway was wearing a seat belt. He sustained serious injuries. The driver of the third vehicle involved in the crash was wearing a seat belt and was not injured.

Micah A. Shurtleff, 45, of Villa Ridge, MO, died when another vehicle failed to maintain its lane and crossed the center of the roadway. The front left corner of the vehicle struck the front left of Shurtleff's vehicle. The crash occurred in Franklin County on St. Mary's Road south of Brinkman Road. Dr. Eric Cleaton, Mercy Hospital Washington, pronounced Shurtleff dead at the hospital. Shurtleff, the passenger in Shurtleff's vehicle, and the other driver were all wearing seat belts at the time of the crash. The others sustained minor injuries in the crash. Franklin County Sheriff's Department deputies also responded to the scene.

Five people died in traffic crashes on Sunday, May 29, 2022. **Joshua J. Tripp, 26,** of Park Hills, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating traveled off the right side of the roadway and struck a road sign. The crash occurred in St. Francois County on Missouri Route O west of Hillsboro Road. Tripp was not wearing a helmet and was ejected. Deputy Coroner Greg Armstrong pronounced Tripp dead at the scene of the crash. St. Francois County Sheriff's Department deputies also responded to the scene.

Bruce A. Dunlop, 72, of St. Louis, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating failed to negotiate a curve, traveled off the right side of the roadway, and overturned. The crash occurred in Ste. Genevieve County on Missouri Route O north of Missouri Highway 32. Dunlop was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Ste. Genevieve County EMS pronounced Dunlop dead at the scene of the crash.

Corey A. McCoy, 35, of Farmington, MO, died when the motorcycle he was operating traveled off the right side of the roadway and struck a tree. The crash occurred in Iron County on Missouri Highway N northwest of Ironton, MO. McCoy was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash.

Trinity A. Roberts, 46, of Kansas City, MO, died when the vehicle she was operating traveled off the roadway in a roundabout intersection and overturned. The crash occurred in Lafayette County where Missouri Highway 131 intersects with Missouri Highway 24. Roberts was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Lafayette County Deputy Coroner T. Fyffe pronounced Roberts dead at the scene of the crash. Lafayette County Sheriff's Department deputies also responded to the scene.

The Florissant Police Department investigated a fatality traffic crash. No further information is available at this time.

Three people died on Memorial Day, Monday, May 30, 2022. **William M. Dickey, 38,** of Bolivar, MO, died when the vehicle he was operating crossed the center of the roadway, began to skid, traveled off the left side of the roadway, struck an embankment, and overturned. The crash occurred in Polk County on Missouri Highway 32 west of Bolivar, MO. Dickey was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Dr. Nathan Walters pronounced Dickey dead at Citizens Memorial

Hospital in Bolivar, MO.

Jarrett B. Sarver, 22, of O'Fallon, IL, died after he stopped in traffic due to congestion, a second motorcycle struck his motorcycle, and Sarver was ejected and struck by a third motorcycle. The crash occurred in Washington County on Missouri Highway 21 at Purcell Drive. Dr. Bockting pronounced Sarver dead at Mercy Hospital South. All three motorcycle operators were wearing helmets at the time of the crash. The second motorcycle operator sustained minor injuries; the third motorcycle operator was not injured.

The Aurora-Marionville Police Department investigated a fatality traffic crash. No further details are available at this time.

NOTE: The statistics provided could change if late deaths occur, other departments report crashes or incidents, a fatality is determined to be a drowning, or if a fatality is determined to be caused by a medical condition after this news release was posted.

Maplewood's Woodside Receives the McReynolds Award from Missouri Preservation

he McReynolds Awards, named in honor of Elizabeth McReynolds Rozier, are given annually to individuals or groups who have made significant achievements in the field or are in the midst of a long-term preservation project, creating synergy in the field of historic preservation. Learn more about the award at www.preservemo.org

The Missouri State Capitol in Jefferson City was bustling on April 19th as award recipients from around the state gathered. The McReynolds award was presented to the owners of Woodside but also recognized the many people that played an integral part in the preservation and restoration of this landmark.

Woodside (2200 Bredell) was built c. 1849 as the home of Charles S. and Mary Warder Rannells and is believed to be the oldest building in Maplewood. In June 2016, the City of Maplewood sold Woodside to Brendon D. Papineau and Elizabeth (Libby) M. Farmer with preservation covenant restrictions, the culmination of a 15-year effort by Maplewood preservation advocates to save the home.

Unfortunately, despite all of the community's efforts to save and preserve the old farmhouse, by the time Papineau and Farmer stepped forward the building was in dire condition. The frame

house was leaning, the mortar in the stone foundation had turned to dust, the wood beams that formed the sill plate for the exterior walls had been crushed, and a portion of the foundation had fallen. The list of structural issues was extensive. Papineau and Farmer consulted with preservation professionals, including Maplewood resident, Jennifer Sims Taylor of Fendler and Associates.

The renovation project began with house movers jacking the house up (a precarious project considering all the structural rot/damage to the wood beams) and replacing the basement/foundation walls. Then, the wood sill plate was replaced, the damaged wood beams were sistered and steel beams were added to support the house structure. The house was lowered back down off the jacks—now resting at about the height it was in the early historic photos instead of crushed down into the ground.

MISSOURI BOTANICAL GARDEN TO OFFER FREE ADMISSION ON JUNETEENTH

Admission free at all three Garden sites, Garden to offer special activities

The Missouri Botanical Garden will offer free admission to all visitors on Sunday, June 19 in honor of Juneteenth. Visitors can spend a restful and restorative day in the Garden and partake in special activities planned for the day. Admission to the Children's Garden will also be free for the day. Visitors to the Children's Garden will receive an okra plug for a "pot-a-plant" activity while supplies last. Okra has strong ties to the African American experience. It was brought to America through the transatlantic slave route, likely as provisions for enslaved people. It is one of the few crops from Africa that could grow in the American climate. It is still used abundantly in Southern cuisine, one of the hallmarks of African diaspora in American cooking.

Dr. Jessica Harris, acclaimed author and featured guest on the Netflix series "High on the Hog," talks about the history of okra and other important foods in the African American community in her presentation "The History is on the Plate: Deconstructing African American Food History." Harris gave this free virtual presentation for the Garden in February. A recording of the presentation will be played in the Garden's PlantLab from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Sunday, June 19.

The Garden will also share an interpretive visitor guide highlighting significant contributions of African Americans to advance botanical science throughout history. The guide will also offer opportunities for onsite exploration at the Garden, self-reflection, nature journaling, and meditation. Visitors are invited to explore the George Washington Carver Garden, dedicated to Missouri-native scientist Dr. George Washington Carver who greatly influenced 19th and 20th century agriculture and education.

Admission will also be free for all visitors at the Butterfly House in Chesterfield and Shaw Nature Reserve in Gray Summit on Sunday, June 19.

The Butterfly House will screen a film created by the University of Wisconsin-Madison that celebrates historic Black entomologists throughout the day.

The Missouri Botanical Garden's mission is "to discover and share knowledge about plants and their environment in order to preserve and enrich life." Today, 163 years after opening, the Missouri Botanical Garden is a National Historic Landmark and a center for science, conservation, education and horticultural display.

This new technology provides Brentwood police officers with immediate notifications when a vehicle that is wanted for a crime enters the Brentwood jurisdiction.

Since the installation of these cameras, Brentwood officers have interrupted countless car break-ins, identified stolen vehicles, and made several felony arrests as a direct result of notifications from Flock. As private businesses and neighborhood associations begin to show interest in these cameras, the Police Department looks forward to continued success in using this technology to assist with protecting the City of Brentwood.

As a reminder: To help discourage thieves from coming to Brentwood, lock your car doors and keep valuables out of your vehicles; this includes firearms, extra keys, electronics, purses, wallets, garage door openers, and anything else of value.

Brentwood Receives \$300,000 Grant for Wetland Project

The City of Brentwood received a \$300,000 grant from the Missouri Department of Resources' Division of Environmental Quality, Soil and Water Conservation Program. The grant will allow the City to design and construct an extended wetland pond north of the confluence of Deer Creek and Black Creek.

With this grant funding, Brentwood can enhance the design of the confluence point to aid in flood mitigation as well as to confer significant water quality benefits.

The .75 acre pond will have .25 acres dedicated as a wetland for water quality treatment. The design will incorporate a varied topography to allow pockets of runoff to form shallow semi-permanent to permanent pools for optimal plant and wildlife habitat.

Installation of shallow emergent zones with native species and a heterogeneous mix of plants will improve the biological diversity of the site.

Construction on this project is scheduled to begin in spring or summer 2022, as weather permits.

Students in Brentwood High School's 94th graduating class were awarded more than \$2.3 million in scholarships this year, Principal Dr. Ed Johnson said during the school's commencement ceremony held Saturday, May 14 in the BHS Auditorium.

Of the 54 graduates in the Class of 2022, 43 plan to attend a two- or four-year college. Students submitted 182 applications to 90 colleges and universities nationwide, and selected 17 different schools to continue their academic careers, including Saint Louis University, the University of Missouri and the University of Alabama.

In addition, five graduates have applied for postsecondary support through Missouri Vocational Rehabilitation, which specializes in employment and training services for students receiving special education services.

Senior speakers Da'Marion Pierce-Williams and Nirmita Vijayalingam challenged classmates to use their high school experiences to make an impact on the future. Pierce-Williams spoke to the Class of 2022 about emotional intelligence and perseverance.

"Don't give up that hope. Don't crack under pressure. Take that risk that makes you feel special. Hold on to what makes that special someone feel special. Hold on to that determination and run with it, and I promise you, you will flourish," Pierce-Williams said.

Vijayalingam encouraged her classmates to use their voices to make the world a better place.


"We are a group of incredible leaders who believe and advocate for so many good things. We have the power to use our voices to make a difference in the world, and we have never backed down in the face of a challenge," Vijayalingam said.

Seniors Quynh Vo and Penelope Herrera described overcoming the obstacles created by the COVID-19 pandemic in their senior class opening and closing remarks. "We have lived through a future history book chapter," Vo said.

"These major events have helped shape us into more flexible, patient and persevering young adults, and there is no way we will ever be able to forget them," Herrera added.

The Class of 2022 was awarded 86 scholarships, including 32 A+ Program candidates and four Missouri Bright Flight recipients. The veteran and the rookie: how Cardinals Albert Pujols and Juan Yepez are building a special relationship

When Juan Yepez walked into the visiting clubhouse in Kansas City almost a month ago, ready to make his major-league debut, he was welcomed with a long bear hug from Albert Pujols.

The two, the seasoned veteran and the wide-eyed rookie, have almost literally been joined at the hip ever since.

"I think he (Pujols) allows him to go to the bathroom by himself and that's about it," said Cardinals' manager Oli Marmol.

The way Pujols and Yepez have formed such a quick bond since that hug on May 4 has not surprised Marmol, who hoped from the day the Cardinals signed Pujols that the future Hall of Famer's influence on the team's young players, such as Yepez, would be one of the extended benefits of the move.

"When we decided to sign Albert in spring training, I pulled Yepez in the office and told him, 'This move obviously directly impacts you making the club, but you can go in two directions. You can be frustrated by it or you can latch yourself to one of the greatest righthanded hitters ever to play this game and take advantage of the fact that he's going to be in the same building as you.'

"What he (Yepez) has done since day one is extract as much value from Albert as possible."

Yepez was optioned to Memphis to start the season, but when Edmundo Sosa had to be placed on the Covid IL, it opened a spot on the roster and Yepez has taken full advantage of it – to play, and to learn.

What Yepez quickly learned was that Pujols, despite his gawdy career numbers and a big difference in their ages, was willing to make himself available anytime Yepez had a question or needed help with something.

"He asks a lot of questions," Pujols said. "I love it. He's a really humble kid, and really fun to be around."

The fact that Pujols has been so open to helping Yepez, and the Cardinals' other young players, is something that Yepez quickly come to appreciate – and something he certainly is not taking for granted.

"He was like, 'Don't be shy to ask any questions, I'm here for you," Yepez said. "Since that day I've just been asking questions."

The questions have run the gamut – from checking on what Pujols saw in a particular at-bat to big picture thoughts about the game, or about life. Pujols has welcomed them all, even though he jokes that he is glad when Yepez goes onto the field to play defense so he can get a little bit of a break.

"He's said a couple of times that I talk a lot and ask a lot of questions," Yepez said, "but he's told me he had a lot people he would talk to and ask questions."

That, indeed, is one of the reasons Pujols is happy to take the time to answer all of the questions from Yepez, who was just a 3-year-old toddler in Venezuela when Pujols made his major-league debut in 2001.

"When I see him I see myself," Pujols said. "I see myself walking into old Busch Stadium and asking questions to the veteran guys. Sometimes I know I felt I was asking a little bit too much but those guys enjoyed it. It helped me out to become who I am today.

to become who I am today.

"My teammates that I had had a big impact in my life

and my career. This is part of my responsibility any my role."

Among the players a young Pujols turned to for advice and answers were Placido Polanco, Jim Edmonds, Edgar Renteria, Mike Matheny and even the late Darryl Kile.

"He (Kile) was one of the guys who told me, 'I'm doing this for you' and he wasn't even a position player," Pujols said.

"He said, 'I know you are going to do it for somebody else' and that stuck with me for the rest of my life."

What Pujols has appreciated about the questions from Yepez is that they all revolve around the same goal – the quest for knowledge about the game, and about what he can do to become a better player.

"He's willing to be open and to listen," Pujols said. "He wants to learn and he wants to get better. You don't see that with a lot of young guys right now.

"If I don't have the answer I try to find out. I just want to try to make him comfortable. This game is a game of making adjustments. He's aware of that, and he knows what he needs to do. He's a good player with talent and he knows what he wants to do at the plate and with his approach and that is something that is really good. He's really mature for his age."

Part of that maturity is illustrated by the respect that Yepez had for Pujols long before they met in person, before Yepez would allow himself to consider Pujols his teammate and friend

"For as long as I can remember I've seen Albert Pujols and heard of him," Yepez said. "He is a legend. Being here and having him treat me this way helps me. It's a God thing. He put him here for a reason and I'm here for a reason. It's pretty special.

"I was talking to my family and I was like, 'He's the machine. He's the legend.' It's hard to see him as a teammate. I see him more as kind of a father figure.



My ears are wide open listening to what he has to say to me." Part of Yepez's respect for Pujols comes from all of the work that Pujols has done for his foundation and other charities.

"I told him I was so proud of what he did on the field but also what he did off the field," Yepez said. "I wanted to tell him how I looked up to him."

Much of their time together has been spent discussing the proper mental approach that Yepez wants to take into each at-bat. Having the physical tools necessary to succeed at the major-league level is something that Pujols knows — and Yepez is learning — isn't always enough.

"One of the things he told me was to be aggressive and not to take any at-bat for granted," Yepez said. "He's been helping me relax. When I go out there I feel relaxed because he is there telling me how good I am. Albert Pujols telling me how good I am is pretty special."

What Marmol has observed about Yepez's relationship with Pujols is that the benefits of all the time they are spending together can't be measured by the results of one particular at-bat or even what happens during one game. Some of the benefits might be apparent immediately, resulting from a piece of advice that Pujols shared, but sometimes theywon't

be that obvious

"It's a great relationship of one of the greatest to ever do it teaching the next guy up what it looks like," Marmol said. "Albert has made himself extremely approachable not only to Yepez but to everybody in that clubhouse. It's an amazing trait.

"Some stuff that they talk about will come into play immediately and some of it will take time."

Pujols realizes that because of his accomplishments in the game, and the age difference, some younger players might be reluctant to approach him for help. He's glad Yepez wasn't like that.

"One thing you need to learn is that you can't be intimidated by anybody in this game," Pujols told him. "I'm not going to force you to listen to me just because I have experience. I can tell you about the adjustments that might have helped me, but you have to figure out what is going to help you. You have to find that out for yourself. But my goal is to be open and willing to help."

Yepez didn't take long to learn that.

"I will keep reaching out to him but at the end when you go out there you are alone, just you against the pitcher," Yepez said. "I am trusting what got me here. I just want to play the game and have fun, trusting my abilities.

"Sometimes I still have some butterflies, but I definitely feel more comfortable now. I know there are ups and downs in baseball and everybody has stretches where it's hard. He (Pujols) has helped me relax and remember it's just a game."

From what Pujols has observed, and learned, about Yepez, it's a game that Yepez should be good at for a long time.

"He's got the talent," Pujols said. "There still is a long ways to go but he's going to be OK at this level as long as he sticks with his approach and what he wants to do at the plate."

Pujols also knows there also will likely come a day when a new player, fresh up from the minor leagues, will be asking Yepez for advice and suggestions.

"I'm not going to be around forever," Pujols said.

While Pujols is here, however, it won't be hard to find him – just look for Yepez and Pujols likely will be standing right next to him.

"I'm very thankful and really appreciate all the time he is taking with me," Yepez said.

Central European Dining In Central St. Louis County

I think by now you know I like to indulge my hunger with different styles of cuisine. I find Central European dining to be a never ending combination of many types of western European staples with middle eastern spices and methods of preparation. What more could you ask for?

By the mid 90's St. Louis became the home to the largest Bosnian population outside of Europe. They brought with them their work ethic that has reclaimed and rejuvenated more than a few St. Louis neighborhoods. They also brought their unique recipes and styles of cooking, including the preparation of food in wood fired ovens.

The Balkan Treat box started as a food truck and has evolved into a brick and mortar property at 8103 Big Bend Blvd in Webster Groves.. There you find a group of hungry people waiting for them to open at 11am Tuesday through Saturday and they are open "until they sell out".



When you enter the restaurant you are given a menu so that when you reach the counter you will be ready to order. You are given a number for your table. You then get your beverage of



choice, have a seat, and your lunch will be delivered to you in a matter of minutes.



Sue ordered the Pide, a Turkish Flat Bread, cheese, Ajvar, kajmak, herbs, with a side of cabbage salad. It comes in many styles including Beef, chicken, daily vegetable, vegetarian,

vegan and cheese. Like most items, it comes fresh from the wood fired oven.





I had the Cevapi, grilled Beef Sausages in Somun, Kajmak, onion, with a side of cabbage salad. It can also be a half order and I should have ordered that. The whole order was humongous!

Other items include a "Balkan Burger" a number of items that resemble a "wrap" sandwich and more. I think I may have to keep going back until I have tried everything on their menu.

We had no room for a dessert, but the rice pudding with pistachio and rose petals sounded delightful.

I realized I am late to the game after seeing the nationwide coverage they have already received such as: Bon Appétit, the Chicago Tribune, Condé Nast Traveler, Delta Sky Magazine, Esquire, MSN, Forbes, Food & Wine, Food Network, James Beard Award Semifinalists, Men's Journal, PBS, New York Times, Southwest Magazine, Travel + Leisure, USA Today: the Wall Street Journal, the Washington Post, Yahoo, ZAGAT and literally every media outlet in the St. Louis area. I might add that all this recognition is very well deserved.

Free parking is available just behind the restaurant. They will ship orders nationwide, and you may also order on line and pick-up on site.

There is nothing pretentious about the Balkan Treat Box. It is just great international style food at a reasonable price. Give it a try, you will love it.

How to Save at the Pump as Gas Prices Soar

While you may not be able to entirely escape soaring gas prices, there are several strategies you can implement in your everyday routine to help you save money.

Use a gas price app

If you do only one thing, this is it. Shopping around on a gas app will quickly show you the cheapest gas in your area or along your intended route. While GasBuddy is perhaps the best-known gas app, there are others available. And you can filter the results to show the price of different fuel grades and which stations offer diesel.

Join a fuel rewards program

Grocery store loyalty programs have been and continue to be a great way to save money on gas. And now even gas stations are getting in on the game and offering their own gas rewards programs.

Pay with a credit card that offers a good rewards program

Getting extra cash back or points for gas station spending is great because you reap rewards for money you would spend anyway — and big gas spenders will rack up more rewards than average. But remember, if you are using a credit card, pay off the entire balance or the interest will wipe out any gas price savings.

Slow down & drive more efficiently

This might be a no brainer, but driving at slower speeds can save you money. It may increase the length of your trip so consider how much longer you'll spend driving if you're cruising at 50 mph versus the speed limit on the highway. Additionally, speeding up quickly and braking suddenly can reduce fuel efficiency. Using cruise control can help improve fuel efficiency.

Combine errands as much as possible

Your fuel economy is worse when your engine is cold than when it is warmed up. So, several short trips taken from a cold start can use twice as much fuel as a longer, multipurpose trip covering the same distance.

Maintain a healthy vehicle

Get regular maintenance checks to avoid fuel economy problems due to worn spark plugs, dragging brakes, sagging belts, low transmission fluid, or transmission problems.

Fixing a serious maintenance problem, such as a faulty oxygen sensor, can improve mileage by as much as 40%. Other things you can do include:

Use the grade of motor oil your car's manufacturer recommends. Using a different grade of motor oil can lower your gas mileage by 1%-2%.

Inflate your tires to the pressure listed in your owner's manual or on a sticker that is either in the glove box or driver's side door jamb. This number may differ from the maximum pressure listed on your tire's sidewall.

Don't ignore the check-engine light—it can alert you to problems that affect fuel economy as well as more serious problems, even when your vehicle seems to be running fine.


Switch to a fuel-efficient vehicle

Are you looking to make a bigger and lasting change? Switching from a car that gets 20 MPG to one that gets 30+ MPG amounts to \$1122 per year (assuming 15,000 miles of driving annually and a fuel cost of \$4.49). That's \$5,612 extra in fuel costs over five years! And fuel-efficient models come in all shapes and sizes, so you need not sacrifice utility or size.

Bottom line

While it's unclear how long high gas prices will stick around but getting a gas rewards credit card, enrolling in a gas loyalty program, hunting down cheap gas and making tweaks to how you drive could all help you save dollars when filling up your tank. 


KFC/SANDERS CAFE & MUSEUM

With summer here and families taking off on road trips it is time to think about food on the road.

Kevin and I recently headed off to eastern Tennessee. On our way back home we stopped at a very interesting restaurant to eat and to tour the unique museum. As we exited the highway ramp we were beckoned by a large white bucket trimmed in red with the face of Colonel Harlan Sanders of Kentucky Fried Chicken fame. Colonel Sanders 1890 – 1980. The title "Colonel" was honorary not the military rank. During the Depression he began selling his fried chicken from his roadside gas station motel restaurant in North Corbin, Kentucky. He developed his famous "Secret Recipe" and his patented method of cooking chicken in a pressure fryer. He recognized the potential of restaurant franchising and opened the first KFC franchise in South Salt Lake, Utah in 1952. He devoted himself full-time to franchising his fried chicken throughout the country.



The original 1940's building was restored and it was added to the National Register of Historical Places in 1990. There is a model of his original kitchen and a hotel room. To find out more go to www.KFC.com


